DR. DOROTHY HODGKIN
LONDON (AP) — Buckingham Palace has appointed two members of the select Order of Merit, including the second woman in history.

She is Dr. Dorothy Hodgkin, 54, who won the 1964 Nobel Prize for her work on the determination of the structure of mechanical substances. The other woman to have received the order was Florence Nightingale, the famed nurse, in 1907.

The other person selected was Benjamin Britten, 51, who has composed 11 operas, including "The Rape of Lucretia."

The honor is conferred personally by Queen Elizabeth II. It is limited to 24 members. The appointments replace two members who died in the past year: Sir Winston Churchill and American-born poet T. S. Eliot.

Rocket Once Had Shakes

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Titan 2 rocket once had the "shakes" so bad that some officials feared it might never be used to launch astronauts in the Gemini program.

Months of corrective work and several test flights eliminated the so-called "pogo-stick" problem and raised Titan 2's reliability.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration discovered the problem in 1962, after the Titan 2 was selected as the booster for the Gemini program. Radio data showed that the missile shuddered at a rapid 11 cycles per second between 80 and 140 seconds after launching.

The vibration did not affect the missile's performance as a military weapon, but it was feared it would prevent the Gemini astronauts from reading a hurried instrument panel during the critical lift-off phase.

The panel must be able to read the panel instruments because the Gemini program they fly their own vehicle. If something goes wrong they must take their own escape measures.

Engineers discovered the source of fuel through lines leading to the first stage combustion chamber of the rocket created the effect.

Helium gas pressure was increased in the fuel system and vibration-damping devices were attached to the lines.

Titan 2 now is the "big stick" of the U.S. nuclear missile force. Fifty-four of the rockets are stationed in protected underground sites, each capable of delivering up to 10-megaton nuclear warheads.

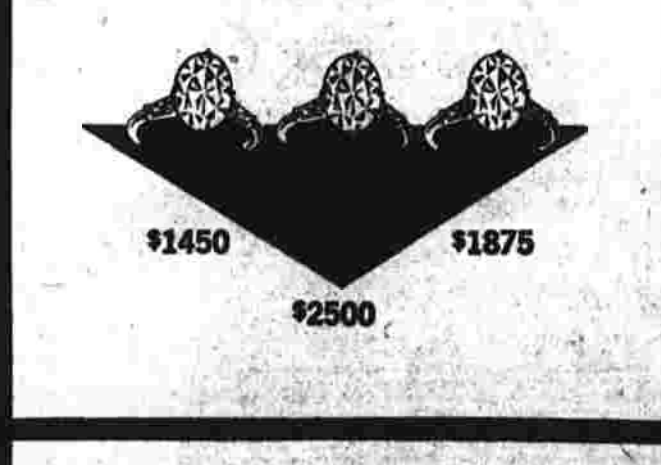
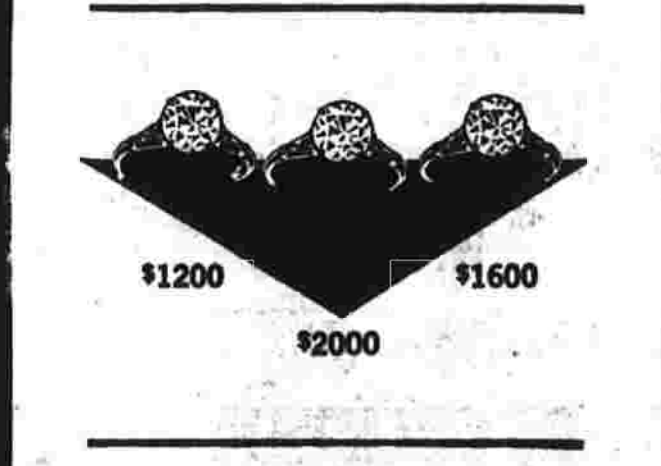
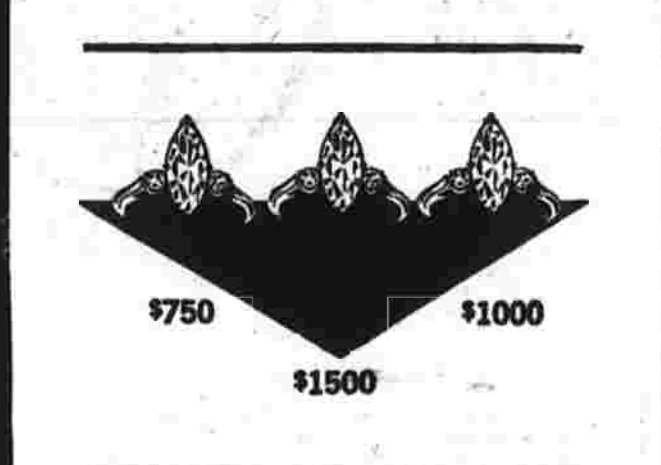
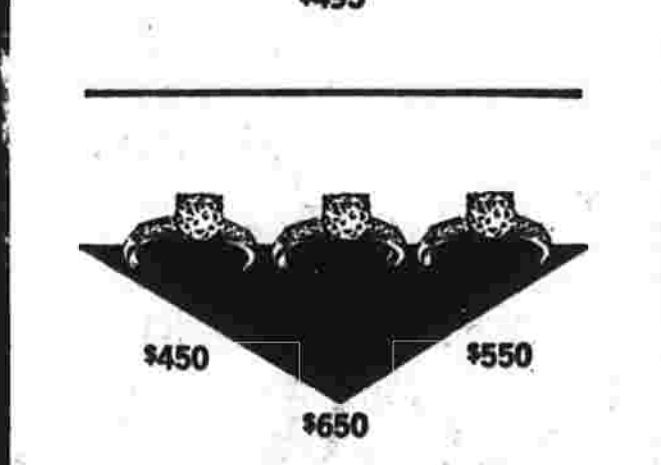
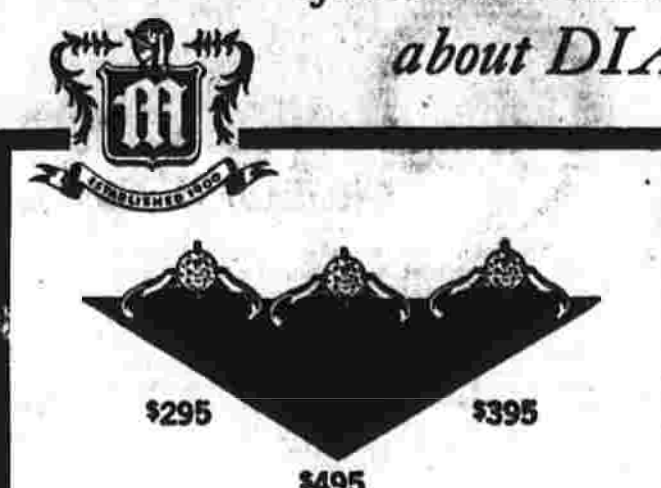
Drop Continues In Idle Claims

Unemployment compensation claims filed in Manchester last week continued their drop, with 37 less people filing for the week ending March 20 than had filed during the week ending March 13. The totals were 906 for last

week, compared to 1,000 for the week before. The drop was reflected in claims filed throughout the state, with a total decline of 1,200 reported from all 50 state offices. Last week's statewide claims totaled 30,000, which is more than 30 per cent below the \$3,471 figure for the corresponding period last year. CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Astronauts Virgil I. Grisson and John W. Young flew their three-orbit trip around the earth many times before doing it for real.

In simulated flights, their spacecraft has blown up, been drenched in the Gulf of Mexico, whirled at dizzying speeds on centrifuges and tumbled.

Most of this was done in training devices called simulators—so named because the machine simulates or duplicates the desired experience.

When the two men started training for the flight last April, they believed they would blast into space in November, or at the latest, December.

Bolton \$300,000 Asked for Change to Fiscal Year

The board of finance voted last night to ask for a \$300,000 10-year bond issue to finance the change to a uniform fiscal year.

The selectmen will call a town meeting sometime next month so that the town may vote on whether it wants to make the change to a uniform fiscal year, and if it will vote the bond issue.

The board of finance said that "conservative calculations indicate that the savings in interest on short term borrowings will practically take care of interest on the bond issue." The board added that the one mill curiously being added for the fiscal year change would be eliminated.

The board is planning to make the change in July 1966. Taxes will be levied in October and tax revenue does not start coming in until May 15 of that year.

Since the town budget is now adopted in October and tax revenue does not start coming in until May 15, the town has to borrow in anticipation of these taxes.

The amount of money spent on interest on this short term borrowing is increasing each year with the increase in the amount borrowed.

Other reasons as explained by the board of finance, it costs more to run the town each year because expenses increase. If the money isn't there to spend as it is needed, then it must be borrowed temporarily. According to the finance board, it makes more sense to borrow \$300,000 for 10 years than to stay on the treadmill forever.

Regional Authority Suggested To Study Metropolitan Crisis

Federal and state concern over the deepening "metropolitan crisis" will ultimately lead to a curtailment of local sovereignty, said Prof. George Raymond of Brooklyn's Pratt Institute.

Raymond, an urban planning audience last night at Manchester High School.

The chairman of Pratt's planning department spoke on the subject, "Megapolis and Regional Planning," at the sixth and final town-financed forum.

In making summary remarks at the outset of the final forum, Dr. James E. Brown, head of the University of Hartford's Regional Affairs Center, said that the sector had worked away from the small city in the first forum to the megapolis, the giant city, in the sixth.

Such a city, said Raymond, had brought with it social and economic disparities that are deeply affecting the nation's social stability.

Quoting President Johnson, Raymond described the study instead against an increasingly concentrated in central city ghetto; while others move to the suburbs leaving the central city to battle against "urban odds."

Neither the cities nor the suburbs have been effective in dealing with this plight, said Raymond, who is president of the Westchester (N.Y.) Citizens Housing Council.

The urban sprawl, he charged, was created intentionally by those who had the cities for their suburbs. They are not going to change their zoning laws to open their communities to the poor and the discriminated against, he said.

In fact, for suburbanites there is no problem, he said. "As they themselves see it, the conditions of the millions of families who, in the last 20 years, have moved into little suburban houses, is fine," Raymond suggested.

Neither can the city help since it is having difficulty implementing its own urban renewal projects.

Raymond suggested that communities forget their so-called "rugged individualism" in favor of an overall look at the region.

Advisory planning commissions have not worked, he said referring to the difficulty of expecting positive direction to come from a consensus of independent municipalities.

But something must be done, he said, if metropolitan areas are to reverse "the trends that day to day widen the social-economic disparity existing between the city and the suburb."

Raymond did not suggest that local government be abolished in favor of regional government but he did recommend that local governments stop encouraging one another to build the line.

"One day," he said, "they will wake up with the realization that there is no line left for them to hold."

He suggested a regional study commission be set up similar to one in London. It would analyze the various governmental functions at all levels and suggest which could be best done by the town, which best handled by the state.

Mrs. Dorothy Jacobson, a guest panelist and Manchester representative to the Capital Region Planning Council, said that CRPA had already set up such a study committee.

But, she emphasized, CRPA has deliberately chosen to remain an advisory group. It believes in the power of a good idea.

The second guest panelist, Robert Chave, a CRPA regional planner, agreed with Mrs. Jacobson and said that the CRPA could only point out the alternatives, make recommendations, and leave action to others.

The implementation of regional advisory groups was discussed at length. It was agreed that with the present set up, progress toward restoring the ancient functions of the city and achieving better balanced communities in a region is unlikely.

Raymond as other forum speakers had done, stressed that it was in the interest of each town to look to the welfare of the region.

The effect of Manchester's urban renewal projects, for example, and the impact of the housing act of 1960, now pending in Congress, containing financial assistance which would aid in building entirely new communities by private builders.

The President has established a Temporary National Commission to study how local zoning regulations affect both the cost and pattern of development, and how they can be made more consistent with sound urban development.

Raymond, in effect, told the Capital Region that new ways are coming and that it might do well to heed John Kenneth Galbraith's admonition, "He who does not anticipate change becomes its victim."

A contributor to the Encyclopaedia Americana, Raymond said that this country "loses track of its own history, compromising the deepest differences within the framework of a federal union."

Referring to the London area, he said that the key to such a solution here lies in the quality, depth, and intensity of the study. He applauded the CRPA group for undertaking the study.

But outside of the needed political innovations, and scientific research, and theoretical analysis, Raymond urged people to pay attention to the man who can foresee the future consequences of present policies and articulate the alternatives.

Quoting Interior Secretary Stewart Udall, Raymond implied that this man is the planner. "As long as those designers and planners who might help us create life-giving surroundings remain strangers at best, and enemies at worst, the alternatives which are desirable places to live."

The proposed redistric district is for suggestion by Raymond and articulated the alternatives he explained the difficulties it is in.

The speaker of impending state persuaded Raymond's remarks. He said that action was needed now to stem the social-economic disparity to prevent the destruction of open space, to achieve a rational transportation system, and to develop "truly soul-satisfying communities."

Space Meal Cost \$425

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — If you were to take astronaut Gus Grissom to lunch and order what he ate in space yesterday — it would cost you about \$425.
Not worth it, you say, for what he got — orange juice, beef pot roast, bacon and egg sandwich, and toasted bread cubes.
Well then, how about the second meal of apple sauce, chicken bites, brownies and grapefruit juice?
Still not worth it?
Actually the high price comes from expensive research that has gone into developing space food.
The foods are freeze-dried and compressed. They are then placed in air-tight plastic bags. One man's meals for one day weigh 1.8 pounds.
This compares with the four to five pounds you eat daily. However, 70 per cent of this weight is water. The astronaut's food has 90 per cent of the moisture removed.
The process leaves the beef pot roast looking like a brown glob of dried mud, but with water added, it does taste somewhat like roast beef.
Water is added also to juices and apple sauce. The other items on the astronaut's menu are bite-sized solids and don't need water to be reconstituted.
After the "crumbly cookie" astronaut Cmdr. McScott Carpenter chased around his spacecraft, a new process for space food was developed.
A different food container was devised along with a long-necked water nozzle. The plastic bag has a sealed valve in the top and the nozzle fits snugly inside. After water has been added, from three to five ounces depending on the type of food, the valve closes to prevent leakage when the nozzle is removed.
Another valve, resembling a shrinker's mouthpiece, pulls from the bottom and fits into the astronaut's mouth. He gets his food by squeezing the bag.
Dr. Paul LaChance, nutritional physiologist at the Manned Spacecraft Center, said the bite-sized foods, which have had all water drained from them, have three coatings of gelatin to keep them from crumbling.
One day's menu contains about 2,500 calories, compared with 3,000 consumed in everyday life. Calorie levels are 17 per cent protein, 32 per cent fat and 51 per cent carbohydrate.
All the foods are of low residue, low-digestible fiber, and low-gas producing materials.
LaChance said the two meals being taken aboard the first manned Gemini mission weren't actually needed. The astronauts were to be in orbit only about 4 hours.
"We need to see how the food reacts in a weightless condition," LaChance said. "So we can know what to expect for the next mission which is four days long and the astronauts will need to eat."
Air Force Maj. Virgil I. Grissom, command pilot, did not eat on the flight. Young did only as an experiment.
The food was developed by Whitford Corp. of St. Joseph, Mich., and cost the space agency \$115,000 for meals to be eaten by astronauts on the first three Gemini missions.

Gemini 3 First Plane For Space

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Gemini spacecraft which astronaut Virgil I. Grissom and John W. Young rode into the eye of history yesterday was the first true flying machine to enter the space race.
In the developing history of space flight, Gemini will probably prove the counterpart of the generation of planes that came after the Wright brothers' model. Complicated in design, it functions simply.
As Gemini 3 circled the globe more than 100 miles high, Grissom kept his hand on the throttle. His flight plan called for him to maneuver the craft — to fly backward, forward, upside down and sideways, and the craft on its tail, pitch the nose down and move laterally and up and down to actually change his flight path. He could, if he wished, switch to an automatic pilot.
The 38-year-old Air Force major, who flew the second Mercury capsule, has called Gemini a much better craft because "it was built for a pilot."
The spacecraft resembles a giant dinner bell, almost 19-feet tall with a 10-foot diameter at base and weighing more than 7,000 pounds. It's 20 per cent larger than the Mercury capsule, shaped much like it.

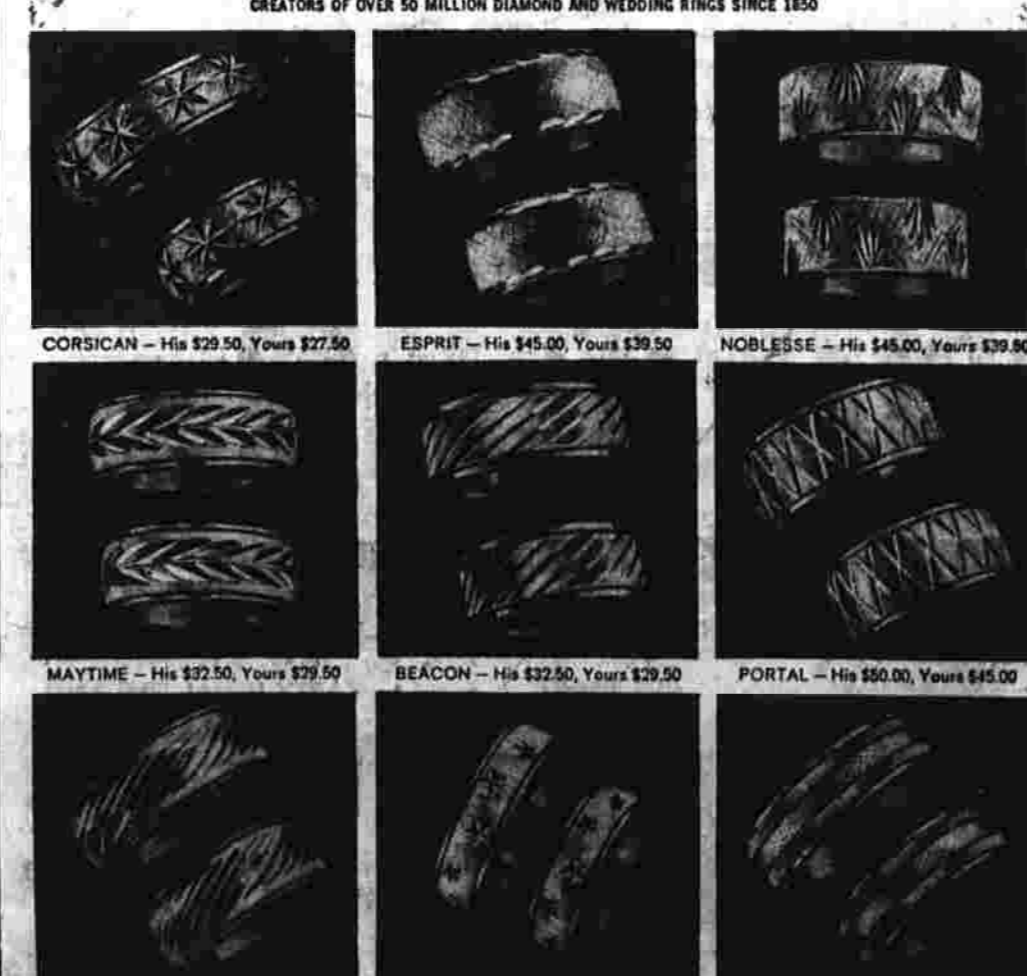
