WASHINGTON (AP) The new Congress convened today in fireworks over leadership posts and legislative rules, and with battles looming over measures President Johnson is expected to propose for his great society."

In a mood for change and in hopes to create a new party image, House Republicans threw out Rep. Charles A. Halleck of Indiana as their floor leader and replaced him with Rep. Gerald R. Ford of Michigan. The vote was 73-67.


