



Mary Lyon Would Be Proud

The spirit that impelled Mary Lyon to found a seminary for young women in South Hadley, and to keep it going by working her fund-raising talents overtime, appears to have survived an thrived in the years since. When it was announced Sunday that Mount Holyoke College had raised the \$7½ million it needed to qualify for an additional \$2½ million from the Ford Founday. tion, some equally important figures were cited. Out of the amount raised (in ess than three years' time), \$5 millio was in separate gifts of less than \$100, 000 each. And the total of donors to the college's over-all Fund for the Future has exceeded 12,000.

The \$7% million was one objective

within an ultimate Fund goal of \$17.-750,000. Combined with either \$2½ mil-lion in initial collections or the Ford grant, it marks the achievement of a thort range Fund goal -- covering the college's more pressing requirements President Richard Glenn Getall has de scribed these as improvements necessar "to avoid creeping obsolescence." Since that comment was made back in 1987 the college has revised its curriculum completely, raised faculty pay, begun a new dormitory to be completed this September, and increased its enrollment. The course of education at Mount Hel-

yoke is well plotted.

But fine buildings and faculties are not all of what makes a college good. Attention to scholastic ability, whatever the financial situation of the student, is the mark of a dedicated institution. Dr. Gettell has put scholarship funds in the programme importance. "prime importance" category. Mount Holyoke, he said, "must never become a finishing school for daughters of the wealthy. We must make sure that really able girl can attend even if all and her family have not a nickel." Or way in which the college recognizes such need is its participation in the so-called ABC program, financed in part by the Ford Foundation. While it does no the Ford Foundation. While it does not involve regular instruction at the college, it gives talented high school girls of limited cultural background a summer study period on campus that prepares them to go on to an independent secondary school. Mount Holyoke begins its participation this summer.






## Battle on 'Gomer Pyle' Fanned by Frank Sutton

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — A

principal reason for this season's success of "Gomer Pyle —
USAEC" is the hot and cold war
between Gomer and Sgt. Carter,
possibly the best military feud
since Quirt and Flagg of "What
Price Glory."

They make a prize pair — the
ingenuous and the harassed sarge, etched
in slow-burn by Frank Sutton.

The series has ended its first
season of shooting, so Frank

No leading man type, he generally was cast several decades older than his real age — "I lost an inch of hairline from putting that white stuff on my hair."
