Justice William J. Shea

What the Honorable William J. Shea did to gain himself first footing in the eventual career of distinguished public servant to town and state seem, in these present days of relatively easy educational opportunity, an unassuming and worthwhile ambition.

It was that, by mixture of Rockville High School and two years at Trinity College and a few years of work for an insurance company, and then at attendance at the law school at Catholic University in Washington, the young man won the privilege of hanging out his shingle and practicing law in Manchester.

The perpetual energy, the prodigious capacity for work he developed then never left him. He was always busy, always willing, always capable.

His years of private practice proved relatively few, as the public interest in his career came to hold more and more importance and responsibility. He became president of the old Manchester Town House and was elected to the House of Representatives at Hartford.

He ran for and was elected to the State Senate at Hartford. In that body, he was the basis of his brief experience in the House and his demonstrated leadership ability, he was made floor leader for the Republican Party.

On that "work-bench" of the Connecticut law, Judge Shea was a vigorous and challenging defender, a willing critic of habits and procedures which seemed to him obstructive rather than aids to the cause of justice.

When the time came for his advancement in accordance with the traditions of seniority to the position of Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court of Errors, William J. Shea had carried his name and career to the highest public position and honor ever accorded a citizen of Manchester.

This community had every right to feel very proud.

No elevation to high office could ever quench Justice Shea's interest in things all the rest of us were interested in. His contribution to the work while civic efforts of Manchester life continued undiminished.

Other phases of his living and his character were perhaps visible only to those who knew him on something more intimate than the public level. He was, to those who knew him most closely, a man of strong opinions and feelings and a right sense of duty.

"His little, nameless, unremembered 'of kindness and of love'."

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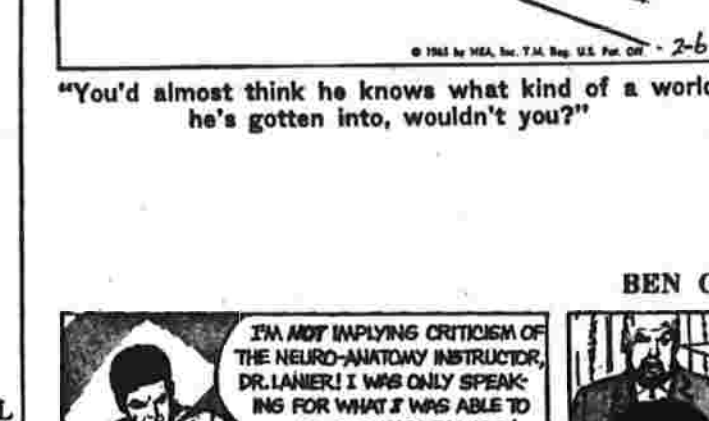

TV Notebook

NEW YORK (NEA)—Twelve years ago, Michael Bentline made his first trip to the United States, indicating on a customs form that the purpose of his visit to America was "to blow up the Brooklyn Bridge."

Actually, he came over for an appearance on The Ed Sullivan Show and was, as he says, "such a smash it took me 12 years to get back."

Bentline, whose "It's a Square World" is one of BBC's most popular programs, has since appeared with Jack Paar, Garry Moore, on the Hollywood Palace, and most recently, with Jonathan Winters.

His BBC shows are most often characterized as satire, but he denies he is a satirist. "Satire is biting and cruel and I don't think I am. People always try to categorize other people. I don't want to be categorized. I don't do satire; I don't do patter. I'm not a prop comedian. I just try to make people laugh."

Serving Coal
He does so by devices like this: When the British coal mines were closing, he suggested they could be turned into exotic restaurants, and did a commercial for one of these establishments, The Black Grotto.

"We showed waiters with miner's caps, and food coming to the table on those cars in which miners load coal. At the end, we suggested the guests have some coke, and we had a shower of coal descend on them."

A conversation with Bentline jumps from subject to subject, and is filled with his observations — all funny — on everything from the lack of Eskimo folk songs to Sam Jaffe. For instance:

"I watch Ben Casey because I am a big Sam Jaffe fan. I saw him in 'Lost Horizon' when he played a 260-year-old man, and he hasn't aged a bit."

Eskimo Folk Songs
"Do you realize there are no Eskimo folk songs? That's because they are too busy trying to stay alive to be decadent."

"I'm always in trouble with embassies in London. Once I was doing a skit in a crude language and BBC got a letter from the Turkish Embassy saying 'they had never heard such terrible language.'"

"Misunderstanding is the basis for all humor. The only book ever written analyzing humor was written by a German."

Anybody who has to have a salute is basically insecure."

"There are 47 Bentlines in the world (we added the 'e' in England), and we are all closely related. My theory is we're a lost tribe."

"It was a bit sticky in my family when I went into show-business. There was a hell of a stink. But when one gets to the position where he goes to dinner with Princess Margaret, it's suddenly all right."

A Look at the Red World After Khrushchev Era

The first picture since the downfall of Khrushchev of the dynamic changes in the Communist world will be seen on "CBS Reports — East Europe: Satellites Out of Orbit," Monday from 10-11 p.m., EST, on the CBS Television Network.

The broadcast, reported by Daniel Schorr, CBS News Correspondent for Germany and East Europe, has been eight months in the making. The CBS Reports team was on the scene in Czechoslovakia when Khrushchev was ousted from power, in a unique position to witness the reaction in that satellite to the Moscow change-over. The broadcast has been completed in time to point up the problem that the Kremlin faces in trying to reassemble its disintegrating bloc for a conference of the Communist bloc in Moscow on March 1.

To dramatize the gulf in the Communist camp, and the tendency of once-rigidly-ruled satellites to spin off on their nationalistic courses, the program dwells in depth on two contrasting East European countries—maverick Rumania, which has cast off its Russian ties, and still-loyal Czechoslovakia, bound to Moscow by economic dependence.

There are interviews not only with political leaders, but with economic experts, artists and students to underline how widely policies and public feeling have begun to diverge. Rumania's Communist boss, President Gheorghe Gheorghiu-Dej, whose hostility to Khrushchev was reportedly a factor in the Soviet Premier's downfall, makes his first appearance before a Western camera in a talk with correspondent Schorr.

TV Starts Pruning for New Season

NEW YORK (AP) — Each September for the past few years, some 30 new programs have had their television premieres on three major networks, taking the place of an equal number which had quietly expired the previous spring.

There is every reason to believe that just about the same mortality rate will continue. Next fall's tentative schedules are expected to be made public in about two weeks and there are at least 19 programs which will be retired at season's end. Another 18 may — or may not — survive for another season.

At the moment, it looks as though there will be no tomorrow for NBC's "The Rogues," "Kentucky Jones," "That Was the Week That Was," "Mr. Magoo," "Jack Paar Show" and "Suspense Theatre." On the dubious list are such programs as "Mr. Novak," the Alfred Hitchcock hour, "International Showtime," "The Man from U.N.C.L.E.," and even "The Jack Benny Show."

CBS, if rumors are accurate, expects to dispatch "Many Happy Returns," "The Joey Bishop Show," "The Cara Williams Show," "Baileys of Balboa," "The Entertainers" and "On Broadway Tonight." It is looking dubiously at "The Doctors and the Nurses," "Slattery's People" and "Password." "Wagon Train," "The Bing Crosby Show," "The Flintstones" and "Jonny Quest," most likely will depart from ABC's schedule. There may be no renewals for "Burke's Law," "Valentine's Day," "The Tycoon" and "The Jimmy Dean Show."

The jury is still out on some of the midseason entries like NBC's "Branded" and "Hullabaloo," CBS' "For the People," and ABC's "The King Family."

Death, of course, comes to most television entertainment shows from a single cause — low Nielsen ratings. Some programs with low Niensens but other important qualities, notably involving prestige and image-making for the network, survive in spite of ratings.

All three networks have many

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Elder Carthwright Waxes Hit Record

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — How could a 48-year-old actor manage to produce a hit record in the teen-age jungle of today's pop music world?

Lorne Greene isn't questioning it; he's just banking the money and enjoying the whole thing.

The amazing success of the record "Ringo" is one of the many pleasant happenstances that have occurred to Greene in recent years.

"Don't ask me about 'Ringo' because I can't figure it out," said the star of television's top-rated hour, "Bonanza." "All I know is that it has already sold over 800,000 copies and that's merely in this country. It's apparently going wild in Australia, too. There seems to be no doubt that it will sell over a million before it's through."

Like many television stars Greene found himself recording some numbers last year, even though his experience as a professional singer was nil.

"Once in high school in Ottawa I was pushed before the curtain and told to stall for 15 minutes," he recalled. "I sang 'Brother, Can You Spare a Dime,' which dates the era, and the students threw pennies instead. Then at Queen's University in Kingston, Ont., I sang in the campus frolics. I was equally successful."

Among the numbers for the album was one in which he told in his sonorous non-singing bass about how he once saved the life of the notorious Johnny Ringo and later had to shoot him dead. The recitation nestled among other singing and talking numbers on the album until a Lubbock, Tex., disc jockey plucked it out for a go-around. The response was enormous.

A Dallas jockey heard about the fuss and gave "Ringo" a big play with identical results. RCA-Victor released the number as a single and away it went.

Greene now finds that when he appears among teen-agers they no longer touch him as before. They grab.

"On the whole I think it's a good thing that an older person can succeed in the pop music field," he said. "Maybe it will convince the teen-agers that their papas and mamas might have something after all."

For Greene, records are another element of his ever-growing career. As a result of "Ringo" he has received night club offers — he opens in Reno April 29. He is preparing a five-times-a-week radio show and two television productions. "I want to taste everything in the entertainment world," he said.

The taste has been sweet already. Greene figures he has earned a million from the six years of "Bonanza."

How much longer with "Bonanza"? He said he'll stay with it as long as it runs, but he doesn't think that will be five years.

"I'm not getting any younger," he remarked, "and I want to taste other honeys."
