NEW YORK (AP)-As searchers criss-crossed the calm sea off Jones Beach today seeking bodies and debris, federal authorities expressed mystification about the cause of an airliner's fatal dive into the water. Eighty-four persons were aboard the Eastern Air Lines DC7B, a four-engine propeller plane, when it plunged into the Atlantic Monday night minutes after taking off from Kennedy Airport.
