

Redistricting Bill Now Law

HARTFORD (AP)-Gov. John N. Dempsey signed into law today a bill revamping the Connecticut General Assembly which he said will be of "lasting benefit to every voter of the state."

Dempsey, in signing the measure reapportioning the State House and redistricting the State Senate, congratulated the legislators and party leaders who "worked so hard and effectively to draft this measure and obtain its passage."

The signing set the state for possible federal court approval of the measure later in the day. "By adopting this act." Dempsey said, "the General Assembly of Connecticut once again has shown that it is capable of fulfilling its responsibilities when given a difficult task to perform."

He noted that the legislature had the choice of working out a "fair and equitable system of representation or having it done for us by the federal court."

The easy course, he said, would have been to let the court do it.

"Instead," Dempsey said, "the General Assembly chose to Resignate the state and to the state itself."

Democratic and Republican lawyers, supported by State Atty. Gen. Harold Mulvey will present the measure at 2 p.m. to the three-judge panel in the reapportionment case.

The judges will be asked to approve the plan and waive their previous order calling for a special legislative election this year.

This would allow the 1963 General Assembly, which passed the reapportionment measure in special session last week, to hold over this year.

The holdover Assembly would then be able to undertake its regular business on Feb. 2.

The day's developments are expected to begin with the transmission of the reapportionment bill to the governor by Secretary of State Ella T. Grasso.



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

When President Johnson, in his Ingural Address, reached for the orarical device of trying to imagine how and our troubles down here might k from aboard a rocket speeding ward Mars, he extended all the rest us the privilege of regretting he didn't let his imagination operate from that vantage point for a moment or two

"Terrific dangers and troubles that we once called 'foreign' now constantly live mong us. If American lives must end, and American treasure be spilled, in puntries that we barely know, then it is the price that change has desanded of conviction and of our endur-

"Think of our world as it looks from hat rocket that's heading toward Mars. It is like a child's globe, hanging in sos, the continents stuck to its side se colored mans. We are all fellow engers on a dot of earth. And each t us, in the span of time, has really aly a moment among our companions. "How incredible it is that in this destroy one another. There are possibilities enough for all who will abandon tery over others to pursue mastery nature. There is world enough for to seek their happiness in their own

"And our nation's course is abunantly clear. We aspire to nothing that longs to others. We seek no dominion over our fellow man, but man's dominion over tyranny and misery."

Thus the President's imagination, and the President's questioning, as he imagined someone looking down from the antage point of Mars.





The government expects to tighten up adoption laws and possibly restrict adoption of Greek babies to Greeks, whether in Greece or abroad; and to foreign citizens of Greek des-

It's legal to buy a baby in Greece. Prices range from \$1,000 to \$3,000. This is mainly a legacy of World War II, followed by a Communist guerrilla war and the prevailing poor economic conditions that exist in outlying areas.

At war's end, thousands of orphans were roaming the streets. Adoption was deliberately made easy and was considered a humanitarian act.

The same ease of adoption still exists. Adopting parents do not even have to be in Greece.

LUONG HOA, South Viet Nam
(AP) — In the hard light of day
under the Mekong River deita
