SELMA, Ala. (AP) -Approximately 300 Negroes, including Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., were arrested by city police today as they marched toward the Dallas County Courthouse in a continuing voter

registration campaign. The Negroes who were walk-ing en masse from the church were taken into custody on orders from Selma's public safety director. Wilson Baker, on charges of parading without a

Baker, his voice hoarse with laryngisits, stopped the proces-sion half a block from the church where the Negroes had assembled. He told them, "This is a deliberate attempt to violate the city's parade ordinance. You will have to break up in small groups.

King, walking at the head of the group, told Baker, "We don't feel that we're disobeying any law. We feel that we have a constitutional right to walk down to the courthouse." The city official warned them again that they would be violat-ing the law if they continued as

out a permit."

A small force of city police told the Negroes to form a more compact group and then marched them the remaining two blocks to the City Hall. 

It is unfortunate that the SPINACH SOUFFLE tend to be neglected.

It is unfortunate that the public must be sold. Its sales resistance includes anything with a "cultural" label on it. "Culture" has almost become a dirty word in the lexicon of the average American. So far as I can see, only the state has the facilities to undertake such a campaign, for it should transcend municipal boundaries. Since only 3 per cent would benefit immediately enabling legislation and appropriations in particular would be far from popular. Yet a statesman, concerned with the real welfare of the populace, should see its advantages even though the ordinary politician would be antagonistic.



For the good of Manchester, the ruiding requirements for the approaching fiscal year's budgeting and taxing should be fixed quite simply. There is an increase in the grand list which will add roughly a quarter of a million dollars to the town's tax income if the present tax rate is continued.

That additional quarter of a million dollars, then, can be taken as the amount by which sound management of the town is entitled to increase appropria-General Manager Richard Martin's preliminary estimates are that the town

appropriations. That means, then, that if the town is going to live within its income, approximately a quarter of a million has to be cut from what the General Manager can now see as town's necessities.
