For "It was a great challenge to me to see just how secret the Klan is and if I could get in," said Belton. "I didn't need him any of our secrets," said Venable. "You have to go through initiation to learn secrets."

Belton also tried his luck with United Klans of America, Inc., but "they asked for my photograph and I didn't return the application."

"I don't know anything about a letter to Imperial Wizard James R. Venable of Tucker, Ga."

He said he mentioned that he was with the Klan "I believe I mentioned that I do janitor work for the club" and he had had followers sympathetic to the Klan.

Belton said he signed a statement that he was a "white Anglo-Saxon Protestant" and mailed his membership application along with the \$15 fee. "Being a Negro and supposed to be unable to read anyway, signed it," he said.

Then Wednesday night Venable was informed that his new recruit was a Negro.

"He has perpetrated a fraud through the mails," said Venable, "I hope he'll drop in and have a cup of coffee."

Then Wednesday night Venable was informed that his new recruit was a Negro.

"He has perpetrated a fraud through the mails," said Venable, "I hope he'll drop in and have a cup of coffee."

ways, lighting a cigar each way if the claustrophobia makes one nervous. The ultimate question is: How much of this will people take? How much gear will they put on so they can have safe accidents? How many devices will they attach to themselves so they can crash and like it? How much less of a human being are we willing to become in order to play the game of modern highway? When, if ever, are we going to recover the idea that automobiles are for people, and even, possibly, for comfort, convenience and pleasure?

We see no dawning of any particular answer. As far ahead as we can see, it looks like seat belts today, complete harness tomorrow, and on through crash helmets to automatic bone-setters, blood-transfusers and stitch-nutures, all eventually required equipment in any automobile allowed on the road, plus, of course, automatic blood-testers and breath-samplers. Let us also hope, meanwhile, the possibility of avoiding accidents in the first place is not entirely neglected.

#### Vehicle For Withdrawal

It is doubtful that Europe could have been reclaimed from the Nazis if the people had had any sympathy for Hitler or were uninterested in his removal. It is increasingly doubtful that we can maintain a position, much less win a war, in South Vietnam against the opposition of sparsity of the "ally" if so, the question is, What then?

The situation is different from World War II on other scores as well. We are fighting alone, on part of the rim of a huge land mass dominated by Communist China; it is stretched taut and we are confronted with an extremely difficult kind of guerrilla warfare.

It is serious to us that such negotiations are not something to be for or against, but simply one of the prospects that will be faced. Certainly the general history of failure of that kind of conference is less and unimpaired.

It is a period in which surface reconciliation will not be achieved, but the future and contribution to the peace really goes.

HARTFORD (AP)—The General Assembly created a report today recommending creation of a state commission for higher education and establishment of community colleges "within reasonable commuting distance" of every Connecticut town.

The report was submitted to Gov. John Dempsey Wednesday by an 18-member special study commission formed by the legislature in 1963.

One of the commission members, Sterling Tooker, said the proposed permanent commission will do continually for this state what this group has tried to do in the last two years.

The report recommends controlling planning and policy making under a 12-member commission and a character selected by the commission. On the other hand, it recommends greater autonomy for individual institutions in managing their own affairs.

Tooker added a statement of his own to the report saying he felt public elementary and secondary schools should be kept separate from higher education.

The graduates of the state's elementary and secondary schools are the source of supply to its institutions of higher learning," he said.

"The excellence of our colleges is directly related to the quality of the public schools," Tooker suggested establishing a board of regents to supervise all public education in Connecticut.

Another commission member, William Horowitz, chairman of the state Board of Education, filed a dissenting opinion.

Horowitz said there is no need for a new state commission. He said the development of state educational institutions has been "efficient, progressive and in keeping with the allocations made by the General Assembly."

Annie M. Hogan of the state's Board of Trustees of the University of Connecticut, also filed a dissenting opinion.

The board of trustees would be retained with its present fiscal autonomy. The state Board of Education should retain responsibility for elementary and secondary education, but the state college and university boards of trustees responsible for higher education should develop plans for the university or coordinating the university's two-year branch colleges with public community colleges.

## Police Last to Know About Teens' Casino

HAWORTH, N.J. (AP) — The police were the last to know about a teenage gambling operation being conducted in the home of a 16-year-old boy, the police chief admits.

"It was common knowledge among the teen-agers," Chief Gaston Michel said Wednesday. "My daughter, Patsy, knew about it but said nothing. That's the way teen-agers are now. They won't tell you anything."

He quickly added that neither of his teenage daughters had been any problem.

The gambling operation was brought to police attention by an anonymous tip. Police kept a \$40,000 home in this quiet suburb, Sargon County community of 2,700 under observation for ten days and then raided the place, seizing a gambling table, dice, chips, and I.O.U. slips totaling \$50.

The owners of the home, Oscar Olsen, who is an insurance salesman, his wife Catherine, their maid Minnie Chisham, and two other teenage boys were arrested. The teen-agers were charged as juvenile delinquents and the adults were charged with contributing to the delinquency of minors.

Michel said the gambling had been going on for about two months. "The boys saved their lunch money to gamble." About 50 boys participated.

"The town has mixed emotions about this. They're happy the thing has been broken up but upset by the publicity," the chief said.

Phyllis Gross, an attractive blonde mother of four teenage boys, said her oldest boy had visited the gambling room. "He told me about it. He said those kids are playing for real. He thought they were a little crazy. I think the publicity in this

Mrs. Gilbert, an ultra-modern housewife, believes that bread making is an art and an easy one. She would be pleased to share her recipe for White Bread and Rolls which was given to her by her sister-in-law, the wife of the Rev. George B. Gilbert Jr., an Episcopal minister in Minnesota.

**White Bread and Rolls**  
(Knead Method)  
1 1/2 cup soft margarine  
1 cup sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 egg at room temperature  
2 1/2 cups milk  
2 packages dry yeast  
8 cups all-purpose flour  
Cream margarine and sugar in electric mixer or thoroughly by hand. Add salt, egg and milk that has been heated up until mixture rises to top of cup, and add to creamed mixture.

Add six cups of flour and mix. Remove bowl from electric mixer and add last two cups of flour by hand. Remove dough from bowl and knead slightly on flour board or table. The dough has been kneaded sufficiently when it no longer sticks to fingers. Place dough in large bowl which has been greased, cover with waxed paper, weight down with plates and refrigerate overnight.

The next morning take dough out of refrigerator and cut down with knife to remove air. Let stand at room temperature about one hour. Divide dough in three parts and knead each section separately on a floured board or table. Put in greased pans or two loaves and 32 rolls if baked in 1 1/2 by 8 pans.

Let bread and rolls rise in warm place approximately two hours. Dough should be golden in size. Bake in 350-degree oven. Bake rolls for 20 minutes and bread 40 minutes.
