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Small Tornado Hits Alabama

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TUSCUMBIA, Ala. (AP)—A small tornado tore into Tuscumbia today, causing heavy property damage and injuring about 20 persons.

The Colbert County Hospital in Florence reported it was above the lock at Wilson Dam on the Tennessee River.

"There are no particularly serious injuries as far as I can tell," a hospital spokesman said.

The patients were reported to be from Tuscumbia and Sheffield.

It could not be immediately determined if a tornado had also struck Sheffield.

The Tuscumbia tornado struck in the northern section of town, damaging at least 10 houses, power lines and roofs.

Tuscumbia and Sheffield are in northwestern Alabama about 30 miles from the Tennessee border.

High winds blew down a 300-foot steel power line tower just above the lock at Wilson Dam on the Tennessee River.

The power line fell into the river and halted all traffic. The U.S. Corps of Engineers said.

All electrical power was knocked out in Colbert and Lauderdale counties in north Alabama.

The Tennessee Valley Authority said it was uncertain when power would be restored and river traffic could resume.

Across the state line in Tennessee, tornado-like winds uprooted an elementary school and blew over several trees at Lawrenceburg. Children were evacuated from the school. No injuries were reported.

Youth Sought In NYC Death Gives Self Up

NEW YORK (AP)—A husky Negro youth known on the streets as "The Big Giant" surrendered to police and was charged today with the slaying of a white youth.

The subject of a 12-state homicide alarm, Christopher Lynch, 17, 6-foot-4 and weighing 210 pounds, accompanied an older brother to a Harlem police station and gave up.

He was taken to the Brooklyn precinct where the murder occurred. Police said the slaying on a subway train Friday night was witnessed by at least 10 passengers, one of whom has contacted police.

There was no indication that Lynch had ever known Andrew A. Morris, 17, the victim of the slaying. Police plunged through his skull. Police described him as a "white reason or cause."

Lynch's older sister, Patricia Harris of Brooklyn, told reporters this morning that her brother had been filled with white hatred in the year or so of his association with a black nation-

Planes Fly Sortie, Apparently in Laos

DA NANG, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. jet fighter-bombers apparently raided Communist areas in Laos again today, dropping more than 20 tons of napalm bombs.

More than a dozen planes, including six F-106 fighter-bombers, took off from the Da Nang air base on a secret mission. They flew in, in the direction of Laos, where U.S. Air Force jets have made repeated raids on Communist supply lines in recent weeks.

The F-106s returned to Da Nang with their bomb racks empty.

The fighter-bombers were accompanied by F-100 Super Sabre fighters. They normally go first to black out aircraft positions while other F-106s form a protective umbrella overhead in case of enemy fighter attack.

An Air Force spokesman refused to comment on the flight. It was not known whether any of the planes were lost or damaged.

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Two more American dead were reported in South Viet Nam today. A U.S. Navy officer was killed by the Viet Cong in the Mekong River delta and a Marine died of wounds suffered in an accidental shooting at Da Nang air base.

Their deaths raised the unofficial total of Americans killed in Vietnam to 16,000.

Gerrymander Dealt Blow By Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House has dealt what is hoped is a lethal blow at the gerrymandering of congressional districts, which require districts to be "as compact as practical."

Although the definition is far from precise, the bill's backers made it clear they mean the shaped districts that take their name from an early Massachusetts governor, Elbridge Gerry.

Another provision of the bill would permit the population of a congressional district to be within 10 per cent of the average district in that state.

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Renewal's Fighting Word, Some Towns Reject Plans

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Not everyone looks to redevelopment for the life of the cities. In many places in Connecticut, redevelopment plans have gone into the sub-zero of local battles. This second article of an Associated Press series examines some of the communities where redevelopment is a fighting word.)

Some topics — incineration is one — have always had the ability to bring a community to a state of near-war.

Redevelopment often has somewhat the same unfortunate magic.

Take this advertisement that was run by the "Partners for Property Rights" last month.

"Urban renewal takes your private property and sells it at bargain rates to individuals at taxpayers' expense for their own gain. Vote no."

When Fairfields held their referendum Feb. 16 on whether to accept the redevelopment plan, the proposition was defeated, 6,088 to 8,991.

It meant turning back government funds already advanced for planning. The pro-redevelopment forces had to launch thoughts of having the town accept \$4.2 million in further federal and state grants.

Fairfield is no means unique in having had a redevelopment program stopped in its tracks. The same thing happened in Danbury, Naugatuck, Beacon Falls, Seymour, Southington and other towns.

This isn't to say that the "against" group always wins. The "for" people have won some rousers, notably the one in Waterbury.

Although the previous administration had started Waterbury on the redevelopment trail, Mayor Edward D. Bergin tried to stop it. For weeks in the pages of Waterbury papers witnessed a battle of words in which first one side and then the other took large sips to appeal for support on the coming referendum.

On nightly radio programs in the week preceding the referendum, Bergin charged that redevelopment "violates the right of private property, that it is economically unsound and unworkable, that it drains the city of its tax base, that it is a small businessman and taxpayer."

But the pro-redevelopment forces, with the backing of many of the city's leading businessmen, won the referendum, 10,225 to 6,338.

Bergin has since left office and redevelopment seems to have been stunted by the bitter debate. However, his growth in Waterbury has far less to show than many smaller communities.

In Bridgeport there is no clear determination as to who is the winner of a pro-redevelopment plan.

But in Bridgeport redevelopment back when Republican Walter J. Murphy Jr. was mayor, his business family political battle, however, he was ousted in the last election by his cousin, Democrat James Casey — a foe of redevelopment.

Innes Attacks Overspending

HARTFORD (AP)—Rep. Alan C. Innes, R-Thomaston, said today that various state agencies have overpaid by \$13.6 million in the current biennium, and this represents "a callous disregard of legislative directives."

Innes, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said that the overspending was "apparently caused by poor administration of state agencies."

In a statement issued through Republican headquarters, Innes said the General Assembly budgeted \$4.7 million last week for the state's fiscal year.

The deficiency requests for May and June will be gone over thoroughly with an eye toward cutting back on this overspending, Innes said.

Innes said, "This could not be done in connection with the deficiency funds for March and April because of insufficient time to analyze what was presented as an emergency situation."

Far from dropping out of sight after losing the election, Murphy became the redevelopment director, which means he and his associates are still trading shoe leather in the morning and pocketing money in the afternoon, some time involving many other attorneys who may have appeared before him that very day in court.

The salary for full-time judges is \$18,000 per year plus a per diem allowance for travel and lodging when serving out of the circuit in which the judges reside.

The criminal jurisdiction of the Circuit Court includes all crimes where the penalty is imposed by the court and not exceeded one year in jail. This includes all traffic violations, misdemeanors and many felonies. Jurisdiction in civil matters extends to cases in which the total amount claimed does not exceed \$2,500.

The judges are assigned to various circuits within the state by the chief judge, usually for a three-month period. Penalties, insurance and vacation allowances of four weeks per year constitute benefits according to the judges. The prosecutors are appointed by all the judges at their annual meeting each June, usually upon recommendation of the resident judges of the circuit in question. All the prosecutors within the state are full-fledged lawyers in good standing with members admitted to practice in the courts of Connecticut.

The prosecutors are the only personnel within the courts who are not classified as full-time employees. This means they are allowed to maintain their private law practices, but are strictly forbidden from engaging in the practice of criminal law in any of the state courts. While there is no express prohibition against Circuit Court prosecutors defending a criminal in the federal courts, most prosecutors decline to be so engaged. As a further safeguard against conflicts of interest, partners and associates of prosecutors are not supposed to appear in defense of criminal cases in the Circuit Court.

The problem of scheduling personnel in the various courts within each circuit may be realized when one considers that each court requires the presence of a judge, prosecutor, clerk, family relations officer, adult probation officer, court reporter and bailiff or court officer. In addition the police department, concerned with cases being handled, must have available its court liaison officer. This liaison officer, together with the other personnel mentioned, will be discussed later.

The prosecutors in the four large cities — New Haven, Stamford, Bridgeport, New Haven and Hartford, receive \$15,000 per year. The chief prosecutor receives \$7,500 per year while his job title is regarded as a part-time position.

The Committee on Criminal Administration of the Connecticut Bar Association reviewed the desirability of changing the chief prosecutor's office to that of a full-time job with a suitable pay increase. After holding hearings on that and related subjects, the committee

Instead, the federal government has been demolishing the area and said that, like any other property owner, demolished structures were entitled to compensation.

Coventry Loyzim Lays Study Group On Charter but Raps Charter

Charles Ferguson, chairman of the newly formed Committee on Home Rule, has been commended by the State Rep. Stephen Loyzim on the interest this group has taken in the proposed charter for the town.

The new committee, a non-partisan group, has been formed to promote discussions of the proposed charter on an informal basis and by public letters and talks, and invites new members "in order that the forthcoming referendum vote on the issue represent the informed decision of as many voters as possible."

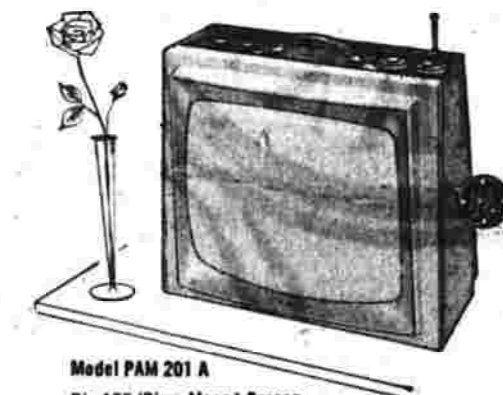

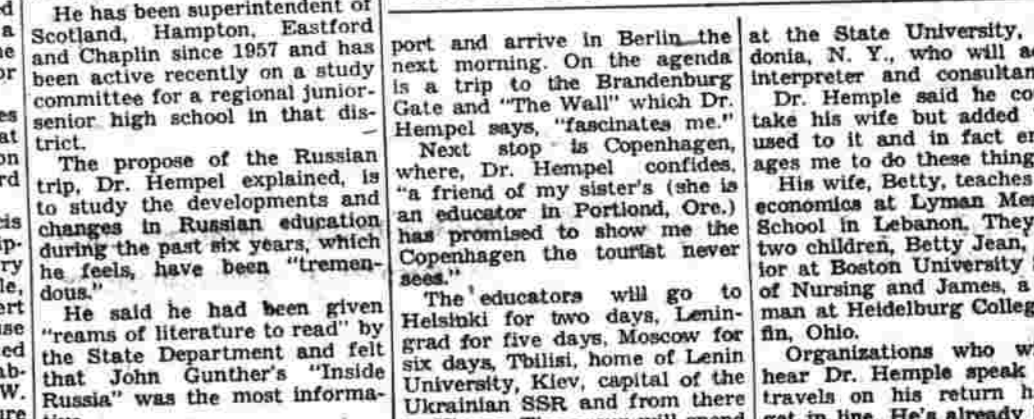

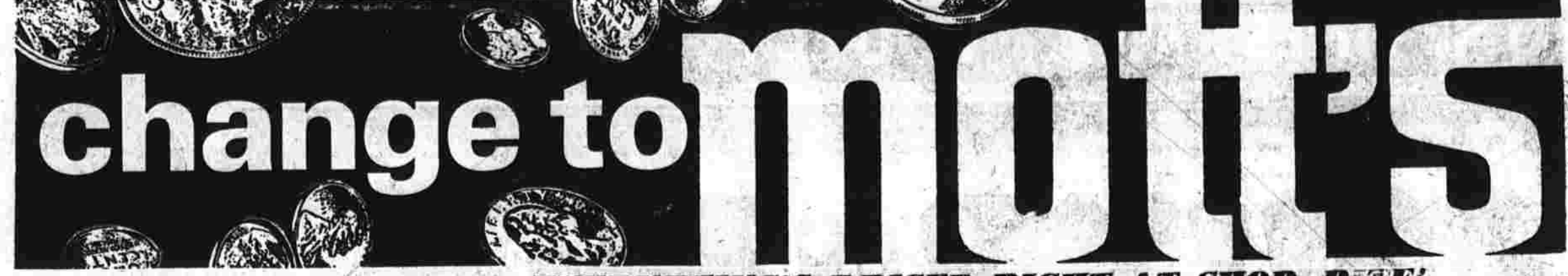

One helicopter pilot set his craft into a landing zone marked by a smoke grenade. Draft from the whirling blades fanned sparks from the engine and the brush burst into flame. The pilot, who landed the craft from the flames, but it landed on one side, smashing the rotor blades.

The second Marine helicopter evacuated the three wounded men. The Army helicopter made five shuttle trips to take out the rest of the men and arms, ammunition and other equipment from the wrecked chopper.
