



Most other commercial flight at lesser altitude is governed by LFR, but not under constant radar surveillance except in the heavily traveled air routes.

In good weather, collision avoidance is on a "see and be seen" basis. In bad weather, planes not on LFR are grounded. More than 95 per cent of the small private planes in this eategory fly under 15,000 feet, and 90 per cent of the miles, thus specting up traffic.
