

Under section 14 of the bill, the community colleges of Manchester and Norwalk, and the one to be established soon in Winsted, would receive \$1,600,000 over the next two years on a proportional per-pupil basis.

Once established, the board would set up and administer a statewide network of community colleges, allotting state frinds and avoiding duplication of facilities.

This board will consist of nine members appointed by the governor to serve six-year terms. They shall receive no compensation except for necessary expenses.

One of the duties of the board would be "to determine the need for education at the community and junior college level throughout the state," and to develop a comprehensive plan to meet this need.

The bill also provides for establishing an advisory council finds and avoiding duplication of facilities.
