NEW YORK (AP)-As searchers criss-crossed the calm sea off Jones Beach today seeking bodies and debris, federal authorities expressed mystification about the cause of an airliner's fatal dive into the water. Eighty-four persons were aboard the Eastern Air Lines DC7B, a four-engine propeller plane, when it plunged into the Atlantic Monday night minutes after taking off from Kennedy Airport.

No one survived the fiery impact of the 52-ton airliner with the water. A geyser of flame signaled the tragedy to watchers on shore, some eight miles



As represented l Defense Secretary Robert McNamara and Presidential Assistant McGeorge Bundy, this is a new breed of leadership, so sophisticated it has passed beyond the nuisance of feeling or bleeding war, s expert it can carry the art of brinkmanship far beyond the relatively cautious lines once observed by the late John Foster Dulles, and so wonderful in assessing the motives and reactions of others that it can hardly miss in outbluffing, outwitting, and outmaneuver-

It seems, in fact, the kind of compebence, the infallible computer-like type of leadership, with which we might conpuer the world, or perhaps some word like structure it would be more in the

We really have no such ambition. And these policy makers of the new breed are not our own masters, but our public servants. Perhaps the real thing we have to worry about is the accuracy and validity of their cool competence.

If they are right, or mankind lucky, there will be a miracle, in which the side which has been hit last does not consider it necessary to hit again before it can consider turning reasonvelop in the conduct of nations in such a situation, because we have never seen It before, and because the life of civilization itself may depend on it.

If this new breed of leadership wrong, then we may come to realize, too late, the truth and validity of the thoughts with which the New York Times concludes its editorial survey of the situation this morning:

"The only sane way out is diplomatic. international, political, economic—not military. A solution will not be found by exchanging harder and harder blows. surrender is out of the question and victory' for either side is impossible. "Perhaps a new start can be made from an untried base—that Americans,

fietnamese, Chinese and Russians are all sensible human beings who are ready for peace in Southeast Asia, or at least willing to consider it. There would be prices to pay, but there would be gains as well as losses. Diplomacy is surely not yet a lost art or a dead language."

Same Facts, Two Truths?

If events in the world today someimes seem to confuse you, don't sell your own intelligence short. The experts can get confused too. Take, for a sample, a certain devel-

spment in the Vietnamese war a few The development was that, for the first time, the Vietcong guerrilles themselves in considerable force, perhaps 2,000 of them, engaging in a sort of protracted set battle in one

That was the underlable fact—that he guerrillas, for the first time, had

The first, from the routine newspaper correspondents on or near the scene, was that the guerrillas had now grown strong enough and bold enough to dare come out in the open and challenge us to a real battle. By this interpretation the fact that the guerrillas had begun to fight this way was made to seem discouraging news for our side, as if the cuerrillas were growing in confidence

The second interpretation was slightly delayed, because it had to come not from regular correspondents but from those columnists who habitually preach our involvement in Vietnam, and who therefore have some instinct, perhaps, to make it seem that things are really going along well for us in this best of all? wars for us. Their interpretation, at any rate, was that the appearance of the guerrillas in real force and in real open battle constituted a triumph for our strategy. We had, it appeared, been trying all along to get them to come out in the open and fight like real troops. That the same facts were involved in both theories is indisputable.

What one has to try to realize, be yond that, is that, to those advancing it, each of these two completely opposite theories seemed absolutely the truth.

No Wasted Flights

It is all right for the weather to demthat what it gives it can also take away. But the take-away ought in the second week of February, to govern itself with

some restraint. It is, at this time of the winter, with a clear Groundhog Day only a week old, much too soon to clean up our dirty streets and sidewalks. Since they cannot be clean, therefore, it strikes us as better housekeeping to let a little snow and ice remain, not only to lighten the color, but to relieve the municipal conscience of any feeling that it ought to be out and sweeping.

And it is, at this point in February, much too early to simulate, even for a 48 hour period, the approach of another season. Nothing can come of it but sudden mud, which will squush this way and that and then freeze into some distorted shape for the next few weeks. Nothing can come of it but wasted journeys northward for birds that do not yet belong across the Hudson. Let the cardinals and the waxwings and the bluebirds and the robins hold their winter fiefs unchallenged; let the redwings wait until spring is a serious matter, and no return flights will be necessary.

Nor is the human being, to tell the truth, quite set for stretching and yawning in that warm afternoon sun. This i still the basic time of year when you can come up lame and halt, just taking a carelessly deep breath because it almost
