These performances will be in the nature of dress rehearsals. You can expect to see some of the local organization made out there earlier this season, the local organization is going to invade the big city tonight with a program of an entirely different nature.

The Beth B. minor Maas is quite an experience if properly done, and quite a feat, and requires a great deal of rehearsal; she presented very frequently in fact the last time. It was heard hereabout the Robert Shere's did, usually done, or at least by her estimation. Mr. Shere did well enough with the chorus but soloist Mrs. Bravley was not so hot.

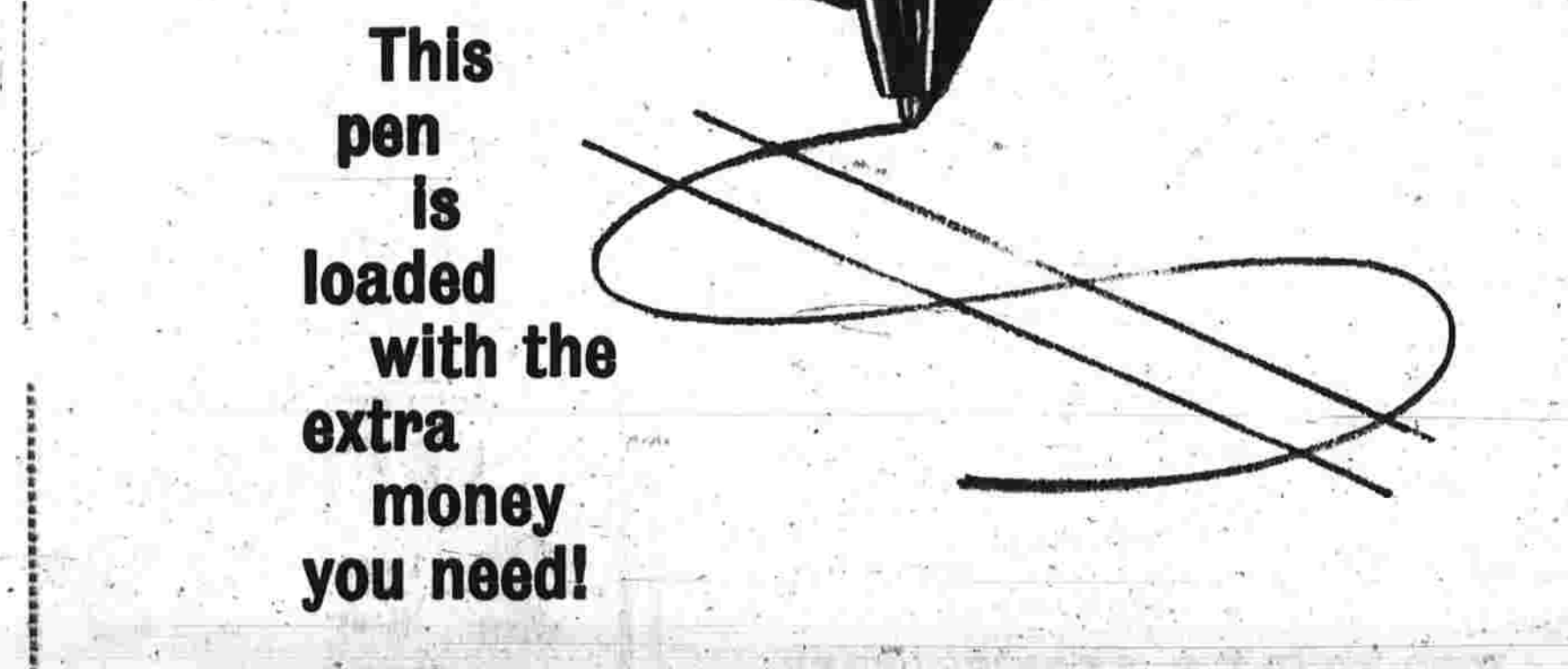

A complex and far-reaching plan to provide sanitary sewers to the Keeney St. area will be aired at a public hearing tonight. The hearing, before the town's board of directors, is set for 8 at the Keeney St. School.

The sewer plan is the first step in a series which could lead to the severing of large sections of the southwesterly part of town. Without such a first step, sewer cannot be extended into the area.

The plan calls for the construction of five continuous sections of sewer trunk from Hartford Rd. south parallel to Keeney St., much of it along the southern branch of Folly Brook.

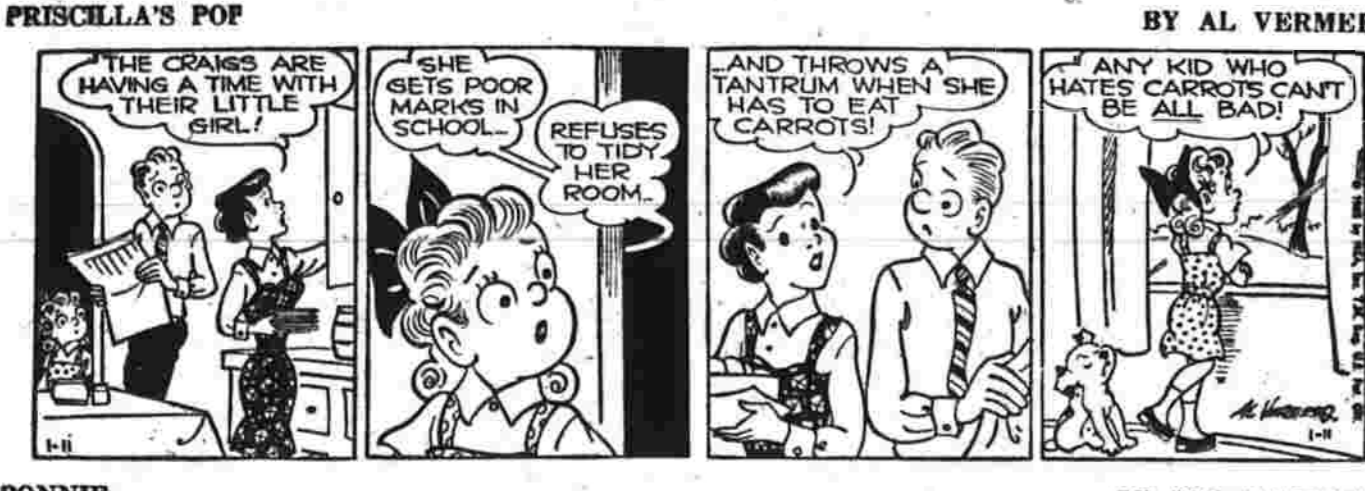
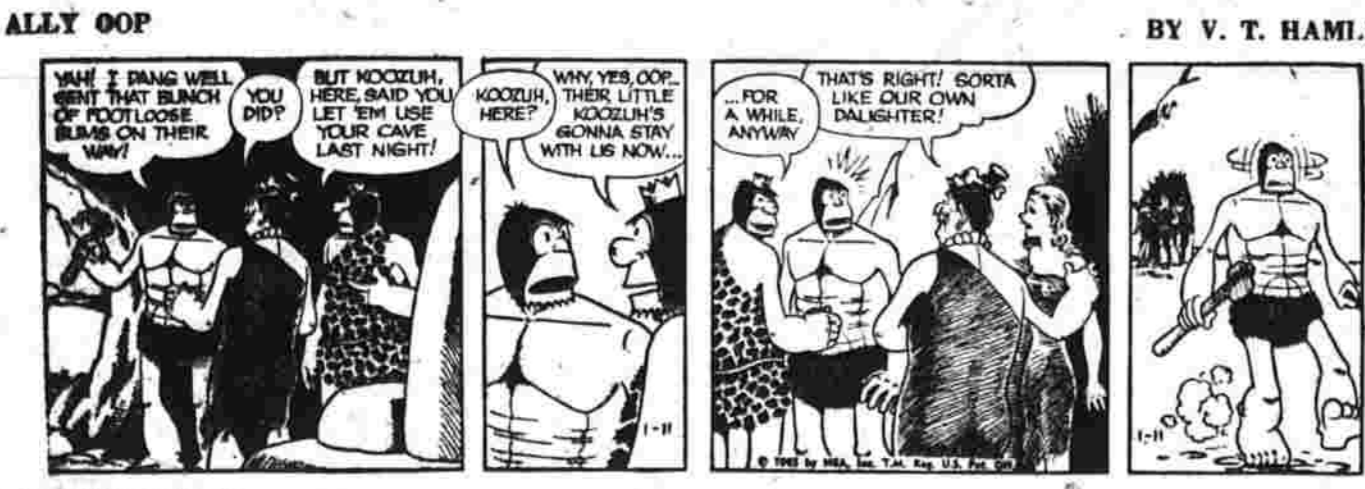
