McNamara Calls Viet Nam 'Grave, but Not Hopeless'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said today the present situation in South Viet Nam is grave but not hopeless.

McNamara stressed that the best to stemming Communist expansion throughout Southeast Asia and other emerging areas of the world. "Considering the great strategic importance of the United States in this struggle," he declared, "I see no other alternative for the United States than continuing to support South Viet Nam against the Red guerrilla onslaught."

McNamara said this country cannot pull out. He discussed the Viet Nam situation in a 20-page statement prepared for a subcommittee of the House Armed Services Committee, set up to hear McNamara outline the general defense situation.

There was no mention of developments at Communist mortar and bomb attacks on U.S. installations in South Viet Nam, nor American retaliatory strikes against North Viet Nam. McNamara's public statement was a condensed version of a much longer secret report he made to the committee. It covered his estimate of the world situation in general, as well as proposals for strengthening U.S. military power under a \$49-billion defense budget.

### Mrs. MacGowan Is Retired From Hartford Dispensary

"I remember it was quite brutal during the depression," said Mrs. Emily MacGowan, the "Mrs. Dispensary" at the Hartford Dispensary for the past 38 years.

She was recalling one of the early experiences of her long span of service that ended last week with retirement. The 64-year-old nurse lives on 126 Parker St. with her husband Andrew, also retired from partnership of a dental laboratory firm in Hartford.

The Hartford Dispensary, then 61 years old, was awfully busy with needy families seeking its low cost medical and dental care, she said.

The Hartford Dispensary has been providing medical and dental care to families of limited incomes since it was founded in 1871. Last year it treated about 2,000 patients, two-thirds of whom were children younger than 15.

Its charter was revised in 1915 to include needy families in Hartford County. The dispensary was the first of its kind in the state.

Mrs. MacGowan looks back upon the years with fondness. She says she didn't mind taking the bus to and from Hartford every day. "Perhaps because I love to work with people," she said.

She said that the dispensary was able to offer large variety of clinics at low cost mainly because some of the finest doctors in the area donate their services.

Increased medical expenses in recent years have forced

many people to seek medical treatment elsewhere, she said. They could go to city welfare but many prefer to come to the dispensary, pay a small amount, and stay off the welfare rolls, she said.

Other than work toward that end, Mrs. MacGowan says she has no plans for the future. "I've only been retired a month and a half and I haven't had a chance to make any plans yet," she said.

Deadpan Look in Deadend Street

Yesterday, by adding something to the prepared text of a speech on economics, President Johnson spoke again on the crisis in Vietnam.

"We seek no wider war," the President said once again, and then went on into that deadpan pronouncement which not even he can really be said to represent the whole truth about the situation in Vietnam or our policy there.

The reason the President talks in the deadpan hopeless fashion is that he feels powerless to talk in any other way. His basic situation, therefore, is that ever since the pronouncement of our retaliation policy, the trigger that can touch off world destruction has been placed not in the hands of Barry Goldwater, nor kept in the hands of Lyndon Johnson, but put into the hands of what half-wit pundits in the jungles of Vietnam.

As for our minor regrets, they are these. We would wish that Communist China were inside the political institution it is trying to ruin, instead of working through agents. And we would wish the United States and Russia, who are in the United Nations, could somehow manage as much appreciation of its impact as they do in the United States.

Clever Politics, Those Chinese

Communist China executed a sharp and logical kind of political play, the other day, inside a political organization to which Communist China does not even belong.

All Communist China needed to hang the United Nations up for a few hours, and make it look as powerless and ridiculous as Communist China would like to have it look.

The record vote Albania demanded was a vote on whether the members of the General Assembly wanted to continue operating without record votes of any kind.

This was a particularly devilish parliamentary device, for it confronted the United Nations General Assembly with the record vote showing it had been avoiding all full and winter by arranging its business, by tacit consent, so it won't have to record votes.

If the General Assembly should ever be forced into a record vote, even on the question of whether or not it wishes to dispense with record votes, that would precipitate the point-blank quarrel between the United States and Russia. In that quarrel the United States maintains Russia can't vote in the General Assembly unless it meets its obligations to peace-keeping operations the General Assembly ordered in the past.

So Communist China pulled the puppet strings leading to this Albanian record vote, and with some minor regrets, we welcome the idea that the world powers and parties should play politics in the United Nations. That is what the organization ought to be for—to settle disputes by politics rather than by war.

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Inside Report

WASHINGTON—More than the anticipated \$28 billion annual savings is at stake in President Johnson's fight to close wasteful Veterans hospitals against pressure from Congress and the veterans lobby.

This is a test of wills which could determine whether the President or Congress will have the upper hand throughout the 8th Congress. Mr. Johnson always believed Congress would respect the war by extending it and fighting it on a new and wider front.

This, then, is the reason President Johnson is behaving as if he has no choice. He put himself, and all of us, in this box when he embarked upon the policy of Sunday, Feb. 7. He has no way out. The question is whether or not some collaboration of other influences and powers, can rescue him, and the world.

Yesterday, President Johnson conferred with Dwight Eisenhower. That gentleman and general came to office in 1952 with a pledge to try to end the Korean war. He pledged American strength and steadfastness and stamina to that task, but he did not promise to do it by bombing across borders or extending the limits of the war.

Eisenhower, it should be noted, had a sense toward peace and survival. President Johnson does not. Our presence in Korea was by vote and sanction and by the assistance and the participation of the United Nations and its members, and there was no doubt or debate about the moral rightness and the book legality of our presence there. There has never been any international moral or legal mandate any kind covering our role in Southeast Asia.

Eisenhower made peace, then, by negotiation and truce in the face of criticism and the war hawks of that day. But he never specifically boxed himself in beforehand, the way President Johnson has done. He did not pretend to know what Eisenhower told President Johnson yesterday. That may have changed. We know what he did, when the handling of the question of war or peace was with him. But he, again, had sense and balance enough to leave himself free, with some scope for decision. He never let himself get a deadend street with a

Connecticut Yankee

It was easy for us to notice how Governor John Dempsey's voice and emphasis deepened when he addressed the opening of this season of the Legislature, he came to his passage of the physically and mentally ill, the disabled, the handicapped, the blind, the deaf, the mentally retarded.

And it was not only a Christmas party at the Governor's Residence, one of the traditional Christmas parties for the gentlemen of the town. But, this year, something new had been added.

There was, on the walls of the Residence's parlor and dining room, a display, in picture after picture, was art which was produced by inmates of state mental institutions.

Some of it, however, artistically speaking, and some of it seemed very professional, artistic and professional. We wouldn't know, from art student knowledge, which we have no competence. What we did notice was the extraordinary interest and pride with which Governor Dempsey and Mrs. Dorothy Dempsey displayed these paintings on their walls, not merely for their visual interest, but for the fact that they were produced by those who, in another day and age, might have been considered hopelessly blank and lost.

For these reasons, the President of the United States, Lyndon B. Johnson, is deeply sensitive about his image and the image of his administration. He is discarding his usual half-a-loaf consensus politics and demanding a full loaf this time. He insists on closing down the 11 hospitals, 7 regional hospitals, and 7 regional centers, and 4 old soldiers homes. The President consulted Budget Director Kenneth G. Cason, then gave his own okay.

Mr. Johnson told the water on Capitol Hill—particularly with the aid of Sen. Charles McNamara, chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, a Southern conservative who has resigned recently from the Senate—disregard with some closings, but in general gave his blessing.

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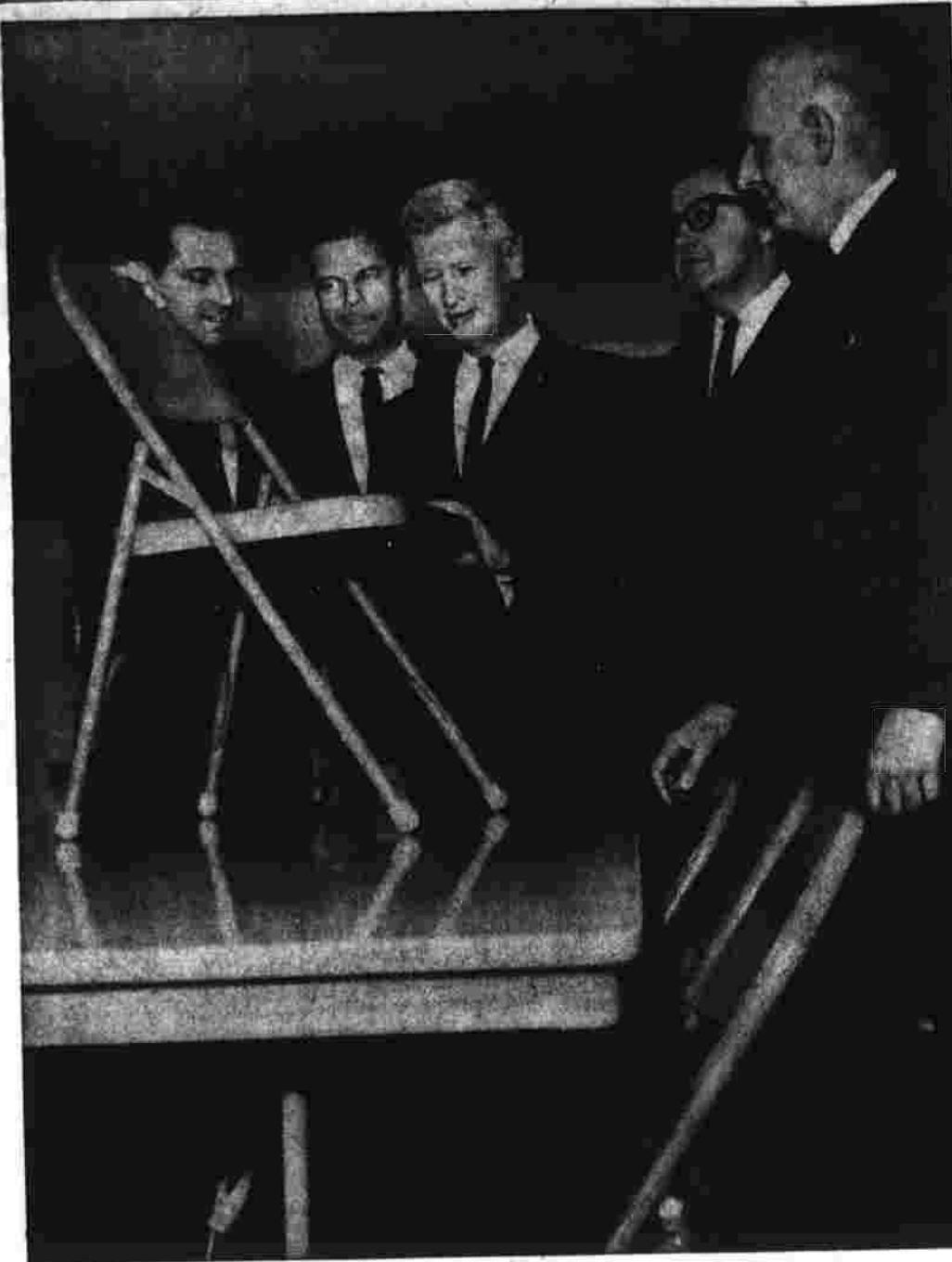

**Noted Flier Joan Smith Believed Crash Victim**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The first woman to fly the equatorial route around the world is believed to have plotted a small plane that crashed in the San Gabriel Mountains Wednesday, killing the two women aboard. Although the coroner's office declined official identification until her husband views the badly burned bodies, the husband said he had no doubt his wife, Joan Merritt Smith, 28, is dead. Authorities believe the other woman was Tracie Ann Schubert, 42, of Los Angeles, who was writing Joan's life story. Sheriff's deputies and federal authorities reported that the women got toward the area of the crash from nearby Long Beach. Smith, commanding officer of the minisweeper USS Endurance, said he was aboard his vessel in Long Beach Harbor at the time of the crash. Joan and Tracie Mock of Columbus, Ohio, caught the world's imagination last year with their race, to become the first woman to circle the globe. Mrs. Schubert also was a veteran pilot. She flew in two powder puff derbies — transcontinental air races for women — in 1938 and 1944. She was married to Dr. Delroy J. Schubert, a college professor.

### Calls for Respect Ignored Attacks Increasing On Buildings Abroad

WASHINGTON (AP) — At 49 embassies in Moscow, Russia and elsewhere in the United States is going to apparently be at a new high despite statements by President Johnson and Secretary of State Dean Rusk calling for respect for the protection of its embassies.

More than a dozen assaults have damaged American embassies and other U.S. government property since Johnson's inaugural address Jan. 4. One unofficial count lists 14 such attacks.

State Department records show 83 cases of "damages to U.S. government buildings or other causes" in the 2 1/2 years ended December 1964. That's slightly less than two attacks a month.

Johnson said "We cannot be indifferent to acts designed to injure our interests, or our citizens, or our establishments abroad. The community of nations requires mutual respect. We shall extend it — and we shall expect it."

Rusk, at a news conference last Dec. 23, voiced concern over foreign violation of the "elementary rights of legation" and said: "We shall be sensitive to these matters." After the Feb. 9 attack on the American

### Sharp Dip Noted In Idle Claims

Unemployment compensation claims filed in Manchester last week took a sharp drop of 10 per cent below the totals for the previous week, with 121 less checks issued during the week ending Feb. 13 than were issued during the week ending Feb. 6.

The totals were 1,011 last week, with 278 of the total claims from the Rockville area. The remaining 733 claims were from Manchester, Vernon and Bolton.

Claims filed throughout the state last week declined by 2,243 to a total of 33,933, far below the 41,444 figure for the corresponding period last year.

The Hartford office took over the top spot among the state's 20 offices with 4,449 claims, followed by Bridgeport, which had been first for weeks, with 4,235; New Haven with 3,707; and Waterbury with 2,870.

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**'Be Positive...Be for Things' Gov. Chafee Tells Area GOP**

Chafee was welcomed by Francis DellaFera, chairman of the sponsoring Manchester Republican Town Committee, and taken to a makeshift pressroom off the Armory's main floor.

Speaking to television cameras from behind a regulation U.S. Army lectern, Chafee expressed his state's support for New England efforts to assist the New Haven Railroad.

Rhode Island, he said, would be willing to put up cash to keep the train running "but only after the four states including Connecticut, Massachusetts and New York as well as Rhode Island, had developed more specific plans."

Chafee said he had asked the governors of the other three states involved to meet with him, but that no concrete plans had been made.

Judging by the reaction of the railroad trustees, he said, the \$20 million plan put forth by Connecticut and New York is "too little and too late."

Both freight and passenger service are necessary to Rhode Island, he said, and the freight is of primary importance.

Minimizing differences of opinion about passenger service revenue losses, Chafee said that "no matter what the loss, we don't think passenger service can be maintained without a federal subsidy."

Rhode Island's Constitutional Convention, charged with reapportioning the state legislature, has begun organizational meetings but has not dealt with any substantial matters yet, he said.

The convention will also consider increasing the term of office of governor from two to four, pairing governor and lieutenant governor on the voting machine, and altering the method by which judges are chosen pending reappointment.

Guests from six areas towns participating in the Lincoln Day Dinner began arriving in the Armory's assembly hall during the press conference.

Besides Manchester, the event was sponsored by town committees in Marlborough, East Hartford, South Windsor, Vernon and Bolton, each of which had a reserved table.

The hall, draped with red, white and blue bunting and hung with outsize pictures of Chafee and Lincoln, had been

prepared by the Manchester Women's Republican Club.

Assistance running the dinner was provided by the newly reorganized Manchester Young Republican Club.

Sitting at the speaker's table with Gov. Chafee and DellaFera were state party chairman Searle Pinney, GOP national committee woman Mrs. Norman Harrover, Fourth Senatorial District committee man Atty. John F. Shea, Jr. and committee woman Mrs. Frederick Woolley, and former state chairman Edwin May.

May, who had battled with Pinney for state chairmanship, was paired at dinner with Mrs. Pinney.

DellaFera opened the after-dinner festivities by introducing the GOP candidates for election in Vernon in March.

And he complimented state chairman Pinney for his handling of the party's interests during the state's reapportionment battle.

Pinney, in turn, gave a pat on the back to GOP state legislators for "seeing the overall good of the Republican Party as more important than the preservation of their personal salarycheck."

The reapportionment plan upon which the state has settled, he said, offers Republicans "an opportunity once again to become the majority party."

Presaging Chafee's remarks, he said that "if we adopt a course of solving problems of the majority of the people in the state, we will win."

Gov. Chafee criticized as "pure wishful thinking" the Republican era will return just as the Democratic era is here now.

"The only time the pendulum shifts," he said, "is when people put their untiring efforts into making it swing."

"I have some suggestions on how we can rebuild and strengthen our party," he said. "I believe these suggestions have general application."

"Sometimes I hear Republicans say the public should vote for us in order to preserve the two-party system.

"If we can't come up with any more valid reason than that, we don't deserve the public's support."

In place, he suggested his four points—positive programs, an all inclusive party seeking out candidates, and stirring public interest by not shunning primaries.

"Today, and probably even more so in the future," he said,

King, still suffering from a cold and fever, scheduled a morning flight to Atlanta today along with several of his top aides. He said he plans to return to Selma Sunday night to intensify the wide drive.

King said, "Until Sheriff Clark is removed, the evils of Dallas County will not be removed."

Sheriff James G. Clark, 42, is the symbol of resistance to the Negroes. The officer arrested more than 5,000 during the first four weeks of the campaign starting Jan. 18.

As Richard Noward's car rolled a corner it spun out of control and crashed into the side of a building. It turned out that he had run into the emergency room at St. Joseph's Hospital.

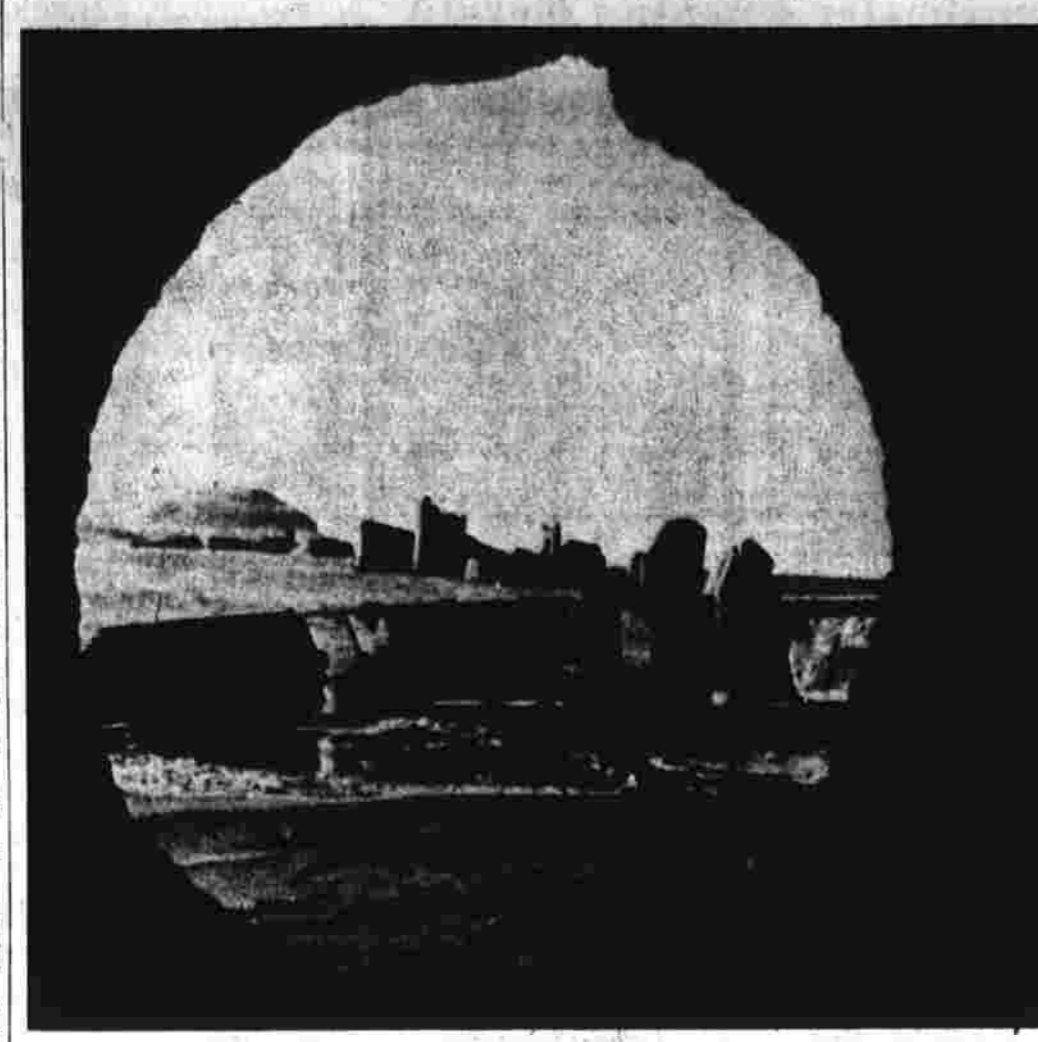
But the second twist of irony was that the car was damaged and he wasn't.

### Iwo Jima Photographer Recalls 20 Years Ago

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—By ship and aerial bombardment. The Japanese had an intricate maze of underground caves and connecting tunnels, some three or four stories down. They had underground sleeping quarters, mess hall and headquarters where they could weather the bombardment. Most were still available when the assault came.

"We were all briefed pretty well on the defense. So there was a grim reality as we approached the beach, wondering who would never come back."

Iwo was the fifth island assault. Rosenthal covered in the Pacific War as Associated Press photographer.

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### Maddox Sells Atlanta Eatery

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—One of the nation's foremost foes of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, Lester G. Maddox, says he has leased his restaurant property to two former employes, both white.

"It is my understanding," Maddox said, "that they will serve people of all races."

Maddox closed his cafeteria rather than serve Negroes.

He said at a news conference Wednesday that the former manager of the eating place, Roy Duncan, and Edward Piper, former chef and line supervisor, probably would open a new restaurant in the property next Monday.

"I will have absolutely nothing to do with the operation," he said. "I'm leaving the building."

A federal judge recently ordered Maddox to pay a fine of \$200 a day for every day he remained open on a segregated basis. Maddox said he would serve Negroes but changed his mind overnight and closed. He was one of the first persons to be cited in a federal court for violation of the public accommodations section of the civil rights law.

He still faces a charge of pointing a pistol, George S. Wilke Jr., a Negro theological student, made the charge in a warrant sworn out last July. He contended that Maddox pointed the pistol at him when he and two Negro companions attempted to enter his restaurant. Maddox is free under \$1,000 bond.

### McNamara Calls Viet Nam Grave, but Not Hopeless

gran step forward in the struggle with the less bellicose Russians for control of the world Communist movement," McNamara added.

"Such a success would also greatly increase the prestige of Communist China among the non-aligned nations and strengthen the position of their following everywhere."

WONT SHARE CITIES WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara told Congress today it is unlikely that a massive nuclear strike by the United States by the Soviet Union would spare American cities at the start and hit only military targets.

The defense chief discarded the no-cities theory which some U.S. strategists have entertained, hopefully, in predicting the form of any general war.

In his annual military posture statement, prepared on the foundation of military posture before the House Armed Services Committee, McNamara did not name Red China as an immediate menace to American targets, despite her detonation of a nuclear test device and a U.S. prediction that Communist China may be forthcoming in the near future.

But he did not rule out the long-range menace of the Chinese Communist power.

"Although results may be slow in coming," he said after discussing Red China's economic and industrial difficulties, "there is no reason to suppose that the Chinese cannot in time produce medium-range and long-range ballistic missile systems and arm them with thermobaric warheads. Given the hostility the regime has shown, this is a most disturbing long-term prospect."

In assessing the possibilities of a nuclear exchange with the Soviet Union, McNamara set forth in his customary unemotional, coldly analytical style what he thought could happen.

The centerpiece was an estimate of American and Soviet deaths in the millions.

McNamara calculated U.S. casualties as proportional to the force, and the time to its ready response to a Soviet first strike.

If Soviet nuclear fire fell on American urban areas simultaneously with fire on U.S. missile and air bases and other strategic retaliatory systems, up to 10 million would be killed, if city attacks were delayed until after the launching of military bases, the fatalities might be halved to a top of 5 million.

An interval between the two types of Red attack would give time for U.S. missiles of the "damage limiting" portion of the strategic force to be launched against still undamaged Soviet missiles.

McNamara put it this way: "Our missile forces would be most effective against the enemy's bombers and ICBMs if the war were waged for an hour or more after an attack on U.S. military targets—an unlikely contingency."

"Our manned bomber force would be effective in the damage limiting role only if the enemy attacks our urban centers were withheld several days."

He looked also at the other side of the coin, what a U.S. re-

quiring fluoridation of the public water supplies.

Departmental regulations are referred according to subject to the appropriate legislative committee. And the committee, according to the statute, "shall schedule hearings thereon."

Planning to Sew Edging?

### South Windsor Proposed Rules for Park Presented at Hearing

A public hearing was held last night on the proposed ordinance regulating conduct in public parks in South Windsor. Two residents questioned several sections of the ordinance. Mrs. Louise Evans of Main St. questioned whether a "vehicle" as described in the ordinance would also include wheelchairs. She also asked who set up enforcement of the regulations and whether there were provisions for penalties in the ordinance.

Councilman Walter Hill said any violation would be a violation of a town ordinance in which there is a penalty. Councilman Umberto Del Maestro, presiding at the public hearing, stated there is a code of ordinances that provides for punishment for failure to comply with any provision of the ordinance. He noted there is a \$25 fine per day for failure to comply.

Edward Miller said in banning the erection of a structure on a vacant lot was to a future camping area. He noted the town at a future date might want to use the park as a camping site as state parks do.

Walter Umbertelli, chairman of the park and recreation committee, said he agreed in general with Miller's proposal but some means for allowing the Boy Scouts to put up tents to sleep in tents should be easily identified.

Miller emphasized that park employees should be easily identified. He said they should either wear arm bands or uniforms. Umbertelli said he had already pointed out to the recreation committee that the park employees were not adequately identified. Life guards, especially, he said, should be easily identified.

Miller stated he thought the park and recreation committee could take care of this. Miller pointed out the director would be stepping in as the safety commissioner's boss in regard to the speed limit set at 30 miles per hour, except on such roads as the director may designate.
