

Redistricting Climax Awaited in Assembly

HARTFORD (AP)—On the other hand, Hartford, Bridgeport and New Haven, now represented by two House members each, would have 10 representatives each.

The House districts aim for an average of 14,200 persons each.

The new Senate districts approximate 70,000 persons each. The present districts range from less than 22,000 to 174,000.

There would be considerably more elbow room in the Hall of the House under the new set-up. The chamber currently has to accommodate 294 legislators two from each of 125 towns and one each from the remaining 44.

The reapportionment plan will be presented to the three federal judges who ordered the legislature to reorganize itself to meet if it meets U. S. Constitutional standards.

Democratic and Republican leaders hope to persuade the judges that no General Assembly election is necessary this year. The reapportionment plan envisions a regular election in November 1966, and this would be when the plan is implemented.

Since the Constitutional Convention set up by the legislature will have done its work by then, it's possible that the reapportionment measure may never be implemented.

But the election of Convention delegates is arranged so as to give the two political parties maximum control and if party discipline can be maintained, the Convention may approve the same plan enacted by the General Assembly.

The Convention must propose amendments to the Connecticut Constitution implementing reapportionment and ensuring periodic realignment of the House and Senate districts as population grows. It is also empowered to take up just about any other constitutional matters it wants to.

Connecticut first became involved in the legislative reapportionment controversy on Dec. 27, 1962, when a group of citizens filed suit in Federal Court at New Haven. At the top of the list of plaintiffs was the name of Oliver Butterworth.

Since then the case has been referred to as that of "Oliver Butterworth et al."

The current special session of the Legislature began Nov. 10. A previous special session ran from Aug. 3 to Sept. 10, but ended in a stalemate when both political parties became involved in a controversy over when an election for a reapportioned legislature should be held.

FBI Arrests Third Suspect In Bank Holdup

HARTFORD (AP)—The FBI reported today the arrest of a 25-year-old New York City man in connection with the Jan. 11 holdup of the Plainville branch of the New Britain Savings and Loan Association.

Robert Wallace was arrested by agents at his Manhattan home early today, an FBI spokesman said.

Wallace, the FBI said, was with Jose Suarez when three men held up the bank after forcing a New Britain man to give them his car. More than \$4,000 was taken in the holdup.

The FBI said Wallace was not armed. Suarez, arrested last week in Miami, Fla., was allegedly carrying a .25 automatic and a .22 calibre pistol.

The FBI office in New York said that no money was found on Wallace. Agents had recovered \$1,000 when Suarez was taken into custody. Wallace was scheduled to be arraigned in New York before U. S. Commissioner Earl Bishop today.

State police last week arrested Edward R. Paul, 23, of New Britain, in connection with the holdup. They said the holdup was planned in Paul's home.

The FBI said the third man who entered the bank is still at large.

Peacetime Strength At Its Peak

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson told Congress today the United States "is stronger militarily than at any other time in our peacetime history."

Johnson, sending a 4,000 word special message to Congress, disclosed that he expects to submit a budget calling for defense spending of \$49 billion, a drop of \$300 million from this year's level and \$2.3 billion less than last year.

The President unveiled three major new weapons systems he is proposing to begin this year.

One is a new missile system, the Poseidon, to increase the striking power of Polaris submarines.

"The Poseidon missile will have double the payload of the highly successful Polaris As," he said.

To keep America superior, Johnson told Congress, "the immediate future will see further increases in our missile strength, as well as concentration on further technological improvements and continuing vigorous research and development."

Johnson said the increased accuracy and flexibility of the Poseidon will permit us to effectively "against a broader range of possible targets and give added insurance of penetration of enemy defenses."

Another disclosure was a strategy of what Johnson called "remarkable new payloads for strategic missiles."

These, he said, include "penetration aids," decoy devices to assure that missiles hit their targets through any defenses; guidance and re-entry vehicle designs to increase many times the effectiveness of U.S. missiles; and new methods of porting the arrival of missiles.

New Haven Files Petition To Cut Commuter Service

NEW HAVEN (AP)—Anderson scheduled Feb. 4 for Trustees of the bankrupt New Haven Railroad petitioned today for permission to seek approval from the Interstate Commerce Commission and other agencies to curtail commuter service into New York City.

The trustees said it was the first step in the planned abandonment of all passenger service. The carrier would concentrate exclusively on freight service.

The action in U. S. District Court came as a surprise. Ten days ago in Hartford, after meeting with Gov. John N. Dempsey and members of the Connecticut Transportation Authority, the trustees announced they soon would take the action they officially did today.

After reading the petition, U. S. Circuit Judge Robert P. Anderson scheduled Feb. 4 for a hearing.

The trustees have outlined two plans:

A short range proposal that would eliminate commuter stops from New Rochelle, N. Y. into New York City and would reduce service between Larchmont, N. Y., and Stamford.

A proposal to abandon all passenger service to be filed within the next couple of months.

The short-range plan affects the New Haven's "West End" run, which links New York City with Westchester County and Connecticut points. An application has already been filed with the ICC to curtail the "East End," or Boston, commuter service.

The New Haven, which lost about \$13.5 million through the first 11 months of 1964, is unable to continue its present level of commuter service with its "ancient equipment," said the trustees.

Churchill Seen Slightly Weaker

LONDON (AP)—Sir Winston Churchill, his life slowly ebbing, was a little weaker today, a medical bulletin said.

The bulletin was issued by Churchill's personal physician and lifelong friend, Lord Moran, after a visit to the 90-year-old statesman this morning.

It said that otherwise there was nothing to report on the old man's condition.

The text of the bulletin: "Sir Winston had a restless night. He is a little weaker, but otherwise there is nothing to report."

This was the seventh bulletin since Churchill was struck by cerebral thrombosis Friday. All have told of the steady decline of the aged statesman.

Moran, 82, arrived for the morning examination at 11:17. The bulletin was issued 30 minutes later.

The next bulletin will be issued at 3:30 p.m.—(3:30 p.m. EST)—the physician said.

Lord Moran left the Churchill home immediately after issuing the bulletin. Asked by reporters whether Churchill was taking nourishment, he said: "I don't think I'll answer that."

Moran examined Churchill twice Sunday. After the second examination he said: "After a restless start, Sir Winston has had a peaceful day, but he has lost ground."

Churchill's three surviving children stayed late with Lady Churchill now 79, near the bedside, dispersing only in the early hours this morning.

His actress daughter Sarah, 49, said as she left: "He is sleeping peacefully."

Sir Winston's son, Randolph, and grandson, Winston Spencer Churchill, 24, left grave faced after 1 a.m. without comment.

The younger daughter Mary, wife of former Cabinet minister Christopher Boonies, stayed on with her mother.

Outside the house, on a secluded residential street just south of Hyde Park, a small crowd of newsmen and photographers waited through a turbulent night. Sleet and rain lashed down and high winds sent milk bottles clattering along the sidewalk.

Three lights burned inside the house all night. At dawn the number of onlookers began to grow.

Big headlines in the morning papers reflected the nation's concern.

"Peaceful... but he is losing ground," said The Daily Express. "Winston worse" was the line in The Sun.

Medical authorities said Sunday night's medical bulletin, coupled with earlier indications of pulse irregularity and restlessness, foretold a gradual weakening of the old man's hold on life.

Queen Elizabeth II and the royal family led the nation's prayers for the veteran leader at a village church near Sandringham, the queen's country home.

Bitter Cold Adds Misery To Snowy Eastern Areas

NEW YORK (AP) Numb, never, was expected to avoid cold stabbed deep into the eastern half of the nation Sunday adding new misery to many sections still recovering from heavy weekend snow storms.

Behind the cold another blast of arctic air pushed in, sweeping southeast through the Midwest and dumping fresh snow on already hard-hit areas.

In the West, mild temperatures prevailed while heavy fog blanketed the far Northwest.

Below-freezing weather forced Florida fruit and vegetable growers to fire up their burners in an effort to save threatened crops. The orange crop, however, was expected to avoid damage. Miami set a record low of 39 early this morning, after a record-tying low of 44 Sunday.

Tallahassee, Fla., registered 19 degrees.

Further north, many secondary roads remained snow-bound and some major highways were snow-packed or icy. Officials announced that schools would be closed in wide areas of Virginia and North Carolina. Up to 18 inches of snow fell over the weekend. About 100 schools were closed in the east Tennessee mountains.

Humphrey, Lynda Johnson, singer-actress Carol Channing, inaugural chairman Dale Miller and many members of Congress.

President Johnson returned Sunday night from a weekend in Texas, ready to celebrate his sweeping victory over Republican Barry Goldwater.

Not until the five inaugural balls are over sometime Wednesday night is Johnson likely to have another quiet moment. He planned to get in some work today on his inaugural address.

For all the accent on gaiety, if you needed one word to describe official Washington today that word would have to be: apprehension.

Viet Cabinet Includes Four Young Generals

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Four young generals were given posts in South Viet Nam's government today in what a U.S. spokesman described as a positive step in resolving the military-political conflict.

Premier Tran Van Huong created three new Cabinet posts to fulfill his promise to the military that he would let them participate in his previously all-civilian regime. It was on this promise that the military agreed to a compromise solution to year-end political crisis.

Maj. Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu was appointed second deputy premier. Reliable sources said he also took over the Defense Ministry from Huong.

The new Cabinet post of minister of the armed forces was given to Maj. Gen. Tran Van Minh, chief of staff of the armed forces.

Soviets Will Make Payment After Voting Resumes

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The Soviet chief delegate, Nikolai T. Fedorenko, told U.N. Secretary-General U Thant today the Soviet Union will make a substantial voluntary contribution toward U.N. solvency—once the General Assembly has resumed voting.

The United States has insisted that the Soviet Union make a payment before being allowed to vote.

Fedorenko's restatement of the Soviet position meant that the Soviet-U.S. deadlock on the issue persisted, just before the assembly's afternoon resumption of its 19th annual session.

Fedorenko paid a half-hour call on Thant and then issued his statement.

An Asian-African proposal would have the assembly agree that U.N. finances should be brought to solvency through substantial voluntary contributions from the entire membership as early as possible, and

GEORGIA LAW VALID

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court ruled valid today a Georgia law requiring countywide election of state senators whose districts are composed of parts of counties. The decision was given on an appeal by Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook of Georgia from a ruling by a three-judge U.S. District Court in Atlanta. Zoners Hear Bids Tonight

Three requests will be up for consideration when the zoning board of appeals meets at 8 o'clock tonight in the Municipal Building Hearing Room, and one of them will probably draw stiff opposition.

The Town Conservation Commission and the Lutz Museum will have representatives present to voice objection to a proposal for the construction of 116 apartments on the Calhoun Farm, adjacent to the Oak Grove Nature Preserve.

Nicholas Peschke of Manchester and Arthur Gobout of West Hartford are seeking a special exception to construct a \$1.5 million, 21-building complex on 13 acres off Oak Grove St.

Multiple dwellings are permitted in this Residence AA Zone, but the applicants must prove that the construction will not cause traffic, fire and health hazards, and that it will not materially alter the neighborhood or reduce property values in that area.

The construction commission and Lutz Museum representatives will argue that the construction will materially alter the characteristics of the zone.

The commission would prefer that the acreage be purchased by the town as an open space addition to the town.

The other two requests will be considered tonight as well.

An extension of approval for a general repairs license for John Diagonaki, at a gasoline station at 250 W. Main St., is being considered.
