Whites Leading Line At Selma Courthouse

SELMA, Ala. (AP)—Day were those applicants who failed to respond when their turn came up at a board meeting Feb. 15. And among those who failed to respond two weeks ago, the first 25 or so were white and they had priority today.

Waiting behind them when the board opened its office at 9 a.m. were more than 100 Negroes, some of whom stood outside in a light rain.

Returning again to lead the campaign he launched six weeks ago was Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., who visited the West Coast during the past several days.

King's workers have been mobilizing for what they hope will be a turnout of hundreds of Negroes at voter registration offices in mostly rural counties of Alabama's black belt.

"We want a number that can't be numbered," was the way the Rev. F. D. Reese of Selma described the plans Sunday night at a church rally here before another Negro, a part-time min-

Events In State

Yale Students Back Teacher Plan Protest

NEW HAVEN (AP)—A group of students prepared today to hold an around the clock demonstration against a decision not to give a Yale University professor a permanent appointment.

The students said they would begin picketing of Woodbridge Hall, the university's administration building at one p.m. and keep it up until Thursday at 4 p.m.

Associate Prof. Richard J. Bernstein of the philosophy department, described as a popular teacher, was not granted tenure Friday by the tenure appointment committee in the humanities.

A controversy over the university's policy toward tenure appointments has been smoldering on campus. The Yale Daily News, student newspaper, recently has written a number of articles on tenure, many of them critical of the university's decision.

About 50 students met Sunday night and formulated plans to protest Bernstein's failure to make tenure.

B57 Bombing Raids Halted in Viet Nam

U.S. Planes
Accidentally
Hit Comrades

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—B57 air strikes against the Communist Viet Cong have been halted in a Mekong Delta area after the American bombers accidentally killed four South Vietnamese troops and wounded 15.

Officers said the error resulted from poor liaison between ground and air units. Under the system of communication between ground advisers and planes, it takes about three minutes to call off an air strike, they said.

Government forces with U.S. helicopter support continued a ground-sea-air offensive in the delta area 100 miles southeast of Saigon. A large Communist force was believed to have been operating in the area.

There were no reports of damage to the Viet Cong, but government forces came under heavy mortar fire this morning. Two soldiers were killed and 18 others wounded.

The B57s and Vietnamese air force Skyriders had been pounding the area for five days, but it was difficult to assess the effectiveness of the strikes. Air crews reported hearing secondary explosions after their bombing runs, including one major blast that could have been a munitions depot.

The ground operation was launched Saturday when two battalions of paratroopers were flown to the front in 137 helicopters. It was the biggest use of the war.

Government forces flanking out through the region reported no major contact with the Communists, but the area was heavily mined and there was some sniper fire.

Two weeks ago Vietnamese fighters sank a ship carrying a large cargo of arms and ammunition off the coast of central Viet Nam.

The possibility of increased action by U.S. Navy patrol ships against vessels running guns from North Viet Nam to guerrillas in the south increased following the new American white paper on the war.

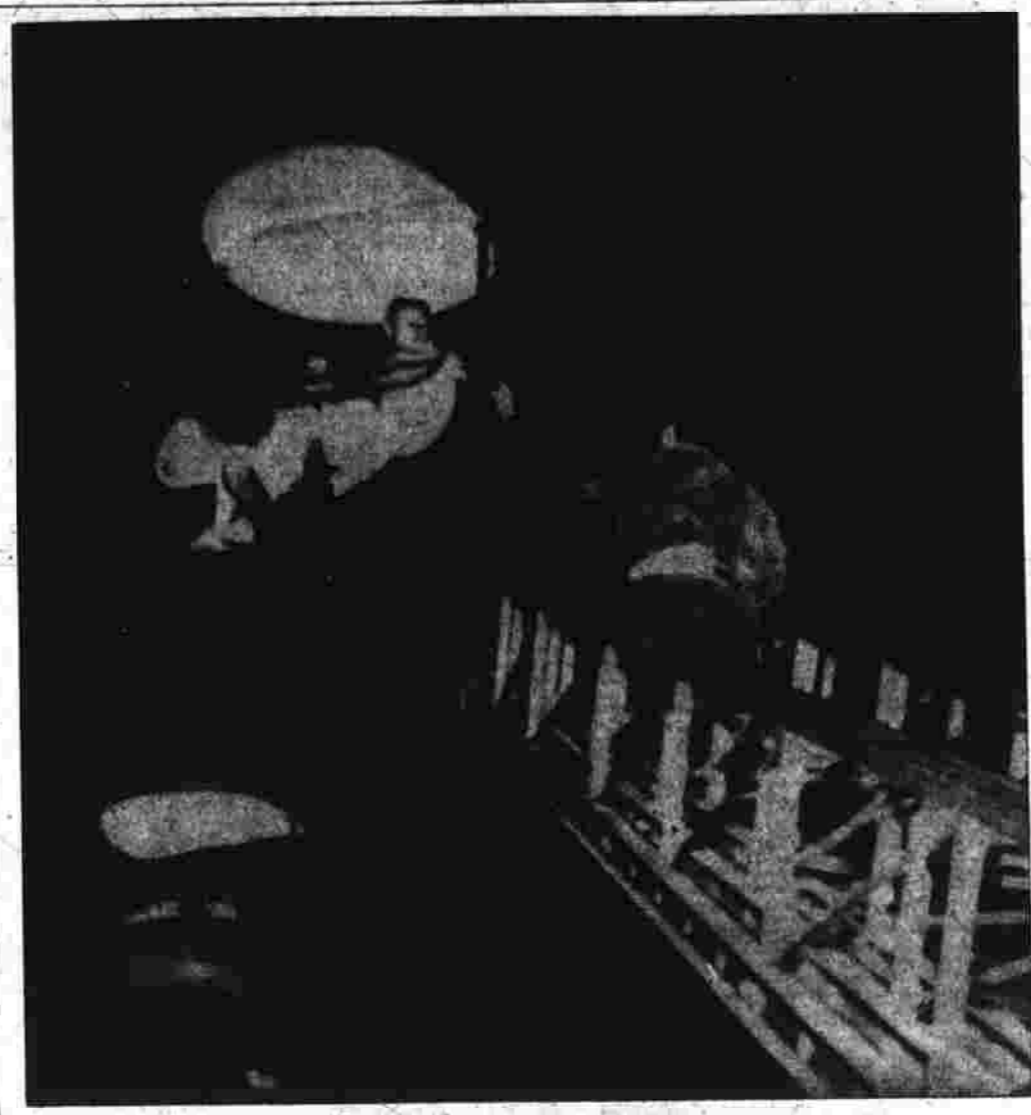
The document issued by the State Department said a North Vietnamese "militant infiltration group" has been sending weapons, supplies and red agents southward in increasing numbers.

In Yokosuka, Japan, Vice Adm. Roy L. Johnson turned over command of the U.S. 7th Fleet to Vice Adm. Paul B. Blackburn, declaring that the fleet is at a new peak of readiness because of the Viet Nam war.

"With no respite in sight, the 7th Fleet casts an even more diligent and watchful eye to events as they take place in the troubled spots of Southeast Asia," said Johnson in a ceremony aboard the fleet flagship, the cruiser Oklahoma City.

The spokesman "blasted" a peace drive in Saigon over the weekend, calling for an end to foreign intervention in the divided land.

Dr. King Urges Peace Between Racist Sects

NEW YORK (AP)—In the wake of the quiet funeral here for the slain Malcolm X, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. has urged that Malcolm's followers and those of Elijah Muhammad, leader of the Black Muslims, "meet with us at the peace table."

"I am concerned over the violence and threats of violence across the nation—particularly in the Negro community since the assassination of Malcolm X," King said.

Peace has reigned in Harlem and other Negro districts here since Saturday's Muslim funeral for Malcolm X, who broke with Elijah Muhammad, leader of the Black Muslims more than a year ago and formed a rival Muslim sect.

Several thousand persons stood in the bitter cold outside a church in Harlem during the service, and about 600 packed the church. There was a heavy police guard. Malcolm was buried in a cemetery in suburban Manhattan.

The peace conference proposed by King, Negro head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, came after threats against Elijah Muhammad and his followers as revenge for the slaying of Malcolm X. Elijah Muhammad and leaders of his Chicago-based sect have denied any connection with the slaying.

King, Nobel Peace Prize winner, made his proposal Sunday to a congregation of more than 2,000 persons in the Victory Baptist church in Los Angeles.

Blast Rips Apartment In Montreal

MONTREAL (AP)—An explosion wrecked a 20-unit apartment building in suburban LaSalle today and unofficial estimates of the number of dead ranged from six to 20. The Montreal Star said eight persons had been killed, six of them children, and listed 30 persons missing.

A search was going on in the rubble of the U-shaped building, of which the middle section was practically obliterated by the blast. Two adjoining wings were heavily damaged by fire. In one of them only the walls were left standing.

All the dwellings in the area of the blast were evacuated. The scene is an apartment development at St. Clement and Berguin streets.

Auto Crash, Drownings Claim Five State Lives

NEW HAVEN (AP)—Five persons lost their lives and four were critically injured in three accidents in Connecticut over the weekend.

Three persons were killed and three critically injured when a car driven by Ivan Alvarez, 24, of Bridgeport, entered the Connecticut Turnpike going the wrong way and crashed head-on into another car early Sunday morning.

The dead were Alvarez, Gene Paolletti, 30, of Stratford, the driver of the other car, and Mrs. Manuel Rodriguez, 35, of Bridgeport, a passenger in Alvarez's car.

Paolletti's wife, Patricia, 29; Constance Mariano, 26, of Stratford, a passenger in the Paolletti car; and Angel Hernandez, 18, of Bridgeport, a passenger in the Alvarez car, were critically injured.

Bridgeport police reported that two officers in a patrol car saw Alvarez driving the wrong way on Stratford Avenue. As the patrol car turned around, the Alvarez car entered the turnpike, and the crash occurred moments later, police said.

Nine persons were in the Alvarez car, all of them going home from a wedding party, police said.

State Woman's Body Found Near River

WEST SWANZEY, N. H. (AP)—Police say they believe an attractive 29-year-old Connecticut mother of two died a week before her body was found on an isolated river bank.

Three young boys discovered the body of Mrs. Dorothy Barber, of Winsted, Conn., frozen in ice Saturday near the Ashuetot River.

Her husband, Leonard, 30, a painter and part time bartender in Winsted said he believed she and the children were visiting friends in Winchester, N.H., and said he did not know she was missing until five days after she was last seen—Feb. 20.

Dr. James M. Ballou, Cheshire County Medical examiner, said today a preliminary examination had not been sufficient to determine the cause of Mrs. Barber's death.

Kosygin Attacks U.S. White Paper

WASHINGTON (AP)—Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin and Red China have blasted the State Department's white paper on South Viet Nam, but at home the document has drawn generally favorable comment.

Kosygin, speaking at an East German government reception Sunday in Leipzig, said the document was "not a white book but a black book—the dirty acts of the Americans can not be recorded in a white book."

Peiking chimed in that the U.S. statement was a pretext for launching new attacks against North Viet Nam.

The 14,000-word document issued Saturday charged that Communist efforts to conquer South Viet Nam are being "inspired, directed, supplied and controlled" by North Viet Nam and that "recently the pace (of aggression) has quickened and the threat has now become acute."

A check with several senators produced agreement that the State Department had made a convincing case on the extent of Communist involvement in the South Vietnamese war. Several said they thought the white paper may have been issued to condition the American people to the possibility of expanded U.S. action in Viet Nam.

Slight Drop In Nation's Birth Rate

WASHINGTON (AP)—An estimated 4,064,000 babies were born in this country in 1964, about 1 per cent below the 4,081,000 in 1963, the Public Health Service reported today.

But the service added that the decline in the birth rate, which began in 1957, tapered off last year.

The provisional birth rate for 1964 was 21.2 per 1,000 population, a reduction of less than 2 per cent from the rate of 21.6 for 1963. This compared with a decline of 3.6 per cent in the rate between 1962 and 1963 and a drop of 4.3 per cent between 1961 and 1962.

Mansfield Commends LBJ On Vietnamese Policies

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Mike Mansfield of Montana commended President Johnson today for "trying to keep the lid on a highly dangerous volcano" in Southeast Asia.

Mansfield, opening another round of Senate debate on U.S. policy in South Viet Nam, praised the administration for the issuance of its White Paper over the weekend.

Mansfield, the Democratic leader, disagreed sharply with those who contend the administration has no policy in South Viet Nam. That policy, Mansfield declared, "is to try to prevent a great war in Asia" and to try to keep a commitment to the government in South Viet Nam.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., in a major speech, praised Johnson's "restraint and perseverance" in the war against the Communists.

The New Math-I Two Plus Two Still Make Four, But the Trick Is Knowing Why

EDITOR'S NOTE—Even in math not only teaches you how, it also teaches you why you do it that way.

You may ask, "Why bother learning 'why' if you already know 'how'?"

Well, knowing how to do a problem is fine—until you forget how. But if you know why a problem is done a certain way, you aren't as likely to forget the how.

Among the first things taught in the new math are the theories of commutative and associative principles. These aren't as complicated as they may sound.

The commutative principle for addition—or C.P.—is a fancy name for a fact everyone knows: 3 plus 4 equals 4 plus 3.

At you can see, this principle simply states that if you add

Gregor Piatigorsky has a new book in the works which will shortly be released by Doubleday, titled "Cellist," and the advance copies have been enthusiastically received by critics and to merit excerpts in both "Time" and "Saturday Review."

Both concentrated on his attitude toward conductors, which is far from flattering.

According to Mr. Piatigorsky, he has played under more than 300 conductors and to judge by his remarks, none of them was as satisfactory as the one who led him to the Berlin Philharmonic in 1934.

Mr. Piatigorsky has a point of view. Most of his experience as a soloist, since after 1928 when he abandoned the first chair of the Berlin Philharmonic, he devoted himself to the cello entirely as a soloist. He spent 4 years as an orchestral player and was principal cellist of the Berlin Philharmonic in 1928.

My recollection is that I first encountered him in the season of 1931-32 when he appeared with the Boston Symphony playing the solo cello part of Strauss' "Don Quixote."

His playing was so good that I was struck by his own transcription of Mozart's E-flat Horn Concerto which he saw in the program.

It may have been some 25 years ago.

Bolton Uniform Fiscal Year Seen by Next Year

The Bolton board of finance... hopes to change the town to a uniform fiscal year starting in July, 1966. Plans now call for a 10-year bond issue of about \$300,000 to accomplish the change with what the board terms the least strain on the taxpayers.

These are normally due May 15 to June 15. Bolton's fiscal year runs from Sept. 1 to Sept. 30. This necessitates borrowing in anticipation of tax revenue in order to run the town from Sept. 15 to May 15 or so. Already this year the town treasurer has borrowed \$245,000.

According to the board of finance, the interest on the money borrowed has been about \$400 each year. Mainly because of the increase in the amount of money borrowed. This year the town will pay about \$5,000 in interest.

The board of finance figured that over a ten-year period this increase and the payments on the bond issue would cancel each other out.

The board met yesterday evening to start working on the changeover. Chairman Norman French said a number will attend the selection meeting tonight to discuss the matter with them and the board.

The board of finance will probably use the one-half mill which has been set aside for this changeover for any deficit. It tentatively predicted that the changeover will cost the town about two mills, according to the present Grand List.
