White On White

It has turned out that the most serious single blow yet struck in the Alauna town of Selma was not one struck y one of Governor Wallace's troopers gainst some would-be Negro voter, nor blow struck in any surge of one mob gainst another.

It was a blow struck by white sgainst white, in the midst of an otherwise calm street situation. Three white en walking down the street after their vening meal were accosted and set spon by a group of five other white men, one of whom brought a club down hard on a head.

The group of three consisted of clermen from the North, who had come to elma because they felt that their reigion required them to make public mitment to the specific but symolic cause of the right of Negroes to bote in Alabama.

The group of five consisted of five tizens of the South, not the best the south offers, obviously, but probably uite normal citizens in many respects. There need be no doubt they love their nilies and are kind to them, and deal her amicably with their fellow whites, and are even kind to Negroes, so long as they are allowed to set the style and nits for such kindness.

But there is no reason to doubt the way one of the group of three has described the "look of hatred" in the eyes of the group of five.

This was the height of the hatred and passion possible in the race revolution now going on in this country—the savresentment felt by some white people, who haven't felt and thought their own way beyond and across the barriers, for other white people who feel and march with the Negro.

Just as this clash between white and white is the height of the feeling, so too it is actually the crux of the bat-Me. If the great white majority of the American people can persuade itself to unity of feeling and belief and purpose on what American democracy has to mean, that will be the end of the conflict. It was white against white at Gettysburg.


The parallel today is by no means exact. The Negroes themselves are participants in this revolution, as they were of to any important extent in the Civil War. But a fundamental reality has just been illustrated: the pulpits of New Engand once more are not just minding heir own business; they are minding their brother's business and humanity's usiness. One of the rewards they reap is hatred and resentment. But even that merely illustrates the location of the inal battleground in the revolutionwithin the conscience of the American majority. Let no one think it is possible, in this revolution, to be a non-participant, to be uninvolved. Every club is, in some degree, either in our hands or on







He added that the reflectors are a traffic hazard.

"There is nothing wrong with the use of reflectors at the end of driveways," Sen. Welles continued, "but I think they should be colored white or amber, but certainly not red."

He added that he has discussed the matter with the State Safety Commission, and that agency "is in harmony with the idea."

"Naturally the line would go through Providence," Sen. Welles said. "I think we should think to the future too."

Sen. Welles tax relief program for the elderly is based on education costs.

The bill would provide prorated exemptions, based on the edicational costs of a town.

"We base out fax structure on property valuations," Sen. Welles explained, "and property is our main source of revenue."

He cited an example of how his proposal would work: If the educational costs in a particular town were 70 per cent of the town's budget, then elderly persons would be granted 70 per cent tax relief.




