HOLLYWOOD, (AP)—Some television series sell themselves; others have to be sold. Place "The Man From U.N.C.L.E." in the latter category.

The international spy thriller spoof had a rocky beginning, striving more for thrills than spoofing. It failed to generate much excitement in its early weeks, and the wise money was chalking the series up as a loser.

But then the production minds began finding their way through less tortuous plot pathways, meanwhile injecting more of the bottled-in-bond humor. NBC switched the show from Tuesday to Monday nights, and ratings improved. Next season it is scheduled for Friday—in color.

The young crowd began to embrace "U.N.C.L.E." To stimulate this interest, MGM sent the series' stars, Robert Vaughn and David McCallum, to key cities, especially where the national ratings are tallied. The reaction to their visits has been clamorous. Industry sources credit these tours with playing a large part in achieving a renewal of "U.N.C.L.E." for next season.

McCallum, a Scottish actor with a distinguished acting background, seems at first bluish an unlikely subject for screaming teen-agers. Yet he draws them on the tours. What's more, he likes it.

"It's rather exciting, really," he observes, "as long as you are not in any particular danger. And I always assure myself that I have proper protection from the local police."

TV Cameras Can Reveal Character

By CYNTHIA LOWRY

NEW YORK (AP)—Robert Montgomery, actor and producer who served President Dwight D. Eisenhower as television consultant, calls the TV camera a "mass lie detector," revealing more of a man's character when he is unexpectedly caught in an informal moment than during planned appearances.

Specifically, Montgomery referred to situations where a public figure was filmed at an airport, leaving a courthouse or committee hearing, and brushing aside questions and microphones—all in sharp contrast to his charming, winsome manners under studio conditions.

"I think the public sees the difference," Montgomery said. "And I think it carries impact."

Montgomery, after a successful acting career in Hollywood, turned television producer in 1950 and for the next seven years turned out the "Robert Montgomery Presents" series, live, from New York. He is particularly interested in the Federal Communications Commission's current interest in network ownership, total or partial, of most entertainment shows they put on the air.

"I would have been on the air still, I think, if I had consented to giving a network a share in my show," he said. "I say it is virtually impossible today to get a show on a major network without giving the network a piece of it."

If the situation should change so that independent package programs were given more of a chance, Montgomery believes that "the truly creative people" will return to the medium—and "I'll try to get back with another dramatic series."

Montgomery has broad business interests and makes an occasional appearance on television. Next Thursday he will narrate an ABC special, "Man Invades the Sea."

The program focuses on the work of Jacques Yves Cousteau and his undersea research abroad and that of the U.S. Navy's "Sealab I Project" with its steel capsule where a team spent 10 days 193 feet below the surface of the Atlantic.

## Crying on 'Peyton Place' Brought Billing — and Mink

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Tears plus a serious mis-step add up, Barbara Parkins finds with surprise, to star billing and a mink coat.

Miss Parkins, a pretty, dark-haired young actress, was an unknown last September when ABC's "Peyton Place" had its premiere. At the outset the plot had her deeply involved in an unfortunate alliance, a situation that promptly went from bad to worse.

"I was pretty worried about the role," she confided, "because the girl, Betty Anderson, was having such a bad life. And I was also concerned because I cried almost constantly in 20 of the first 30 episodes of the serial. But it had an unexpected result — people wrote in and, except for four or five letters, they all felt great sympathy for me."

At any rate, Barbara suffered so well that her name was added to the co-stars in the credits after the 56th episode and her studio and network began thinking about building a whole new series, tentatively called "The Girl from Peyton Place" around the Betty Anderson character.

"They called me up to Mr. Self's office (William Self, director of TV activities for 20th Century-Fox) and I thought I'd done something wrong, of course. Then when he told me, I was scared — at the responsibility I suppose. But a couple of weeks later when they called me in again to say they were putting the idea on the shelf for now, I cried."

However, "Peyton Place" expands from two to three shows a week next season and Barbara will be an important member of the cast.

On her first trip to New York, she satisfied a long-standing ambition: "I marched in and ordered myself a mink coat," she said, "as a reward."

**NEW YORK (AP)** — "Preview Theater," the ABC series of specials designed to take home viewers behind the theatrical scenes, has been dropped by the sponsors after two shows which received poor critical notices and unimpressive ratings. Originally four were planned.

The day-time show starring Tennessee Ernie Ford disappears from the ABC schedule on March 26, to be replaced by a new audience participation show, "The Robus Game," with Jack Linkletter as m.c. The Ford show, made in San Francisco, has been around for three seasons in various time spots and under a succession of titles, but never was the popular success anticipated.

Lloyd Bridges will play the lead in CBS's western, "The Loner," starting next fall. His last TV assignment was the skin-diving star of "Sea Hunt."
