That fact received two interpretations.

The first, from the routine newspaper correspondents or near the scene, was that the guerrillas had now grown strong enough and bold enough to dare come out in the open and challenge us to a real battle. By this interpretation, the fact that the guerrillas had begun to fight this way was made to seem discouraging news for our side, as if the guerrillas were growing in confidence and insolence.

The second interpretation was slightly delayed, because it had to come not from regular correspondents but from those columnists who habitually preach our involvement in Vietnam, and who therefore have some instinct, perhaps, to make it seem that things are really going along well for us in this best of all worlds for us. Their interpretation, at any rate, was that the appearance of the guerrillas in real force and in real open battle constituted a triumph for our strategy. We had, it appeared, been trying all along to get them to come out in the open and fight like real troops.

That the same facts were involved in both theories is indisputable.

What one has to try to realize, beyond that, is that, to those advancing it, each of these two completely opposite theories seemed absolutely the truth.

What Washington Hopes

It is perhaps a little clearer, today, how Washington would like to have us think of the weekend air strikes at North Vietnam.

First, the fact that last week's guerrilla activities happened in the same area, rather than in some other part of North Vietnam, demonstrated a special response from us.

As James Reston puts it in the New York Times this morning, "Thus the North Vietnamese Communists, and Moscow and Peking as well, have been warned that, therefore, victory is as better housekeeping to let a little snow and ice remain, not to rely to lighten the color, but to relieve the municipal commission of any feeling that it ought to be out and sweeping."

And it is, at this point in February, much too early to simulate, even for a 48-hour period, the approach of another season. Nothing can come of it but sudden mud, which will squish this way and that, and then freeze into the distorted shape for the next few weeks.

Nothing can come of it but wasted journeys northward for birds that do not yet belong across the Hudson. Let the cardinals and the waxwings and the bluebirds and the robins hold their winter diets unchallenged; let the redwings wait until spring is a serious matter, and no return flights will be necessary.

Nor is the human being, to tell the truth, much of an archer and yawn-inducer in that warm afternoon sun. This is still the basic time of year when you can come up lame and halt, just taking a moment to rest, because it almost seems like spring.

No Wanted Flights

It is all right for the weather to demonstrate, as it did over the weekend, that what it gives it can also take away. But the take-away ought to be rather the other way of February, to govern itself with some restraint.

Inside Report

BOSTON — His spurs were as campaigner and voter-getter, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy is reaching for the more exalted role of party leader.

Kennedy's unstated goal: to bring order to the boisterous, Balkanized Democratic party of Massachusetts. That requires getting his own man nominated for Governor in 1966.

And Kennedy's choice might well come from the Kennedy family's inner circle. It could be Lawrence O'Brien or Kenneth O'Donnell, commanders of John F. Kennedy's Irish Mafia.

But controlling the nomination is not enough. If Kennedy uses brute force rather than finesse, he could provoke another Massachusetts Democratic schism to match the 1964 fiasco. It was Democratic disunity that enables the Republican to win in Massachusetts continuously here the past generation.

Connecticut Yankee

It was fortunate, for our point of view, and perhaps from the point of view of future analysts all down through the ages, that it so happened that on Tuesday a week ago, when the special regular session of the Connecticut General Assembly formally organized itself, there was a psychiatrist in the House.

There were, we suppose, two reasons for his presence. First, tradition requires that a Governor's official family attend the inaugural, and this, although not an inaugural, and not even a strictly a formal opening of any new Legislature, was made into something of a ceremonial occasion.

Second, Governor Dempsey has for some time been making quite a point of expecting the attendance, in person, and not by proxy, of all the commissioners and members, one rare time in history when a vote had been called on which everybody was absolutely free to follow his secret wish or conscience. They could be voting on something, or they could be voting on nothing, but they could, as Speaker Patterson assured them, vote as they pleased.

Community College Seeks Campus

HARRISBURG, Pa.—The community college is particularly useful to the poor, who for one reason or another, are unable to attend in homes. There are now more than 500 public supported community colleges in the nation, and new ones are opening at a rate of 40 a year. But perhaps none is more unusually financed than the Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC), which has been operating since 1964. It does receive some money from the state, but its principal support comes from 61 separate school districts in three counties around the Harrisburg area. Now after five months in operation, HACC is asking for more school-district support under a three-year guarantee of support, but that is insufficient for its goals, says the college president, Clyde Blocher. HACC wants a 40-year pledge from the school boards affected.

With the long-term pledge, Mr. Blocher says that HACC can obtain a \$2,000,000 loan. The loan should qualify the college for the \$1,500,000 in Federal matching funds under the Higher Education Facilities Act. With the \$3,500,000 the school can build a permanent campus in a Harrisburg area, and move out of the Naval Reserve Area, where it has been housed since its inception, because we have never seen it before, and because the life of civilization itself may depend on it.

If this new breed of leadership is wrong, then we may come to realize, too late, the truth and validity of the thoughts with which the New York Times concludes its editorial survey of the situation this morning:

"The only sane way out is diplomatic, international, political, economic—not military. A solution will not be found by exchanging harder and harder blows. Burender is out of the question and 'victory' for either side is impossible."

"Perhaps a new start can be made from an untried base—that Americans, Vietnamese, Chinese and Russians are all sensible human beings who are ready for peace in Southeast Asia, or at least willing to consider it. There would be prices to pay, but there would be gains as well as losses. Diplomacy is surely not yet a lost art or a dead language."

Seeping Gasoline Imperils Boston-NYC Phone Lines

Telephone conversations between New York and Boston have been endangered since last Thursday by a leaky underground storage tank in a service station parking lot at W. Center and McKee Sts.

And although the tank has been removed from the ground, the threat remains. Groundwater from melting snow is apparently continuing to carry gasoline caught in pockets in the ground into an American Telephone and Telegraph Co. manhole. Through the manhole runs the main trunk line between New York to the west and Providence and Boston to the east.

Telephone company officials fear that a wayward spark could ignite gasoline fumes in the manhole, or the flash fire might melt the lead insulation around the telephone cables and cut off the interstate telephone service—including cable-carried network television programs.

The problem was first discovered Thursday, when telephone men pried the lid from the manhole to work on a new trunk line. From the hole, they saw a powerful odor of gasoline. They dug out the manhole, but the odor was still there.

The source of the flooding was quickly discovered to be the gasoline storage tank at the adjoining service station. It had leaked an estimated 500 gallons of fuel, according to Sedrick Strough, assistant chief of the town fire department.

A crew from the Southern New England Telephone Co., which oversees the telephone lines in this area, was sent in to clear the manhole as well as possible, and on Friday the storage tank was disconnected and pulled from the ground.

Still the gasoline continued to flow into the manhole. Pumping and searching continued through the weekend — as did the flow of gasoline.

period was no more than 75 percent of your regular pay, even though you were injured or hospitalized. If 75 percent or less, you can exclude up to \$75 for the first 30 days.

Example: If you continued to receive your regular pay that first 30 days you can deduct none of it.

But if you were out sick more than 30 days you can exclude a further 50 days \$100 or your weekly rate of pay received without worry about percentage limits.

Here are some examples of those limits in the first 30 days:

But suppose your regular pay \$120, your sick pay \$91 each week. That \$91 is more than 75 per cent \$120. Therefore, in the first 30 days you could exclude none of it.

Or suppose your regular pay was \$100, your sick pay \$75 a week. You could exclude up to \$75 since that happens to be 75 per cent of \$100.

But, if that sick pay had been \$61 each week, which is more than 75 per cent of \$80, you could exclude none of it.

There's been a change on deductions for child care, and it works this way:

You may, under certain circumstances, deduct for a child or other or private school costs for a child if you are a woman—single, married, divorced or deserted—who must work outside the home.

You can deduct for such care for a child up to 3 or up to any amount that is physically or mentally defective. The child doesn't have to be your own child as a dependent.

The deduction limit for this child care is \$600 for one child or a maximum of \$900 for two or more children cared for. But there can be a lot of ifs, ands, and buts if this problem, even resulting in the case of a married couple, is being overlooked under some circumstances.
