Hartford Man Tries to Shoot Trial Witness

HARTFORD (AP) — A 20-year-old man was in police custody today, accused of trying to run down and shoot a witness in his forthcoming narcotics trial. Charged with assault with intent to kill is David J. Schinelli of 721 Wetherfield Ave., Hartford. Police say he tried to kill Victor Franco, 25, of 45 John St., today in the north meadow. Capt. Thomas J. Henard, head of the detective division, gave this account: Schinelli and Franco met at about 12:15 a.m. and went for a ride in Schinelli's car. In a lonely area, Schinelli stopped the car and asked Franco to fix the hood. Franco got out and was adjusting the hood when Schinelli gunned the car and tried to run him down. Franco jumped to safety in time. Schinelli then fired at least one shot at him. Franco fled the area and called police. Schinelli was arrested later.

R.R. Needs Funds Now, Smith Says

WASHINGTON (AP) — A New Haven Railroad trustee declared today it would be unthinkable to let the road's freight and passenger services in New England but that it must take immediate and drastic action to save them. Richard Joyce Smith, trustee of the New Haven Railroad, told the Senate Commerce Committee the New Haven's freight operations could be retained by their inclusion in a proposed merger of the Pennsylvania and New York Central Railroads. But the trunk lines, he said, would not accept the losing operations of the New Haven and these would have to be underwritten by some public authority. Trustee William J. Kirk also painted a dreary picture of the New Haven's declining financial position. He said the three trustees had long been aware that no reorganization without public subsidization of passenger services. Chairman John O. Smith, D-R.I., presiding at a hearing on various bills designed to solve the New Haven's passenger problems, that the trustees have agreed with the Pennsylvania and Central for inclusion of New Haven freight business in their merger, adding: "But in some way or other, the New Haven's passenger service problem must be settled first. We haven't been able to work out a takeover of passenger services by Penn-Cen."

Dozen Patients Removed During Hospital Blaze

MIDDLEBROWN (AP) — Seven children were removed from a nursery and five women patients from a surgical ward as firefighters battled a smoky fire at Middlesex Memorial Hospital Tuesday night. The blaze broke out in the attic of the administration wing, an old building which does not house any patients but which is connected to the rest of the hospital. The sprinkler system and firemen's hoses dampened the building considerably. Firemen chopped holes in the second floor to let the water out. The nursery and five women patients were near the administration wing. Their occupants were removed to get them away from the smoke. Some smoke also filtered into operating rooms, forcing surgeons to postpone one operation for a couple of hours. No injuries were reported. Most of the damage to the administration wing was due to smoke and water. Some of the beams in the roof were blackened by the flames. The cause of the blaze was not immediately determined. 30 U.S. Air Force Jets On Mystery Viet Flight

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — More than 30 U.S. Air Force jets flew a mystery strike today from Da Nang air base. It was believed they hit at Communist positions in Laos. Officials at Da Nang, 100 miles south of the border with Viet Nam, would not disclose the targets of the strike. American officials in Saigon said there had been no strike against North Viet Nam today, but they refused to say whether raids had been made elsewhere outside South Viet Nam. American jets have been hitting Communist targets in Laos fairly regularly for the past few months. A high Vietnamese source at Da Nang said the strike was against Communist targets either in North Viet Nam or in Laos. He declined to say which. He said regular attacks against Communist targets in the future. The American F100 and F105 fighter-bombers were heavily loaded with bombs and rockets. No Vietnamese planes took part in the mission. President Johnson said in Washington Tuesday night that six jet planes were shot down against a massive air raid against Communist targets in North Viet Nam and that five of the pilots had been rescued. U.S. officials in Saigon said four Americans and one Vietnamese were rescued and one American pilot was still missing. A U.S. spokesman refused to say whether he was down in North Viet Nam. Moscow radio said "one pilot bailed out in a jungle area and a search has been organized" by the North Vietnamese. The broadcast said the plane went down near Quang Khe, a North Vietnamese navy base about 60 miles north of the border and "undoubtedly" to intercept returning fighter-bombers from the raid but were shot off. The official Viet Nam Press Agency said its pilots spotted the three strange planes coming from the east, "obviously intending to head off the Skyraiders." It quoted the Air Force Command as saying the larger number of South Vietnamese planes "apparently frightened them away." No Communist air activity has been reported during any of the previous American or South Vietnamese air strikes against the Communist north. Seven Navy propeller-driven Skyraider fighter-bombers from a U.S. aircraft carrier driven a line of North Vietnamese boats near one downed American plane, Lt. James A. Shea and Innes Clash During GOP Hearing

HARTFORD (AP) — A Republican hearing on the Democratic Administration's deficiencies bill turned into a shouting match at times today as Democratic and Republican members of the House Appropriations Committee clashed over points of order. Democratic members of the committee, including Rep. William T. Shea of Meriden, who is minority leader in the House, and Republican members vied with each other in their quest for management of the various department heads who appeared to each side. Each side appeared determined to demonstrate that budget shortages, for which the various agencies were seeking additional funds, were the responsibility of the other party. At one point Shea and House Chairman Allan Innes, R-Thomaston, clashed over a statement Innes had issued before the hearing got under way. Shea sought to question Innes about the statement, but was ultimately ruled out of order by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., who is GOP chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, which is conducting the hearing. Shea challenged Innes' right to issue a statement in behalf of the committee. When the committee recessed, Shea said he was not expected to arrive in time for the Selma service. Huge Crowd Jams Church For Funeral

SELMA, Ala. (AP) — Hundreds of Negroes jammed into a red brick church here today for the first of two funeral services for a member of their race killed in an outbreak of violence. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. headed back from a one-day visit to Washington to pay tribute to 26-year-old Jimmie Lee Jackson, who was fatally wounded at nearby Marion, Ala., the night of Feb. 18. King was not expected to arrive in time for the Selma service. A second service was arranged for 2 p.m. at Mason Temple Church, A.M.E. Church. An overflow crowd packed the street an hour before the services began. Bunched across the front of the twin-spired building was a sign which proclaimed, "He Killed Our Brother." McCusker Wins in Vernon, Representatives Split, 6-6

Vernon Democrats yesterday scored a narrow but decisive victory over traditional Republicans in town. Thomas J. McCusker, the Democratic candidate for mayor, led his party in an overthrow of GOP domination which resulted in the takeover of the board of representatives and the Vernon Board of Education. Under consolidation, approved Oct. 15 in referendum, the town will be governed by a mayor and a 12 man board of representatives. Yesterday, six Republicans and six Democrats were elected to that board. However, under charter rules, the mayor will serve as board chairman and will not vote except to break ties. McCusker's election gives the Democrats a decided advantage on the board. Four Democrats and two Republicans were elected to the board of representatives in the city, and in the rural area, the Republican, became Democratic Vernon Fire District, four Republicans and two Democrats were elected. Under the rules set down for the consolidation election, each party nominates four candidates from the city and four from the district. The top six vote-getters are elected. This method allows for minority representation. The members of the Democratic party elected from the city are Frederick Blouw, Albert Brooks, Edwin J. Heck and Richard McCarthy. Republicans elected to the board from the city are Herman Olson and Stuart C. Neff. District Republican candidates elected to the board are Carruthers, Frank McCoy and George Riley, Democrats elected are Robert W. Denning and Thomas Wolf. The Vernon board of education, Republican since its inception, became Democratic controlled yesterday. The nine-man board has been split 5-4 Republican but now the Democrats will have five men on the board. Democrats elected to the board of education for full six-year terms, are James J. Brennan and Albert Smith. The lone Republican elected for a six-year term was the Rev. Paul J. Bowman. Elected to a two-year term on the Board of Education was Peter Humphrey. A temporary gap in the board will be filled by Robert L. Sierakowski who will serve until July 1. Three candidates were elected.

Current Business Boom Nears Peacetime Record

Mexico Temporary Refuge For Thousands of Cubans

MANCHESTER (AP) — Most weather "My son is in Columbia in a clearing house and temporary refuge for thousands of Cubans. Exact figures are difficult to come down, but informed Mexican and Cuban exile sources say an average of 200 Cubans a week come to Mexico. There are 2,000 of 2,500 refugees in Mexico in transit at a time. It takes about 90 days for an average resident permit to clear, enabling them to leave for the United States or elsewhere. The Cuban government strips all those leaving of their property money, even extra clothing, so they arrive penniless.

Three boarding houses and one apartment house in the Cuban exile who live here, number between 5,000 and 10,000. The boarding houses are usually crowded. One is in the immediate vicinity of a Methodist school operated by Helen Hill, the children whom she has brought in Cuba and was deported. Chinese are given food, clothing, money and even haircuts to assist them. The flow from Cuba today is mainly of adults. An estimated 25,000 children of school age were taken out of Cuba during the early Castro days to prevent their being indoctrinated, and many of the current refugees haven't seen their children for years. Some don't even know where they are. "I have a son who is 14 now," a woman said. "I haven't seen him in four years. I won't recognize him. He now is an American and says he will return to Cuba." "I haven't seen my son and daughter for 3 1/2 years," she said.

Public Hearings On Railroad Aid Slated Tuesday

HARTFORD (AP)—Bills that would provide aid to the New England railroad have been scheduled for a legislative public hearing next Tuesday. A wide variety of bills that would give the Connecticut Transportation Authority more money to deal with the bankrupt railroad's problems will be aired.

The hearing will be conducted by the Legislature's finance committee, headed by William Verrier, D-Waterbury, Senate chairman, and Robert Cairns, R-Madison, House chairman. Gov. John Dempsey called Tuesday for a prompt hearing on the measure "so that we might indicate to New York and the federal government that the money is available."

This would be added to an appropriation of \$1 million and bonding authority of \$2 million granted the authority in 1963 by the General Assembly. The \$5 million would be Connecticut's share of a \$20 million plan to provide the New York City commuter service with new equipment. New York's share would be \$5 million and the federal government would put up \$10 million.

WASHINGTON (AP) - GOP National Chairman Dean Burch's assertion that the Republicans have to recast their long-time party image to win elections got the endorsement today of Sen. Thurston B. Morton, R-Ky.

Morton, a former national chairman who heads the Republican senatorial campaign committee, said he agrees with Burch's contention that the needs of the 1964 election defeat go back for years in which the GOP failed to respond to needs of the times.

Antismoking Pact, Coin Drive In Weekly American Panorama

EDITOR'S NOTE — A far-flung antismoking pact in Atlantic City is being followed by a Florida citrus industry vs. synthetic. A campaign to relieve the coin shortage in Phoenix, and a "small boiler" move in the Texas Legislature are among this week's vignettes from the U.S. scene.

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Three men who have stopped smoking for more than a year say it is easy to quit if you follow their formula.

JACK BOONE, one of the three, said: "It's fairly easy to stay away from cigarettes when you know how expensive that first smoke would be."

Boone and two friends, Don Dubose and Earl Smith, decided last year to stop smoking. "We tried to think of a penalty that would be stronger than our desire to smoke," Boone said. "We decided that the first one of us who smokes again would pay for a round trip ticket and a dinner for our families anywhere in Georgia."

They put the pact in writing. After several months, they agreed that the penalty should be higher.

"We decided to include the entire United States," Boone said. "But after a little consideration, we included the whole world."

If any of the three starts smoking again, he will be called on to take the other two families anywhere in the world for dinner.

There are three members in the Boone family, five in the Dubose family and six in the Smith family.

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — The Florida citrus industry has declared war on test tube drinks, but hasn't yet worked out a plan of battle.

Industry officials say one synthetic orange-flavored drink captured a market during its first six months equal to 13 per cent of that of the Florida citrus industry's No. 1 product, frozen orange juice. They fear further inroads by other synthetics.

It appears likely the industry will aim more frozen orange juice advertising at the housewife during the months ahead and cut down its emphasis on the product's vitamin C content.

The Florida Citrus Commission, an industry-supported state agency, has just received a report on an eight-month survey among the nation's nutrition experts that cost \$53,000.

The report recommended that the industry stop stressing the vitamin C content of frozen orange juice, because the synthetic drink people can add as much vitamin C as they wish.

The report said, "vitamin C is the only health benefit the synthetics have to sell."

Natural juices, the report said, "provides an excellent spectrum of nutrients" as well as vitamin C.

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Selling liquor by the drink is illegal in Texas. This means you can't order a martini, or anything else, when you sit down to dinner in a public restaurant. Only beer or wines can be served.

If you bring in your bottle, you can be served with a setup.

Several state legislators are out to change this situation, which results in the curious sight of well-dressed people carrying bottles in paper bags into fancy eating places.

One state senator has introduced a so-called "small bottle" bill which would permit legitimate restaurants to sell liquor in two-ounce bottles.

"The sole purpose of this legislation," declared Sen. Jim Bates, "is to remedy the ridiculous situation which compels Texans, tourists and everybody else while in our state to carry around one or more bottles in a paper sack in order to pour a shot of liquor. We'll give you a crisp \$5 bill and a mini condition Kennedy half-dollar for \$5.50 worth of wine. We'll also give you a chance to win a \$25 savings account."

The response was phenomenal. Seven hundred percent brought in a total of \$5,007.75 in change. Broken piggy banks, empty tin boxes and beach towels decorated the lobby of the bank.

One person brought in a glass jar with 43 pounds of dimes that counted out to \$700.

Many participants failed to take the notice carefully. They were under the mistaken notion that the bank planned to pay them \$5.50 for its coin.

However, nobody walked out with a half and most took their disappointment in good spirit when terms were explained and accepted an even cash exchange for their coins.

PockeTutor, Memory Aid Or Boost to Cheaters?

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP) — Attention college students: Forget about that memory aid device, its Seattle creator says it's about to be junked.

A big ban was lifted up in reaction to the device, called a PockeTutor and advertised through the mails at \$19.95.

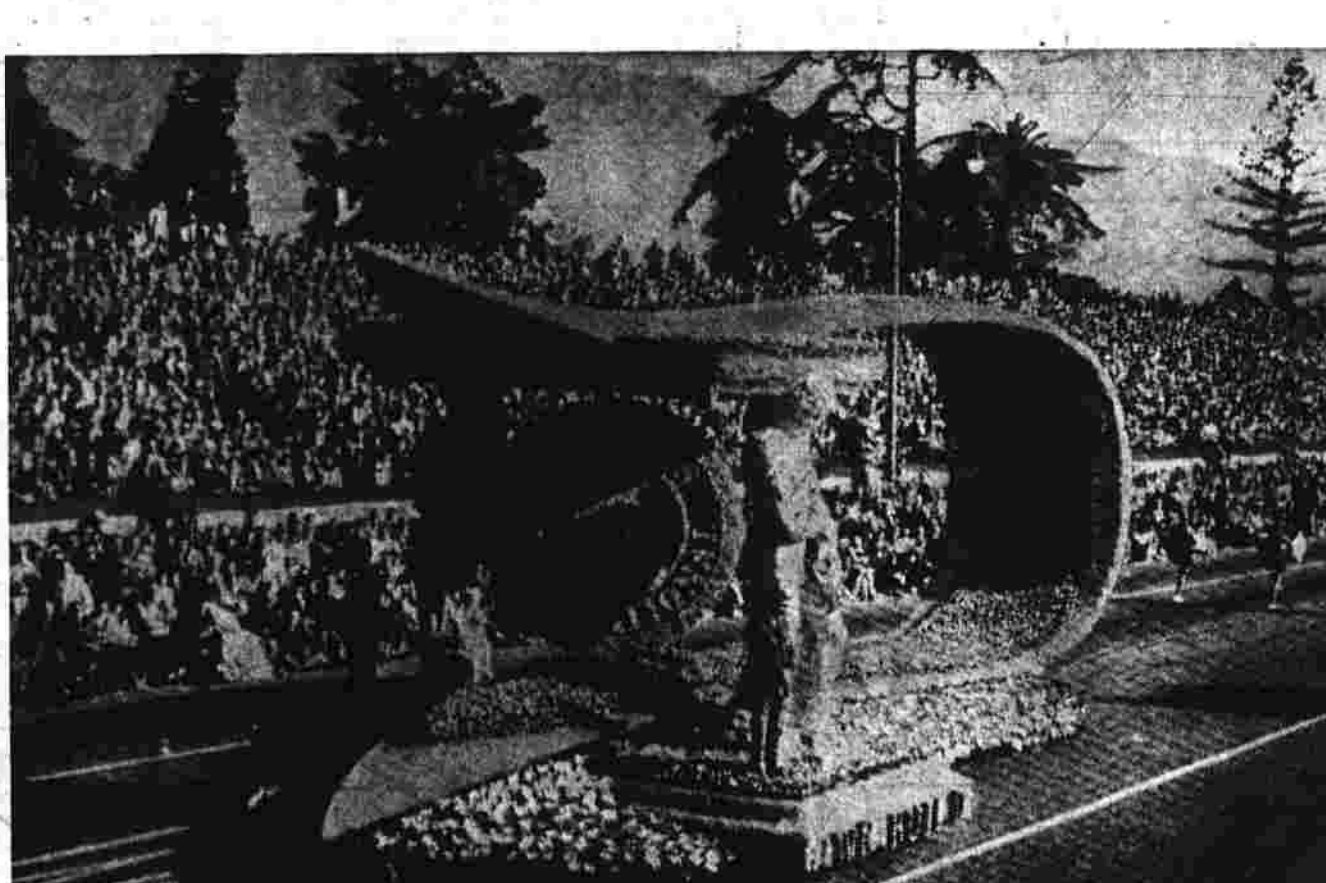

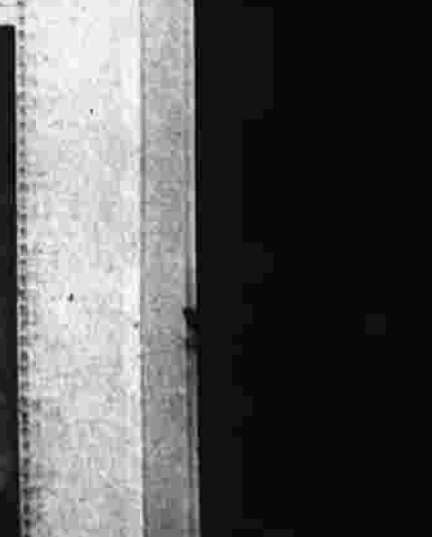

South Windsor School Board Adds Cafeteria Head

The board of education voted last week. It is moving to select a new head of the school cafeteria and cafeteria supervisor in the proposed budget for 1965-66.

Supt. Charles Warner said that he considered it necessary to have a qualified person in complete control of all the cafeteria in the South Windsor Schools.

The position of cafeteria supervisor has not been included in previous budgets. Under the present system each school cafeteria cook-manager handles the menu preparation and ordering of supplies. The board felt that to coordinate the services of cafeteria under a career position would be more efficient and the initial salary cost would be reduced.

The board voted to delete the appropriation in this category for a cafeteria head in the 1965-66 budget. Board member D. P. Cavanaugh suggested that the position could be filled by one of the clerks already employed at the schools.

The proposal included in the budget to renovate two hall buildings at a cost of \$2,000 each was approved. Board member Harry Anderson stated that at the present time the fields are considered unsafe due to their poor condition.

An item requesting deletion of the high school building at a cost of \$1,900 was deleted from the items requested under the proposed budget. The reason given was that the building is in poor condition and would be replaced in the near future. When the year is enlarged this may be considered as a safety feature for sports activities taking place at the high school.

There was discussion on a proposal of \$1,000 to replace the frames in the Windsor School gym. Assistant Supt. William Ferry pointed out that the frames were in use the ones originally purchased at the time the school was built about 15 years ago. The windows they cover face a southern exposure and some type of shading is required.

The possibility of using an shades rather than draperies was suggested by Anderson. The amount was reduced to \$500 and a decision as to what type covering will be used will be made at a later date.

The business education appropriation was cut by \$24,000. The major portion of this amount is to be used to replace typewriters. Some of the typewriters to be traded in are 12 years old, the newest ones 10 years old.

Mrs. Julia Durig pointed out that the longer the machine are in operation beyond the useful life the more they cost to maintain. In a letter to the board Mayor John Regan noted that there would be no money available to replace them.

The appropriation will replace 18 manual typewriters. In a letter to the board Mayor John Regan noted that there would be no money available to replace them.

Supt. Warner stated that expenditures to date and known commitments indicate at this time that the board accounts will be sufficient as they now stand.

However, supplementary materials and supply purchases have been reduced for the remainder of the year. Supt. Warner noted that there was a \$16,000 deficit from the 1964-65 budget.

The question arose last night as to whether it would be advisable to allocate funds to increase the salaries of all those teachers who are eligible for career status.

Supt. Warner felt that it was unfair to set a definite percentage of teachers to be raised to the career status.

Some of the board members felt that only a percentage of the 13 eligible teachers should be raised.

The board decided that money would be allocated to raise nine teachers to career status. If there is the possibility of another teacher in this category, the money will be determined at a later date.

It was noted that 80 per cent of the children at the Hill Ferry School might walk to school next year. A crossing guard will be provided at the school.

No additional buses are expected to be required for next year. The bus contract has one more year to run. Fifteen buses are presently being used to transport school children.

The bus contract calls for a guarantee of 60 miles per day. Buses presently in use run as much as 80 miles per day, Supt. Warner stated.

Mrs. Julia Durig asked that this situation be looked into. She said the opening hours of the school had become dependent upon the bus schedules. It was thought last year that the bus school hours would be later but due to the bus schedules classes at the high school begin at 7:30 a.m.

Supt. Warner indicated that next year it would be possible to open two schools at the same hour.

The board approved the hiring of a clerk-typist for one month during the summer. This will help with the opening of the Hill Ferry School and setting up the course cards for the junior high students.

A reading teacher has been added to the summer school program.

Contracted services including refuse removal, boiler, laundry, machine repairs were approved by the board.

Gas, water and fuel were also approved by the board without any discussion.

TV Salesman Found Innocent In Fraud Case

HARTFORD (AP)—Peter Buchan of Fairfield has been found innocent of criminal intent in a case involving alleged misrepresentation on a weekly television program that was broadcast over WATR-TV in Waterbury.

Federal Judge T. Emmet Clarke found Buchan innocent Tuesday of criminal intent to devise a scheme and artifice to defraud.

But the U.S. Attorney's office prepared to turn over to the Federal Communications Commission evidence presented in the case.

Clarke directed that advertising for the weekly program, "Mail Order Market," be sent to the FCC, which governs licensing of radio and television stations.

Clarke suggested administrative consideration of whether or not the station participated in "any" misrepresentations at the time its license is being considered for renewal.

The government had accused Buchan of soliciting advertising for his program by "fraudulent misrepresentations" through the mail.

Among claims he allegedly made was ability to reach more than one million customers and receiving "stacks of fan mail."

The government charged that he concealed the fact that the program was broadcast over an ultra-high frequency station which cannot be received by all television sets.

Witnesses in the case included Samuel Elman, general manager of the station, and Mrs. Astrid Curtis, traffic manager. Clarke told Buchan that he was not satisfied beyond a reasonable doubt that criminal intent existed.

"Mail Order Market" was a succession of presentations about various items such as housewares for sale by mail.

Assistant U.S. Atty. Howard R. Moskoff presented the government's case and Robert K. Shelton, who is chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, represented the defendant.

Tamsky Opposes State Plan For Garage Near Park Site

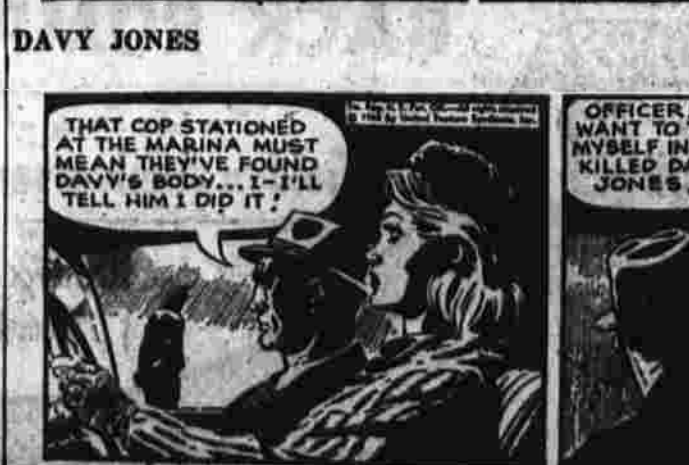
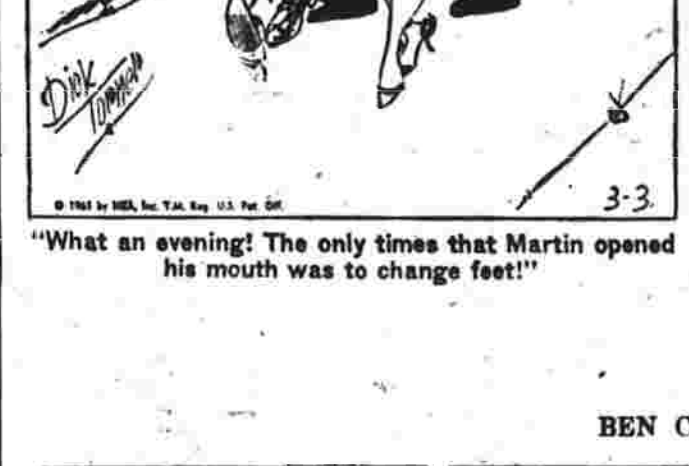

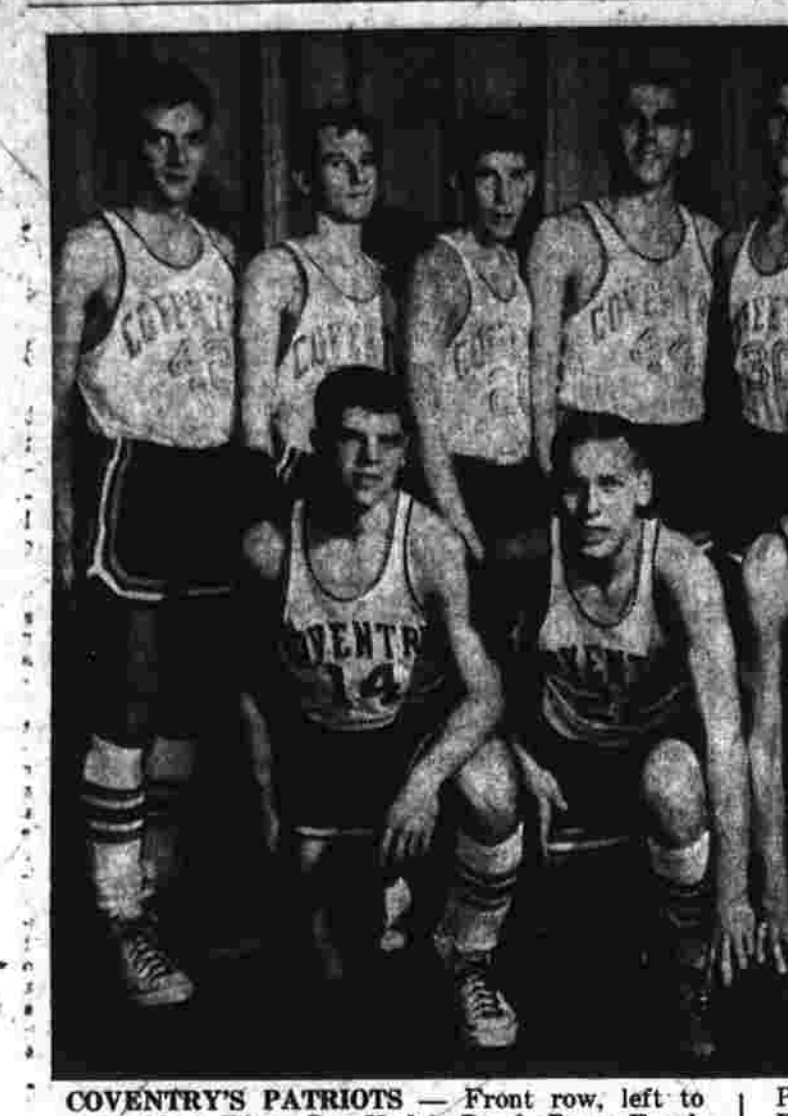
