A town-owned tract between McKee and Lyness Sts. has been approved by the town directors as the site for a new West Side firehouse. The board has also voted to allocate \$8,000 to architect Arnold Lawrence to draw detailed plans for the firehouse.

The proposed firehouse will replace the present Company No. 1 house at Pine St. and Hartford Rd., which General Manager Richard Martin noted last night was poorly heated and not sound enough to house heavy fire fighting trucks.

Figures for MMH Rise for 1964

Manchester Memorial Hospital had a busy 1964, according to figures released today. The number of births decreased from 1,592 in 1963 to 1,581 in 1964, but everything else increased.

There were 225 more patients admitted (13,907 in 1964, and the average length of stay increased by almost one half a day, from 4.5 days to 6.9 days.

In comparison with 1963, the average daily census was up 18 to 252; the number of operations increased 426, to 6,331; and emergency room visits rose 77, to 39,742.

These figures were computed by Richard Felton, the hospital's administrative assistant.

MEAs Seeks to Meet School Board on Pay

The Manchester Education Association will seek a meeting with the entire board of education in an attempt to raise teachers' salaries by at least \$35,000 over the proposed increases set Dec. 15 by the personnel committee of the board.

Wolfe, Atty. William Collins, chairman of the board personnel committee, said that such a procedure was more desirable.

The MEA wants a total increase of about \$200,000 over the present salary schedule. The personnel committee proposed one of about \$165,000. Monday, the Manchester Federation of Teachers asked the personnel committee for a total increase of about \$197,000.

This action was the result of a sense of meeting motion voted unanimously by about 80 MEA members yesterday afternoon. The general meeting, held at the Flung Junior High School cafeteria, did not represent a quorum, so no official motion was made.

At the middle level, dissatisfaction was voiced over the increase received at tenure.

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New Yorker Held As Russian Spy

WASHINGTON (AP)—FBI agents seized a 29-year-old New Yorker today and charged him with conspiring to transmit U.S. military secrets to the Soviet Union.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover identified the man as Robert M. Thompson, a self-employed fuel oil distributor. He said FBI investigation revealed that Thompson had been serving with the U.S. Air Force in Berlin in 1947.

Hoover said a Soviet national, Fedor Kudashkin, is named as a co-conspirator with the spy, and that intelligence and counterintelligence activities of the United States government.

Hoover said Thompson, a resident of New York City, was employed by Kudashkin as a Soviet national formerly employed by the U.S. secretariat in New York but now living in Russia.

Thompson lives with his wife and three children at 1833 N. Gardner Drive, Bay Shore, N.Y. He is a native of New York and veteran of six years in the Air Force, having served in West Berlin, Labrador, and several posts in the United States.

White House officials today said they were not aware of the case.

Police Find Wanted Man In Hartford

HARTFORD (AP)—Hartford police picked up a man today in connection with a gun battle that followed the theft of a fur store in downtown Springfield, Conn.

The man, identified as James Womack, did not offer much resistance when he was spotted by Patrolman Damase Chervier in Hartford's North End section shortly after 7 a.m.

Detectives said that the man was leading police to the gun battle. Another man was shot in the leg and hospitalized along with Seymour.

Wessex Memorial Hospital authorities tentatively identified the man as Raymond Henry in Baltimore, Md. Police, who had said the wounded man may have been an innocent bystander, did not release his name immediately.

The bandits' car was found parked on Main Street in Hartford, Conn., about an hour after it was driven away. It had three holes in the right side, where the burglary occurred.

He said he believes he shot and wounded the man who fired at him.

Both Seymour and the other man were reported in good condition last night. The patrolman is slated to undergo surgery today for removal of the bullet.

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President's Health Program Attacks 'Three Great Killers'

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson handed Congress today a vast program for advancing the nation's health, coupling hospital insurance for the aged under Social Security with an all-out attack on "the three great killers," heart disease, cancer and stroke.

The President called, too, on the other end of the age scale, for the federal government to pay part of cost of medical and dental care for children in needy families. The program would cost more than the health center plan.

He also proposed that the government pick up part of the cost of health care of patients, hospital students, and set up a system of health research necessary and the 1966 budget.

Johnson also called for a 10 per cent increase in federal expenditures for such research and related training.

Johnson said that last year's medical school graduates came from families with more than \$10,000 yearly incomes, and urged that access to the profession must be denied to able young men from lower income groups.

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Democrats Rule No Contest For Openings In Key Posts

WASHINGTON (AP)—House Democrats picked three new members today for one of the most important committees of Congress, Ways and Means.

The Democratic caucus today named Rep. Phil M. Landrum of Georgia as the new member to succeed the late Rep. Charles A. Vanik of Ohio. There was no contest for the openings, as there was on a previous occasion when Landrum lost out, even though he had the backing of House Democrats.

All three are backers of the kind of health care for the aged President Johnson wants.

Today's action was important for the Democrats.

The three new members should give the administration no choice of the committee a bill providing health care for the aged under Social Security. This is a key item of President Johnson's legislative agenda for the coming year.

The Democratic members of the Ways and Means Committee also choose the assignments of party members to other House committees. There is always a contest to elect members to the major committees.

House Republicans planned a meeting of their own to continue the fight for organizing for the new session.

Among the proposed rule changes for the party conference is one which could conveniently clear out the rest of the Old Guard holdovers in leadership positions and allow new members to take office.

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Principal's Report in New York Sapphire Recovered

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Allan Dale Kuhn, two New York detectives and an assistant district attorney disappeared today after a reported attempt to recover the fabulous Star of India sapphire.

They vanished after a long, cat-and-mouse game with newsmen, clinaxed by a taxicab chase in Hartford's North End section shortly after 7 a.m.

Whether they have the 56-carat sapphire was not learned, but a newsmen said one of the detectives had an attaché case handcuffed to his wrist when last seen.

There was speculation they had returned to New York. Kuhn was spotted by a man who said his name was "Charlie Smith." He said he was not a detective.

The two later bolted from Kuhn's apartment and disappeared.

Before daybreak, a newsmen found Kuhn again this time at the "Dunes Motel" in Miami Beach. Four other men were with him.

Registered at the motel was Asst. Dist. Atty. Maurice Nadler, who said he was not a detective.

West Porter, newsmen for radio station WJZ, tried to question one of the four.

"They apparently didn't get into the case," he said. "I got this report." Kuhn, a taxi driver, picked up Kuhn and the other four and drove away.

They stopped several blocks away, Porter said, and Kuhn made a telephone call from a booth. Five minutes later, a white limousine arrived at the phone booth, the five jumped into it from the parked car and took off again.

That was the last newsmen saw of them here.

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Bolton Cocconi Maintains His Bid \$1,000 Lower for Tractor

Ray Cocconi, local sales representative for the Capitol Tractor Co., of Westport, Conn., said yesterday that "no matter how you figure it" the Ford tractor he bid is still about \$1,000 less than the tractor the town is buying.

The Public Buildings Commission (PBC) awarded the bid for a multi-purpose tractor for the high school to the Crown Manufacturing Co. of Hartford at a meeting Dec. 21.

At its meeting Monday night the commission presented figures and information to justify not taking the lowest bid, but one of the original intent of the commission was to award the tractor to the Ford.

The commission's bid figures for the Crown company's Massey-Ferguson tractor but not the Ford from its total price. According to the PBC, this tractor brought the actual value difference to the town down to about \$1,000.

It is this figure and the original bid figures that Cocconi disputes. He said that he knew it was too late now to bid, but he wanted to set the record straight.

Cocconi gave the following figures on the two tractors as recorded when they were submitted: Tractor alone, Ford \$1,995; Massey-Ferguson, \$3,321.95; cab, Ford, \$970; Massey-Ferguson, \$2,777; total, Ford, \$1,025; Massey-Ferguson, \$6,098.95.

The Ford total price was \$1,004, he said. The addition of a 12-speed transmission at \$200 and a 10-hp diesel engine at \$100 brought the net figure to \$1,304, including all discounts.

Cocconi said the total Massey-Ferguson figure came to \$4,068.95. The five per cent discount would make it \$3,865.50, he said.

The PBC quoted the total figure on the two tractors as follows: Ford with 12-speed transmission, 12-volt ignition and yellow paint, \$2,295; Massey-Ferguson with six-speed transmission, differential lock, 13-volt ignition and yellow paint, \$2,890.

Conducted at work today, PBC Chairman Douglas Cheney said that the Massey-Ferguson tractor, with cab, plus a 12-hp diesel engine, comes to \$4,146, including a five per cent discount. Subtracting the Ford figure of \$2,304, gives a figure of \$1,842, the difference in price between the two tractors.

Cheney explained the difference in his figure for the Massey-Ferguson tractor and Cocconi's figure of \$4,356.60 and Cheney, \$4,146. Cheney said the Crown Company could not provide both a shuttle transmission and differential lock, as the PBC had requested. The Ford was not bid with the specified tractor, which were 12-hp and 10-hp. Cocconi said he had bid on 13 x 28. Extra for larger rear tires, Cocconi said, would run \$80, and not the \$150 listed by the PBC. He said he had bid according to specifications on the front tires.

Cocconi said that the 18-gallon per minute front-mounted pump, which the PBC valued at around \$225, was not necessary on the Ford since it had its own pump for raising and lowering the plow.

Low Attendance Cited in Closing Of Teen Center

The Rockville Recreation Commission has announced that the Teen Center at Henry Park has been closed. Attendance was among the lowest in its first appearance here several years ago, and this decline is cited as the reason for its closing.

The center was opened Nov. 14 and has operated a total of ten sessions through Dec. 29. Over this six-week period, the total membership was only 19, all of which were boys. On two occasions since the center was opened this season, there were less than five members on hand, Berger reported.

Recreation officials expressed great disappointment at having to close the center, but the poor attendance did not justify the expense involved in keeping the center open, Berger said.

The possibility of such a center being located in the Rockville area will be explored by the commission. Commission members believe that a more central location, easily accessible, might be more popular.

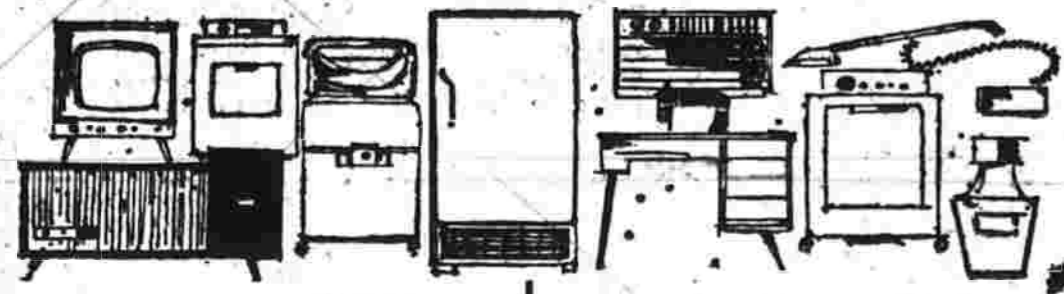

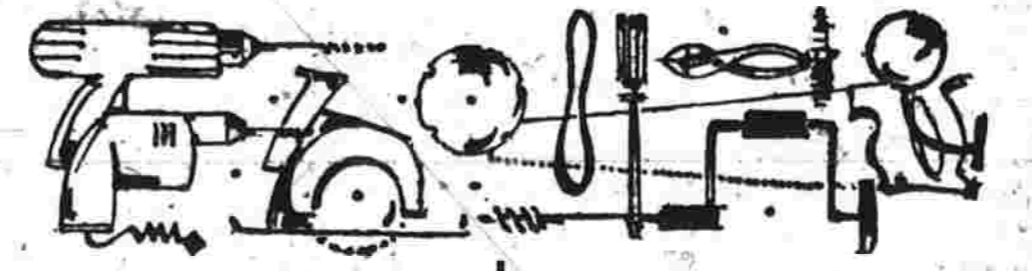

The 36th President of the United States, Lyndon B. Johnson, has been chosen newsmaker of the year for 1964.

Johnson settled the railroad strike in April and sent planes to bomb PT boat bases in North Viet Nam after the American destroyers in Tonkin Gulf. He got his two major items of legislation, the tax cut and Civil Rights bills, through Congress.

Johnson entertained a d campaign for election Texas style, dancing with lady guests at the White House and throwing campaign barbecues. He pulled the cars of his battleships announced such economies as closing certain military bases and turning off the lights in the White House.

Johnson visited Hungary and toured Scandinavia for 15 days. He gave Egypt a huge loan and received the support for Russian foreign policy. In April it was rumored he died but on his 70th birthday April 17, he was made a "Member of the Soviet Union," the country's highest award.

Venison Meatballs with Cider
 1 1/2 pounds ground venison
 1/2 pound lean pork, ground
 1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup freshly ground black pepper
 1 tablespoon freshly chopped parsley
 2 tablespoons minced onion
 1 cup cubes of flavored bread stuffing
 2 eggs
 1/2 to 3/4 cups evaporated milk
 1 cup fresh sweet cider
 Mix together meat, seasonings, parsley, onion and bread cubes. Add egg and bread stuffing. Shape into meatballs about one and one-half inch in diameter. This makes about 30. Brown meatballs in corn oil in skillet on low heat. Add cider and simmer gently about 10 or 15 minutes. Remove meatballs and chicken gravy and serve over Almond Poppy Seed Noodles.

Almond Poppy Seed Noodles
 1/2 cup butter or margarine

Increase Noted In Idle Claims

Unemployment compensation claims filed in Manchester last week followed a statewide trend and rose sharply by close to 25 per cent over the total claims filed during the previous week.

A total of 1,154 claims were presented locally for the week ending Jan. 2, compared to 1,058 for the week ending Dec. 26.

The rise was attributed primarily to seasonal layoffs in the construction industry, and year-end inventory-taking shut-downs.

Claims filed throughout the state increased by 4,634 to 34,623. The figure for the corresponding period last year was 44,882.

Bridgeport ranked first last week among the state's 20 cities with 4,828 claims, followed by New Haven with 4,053, Hartford with 3,544, and Waterbury with 2,874.

Manchester was in the 13th spot for the week ending Jan. 2. It had been 12th the week before.

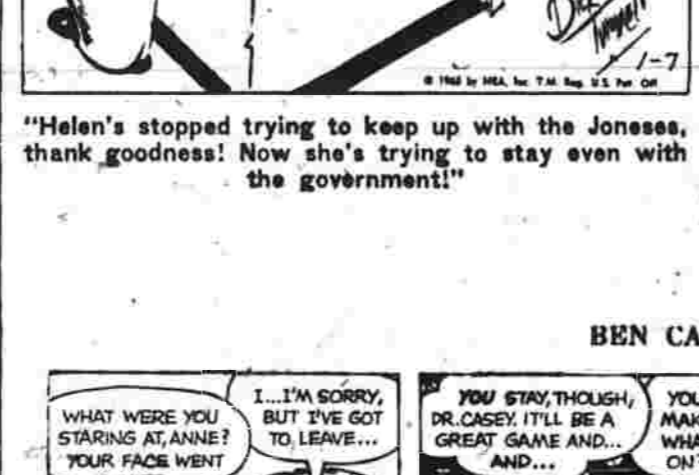
