Judge William J. Shea, associate justice of the Connecticut Supreme Court of Errors, died yesterday at his Manchester home after a long illness. He was 64 His death ended a court

career which began in 1933 when he served the Manchester town court. He was active in civic affairs and had served in the General Assembly. In his youth he was a notable athlete. The news of his death brought forth eulogies from Judge John Hamilton King, chief justice of the Supreme Court, and from Judge Raymond E. Baldwin, its former chief justice.

Judge King described him as "a jurist of outstanding ability and industry" who "never sac-rificed painstaking research and scholarship because the work load was heavy."

Judge Baldwin said he was "most painstaking in his work and had a keen sense of justice." and had a keen sense of justice, with an understanding and sympathetic heart."

Judge Shea, a Republican, had served on the state's high-est tribunal since July 1959, when Gov. Abraham Ribicoff, a Democrat, elevated him from his post of chief justice of the Buperior Court.
The judicial oath had been administered to Judge Shea at him home by his son, Atty. Wil-liam J. Shea Jr. He had been a Superior Court Justice since December 1942, when he was appointed by for-mer Gov. Robert A. Hurley. His court service started in 1933, when he was appointed prosecutor of Manchester's Town Court, a post he held un-






