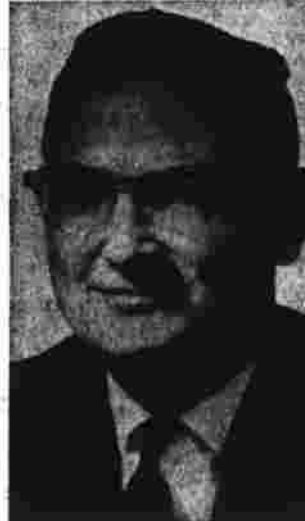
STAMP CENTER MOVING

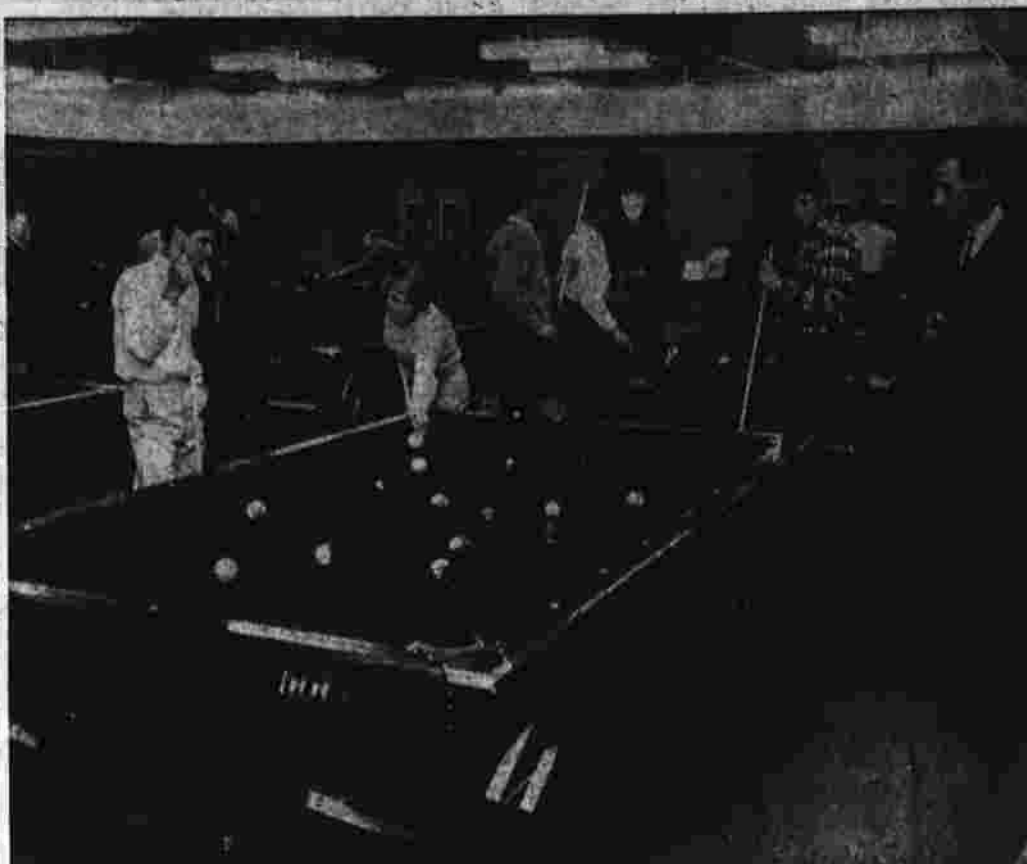

NEW YORK — (NBA) — Barry Morse has figured out an easy way to sainthood. Play, as he does, the cold, shrewd, implacable Lt. Philip Gerard on ABC-TV's *The Fugitive*, and bound nice David Janssen week after week. Do such a good job, people come to believe you are a bona villain.

"Then when they meet me, if I am halfway tolerable, I am canonized at first gasp," Morse says.

Gerard is purely a creation of a fine actor. None of his character exists in Morse, a lively, friendly person. But, since he has been playing the role, Barry says, "women don't want to get closer to me than 10 feet. They are sure I will eat their children. All hate me heartily, but then I am providing the only regular character they can loathe."

"Most people are so damn lovable on television you want to press your fingers on their windpipes until their faces turn black."

In *'Profiles'*
In a sortie away from *The Fugitive*, Morse will play Theodorus Stevens on *Profiles in Courage* on NBC-TV March 21. In researching the role, Barry found Stevens was born in Vermont and eventually became a congressman from Pennsylvania.

"When a role on this series is offered to an actor, it is presented as a mixture of national duty and a contribution to a charitable organization. I have come to learn when they flash the flag, you must watch your wallet."

Morse makes his home in Canada with his wife and 18-year-old daughter. His 17-year-old son Howard, is in London, studying acting at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts on the same scholarship his father had 29 years ago.

Question of Age

Rating Game Had Role in Aubrey's Fall

NEW YORK (AP) — James T. Aubrey Jr. quit CBS network earlier this week in the most publicized television walk-out since Jack Paar stormed off an NBC stage.

Speculation by insiders about the sudden unexplained departure of the television network's president concentrated immediately on CBS' loss of leadership in the national Nielsen ratings this season after two seasons well out front.

What about the national Nielsen? Why are they so important? Why do they more than any other one factor, determine whether a program is renewed or is canceled?

The ratings are projected statistics on the purported viewing habits in more than 50 million American homes gathered by electronic gadgets attached to the sets in about 1,200 homes throughout the country. These homes are chosen to represent as closely as possible the make-up of the entire population according to the most recent federal census — age, sex, family composition, income, education, geographical composition and many other factors.

From records of what programs these families are tuned to, the A.C. Nielsen Research organization estimates the total audiences for various shows. The result is the yardstick by which networks assess the popularity of their programs. It is also widely used by sponsors and their advertising agencies to obtain some idea of the number of people exposed to sales messages on which some companies spend millions of dollars a year.

Thus when a manufacturer of a household product finds that a program which carries his commercial is attracting half as many viewers as a competing show on a rival network, he is likely to be very unhappy. He also is likely to want to move his commercials to a show, perhaps on another network, where he gets more for his money.

Critics complain that ratings fail to reflect the quality of programs or to show the composition of audiences.

In spite of this, the national Nielsen is commercial televi-

Television Nice Place to Visit

NEW YORK (AP) — Tony Randall thinks that television-land is a nice place to visit, but he doesn't want to live there.

Randall was a happy inhabitant of the television community from 1952 to 1955 when he played Harvey Weiskit, Wally Cox's know-it-all chum, in the beloved "Mr Peepers" series.

"That part has meant everything to me as an actor," Randall admitted gratefully. "Before that I'd been doing all right in New York, with some pretty good radio work and a few parts in Broadway shows. But after 'Mr. Peepers,' leads on Broadway opened up and so did good parts in films."

Randall occasionally returns to the scene of his first real success for a guest shot in one or another series but insists that he is not interested in tackling another series.

"I don't want to make all the money in the world," he said, "and I like to work in a more leisurely way. When we were making the moving picture 'The Seven Faces of Dr. Lao,' we took several weeks developing the right kind of makeup and wigs, and then revised them several times to get the precise effects we wanted."

"There isn't time for that sort of attention in television. On the other hand, fast shooting isn't always bad: 'The Informer' was

made in two weeks and Ingemar Bergman never takes more than three weeks to shoot and he never allows more than four takes of a scene."

Randall believes that if "Mr. Peepers" had been one of this

season's new shows, it would have been a loser.

"I got hold of an old kinescope of one of our shows the other day and showed it during a lec-

Morey Amsterdam-- An Irreverent Wit

Nobody, not even the script writers, always knows just what jokes Morey Amsterdam will come up with, as Buddy on "The Dick Van Dyke Show." His is an irreverent, impromptu approach to humor.

He's a comedian who can stand up, as he did at a formal charity banquet, and introduce a leading citizen thus: "It gives me great pleasure to present John Doe, who has given unstintingly of his time and talents to this great cause, who is fully deserving of our warm-hearted praise and admiration, and who also happens to be a very sloppy eater."

Thereupon, Amsterdam pretended to brush crumbs from his victim's boled shirtfront, to a burst of laughter from the crowd as well as from the startled but amused dignitary.

Amsterdam, who is a regular on "The Dick Van Dyke Show" on CBS has an encyclopedic mind for jokes. Name a subject and he instantly comes up with a quip about it.

Much of his deadpan delivery and careful timing on the show are devoted to razor-sharp cuts at his chief antagonist, the pompous producer Mel Cooley, played by Richard Deacon.

Often the script will leave a space in Amsterdam's dialogue with the writer's note, "Let Morey put in a joke here." A recent culling of scripts showed these examples of typical Amsterdam funnies:

Mel — Alan asked me to get the script.
Buddy — What'd he say — "Fetch?"
Mel — What's that on the desk? (pointing to money).
Buddy — You know, the stuff you steal every payday.
Buddy (at a party) — Mel, I forgot you were here. Now we can play pin the tail on the donkey.
Mel — I think I'd better go home.
Buddy — Good move.
Buddy — Mel is so bald, the other day in a supermarket a lady pressed his head to see if he was ripe.
Off stage, Amsterdam and Deacon are close friends, but Amsterdam finds that no bar to onstage insults.
"I've described Cooley as a man who knows a lot but just

can't think of it," he explains. "I keep that in mind and have no trouble coming up with cracks about him."

Marine Forces Land At Key Viet Air Base

DA NANG, South Viet Nam (AP)—The U.S. Marines landed by sea and air in South Viet Nam today to strengthen the defense of the key Da Nang air base against attack by the Communist Viet Cong.

One battalion of 1,400 Marines came ashore from four 7th Fleet transport ships standing half a mile off the coast, 280 miles north of Saigon.

A second battalion began arriving without fanfare aboard C-130 Air Force Transports from Okinawa.

About 3,500 in all were expected by Tuesday night, including a helicopter squadron. Landing of the helicopter group was reported delayed by heavy surf which also slowed the movement of tanks and artillery to the beach.

The landing brought a few nervous newspaper comments in Western Europe but failed to rouse the wrath of Moscow-oriented Communists to any great pitch.

One of the strongest attacks came from left-wing leaders of Britain's Labor party.

The story of the landing was published in Moscow but only briefly and without immediate comment.

The Hungarian paper Hetfoi Hirez called the landing "a long stride ahead in the direction of extending the war."

The Italian Communist party paper L'Unita said the landing "exacerbates the indochinese crisis to the breaking point."

Most non-Communist papers gave the story big play but only a few carried immediate comment.

In France, the Gaullist paper Nation said the landing meant a new step in the "policy of escalation."

In Britain, the liberal Guardian suggested that the landing would provide propaganda for the Viet Cong while the conservative Daily Telegraph supported the move but with caution.

A detachment of 1,200 Marines was already at Da Nang manning Hawk anti-aircraft missile batteries.

At the beach 10 miles west of Da Nang, the Marines charged ashore in traditional fashion, some slipping and sliding on the wet sand.

At the air base the Leathernecks walked calmly off their planes and stood in files while they were assigned to bivouac areas.

Extra Protection in Washington Anti-Castro-Cubans Splatter Red Embassy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Extra police have been stationed around the Soviet Embassy after five anti-Castro Cubans splattered black liquid on it in a surprise bottle-hurling protest.

The Cubans were arrested promptly charged with interfering with the property of a foreign government and jailed overnight. They said they were protesting last week's violent demonstration against the U.S. Embassy in Moscow and also the continued presence of Soviet troops in Cuba.

The State Department reported that a telephone call of protest had been received from the Russians. The official who received the call expressed the department's regret at Sunday's incident.

It was understood that the subject of compensation had not been discussed in this initial exchange, said to have been at a relatively low diplomatic level.

Last Thursday hundreds of screaming Red Chinese, Vietnamese and African students stoned and splattered ink on the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. Red army reinforcements were required to quell the disorder after the demonstrators had beaten back police and scuffled with soldiers.

American diplomats, who have contended that the Soviet government provides insufficient protection for the U.S. building, filed a protest. The Soviet government apologized and promised compensation.

U.S. officials pointed out recently that no such demonstrations are permitted here. District of Columbia law forbids demonstrations within 500 feet of an embassy. A three-man detachment of police had been assigned to the Soviet Embassy here since last Thursday.

The five men arrested were members of a group of 78 anti-Castro Cubans who came here from the New York metropolitan area to picket the embassy. At the time of the bottle-hurling the rest of the picketers were parading a block and a half from the embassy.

The signs they carried read "There's 40,000 Russian Troops in Cuba," "Wake Up, America," and "Cuba, Yes, Russia, No."

U.S. officials estimated the number of Soviet troops in Cuba at from 2,000 to 3,000.

Policemen at the embassy were taken by surprise when the five Cubans suddenly hurled soft, sticky bottles. Black with black liquid at the embassy.

Before police could hustle them away, they scored four direct hits, splattering the walls on both sides of the entrance and hitting some shutters on a second-story window of the embassy mission.

Four Monarchs To Attend Rites For Queen Louise

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—Four reigning kings are expected to attend the state funeral at Saturday of Queen Louise of Sweden, great-granddaughter of Britain's Queen Victoria.

Together with the 73-year-old queen's husband, King Gustaf VI Adolf, 83, King Frederik IX of Denmark, Olav VI of Norway and Constantine II of Greece are to walk in the funeral procession through the streets of Stockholm.

There has been no word of who will represent Britain's royal family. But Prince Philip, husband of Queen Elizabeth II, will probably attend. He is a nephew of the deceased queen.

Queen Louise died in a Stockholm hospital Sunday, four days after emergency surgery for removal of a blood clot in her right leg. A change in her main artery, the aorta, caused her heart to falter.

Her husband, confined to bed with a severe cold, rushed to St. George's Hospital when told his wife was dying. The king's

LBJ Asks Congress For Crime Control

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson asked Congress today to ban sale of mail order firearms, tighten controls over drugs, and strengthen safety in the streets as part of an attack on crime as a national problem.

"Crime will not wait while we pull it up by the roots," Johnson said in a special message to the House and Senate. "We must arrest and reverse the trend toward lawlessness."

Various bills will be submitted to carry out this idea, some of them still in a vague stage.

For example, the presidential message made no reference to legalizing wire tapping in some instances, although this could be wrapped into legislation the Justice Department will lay before the lawmakers.

HARTFORD (AP)—The State Adjutant General's office is working on a plan to merge Army Reserve units in Connecticut into the Army National Guard and also to eliminate some Guard units.

A preliminary report was made this weekend to Gov. John Dempsey by Maj. Gen. E. Donald Walsh, state adjutant general.

The State Military Department will work out the details and a final recommendation will be made to the governor, who will be asked to notify the Defense Department of his approval or opposition to the plan within 15 days.

The plan, a result of the Pentagon's decision for personnel cutbacks, would put the authorized strength of the National Guard in Connecticut, with inclusion of reserve units, at 9,131 officers and men in 126 units.

The total represents a loss from the current combined strength of the Guard and the Army Reserve, which now stands at 10,462 in Connecticut.

Heavy Tear Gas Cloud Makes Selma Look Like Battleground

Police Use Clubs, Gas; 40 Injured

SELMA, Ala., (AP)—An attempted 50-mile march to the Alabama Capitol at Montgomery by Negroes pleading for civil rights erupted into bloody racial violence in a clash with state police Sunday.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. says he will lead another attempted march Tuesday.

King decided to remain in Atlanta and did not, as planned, lead Sunday's march attempt by about 400 Negroes, which was broken up by blue-hatted troopers wielding night sticks, shotguns, tear gas grenades and wearing gas masks. About 40 Negroes were injured in the violent confrontation about a mile after the march began.

"If it has to be a path of blood, it is going to be established that Negroes have the right to walk on the highways of Alabama," said the Rev. James Bevel, a lieutenant in King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference. King was expected in Selma this evening.

The highway was cluttered with packs, bed rolls and other camping equipment when the melee ended. They had been left behind by Negroes fleeing the tear gas and the club-swinging state troopers.

The troopers later were joined by about 60 members of Sheriff James G. Clark's Dallas County posse, some of them on horseback, who prodded and beat the Negroes back to the church from where the march started. The possemen shouted, "Get the Niggers off the streets!" as they charged.

Clark blamed King for Selma's racial troubles. He spoke in a Washington television interview Sunday, the ABC network program, "Issues and Answers," taped the day before.

The sheriff accused King of conducting a personal vendetta against him stemming from King's arrest in October 1963, in a rented car furnished by the civil rights division of the Justice Department.

Clark said his life has been threatened by Negroes. He said he has moved his family into quarters at the county jail where he keeps them under guard.

He said news media have distorted his law enforcement activities in Selma. And he contended that prospective Negro voters were being processed "about fast as they could qualify" before King began his voter registration drive several weeks ago.

The Justice Department announced in Washington that FBI agents in Selma have been ordered to make a complete investigation to determine "whether unnecessary force was used by law officers and others" in halting the march. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach said he was in touch with the situation.
