### Coventry State Ranks Town 106th In Money for Each Pupil

Coventry ranks 106th of 180 towns in the state in the amount of money it spent last year for each pupil in its public schools. The town spent \$145.80, according to statistics compiled by the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council.

The report shows the total amount of money spent by all public schools was \$283,201 for 1964 when there were 1,707 students enrolled during the 1963-64 school year.

The town has received a check for \$2,004.50 as rebate on insurance made possible through a new blanket policy and a change in the town's insurance program.

### Cubans Claim Exiles Confess To Base Source

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Anti-Castro guerrilla leader Eloy Gutierrez Menoyo and three companions, captured by Fidel Castro troops, confessed that their base of operations was in the Dominican Republic, Havana radio said today.

The broadcast, quoting an Armed Forces Ministry communiqué, said the three admitted that they had close contact with the Dominican government.

Menoyo's three companions were identified by the broadcast as Ramon Quasada, Genes Domingo A. Acosta and Noel Salazar Sanchez.

The communiqué said the confessions concerned Cuban charges of anti-Castro bases operating in Nicaragua, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Puerto Rico and other Caribbean countries.

"Those bases," the broadcast said, "are used to carry out pirate attacks against Cuba, infiltrate spies, organize counter-revolutionary bands, train saboteurs and to introduce in Cuba arms and explosives."



A President Has A Cold... The circumstance and timing of President Johnson's bad cold, plus realization of some of his past habits with the press, forced all this country's information services into a difficult quandary.

When a President leaves the White House at 3 o'clock in the morning for a hospital, and when he is an individual who has a past record of a heart attack, does any news reporter or newshandler dare treat the incident as news and lightly as would be the case if he were absolutely sure there was nothing more than a bad cold involved?

The answer was—as the answer almost had to be—that the information service of the nation would handle it as if it were a bad cold but, as it were, for unstated reasons, the most important had cold in history.

In this situation, information services simply could not accept, totally, the assurances conveyed by the information given through official channels. They had to calculate that, if the situation were really more serious than anybody admitted, they would still be getting a soothing, reassuring story. Consequently, there had to be news stories longer and headlines bigger than a common cold would normally merit, and, as for coverage by television and radio, they had to be more dramatic and more colorful than the technical advice to feature some new minor detail or development every few minutes. It had to expand itself to a degree which might have been questionable even had the emergency been guaranteed.

The first main thing we wish to point out, however, is that the past history of White House illnesses, together with the past medical history of this particular individual, plus the almost perpetual presence of a general political and cultural existence, and, ironically, an India which is split is subject to more intensive news and attention for nationalistic and conformist. So man wraps himself in flames and die because he would rather die than be required to learn a language which to him represents something un-speakable.

Perhaps this demonstrates more heroism, more feeling, than we of the West and it comfortable to realize that the mere reflection of an entirely different attitude toward the precociousness of human life, which we find it difficult to understand in any case, we are not accustomed, in our own civilization, to the use of suicide as a weapon in political battle, or in some strifes of principles.

But there it was, over in Madras yesterday—a fine young man wrapping himself in flames because he didn't want to have to learn to speak or write in Hindi language.

On the same day, in South Vietnam, it was a young 17 year old girl who hit her own gasoline soaked garments and died, just to demand a change in her country's government. This morning the government is changed, even though the whole weight and power and prestige of the United States happened to want it not changed. We believe Kipping said it, with an erroneous conclusion. They do have to meet and understand each other. East and West, enough to accomplish their mutual survival.

The Artist And The Hoodlums... Andrew Wyeth, the noted artist, lives in a place called Chadds Ford, Pa. Last Halloween, while he and his family were out playing goblin somewhere else, a gang of between 20 and 30 young hoodlums entered his unlocked studio and had themselves a party, wrecking the furniture, smashing and smearing everything they could.

When, subsequently, police apprehended some of the young people involved, and were about to bring them to trial, Wyeth intervened. He would rather not prosecute, he said. He would rather talk to these young people, and, if possible, their parents, and try to get them straight.

In the time since then, Artist Wyeth has had a number of conversations. Maybe a dozen of the youths accepted his invitation to come with him and take advantage of his promise not to prosecute if he could talk instead. From this experience, Artist Wyeth has enriched his acquaintance with modern youth and recalled some of his own youth, but still not come very close to an understanding. He's just as well satisfied he played the situation as he did. He regards it as something of a vindication that one of the boys has decided to visit, a psychiatrist. But he winds up his experiment too sure just what it is that makes such modern youth tick.

He came out of the experiment with a somewhat clearer impression of what modern America is like.

Most of the parents of these kids in trouble who might have visited him and joined in his experiment stayed away. They lack even that much interest in

CHICAGO, Ill.—The future course of the Illinois Republic party will depend on the outcome of Charles Percy's fight to survive these next four years.

This time, nobody did too much more than had to, and the cure, which allowed the national thermometer to descend to normal, appeared in reasonable time.

A Topsy-Turvy World... There is a world out in space which is an exact duplicate of our own. It is populated with men and women like ourselves. They live in countries like our own. They conduct business and raise families. They live under various economic and governmental, and are divided into different national, religious and racial groups. They differ in only one respect. In each country there is a pathological obsession with human welfare.

Record earnings by American Telephone & Telegraph's \$1.7 billion and International Business Machines' \$431 million delight big families of shareholders.

Leading the parade of oil companies is Gulf with \$777 million up from \$677 million; Exxon with \$677 million up from \$577 million; and Shell with \$567 million up from \$467 million.

Monahan, biggest of the chemicals to report so far, has \$115 million profit, up from \$105 million. Others advancing are Hooker Chemical, Diamond Alkali and Pennwalt Chemical.

Drug companies with increased earnings include Smith, Kline & French Laboratories, Glaxo, Parke, Davis and Company, and Lilly, and Plough.

Douglas Aircraft pulled up to \$11.7 million from the previous year's \$11.5 million. Ryan Aeronautical was up \$7.7 million from \$7.5 million and National Aeronautics to \$5 million from \$4.5 million.

New York May Soon Solve Teen-age Drink Problem

NEW YORK (AP)—This could be a year of solution for a New York teen-age drinking problem that has plagued the city for 20 years.

These days are urged to raise the minimum drinking age from 18 to 21.

Minors too young to drink legally in the border states have been flocking into New York.

Despite campaigns, hearings and a lot of talk, New York has stuck with the age provision it adopted in 1933.

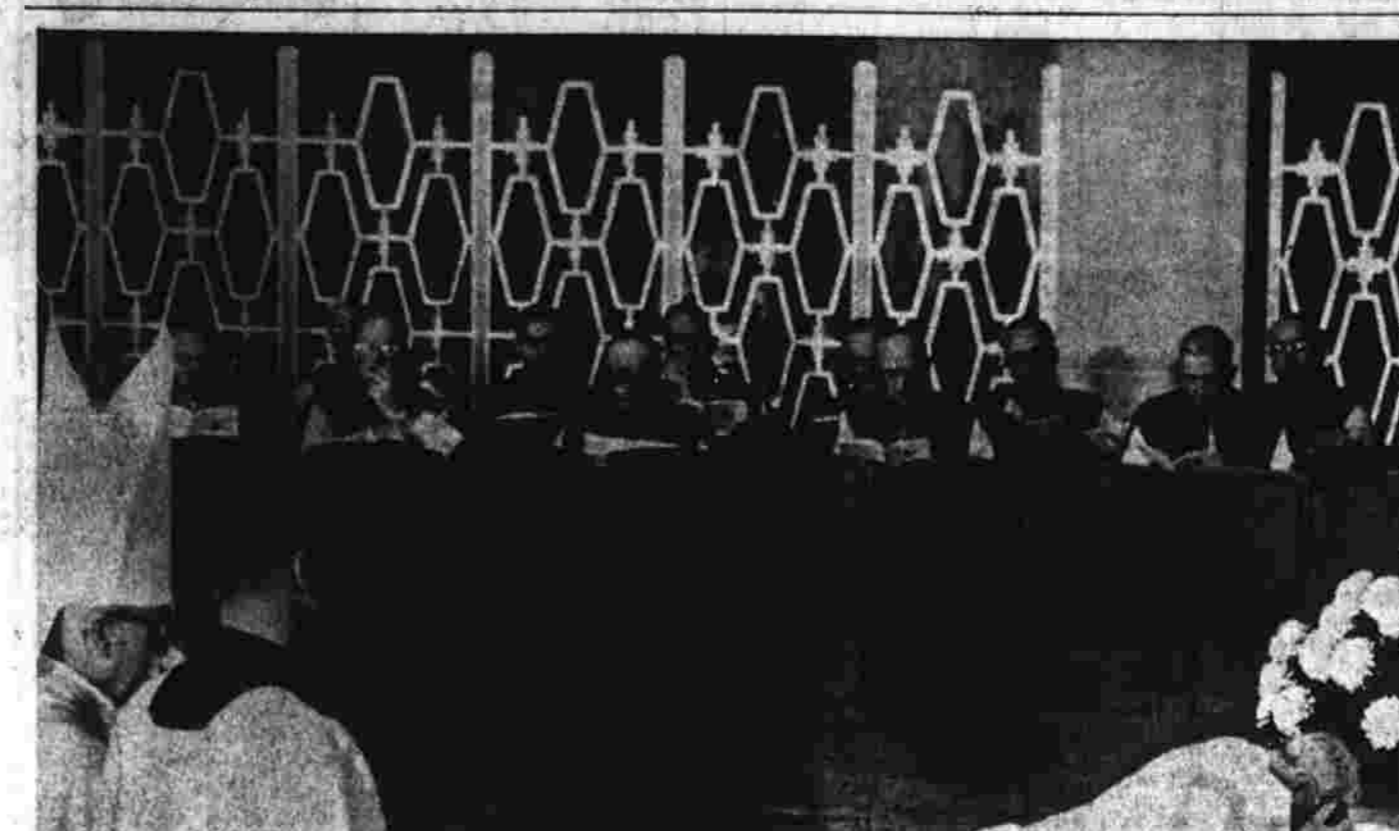
