## Cargo Plane Falls Near Miami Homes

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A cargo plane crashed into an automobile junkyard and exploded today, narrowly missing a residential area in northwest Miami.

Flames quickly consumed the cabin and fuselage of the plane, apparently burning to death its two occupants.

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Riot police, reinforced by heavily armed soldiers and helicopter support, battled leftists who stormed the downtown section today, demanding overthrow of the Malaysia federation.

## Grand Juries Probing Hoodlums in Banking

WASHINGTON (AP) — An inquisitive government source said today federal grand juries are investigating reports that few banks have been taken over by wealthy hoodlums of the nation's organized crime empire, the Cosa Nostra.

These sources, who asked not to be named, said in interviews that in the few such cases under study, mobsters of the syndicate are making a shambles of good banking practices with methods that flout the traditional cornerstones — integrity and trustworthiness — of the American banking system.

One government official emphasized that grand jury scrutiny of the reported takeovers is concentrated on banks still in operation. He said there has been no allegation that several bank failures of the last year are in any way connected with the syndicate's new interest in banking.

Only a handful of banks are involved so far, the sources told The Associated Press. But in those banks where Cosa Nostra figures are reported to have moved in, investigators are checking allegations that mobsters are draining the institutions of their assets and demoralizing their communitarian equipment.

## Viet Morale Grows Low, Officer Says

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — An Air Force officer home on leave from Saigon says the Vietnamese are losing spirit in the struggle with the Viet Cong and have doubts concerning the U.S. role in the war.

Lt. Mike Vivian, 37, on 30-day leave after three months in South Viet Nam, said Friday, "I could not be honest and say the South Vietnamese have an optimistic attitude."

The soft-spoken career officer and father of two young children asserted, "It's not easy to live and do nothing but fight."

He said some Vietnamese officers have known nothing but war all their lives.

Describing combat conditions, Vivian said, "You really can't defend the bases. There is no physical way of telling the Viet Cong from Vietnamese."

In many cases, he said, it is easier for the poor farmer to be a Viet Cong than an open supporter of the government.

"That's when the Viet Cong kill the head of the family, burn the crops and take the kids, and even if plans bomb the guerrillas, what has the farmer gained?"

## Anti-U. S. Protests Spread About World

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — Nearly a thousand Communist-led students today staged a violent anti-American demonstration and some of them broke into the building of the U.S. legation.

Down town, Hungarians, African and Asian students protesting U.S. attacks on North Viet Nam smashed front windows of the legation building in Budapest's Freedom Square.

Some broke into the basement and set off a fire. The United States has never ruled out peace talks and that it is open to North Viet Nam and Communist China to halt guerrilla attacks on South Viet Nam.

Besides, there is no optimism here that the one-day hit in terrorist attacks in South Viet Nam will have any lasting significance.

Still, there is hope that the Communists will come to regard their attacks on South Viet Nam as too expensive an undertaking to run the risk of further reprisals and will decide to coexist peacefully with their neighbors.

Officials maintain the United States is not involved.

## Thant Plan To End War Seen Subject

MOSCOW (AP) — A British cabinet minister will meet with Soviet Foreign Minister Andre Gromyko here Monday and diplomats speculate he may act as a go-between for U.N. Secretary-General U Thant's call for peace talks on Viet Nam.

A British embassy spokesman said today an appointment with Gromyko has been arranged for George Thomson, British minister of state for foreign affairs. He will fly back to London after the meeting.

Thomson, the No. 2 man in the British Foreign Office, came to Moscow Friday to sign a cultural agreement.

Diplomats at the United Nations speculated the British minister may discuss Thant's proposal that both sides in the Vietnamese conflict get together over a conference table.

The U.N. secretary-general said in a statement Friday the main parties in the dispute should arrange for talks before the crisis explodes into a major war. But he played down prospects of the United Nations taking any direct role.

Thant repeated a statement he made in Paris last July that the only way to solve the Viet Nam problem was to reconvene the 1954 Geneva conference on the partitioning of French Indochina.

Britain and the Soviet Union were co-chairmen of the conference.

Thant said there would be no many snags to a solution involving the United Nations directly because North Viet Nam and Communist China are not members of the world body.

Britain, which has diplomatic relations with Peking, was considered the logical power to act as liaison in any effort to get a Viet Nam conference under way.

French President Charles de Gaulle and Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri of India have called for another Geneva conference. India is a member of the International Truce Commission on Indochina, charged with preserving the status of the 1954 conference.

The British ambassador to the United States said Friday night in a speech in Williamsburg, Va., that his country may "play a larger and more active role" in support of the U.N. commitment to South Viet Nam.

**BEST PLAY DEVELOPS DECLARER'S LONG SUIT**

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD, National Men's Team Champion

When your partner opens with one trump you can add two clubs the Stayman Convention, to find out whether or not you have a fit in a major suit. If the opener has a major suit, he bids it; otherwise he bids two diamonds.

Open lead—three of clubs.

North wanted to get to four spades if South happened to have a four-card spade suit. When South indicated that he had no major suit, North went to game in notrump.

The Contractors' Division of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce is planning to build a permanent shelter for the homeless. The shelter, to be located on the site of the former Kennedy Day Camp, will house about 25 to 30 families.

The shelter, of approximately 25 by 30 feet, is scheduled to be completed by June 1, and will be donated to the town, so that it could be used by other groups and organizations throughout the year.

Salvatore Filorami, chairman of the Chamber's Contractors' Division, and a member of the Kennedy Day Camp Advisory Committee, has appointed a special group to carry out the project.

The committee consists of: chairman, Hayden Griswold; Edgar Coughlin, Alexander Jarvis; Arthur Steele of William F. Steele and Son; Frank Gambolati of C. Gambolati and Son; and Walter Sudano of the Congress Construction Co.

The camp, in its first year, operated three sessions of two weeks each, with about 100 campers attending, and 63 volunteer teen age counselors participating.

Plans will soon be made for filing an application with the Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation for a request for a repeat grant of \$10,000 for this year's camp operation.

Last year's shelter consisted of tent and a house trailer, both of which were loaned.

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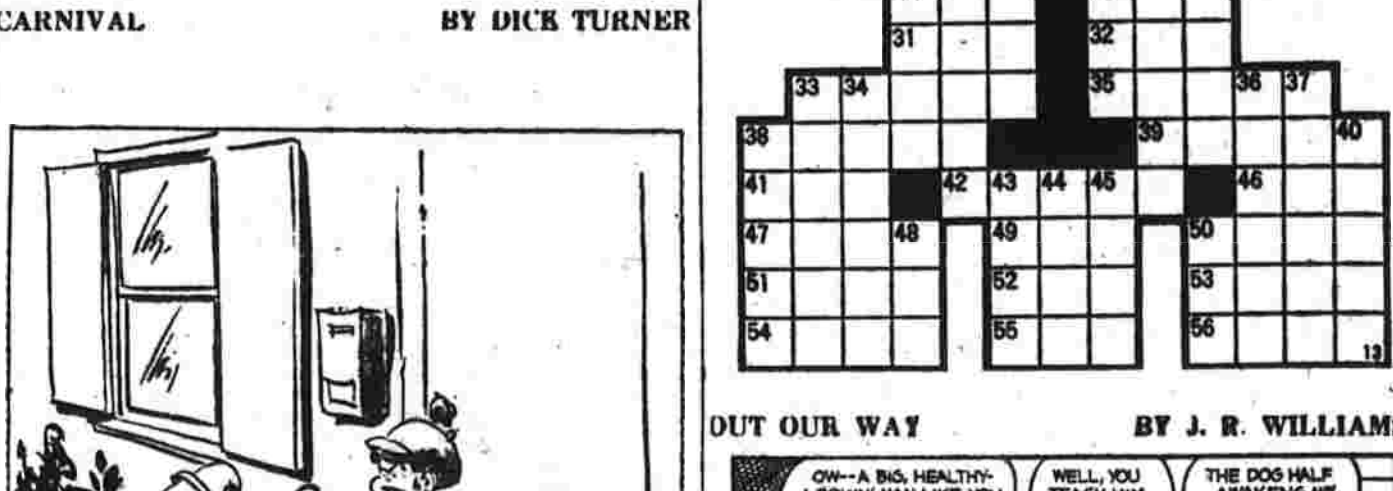
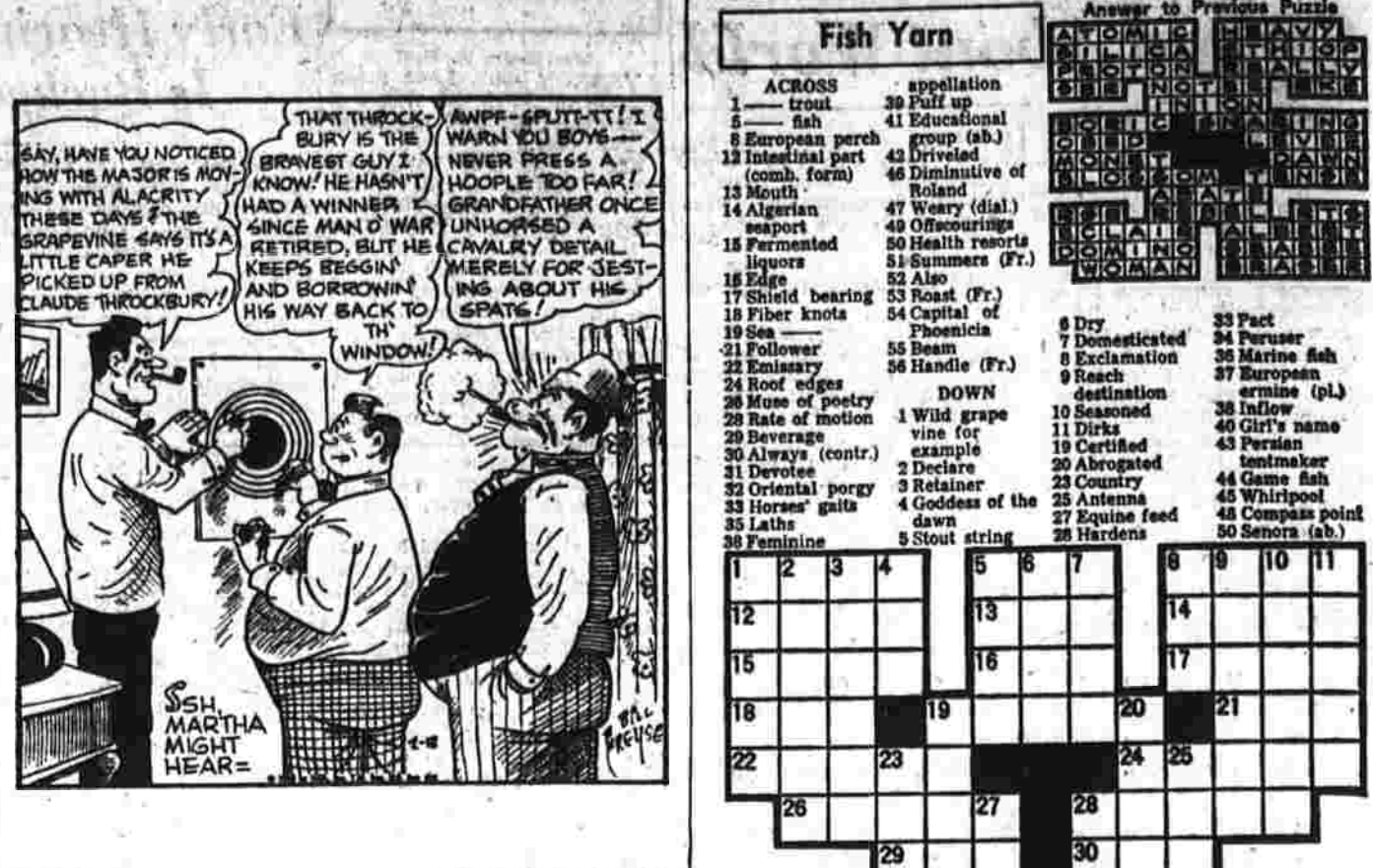

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TV Notebook

NEW YORK (NEA) — Lilia Skala, an Oscar nominee for her beautiful performance as a nun in "Lilies of the Field," is a good example of the things wrong with show business.

A handsome woman with a proven talent, she still has trouble getting acting jobs. When she received word of her Oscar nomination last year, she was working in the lost and found department of the New York City Center, "grateful for the job."

"I know my talent is very great," Miss Skala says, with objectivity. "It was only scratched in 'Lilies of the Field,' but others have to know it."

Others — mainly producers and casting directors — have to know two other basic facts of life, Miss Skala believes:

A performer with an accent (hers is a charming Viennese inflection) can be cast in an "American" role without the accent having to be explained. (She is a naturalized American, who has lived here since 1939 when she and her family fled Hitler.)

If one does have an accent, it is not necessary to be cast as only a Grand Duchess (which she played in both the Broadway and Hollywood versions of "Call Me Madam") or as a hand-wringing immigrant mamma.

"There are plenty of middle-class Europeans living in America — doctors, lawyers, psychologists. All have accents heavier than mine, all are middle class. But this is a facet of life that hasn't penetrated writers' minds yet."

The Accent Affected  
Even if a role calls for an accent, Miss Skala says American directors prefer to cast American actors and have them put on an accent.

"I suppose I can't blame them," she says, "although I would love to. But they feel if an American puts on an accent, the inflection remains American, which makes the actor easier to understand."

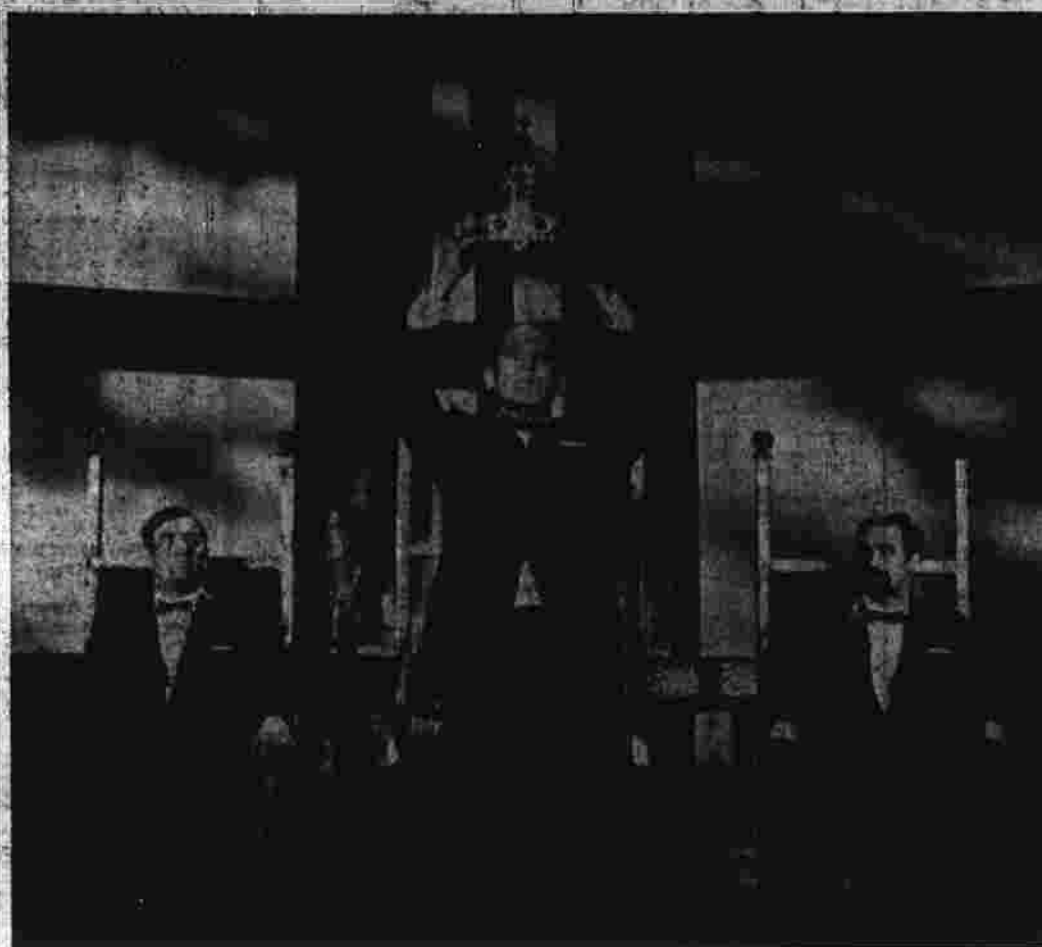

There's Glamor in the Kitchen

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — Housewives of America, you may not realize it but when you watch "Bewitched" and make it one of the most popular television programs in the country, you are really patting yourselves on the back.

When you analyze it as Elizabeth Montgomery has done, the message of Bewitched is a simple and rather frightening one: "Samantha can be anything she wants to be, do anything she wants to do, have anything she wants to have, go anywhere she wants to go. But what she really wants to do is be just an average American housewife and do for her man."

Thus, "Bewitched" is telling all you housewives that you are the chosen people. You have a niche that a witch would give her riches for.

And, actually, all these television family situation comedies preach pretty much the same philosophy. They do this by casting glamor gals as housewives.

A quick inventory of actresses who are playing ordinary American housewives this season reveals a stunning list — Miss Montgomery, Mary Tyler Moore, Abby Dalton, Connie Stevens, Beverly Garland, Joyce Bulifant, Patricia Barry and (not quite ordinary) Yvonne De Carlo and Carolyn Jones.

Very few committees offer such an array of beauty in the kitchen. So the message here is easy to interpret: Housewifery is glamorous trade, and every girl should aspire to it.

Of course, television housewives witness Jane Wyatt, Donna Reed and Marjorie Lord. But the image has been more of the wise, maternal one.

The new breed of helpmate undoubtedly has made these

family comedy shows more popular with American male viewers. There is, for example, a far from small fraternity which eagerly looks forward to Wednesday evenings just to see if Mary Tyler Moore (as Dick Van Dyke's wife) is wearing a new pair of stretch slacks.

Elizabeth Montgomery thinks that she shares with the benevolent witch, Samantha, one vital trait — both enjoy doing things for their husbands.

Miss Montgomery, no witch, is a very real girl. And although she grew up the daughter of a successful actor, Robert Montgomery, her education in the domestic arts was not in the domestic arts was not lacking. She says that her mother is a great cook, and so are an aunt and a cousin with whom she is close.

'Line' Notes Fifteenth Anniversary

NEW YORK (AP) — "What's My Line?" will be celebrating its 15th anniversary on CBS Sunday night, a remarkable age in an industry where two seasons is a success, three seasons a smash.

The four regulars on the show — host John Daly and panelists Dorothy Kilgallen, Arlene Francis and Bennett Cerf — have been on the show so long it is hard to remember that in earlier years the chairs were occupied by others. On the winter's night in 1950 when John Daly first asked, "Will our first contestant enter and sign in, please?" Miss Kilgallen occupied the first chair. Miss Francis joined the second show. Cerf came aboard about 15 months later.

In terms of age — and in TV age is synonymous with audience affection — it is surpassed only by Ed Sullivan's show, now in its 16th year.

But although "What's My Line?" features different characters each week, the leading players are the same.

All four were asked why they thought the rather simple guessing game had survived over the years.

Daly guessed that "spontaneity is a basic ingredient," and suggested that "each contestant presents a new plot and the cast — the ebullient, sunny and perspicacious panel — is superb."

Dorothy Kilgallen forthrightly declared it was "because Arlene Francis is unfailingly witty, Bennett Cerf is a brilliant game player and John Daly is the best panel moderator in the world."

Arlene thinks it is simply a good game "and John, Bennett, Dorothy and I all enjoy playing it."

"We became involved and amused all over again with each new occupation — and obviously the fun we are having communicates itself to the audience," she said.

Perhaps a more subtle reason for its popularity — and it is a great favorite with women viewers — is the clothes and the hair

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# Bea Is Uncertain Success Will Last

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — This is the time of peril on the sound stages of television series, when stars are alert for the descending whiff of axes.

At this season the networks decide which shows are to survive and which are to become reruns. One series which seems certain of pressing on is "Petticoat Junction," by reason of its consistently respectable ratings. Still, Bea Benaderet isn't certain.

"You never know these things until they happen," she reasons, "and I'm the last to find out. I usually hear the news from the prop man, who seems to know everything that is going on."

There is cause for Bea's unwillingness to believe that "Petticoat Junction" is a cinch for renewal. She still has trouble believing that the series actually happened.

For many seasons, Bea Benaderet served as supporting actress and comedienne. "I was always playing character parts," she recalls, "even when I was appearing on the stage in San Francisco at 16."

She continued in that capacity on many top shows during radio's heyday, notably as the Brooklynese-spouting telephone operator with Jack Benny. Television was an easy transition, and for eight years she resided next door to Burns and Allen.

Four Harry Mortons came and went, including Hal March and Fred Clark, but Blanche Morton was always Bea. She seemed destined to continue in her ace support until Paul Henning intervened. She had played the outlandish cousin Pearl Bodine in his "Beverly Hillbillies." So when he planned a new series about a widowed mother of three daughters who runs a whistle-stop hotel, he sent for Bea.

"It was entirely his idea," she says. "Never in my wildest dreams had I thought of myself starring in a show."

But she's doing it in her second season and, despite her dubiety, she'll go a third. Bea, with a 25-year-old son who works on "Petticoat Junction" and a daughter, 18, in college, thrives on the attention and the role.

"Sometimes I think, 'Goodness, this business of appearing

in every scene of the script is too much work.' But let a script come along in which I'm not in all the scenes, and I go, 'Gritzzzzz', she said.

## UN Special Set Friday

Marla Schell, Edward G. Robinson, Stanley Baker and Theodore Bikel head an international cast in "Who Has Seen the Wind?", second in the series of 90-minute dramatic specials about the activities of the United Nations, Friday on ABC from 9:30-11 p.m.

Co-starring in "Who Has Seen the Wind?" are Victor Jory, Gypsy Rose Lee, Simon Oakland, Paul Richards, Lilla Skala and 13-year-old Veronica Cartwright.

The drama, from an original story by Tad Mosel, deals with a family forced to spend their lives aboard a tramp steamer because their country was written out of existence as an aftermath of World War II. Their personal drama reaches crisis when the parents must make a fateful decision concerning their teen-age daughter and the future of them all.

The entire production was filmed off the coast of Mazatlan, Mexico, aboard a freighter, and in the town itself, a fishing port on the rugged west coast.
