

When you first opened the can, it was an oily, spreadable product. When you ate the top of the jar, you had too much oil; unless you mixed most conscientiously as you went along, the bottom of the jar was too dry. By 1945, a most distasteful revolution

had invaded the peanut butter field. The___ product was now homogenized, as the Wall Street Journal said, to prevent oil separation. Now all peanut butter spread the same, from top to bottom of the jar. Now, too, all peanut butter lost something in freshness and flavor. By 1947, there began the first mur-

murings of a consumer revolt, the protests of silly old-timers who never like change and progress, who are always finding something newfangled to complain about.
