## Heart Attack Claims Comic Stan Laurel

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Stan Laurel, the little, rubber-faced partner of the late, 300-pound Oliver Hardy in the movies' most successful comedy team, is dead of a heart attack at 74.

Victim of a stroke in 1955 and of diabetes in later years, he suffered the final attack Tuesday in his bluff-top apartment overlooking the ocean. His fourth wife, Ida, was his bride. Laurel and Hardy starred in 300 films, mostly two- and three-reelers, and made millions.

They were the 30's slapstick kings and their films still are shown regularly on television and in theaters around the world.

Fans remember Laurel as the top-haired, bungling yet lovable, blank, stupid expression, inevitably brought disaster to his fat, exasperated partner.

Bates Hardy used to say Laurel was the brains of their act. Stan wrote and directed many of their films.

In a stock situation, the skinny Laurel and the rotund Hardy were at odds with authority—landlord, grim mother-in-law or chief of police. They always lost—except at the box office.

Laurel was born Arthur Stanley Jefferson June 16, 1890, in Ulverston, England, the son of a theatrical family. Spending much of his childhood in dressing rooms and railroad stations, he toured with his parents in English stock companies. He later attended King James Grammar School, Gairford School and Tyngsboro College.

He started as a writer and director. Then one day Hardy replaced an actor who had taken sick and played a better named Hardy. They were an instantaneous click.

Their heyday was in films for the late producer Hal Roach. They made many pictures for him before moving in 1940 to 20th Century-Fox. They kept to properly rights to the old films, so Roach no longer when they later were shown on television.

Their movies included "Babe in the Wood," "Doris," "Brooklyn," "Way Out West," "Our Relations," "Bosch," "The Bonnie Bachelors."

They made their last film, "Auntie," in France in 1949. Hardy died in 1957.

Besides his widow, Laurel leaves a daughter Lois, of suburban Westport, and a son, J. Brooks, is a movie producer.

## Rockville-Vernon District Firemen Approve Buying Two Fire Engines

About 50 Vernon Fire District members dancing from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Tuesday night at the Rockville-Vernon District Firemen's meeting approved the purchase of two fire engines for use by district volunteer firemen. The action came at a special district meeting held last night at the Vernon Elementary School.

Discussion was limited on the purchase of the two engines, which will cost \$26,330 and \$25,975.

Fire District Commissioner Andrew Trivette observed that all of the district's fire trucks are about 14 years old, and two of the six trucks were out of action recently due to mechanical failure.

Norman Couch reported that during a fire which destroyed the First Congregational Church of Vernon last month, one of the trucks broke down and had to be placed in a firehouse.

A report presented by Commissioner Percy Spicer, chairman of the fire truck committee of the district, has been since 1961.

"Every year brings new business establishments and to continue this growth, adequate fire protection is a necessity," Spicer said.

Also approved at the meeting was an expenditure of \$3,400 for construction of the interior of the new Co. 3 firehouse.

part of an apparent effort to close in on the beach.

Another report from Da Nang said 15 elephants sighted in the area are believed to be part of a wild herd. There had been speculation that the elephants were being used by the guerrillas to move supplies and equipment.

A military spokesman said 800 Viet Cong were killed in operations last week, against South Vietnamese losses of 210 dead. In addition, however, 400 South Vietnamese soldiers were wounded, and 300 missing.

American casualties were five killed and 11 wounded during the week.

Lt. Gen. Nguyen Khanh, South Viet Nam's ousted strongman, returned to Saigon today for the first time since a series of coups against him began Friday. He had been held up in Dalat, a mountain resort 140 miles north-east of Saigon.

Reliable sources said Khanh would formally hand over his command to the new armed forces chief, Maj. Gen. Tran Van Minh, Thursday morning.

The sources added that Khanh was expected to leave Saigon by plane later in the day for the United States.

Khanh was appointed Tuesday by Chief of State Phan Khanh Chu as a roving ambassador, a peacetime post.

The Viet Cong struck early today, only five miles from Saigon. Two companies of Communist guerrillas overran the hamlet of Phuoc Hiep in the swampy area of Saigon, then withdrew 10 hours later.

Phuoc Hiep's 26 local guardsmen were driven off and at least one was wounded.

An American killed Monday on a combat patrol was identified as Spc. 5 Gerald B. Rose, whose widow, Claire, lives in Fairville, N.H. His mother, Mrs. Herb Gross, lives in Cincinnati, Ohio.

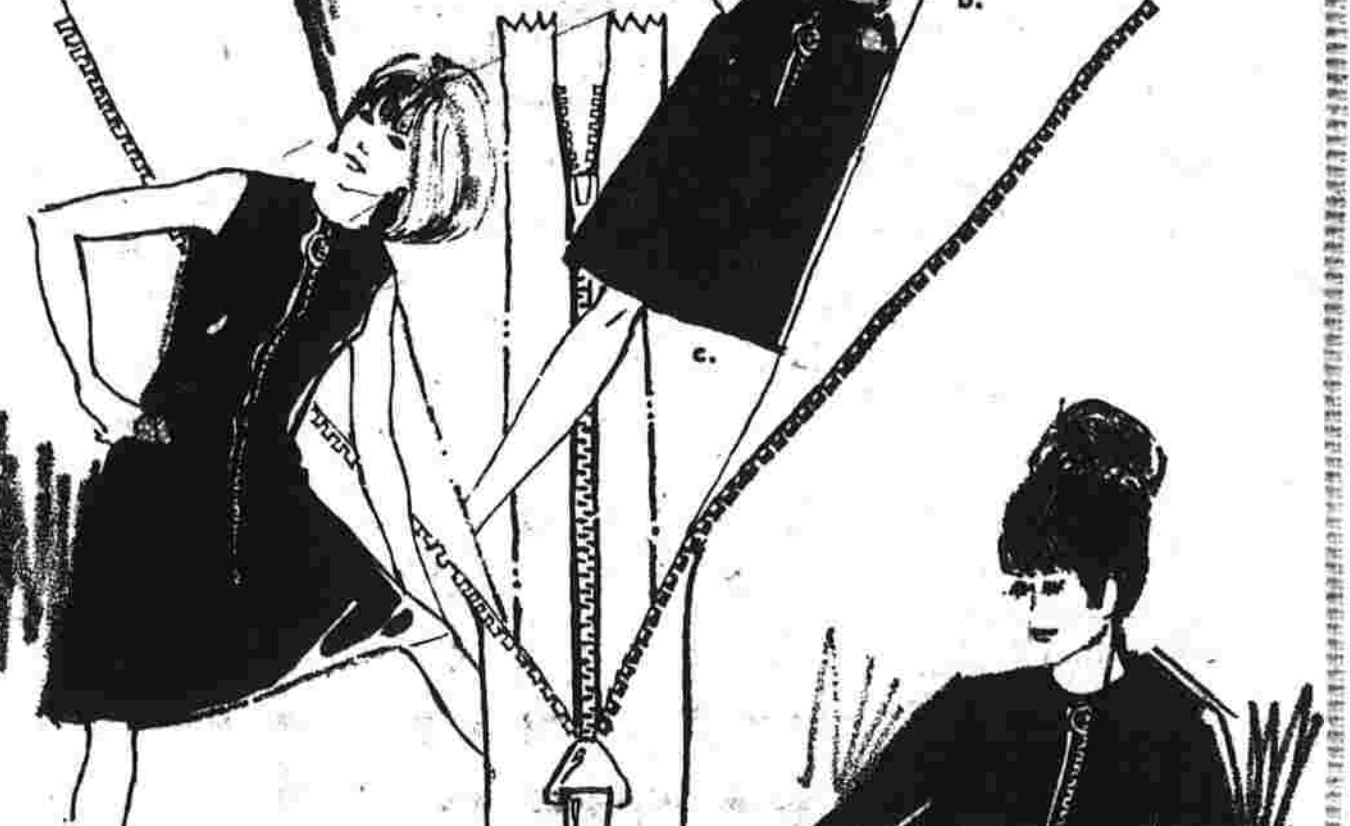

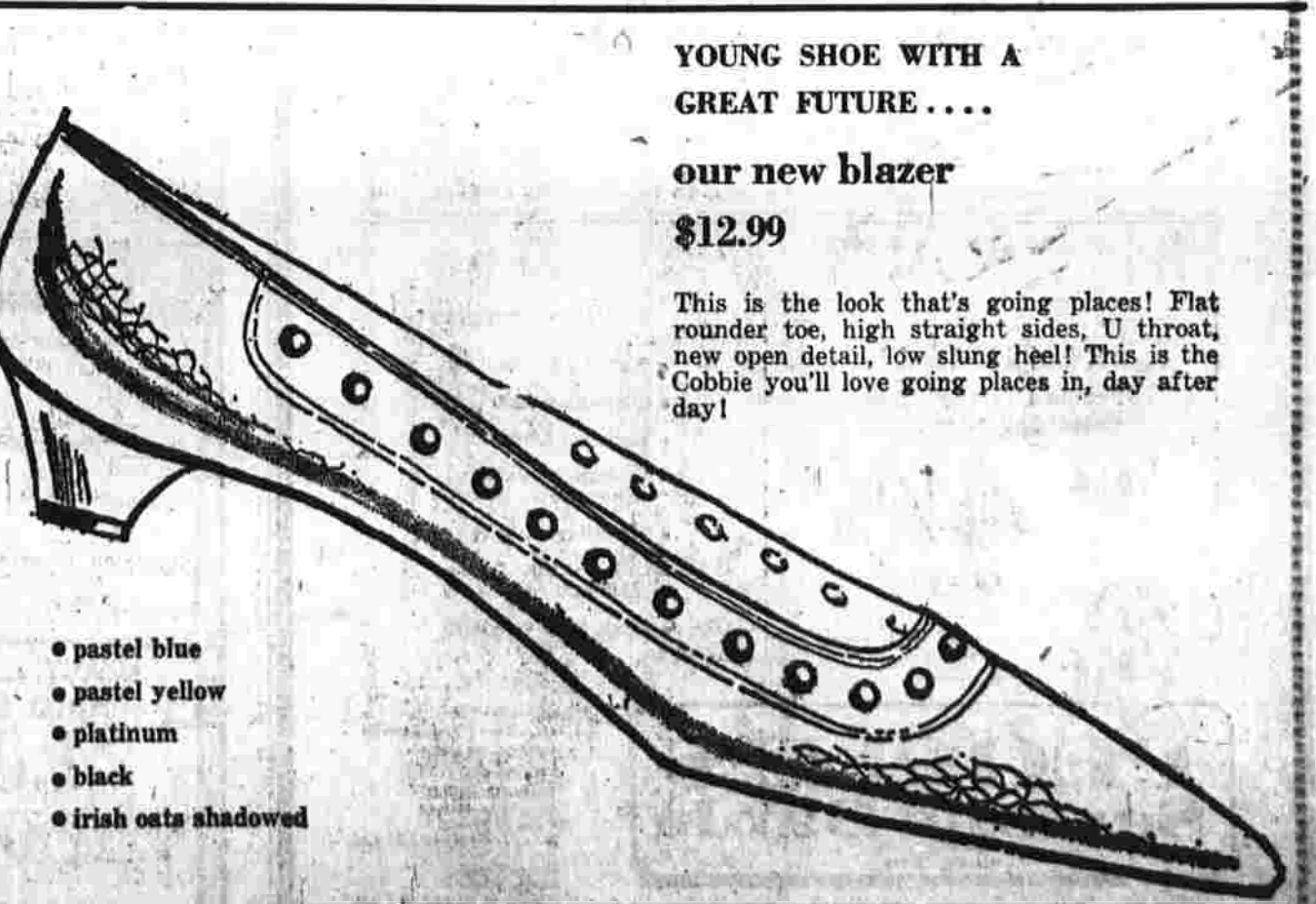

made our country both the hope and the envy of the world.

It is voluntary institutions, state and local government, that the political issues of the day must be met.

The issue is not whether problems are to be faced by the government or the individual; it is through our voluntary institutions that we solve the problems that have any other nation at any time in history.

The choice is between more government and more money on the one hand, and leadership to set cooperative goals and local responsibility on the other.

And, he said, "The answer to excess federal sovereignty is not the resurrection of states that ignore state responsibility. It is the exercise of state and local responsibility including the federalism of state constitutions and local government and the discharge of their functions adequately and effectively."

"Only when local and state government are able to take their own responsibility for solving their own problems can the federal government be able to respond to the economic issues he outlined — which he described as 'economic power in the hands of a few citizens'."

"The national economic policy of the federal government is not the bargaining of nonopolies has made the customer the forerunner of the economy."

He proposed, in a portion of his speech to the dinner, that "without destroying the benefits of labor organizations, the organization of workers bargaining nonopolies must put the customer back in the driver's seat."

While Gov. Romney's reading of his speech to the dinner was often overshadowed by the strength of delivery of his chief of staff, Romney's better view of the man was not seen at the assembled Republicans at all.

Gov. Romney was at his most vigorous and forceful during a fast-paced press conference in a fourth floor suite of the Statler before the dinner began.

Although he said that such concentrations of industrial power as U.S. Steel are in a position to control the country's economy — while such control should be in the hands of the consumers — he said nevertheless that he does not advocate more vigorous enforcement of anti-trust laws.

Instead, he suggested one way the customer could be returned to his rightful place in the "modernization of labor laws" to put labor on the same basis as corporate stockholders.

In answer to a question about the role of the federal government — for example in aiding the New Haven Railroad — he suggested federal action "when the problem is too large for organizations of a private character."

He said he believed the federal War on Poverty might give a slight impetus to stimulate local action, but thought it was outweighed by its disadvantages.

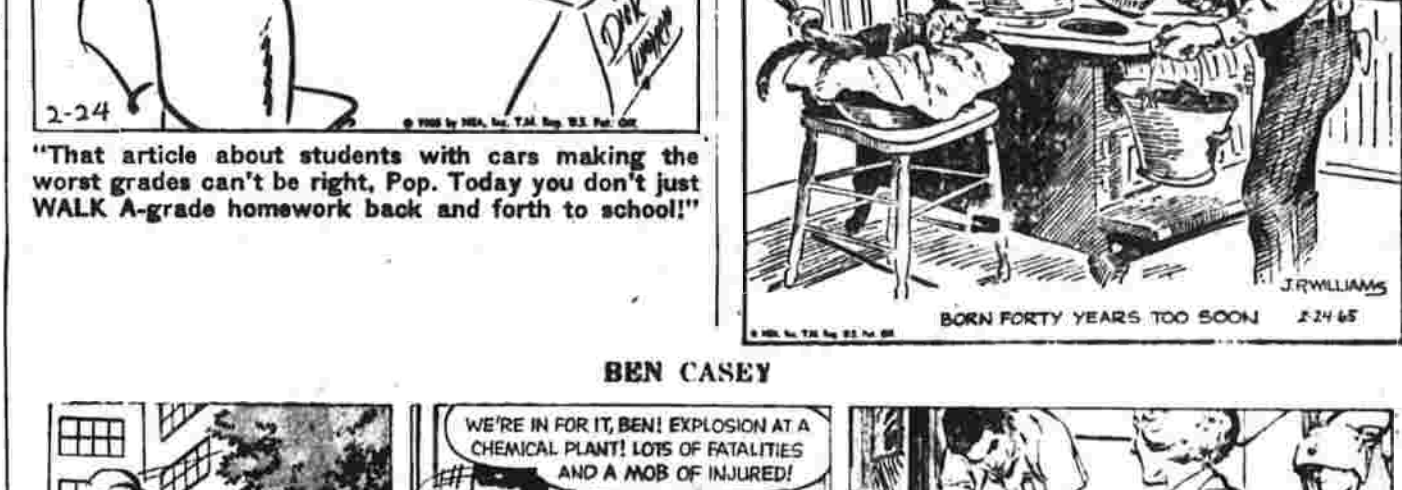
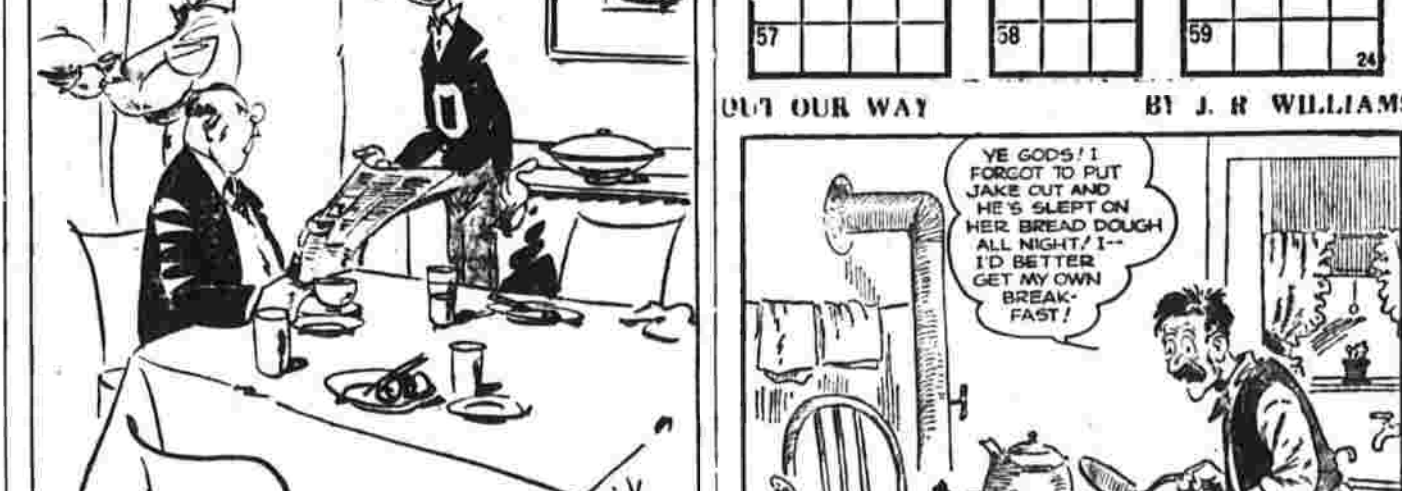
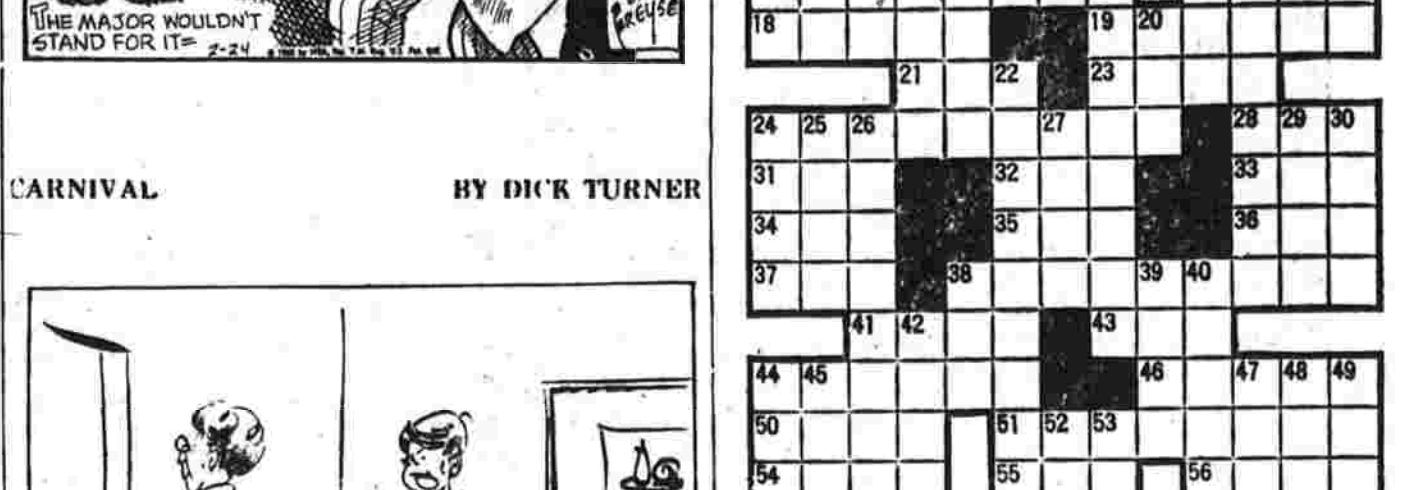
