ELJEM SPEAKING
From
LUTZ JUNIOR MUSEUM

Sometimes ago, Eljem came across an article in National Wildlife magazine which so well expressed the philosophy of Lutz Junior Museum that we felt all the people of Manchester should have an opportunity of reading it. Enclosed are reprinted here by courtesy of the magazine.

"If I were going to teach a boy to hunt I would begin with a window, preferably near the breakfast table, so that every morning as he sits at the table he could watch the chickadees and nuthatches and blue jays come for their breakfast, too. His window would be a natural part of his life, and he would be able to call some of the regular visitors by name. He would see the robin and the thrush never come to the feeder for seeds and unsolicitedly he would learn that different birds have different eating habits.

"If we were lucky enough to live where there was a wren, he might see the wren blue jay swoop down and snatch the peanut almost from under the wren's nose, and he would learn that there is competition among our wild neighbors.

"When he discovered his first frog or toad, and came to tell you about it, we would go out and watch it. I'd pick it up gently and place it in the palm of his hand so he could feel its cool body. Then we'd put it down and let it go on its way.

"I would teach him to set traps for mice and to see the chipmunk runs out of his burrow and start across a log with a loud squeak. For this he would see the chipmunk under the bird feeder stuffing his cheeks with seeds, and looking to one of the entrances of his burrow, to add to his winter supply.

"Even before he begins to read I would buy some of the picture books about birds and animals written for children, and he would enjoy seeing his wild friends in their own homes. As he grows older and starts bringing home traps, I would encourage him to make neat labeled collections. When we mentioned as we would often do, his eyes would be alight, his face would be lit with interest, and he would be able to tell you the different kinds of mouse at the base of the old oak tree, and soon his young eyes would be seeing the birds before I would.

"I would give him a subscription to one or more of the magazines which feature birds and animals and occasionally we would take some friends in to the city to visit a natural history museum. Even better than the city museum, we would visit a natural history museum to see our own wild friends living in what is close to their natural habitat. In summer vacations when we went camping we'd discuss the camping areas which are not

Crash Hurts Fatal to Man

Manchester's second traffic fatality of the year was reported yesterday by the police department.

Cosmo Mendolaski, 60, of Broad Brook, died at Manchester Memorial Hospital on Jan. 20, of injuries sustained in an accident ten days earlier. The death certificate, filed at the town clerk's office the next day, indicates the immediate cause of Mendolaski's death is a ruptured aorta, and mentions as one of the contributing causes a rupture of the duodenum. The certificate records that the interval between death and the onset of the peritonitis and also the occurrence of the rupture was ten days.

Through an oversight, police were not notified immediately of the death and it was from a reading of a newspaper account by Lt. Edward M. Winsler of the Manchester police force that the death first came to the attention of the police.

According to Patrolman Richard Rand, who investigated the accident which occurred about 2 p.m. on Jan. 10 on Windsor street, Mendolaski was operating a 1954 Buick Wildcat when he was struck by a 1954 Buick Wildcat driven by Albert J. Boly, 31, of Tolland.

"When he graduated from high school I'd know that he was an expert driver, and that he was outside a soldier's barracks in Alaska, resting after a day of surveying in the West, or even walking quietly in the woods after a week in a busy office, he would be trained to hunt; hunt with his eyes, his ears, his camera, and his field glasses.

The above thoughts by Helen Roca-Garcia express what she feels is an explanation of the cause of the accident at the time and no arrests were made. Both vehicles were heavily damaged and were towed from the scene.

Boly was apparently uninjured but Mendolaski was taken to an ambulance to the hospital where he was treated for a ruptured aorta, face and arm, requiring 15 stitches. He was admitted to the operating room at the Manchester Memorial Hospital, where he died at 11:30 a.m. on Jan. 20.

Shuttle Cost Said \$15,000

Wayne's Wire Comforts Cole

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Singer Nat "King" Cole took comfort today in a well-worn telegram as he convalesced from an operation to remove a cancerous tumor from a lung.

The hospital said surgery was necessitated by a malignancy. The telegram was from actor John Wayne, who underwent surgery a few months ago for removal of a cancerous tumor from a lung.

Wayne's message read: "I liked it. So can you."

Cole's wife, Maria, said Wayne's telegram has encouraged her husband more than almost any of the thousands he has received since entering the hospital Dec. 3.

Doctors at first merely said he was suffering from a respiratory ailment. Later, they said he was being given cobalt treatments — bombardment of his lungs with powerful rays to stop the tumor's growth.

It was then the telegram came from Wayne, who at that time had not publicly revealed his own lung cancer.

A few weeks later, Wayne disclosed to the public: "I liked it. So can you."

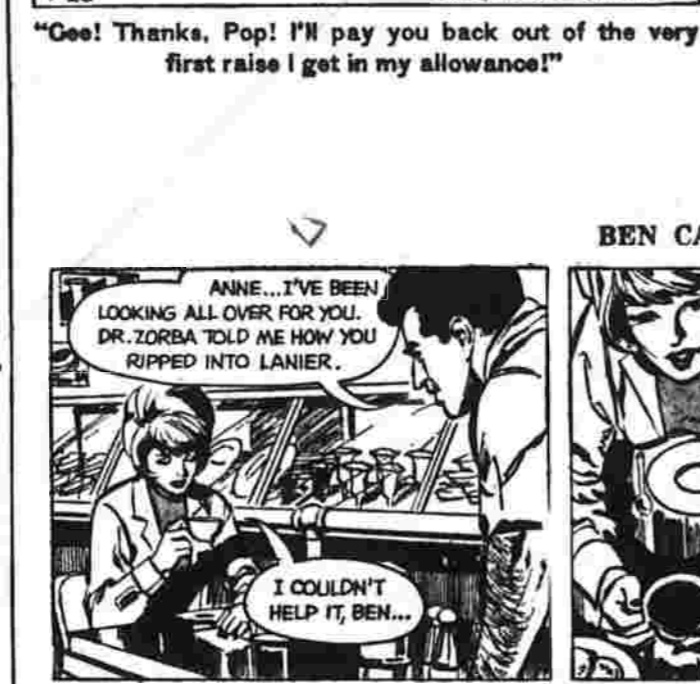

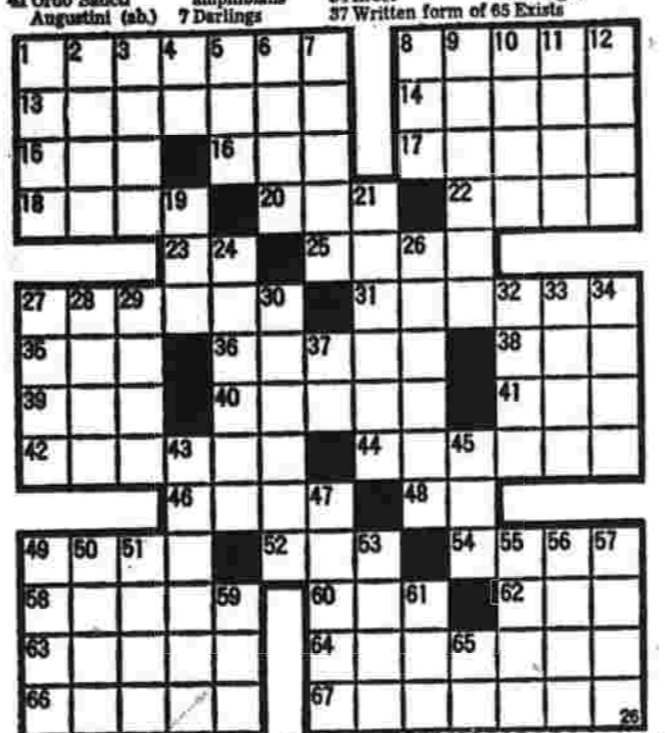
