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### Hectic Start For Driver On New Job

WASHINGTON (AP) — "This has been a very hectic first 30 days," William J. Driver said after the Senate confirmed him as administrator of veterans affairs.

Driver was confirmed 75 to 1 Tuesday. He was sworn in last night. He did not come until Driver had been exposed to three weeks of congressional fire generated by Republicans.

Driver told an interviewer he is "pleased that the Senate moved right in with an inquiry into the hospital closings and other announced consolidations."

"How there has been a full swing on the record. This was needed."

He is pleased that the national commanders of four of the nation's largest veterans organizations — the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Amvets — urged his confirmation though they are on record in opposition to the hospital closings.

He is the first career federal employee to head the VA. He took his oath of office as administrator under a recess appointment Jan. 2, succeeding John B. Gleason Jr., who returned to private banking in Chicago.

Among major immediate problems to be dealt with, Driver mentioned implementation of the amended pension law enacted last year, reopening on May 1 of the National Service Life Insurance program to veterans having disabilities and earnings through consolidations and reorganizations already announced.

"We have a very busy time ahead of us," he said. "I will keep him busy in trying to make the program more dynamic." He explained he wants a program of increased publication and return to community living of every disabled veteran who enters a soldier's home.

### Pupils Help School Drive On Smoking

Spokane, Wash. (AP) — The public school system of Spokane, a leader in an anti-smoking campaign among students, has brought into the battle a powerful new weapon — the pupils themselves.

The "Don't Smoke" theme is not new here. A strong anti-smoking program began four years ago, before the U.S. surgeon general reported cigarette smoking is a health hazard and contributes to lung, tobacco and other diseases. The tobacco industry contends no conclusive evidence has been presented to show a relation between smoking and cancer.

Until recently, teachers and school officials bore nearly all responsibility for warning pupils against smoking.

Burnishing that pupils are more persuasive than teachers when dealing with other pupils, school officials enlisted the aid of some of the city's outstanding high school and junior high school pupils.

After citywide planning meetings, these youths will return to their schools and present anti-smoking discussions and assembly programs, attempting to convince fellow pupils that smoking endangers their health.

The posters and pamphlets provided these missionary pupils are potent weapons, but the most persuasive weapon they have is the example they, themselves set.

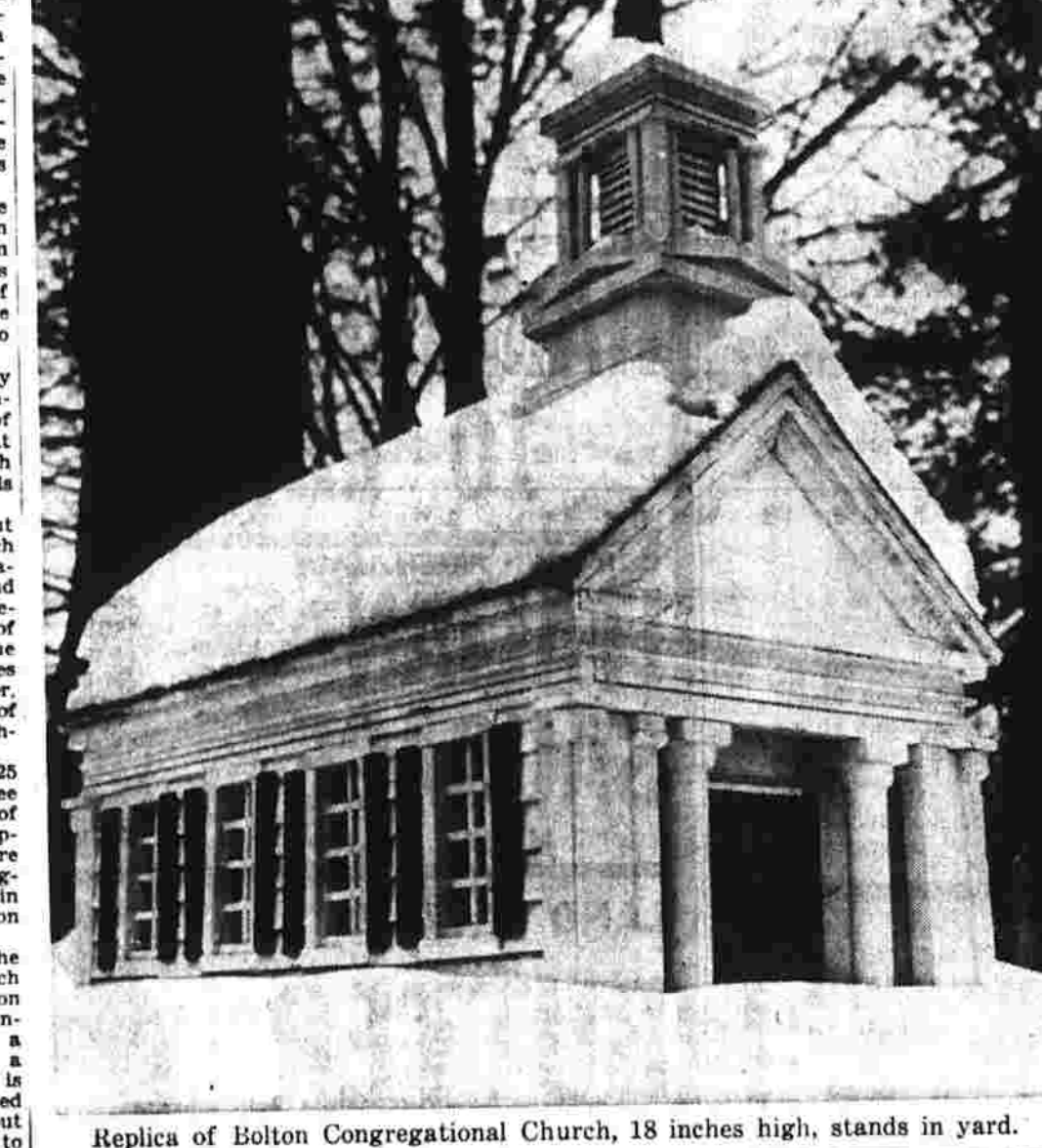

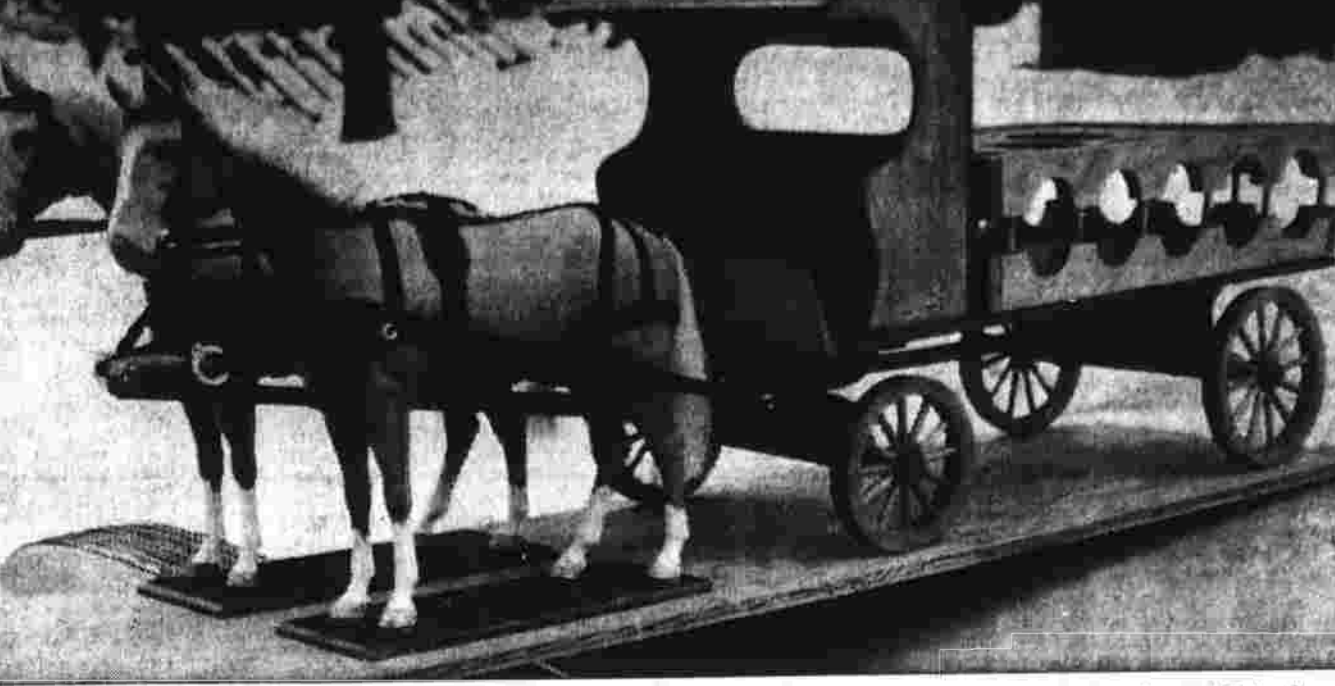

# A Swift Flight From Carrier Deck

 ABOARD USS Hancock, South China Sea (AP) — I sat sweating in the cockpit of an attack jet on the flight deck of this aircraft carrier off South Viet Nam. Radio voices crackled in my ear, the pilot waved suddenly a giant fat assed to smash my body.

We were being catapulted off the carrier. The force of the launch flattened me against the seat. My eyeballs pressed back into my head. In just three seconds our 28-ton jet went from zero to more than 150 miles an hour in 180 feet.

Although the two won't talk about it, other sources here said Anderson's crew photo-graphing Viet Cong sites all over South Viet Nam, particularly in the delta region south of Saigon. They also fly over Laos, the mainland.

The third man usually is Lt. (j.g.) David H. Smith, 24, of Tacoma, Wash. On this particular flight he gave his seat to me. tioned to watch for submarines or enemy planes. After a low level pass, Anderson banked sharply for another swing. Gravity-force was not noticeable until I attempted to lift my camera. Each seemed to weigh 20 pounds.

Sitting in the nose of this jet is an unforgettable experience. There is little sound. The horizontal axis and an instant cloud envelop the plane. Just as suddenly it is blue again.

A mechanical voice buzzed in our ears again, warning of an approaching jet tanker for a refueling maneuver.

The single-seat A-1 jet, with jet fuel pods slung below it, eased up beside us then pulled ahead and unreeled its fuel hose.

As we slipped in behind the jet its all-glass began rocking. Electronic j.c. James J. Dowdell, 24, of Oxnard, Calif., got up. We eased toward the fleet end of the fuel line. With a jolt bump we made the connection.

Voices crackled again and then we were free, curving away from the tanker at 3,000 feet. Far below, a nearby island speck the water, played the USS Hancock.

spending the way for its use as a common waiting room for both bus and train passengers. Trailways buses now have a small waiting room in rented facilities north of the main station.

Genegra said he will hire architectural consultants as soon as the bid is approved by the trustees and U.S. Circuit Judge Robert T. Anderson and begin renovation as soon as possible.

He said he will also commission Simpson and Curtin, Philadelphia consultants now in final stages of a study of long-range plans for Connecticut Co. bus routes, to study the possibilities of mass rail transit.

One possibility to be considered, he said, is use of diesel buses with dual rubber tires and flanged railroad wheels. Buses could pick up passengers in remote areas, drive along a macadam ramp onto the rail, and then use the high-speed rails into the city.

The vehicles might then run off the track and back onto downtown streets, Genegra said. Some sections of track might even be completely macadamized for use as express bus right-of-ways, he said.

Any use of the rails would require Public Utilities Commission approval, Congress said, but approval of the bid itself does not. Essential use of the tracks would be negotiated on a per-mile or per-passenger basis.

The bid submitted to the railroad is for a two-year lease, with an option to buy, but Genegra said an immediate purchase of the station is possible.

Following submission of the Connecticut Co. bid, the New Haven advertised publicly for other bids, but none were received by the time the invitation closed at 8 p.m. Monday.

### State Taxes, Budgets Grow

NEW YORK (AP)—Record state budgets are front page news almost every day in one section or another of the nation. Often they are linked to plans to raise state taxes.

Taxpayers using lower rates in computing their federal income tax just now may find any savings quickly drained away at the state and local levels.

The total of revenues to be raised through various taxes by the 50 states in 1966 is headed for a rise of \$3 billion or more in 1966. This would bring it above \$27 billion. It has been growing at an average rate of \$1 per cent a year since the early 1950s. But in 1964 it rose 3 per cent to \$24.2 billion.

And this year some of the states already have presented spending programs up by 35 to 60 per cent.

Higher tax rates or new taxes are only one revenue source. For most states much of the year's increased total will come from property itself. In 1964 economic expansion accounted for about half of the gains in collections.

As consumers spend more this means more sales tax revenues. Income of individuals and corporations are up, and those states taxing incomes are benefiting. Property values are rising in many places—and bringing in more for the tax collector.

Also the state and local governments increasingly profit from Uncle Sam. Total federal grants at the end of World War II ran around a billion dollars annually. In 1966 they are expected to be about \$10 billion.

And some states, such as Michigan, are lucky enough to have a treasury surplus on which to draw to meet a record budget without raising tax rates.

Texas is holding the tax line, expecting increased revenues from present rates, thanks to property, will use it through.

The Tax Foundation, a privately financed watchdog of the tax system, says that much of this year's expected record jump in state budgets is due to increases by the largest states.

It says California's proposal will give it a \$4-billion budget, to top all the other states. New York, with a gain of \$500 million, will go to \$3.5 billion. Ohio is the foundation lists include Wisconsin, up 37 per cent; New Hampshire, up 32 per cent; Wyoming, up 26 per cent; and Idaho, with its education spending budget up 60 per cent.

The big increases this year are largely concentrated in education, health, and social services. And it sees this as the likely pattern over the next few years.

Only about a half of state revenues come from taxes themselves. Other sources to be tapped may include various trusts and charges, insurance fees, or state liquor stores—and, of course, U.S. grants.

### Directors Favor Law To Extend Utilities

A bill permitting Manchester "to extend its highway, water and sewage systems to make land available for industrial and commercial purposes" will be submitted to the General Assembly this session.

The proposed legislation was approved by resolution by the board of directors last night.

According to Town Counsel Atty. Irving Aronson, the bill approved by the assembly will make the town's implicit power to provide utilities in land on which the town wishes to encourage industrial development.

The immediate reason for the legislation, said General Manager Richard Martin, is the town's effort to keep the Pioneer Parachute Co. in Manchester.

The town has offered to construct a road and water line to the plant, but the street and sewer lines in which Pioneer is interested.

While the town has authority to make such an offer now, Atty. Aronson said, the authority is implicit in case law instead of being spelled out in statute.

The board's action last night followed expressions of consideration by the directors for the public present and objections from Republican director Harty Taylor that he did not see the necessity of the proposed bill.

Seven directors voted for the resolution. Taylor abstained and Atty. David Barry called out of the meeting earlier in the evening, was not present in the Club president, including Ray B. Warner, Manchester Country Club president, asked Pioneer to increase dues for club members.

### Proposed Act Trip by Schools Suggested for Shuttle Buses

SECTION 1. The Town of Manchester is authorized to extend its highway system, water system and sewage system anywhere within the limits of the Town of Manchester whenever it is deemed by the Board of Directors to be in the public interest.

SECTION 2. Said extensions may be made for the express purpose of making lands available for industrial and/or commercial purposes, and such purposes are hereby deemed to be public purposes.

SECTION 3. The Board of Directors may finance said extensions in any way permissible under the Charter of the Town of Manchester and, if the assessment method is used, all provisions pertaining to the Town of Manchester.

SECTION 4. The Town of Manchester may, if it is not feasible or practical to extend its own water and sewer lines along with private water company or sewer district to any given area within the limits of the Town of Manchester.

SECTION 5. This Act shall become effective upon passage.

SECTION 6. To permit the Town of Manchester to extend its highway, water and sewage systems to make land available for industrial and commercial purposes.

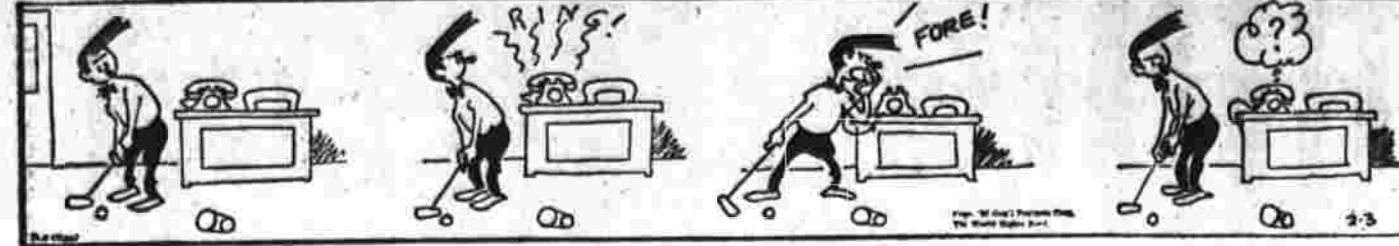

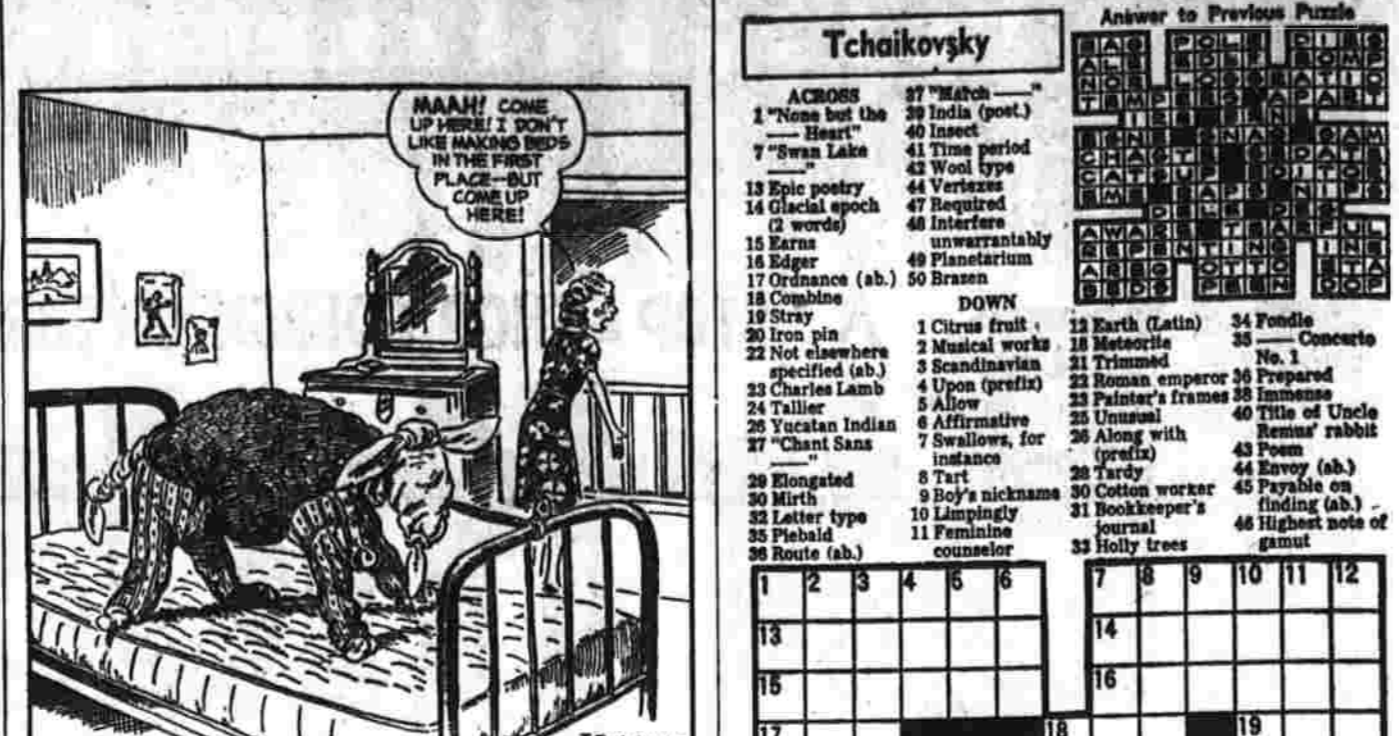
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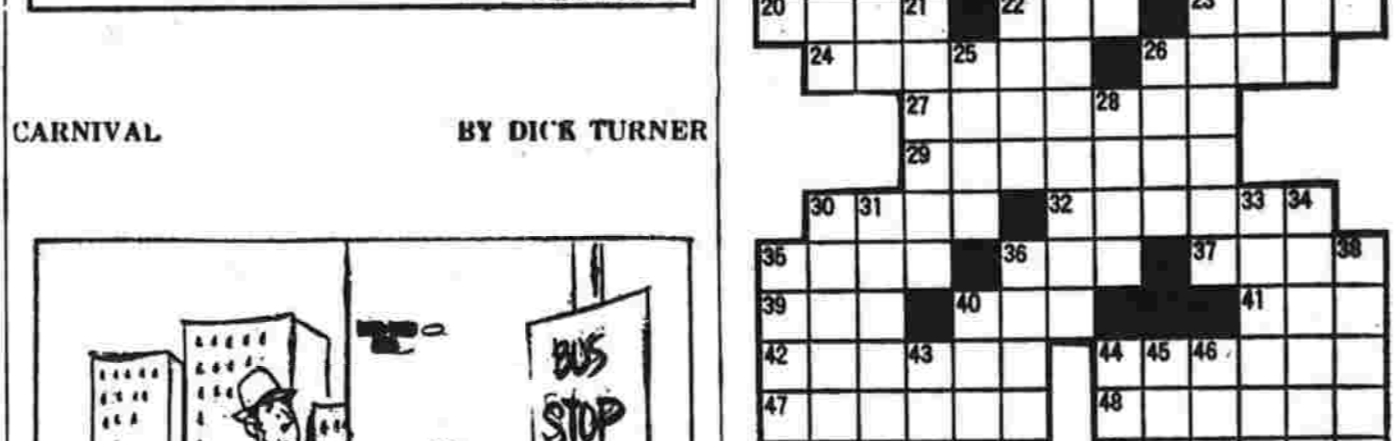
