### Events in World

**BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)**—Premier Thanom Kittichachon said Tuesday night that Communist China has sent agents through Laos to Thailand to start subversive work.

Communist couriers are shuttling in and out of Thailand, the premier told newsmen after a Cabinet meeting. He said police and officials along the 800-mile border with Laos have been ordered to keep a sharp lookout for infiltrators.

Thanom said he had also received reports that Communist China has been buying Thai currency in Hong Kong. He said this is "proof" that the money will be used to finance activities in Thailand.

**BONN, Germany (AP)**—A bill to give the West German government another 10 years to track down West murderers has been introduced in Parliament. The present statute of limitations bars new prosecutions in most of West Germany after May 8.

Deputy Ernst Berndt of Christian Democratic party presented the measure Tuesday without party support, but he is expected to be able to gather the 50 signatures required for consideration.

The present 20-year statute is considered to run from the date of the German surrender.

**NEW DELHI, India (AP)**—Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri said today Communist China poses a continuing threat to India but it is a threat of conventional arms and not nuclear weapons.

"China is not going to drop an atomic bomb on India tomorrow," Shastri said at his three full-scale news conference since succeeding the late Jawaharlal Nehru last June.

**SEOUL, South Korea (AP)**—The Seoul District Court today convicted two organizers of the underground Popular Revolutionary party of advocating Communist policies and instigating antigovernment student riots last summer. The secret police originally accused 47 persons in the case.

Toh Ye-jong, 40, was sentenced to three years in prison and Yang Choon-woo, 27, to two years. Eleven defendants were acquitted.

**HONG KONG (AP)**—Communist China says it is rushing completion of a 30-mile canal to supply refuse-packed Hong Kong with water.

Hong Kong's Communist newspaper Tu Kung Pao attributed the rush entirely to Peking's desire to better "the welfare of the Chinese people living in Hong Kong."

Beginning March 1, under an agreement signed last summer, Hong Kong will buy a minimum of 28 million gallons of water a day at 14 cents per 1,000 gallons. That will come to at least \$1,430,000 a year.

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The Labor Department has decided to pay a \$1.25 an hour minimum wage to youngsters working in Neighborhood Youth Corps projects under President Johnson's anti-poverty program.

Organized labor had pushed for the \$1.25 rate.

Thirty-seven projects have been approved in 23 states. The total cost will be \$2,386,000. More than 41,000 youths between 16 and 21 are involved.

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—Christian A. Herter, President Johnson's special aide for foreign trade matters, plans to confer with European leaders next week in an effort to speed international trade talks, particularly those affecting tariffs and some agricultural products.

An announcement from Herter's office Tuesday said he will review the progress of negotiations started last September under the auspices of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

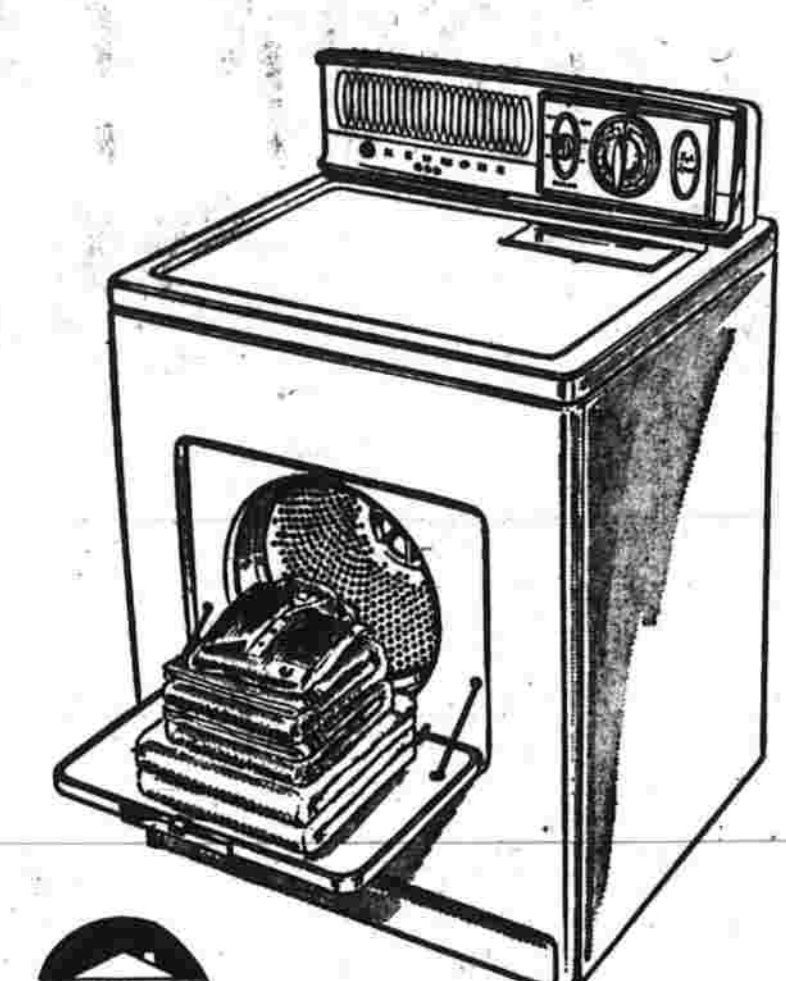

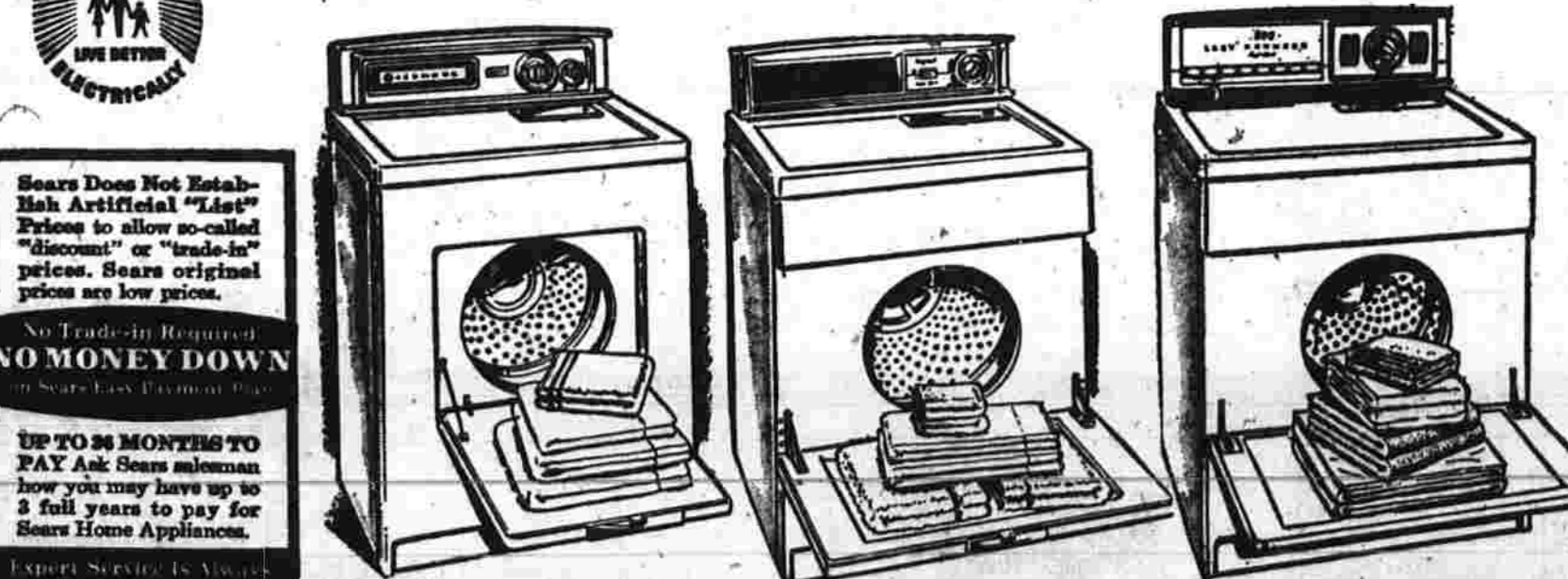

### Rockville-Vernon Town Defers \$6,900 Debt To Manchester Child Clinic

A request to Vernon selectmen for \$6,900 as the town's share for cases treated at the Community Child Guidance Center in Manchester was deferred by the town fathers last night.

The request, made by Edward S. Dix, president of the treatment center, was submitted to First Selectman Samuel W. Pearl.

The request noted that 94 Vernon children were treated at the center last year, and the only funds received from the town amounted to \$2,000, appropriated by the Vernon Board of Education. The previous year, a \$1,000 payment was made to the center.

Vernon statutes prevent the town from paying the agency's selection.

Pearl noted that the only alternative the town has, with a consolidated government due to replace the present three governments on July 1, is to present the guidance center's request to the new government.

Pearl said, "We cannot allocate anything at present to the clinic, but we are not carrying our own weight there. The agency is asking for \$7,000, this is not just a request for a contribution, it is a very serious thing."

He said he will send a letter to the clinic informing them of the town's problem.

"If we tried to do this (conduct a treatment center) on our own, it would cost us much more," Pearl added.

Dix's letter noted that Vernon's cases account for about 24 per cent of the total cases treated at the center. He added that the \$2,000 contribution made last year was about one-third of the cost of treatment.

"Other towns such as Manchester, South Windsor, Enfield and Ellington have honored our requests and have paid them in full," Dix wrote.

Last year the clinic served 400 cases, 94 of which were Vernon children.

A request for more graves for veterans submitted by Fort Hill, commander of the Rockville American Legion, prompted Pearl to appoint Selectmen John Dugie and Robert W. Dunning to a committee to investigate the request.

Hill reported that only two grave sites are available for use by veterans whose families are unable to afford such a grave site.

A possible site at Grove Hill Cemetery was discussed by selectmen.

Three town residents, presently serving as a jury committee, were named to the post named were Stuart C. Kerr, John Moran and Francis Buppochi.

Selectmen noted that a vote-making session will be held Saturday from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Vernon Public Safety Building on West St.

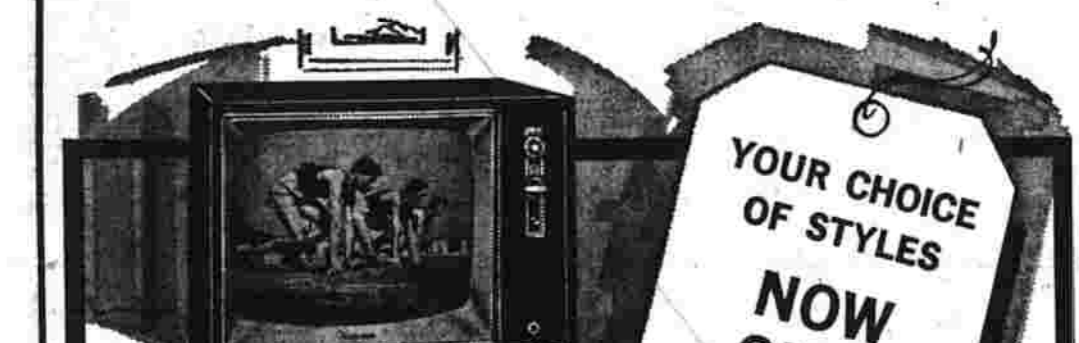

HRC Urges Seeking Anti-Poverty Funds

Manchester may soon apply for federal funds under the \$842 million Anti-Poverty Program, as a result of an action taken last night by the Human Relations Commission (HRC).

The HRC, on a motion by Mrs. Barbara Goldberg, seconded by the Rev. Felix Davis, voted, "We recommend that the town of Manchester proceed with the planning for application for aid under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964."

Thus, the HRC, which had voted in November "to accept the responsibility for initiating action toward the town's possible participation in the Anti-Poverty Program," will now ask the board of directors and General Manager Richard Martin to assume the responsibility for local action.

Last night's recommendation followed a two-hour hearing with representatives from 10 local agencies participating. All expressed the opinion that there are enough areas of need in Manchester to warrant the town's participation in the program.

The HRC motion was passed by a 6 to 1 vote, with Dr. David Warren dissenting. The Rev. Edgar J. Edwards, Jr. and Rev. M. Joseph Ryan voted in favor of the motion but did not attend last night's meeting.

Dr. Warren, in explaining his vote, said, "There is no question in my mind but that there is some need for local participation. I don't think that we are ready to take action until we have digested the information and statistics introduced tonight. It seems to me that the facilities now available in Manchester can, and do, handle whatever problems have arisen to date."

Each of the six commission members who voted for participation explained his or her reason. Dr. Sedrick Rowles — "I think there is a need here, but I don't know how great it is. My duty is to curb juvenile delinquency."

"I must caution the HRC that its duty is to initiate action only, otherwise we may be lost in the program and may not be able to complete the specific work for which we have been appointed."

Mrs. Goldberg—"This is not purely a poverty program, since health, vocation and job training is involved, as well as adult education. The town should apply for funds, even if it is not a poverty program."

Mrs. Virginia Briggs—"The situation in town may not be one of financial poverty, but it tends to be so, because of the increased school dropouts and the need for residential placement of children."

Leaders Radding—"So long as there are 1,000 unemployed in Manchester, it is up to us to see that the figure is reduced. I urge, also, the establishment of adult-education programs."

The Rev. Mr. Davis—"I am not sure how we can fulfill the program, yet it is evident to me that it should be tried. I am voting yes, although I am not entirely convinced that Manchester is ready for a program."

The first condition is not met under the town's present zoning regulations, however, nor is there time to change regulations before a town planning commission hearing tomorrow night on the change to industrial zone.

However, the town planning department has included in the zone change a partial buffer comprising a triangle of residential land between the industrial area and the South Windsor home sites.

In addition, the chance are that Pioneer will build far enough from the town line so that it will not impinge upon the residential land.

Town Planning Director Joseph Tanasy said this morning that he intends to recommend to the planning commission that the change from rural to industrial zone be approved.

The change would affect about 100 acres of land between Slater and Denting Sts., the Wilbur Cross Highway and the South Windsor town line, including two pieces of land already zoned industrial or to remain residential.

The site has been selected by the management of the Pioneer Parachute Co. as the most suitable in town for a new plant, the company plans.

### Petitions Ask Views On Keeney Sewer

Petitions suggesting three alternate plans for constructing and financing a sanitary sewer to serve the southwest section of town are being circulated by a Keeney St. resident.

Fred Diehl, 114 Keeney St., has prepared the petitions to determine how much interest area residents have in the proposed sewer project.

The petitions suggest three different means for handling the sewer service area.

One asks the town to undertake the entire sewer project—a trunk, sub-trunk, lateral and street line—in one fall project, so that all area residents could look up to the sewer as soon as it is complete.

A second asks that the basic sewer trunk line be constructed, but that each property owner be assessed the same amount per acre as every other resident in the sewer service area.

And the third proposes that the trunk line be installed as a capital improvement project, but that it be paid for by the town (sewer department) capital improvement reserve fund. It also proposes that property owners be assessed the same amount per acre as every other resident in the sewer service area.

The town had proposed to build only the basic trunk line from Hartford Rd. to Lynnwood Dr.

To assess each property owner in the area a greater or lesser amount, depending upon the distance of trunk that has to be installed to reach his land.

And to build additional lines from the trunk to other areas along Keeney St. only after petitions from individual property owners have been received.

Mrs. Diehl said today that her husband began circulating the petitions late last week. He is working six days a week at Pratt & Whitney, however, and has not been able to see as many property owners yet as he would like.

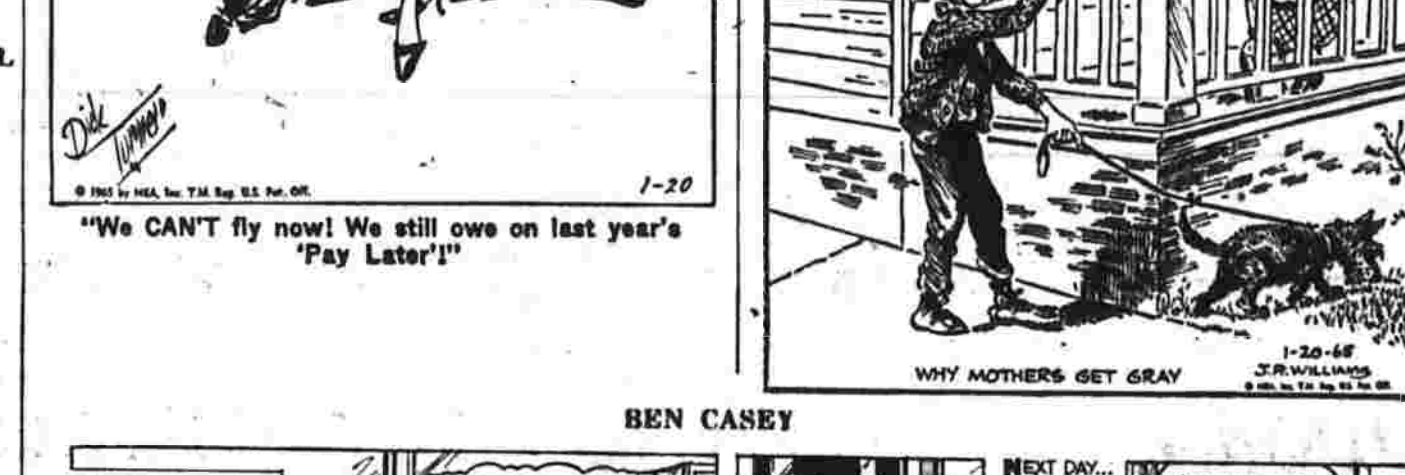
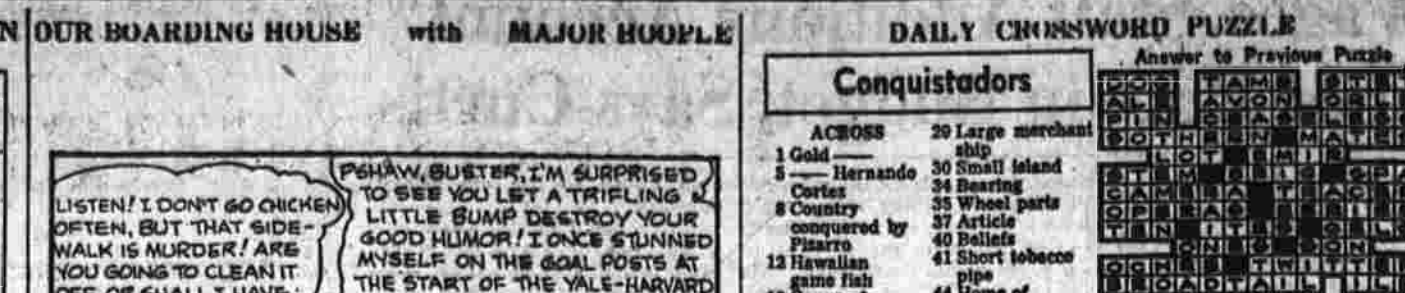
