Col. Simmonson and Communist troops from North Vietnam attacked the post in the evening. The post was held for three days before being abandoned.

The attack on the post is the first of a series of Communist attacks on army posts in the area.

Simmonson said the Communist forces burned the post, looted the village and some rice fields before withdrawing.

OTTAWA (AP) — After 53 months in office, Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson is weighing the possibility of calling an election in June in the hope of giving a parliamentary majority to his Liberal party.

Although prospects for a sweeping Liberal victory aren't good, some party strategists see more of a gamble to posturing the election.

In fact, the opposition might give an election by a vote of no confidence if the prime minister hesitates too long.

John G. Diefenbaker, 69, Conservative leader, appears more enthusiastic about an election than Pearson, possibly because Diefenbaker's leadership is weakened. He may not lead the Conservatives if the election is called.

Danbury's Consolidation Mayor Facing Strong Election Fight

DANBURY (AP) — The incumbent Republican mayor faces a strong challenge from Democrats Monday as this council state of officials.

Mayor J. Traver Bowman is credited with bringing about consolidation of city and town into a single government.

There are 22,250 eligible voters, about 12,000 of whom live in the old city area.

Danbury has been going Democratic in state and national elections, but Republicans in the town elections. Democrats won 11 of the 15 elections in the old city.

President Johnson swept Danbury 22,000 to 5,728 last November.

One candidate is assured of re-election. He is Mrs. Margaret Yacko, town clerk, who has been assistant town clerk for two years.

The city was chartered in 1880, successor to the borough which was founded in 1823.

The new city represents the first successful use of the state's Home Rule Act to bring about consolidation of local units of government.

Communist Bloc Contacts In Offing for West Germany

BONN, Germany (AP) — One of the main aims of the East German government is to bring West Germany into the Communist bloc, officials here said today.

For nearly a decade this country has refused to maintain diplomatic relations with any country that formally recognized the Communist Government in East Germany. It made an exception only for the Soviet Union.

When Yugoslavia recognized East Germany in 1957 and Cuba did the same in 1963, West Germany broke diplomatic relations with them.

This policy, known as the Hallstein Doctrine, was named for Walter Hallstein, formerly No. 2 man in the West German foreign ministry, now head of the Common Market's executive board.

It went well with former Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's policy but even before he left office in 1963, it became clear that strict application of the Hallstein Doctrine was hurting trade and making it harder to heal the wounds of World War II.

Agreements on setting up permanent trade missions were made with Poland, Romania, Bulgaria and Hungary. Negotiations were started with Czechoslovakia.

Then came the clash with Gamael Abdel Nasser over the visit of West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer to Egypt in 1965. Nasser, a step he had previously avoided in an attempt to keep Arab friendship. The Arab states replied with a threat to break up relations with West Germany.

Some of them may carry out this threat, and if they do little West Germany will be left of the Hallstein Doctrine. Should hope disappear of preventing neutral countries from recognizing East Germany there will not be much reason to left to bar traditional ties between West Germany and the nations of Eastern Europe.

There have been other straws in the wind. West Germany is guaranteeing credits to communist governments for as long as eight years. Erich Mende, Erhard's vice chancellor, has proposed setting up diplomatic relations with the East Bloc states.

Erhard's spokesman declined to comment on Mende's statement.



In Britain Vicar Runs Club For Ton-up Boys

By GOREY ANDERSON LONDON (AP) — Britain's ton-up boys — the leather-jacketed toughs who top 100 miles an hour on motorbikes — now have a ton-up priest to care for them.

The Rev. William Frank Shergold, Church of England vicar of Paddington Green, West London, wears denim jeans, jackboots and a helmet just like the teen-age boys he serves. He rides a powerful factory-made machine.

After Shergold runs a club with nearly 7,000 members — almost all of them teen-agers and about 25 per cent girls. He has married a few member couples and visited others in hospitals as they recovered from accidents. More than once he has cradled a dying boy in his arms, while police sent the traffic streaming round them.

"What really floors these boys is when one of them makes a good car coming their way," says Shergold. "They imagined us all roasting up to the church door on motorbikes. In fact, 400 attended my induction service. It was really something. But they've settled down now and been very good about it. In fact they seem to like the boys."

Right now Shergold and his assistant, Graham Hullett, who also is a motorcyclist, are searching for a club headquarters where "a thousand or so motorcyclists can get together without annoying the neighbors."

They have decided to rebuild the war-damaged church hall, which will be left relatively isolated by a new road-widening scheme. Already the boys have raised more than \$2,800 by raffering a motorbike.

So far as the Church is concerned, Shergold believes that the fruit of his work will be reaped by some future vicar.

"It may be years," he said, "but when these boys have grown up and raised families of their own, they may remember St. Mary's with affection and return to us."

Shergold himself has been a motorcyclist for 14 years. He started using one to get around his parish at Hackney in East London.

There in 1959 he founded the

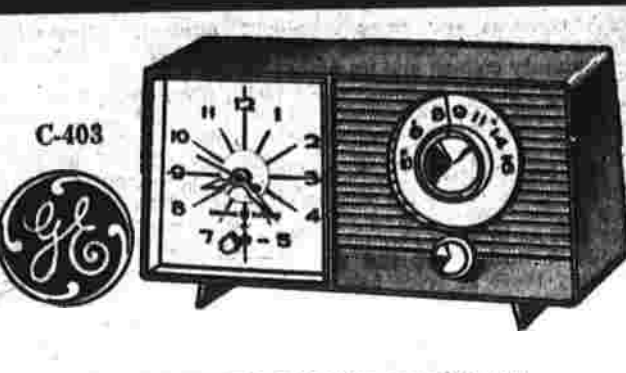

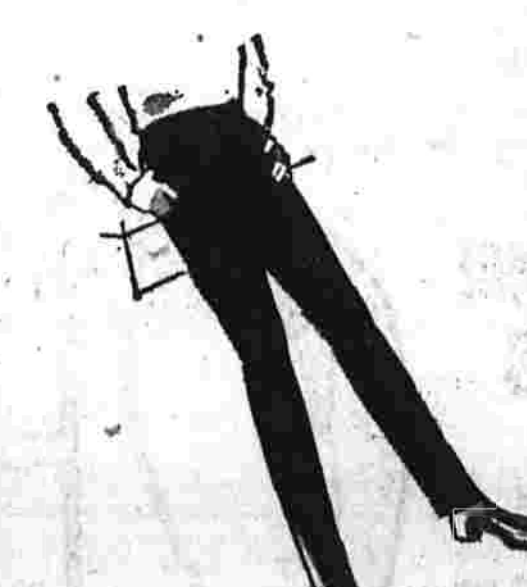

Mahler Work Is Applauded

Arthur Winograd turned out his most impressive performance yet at the helm of the Hartford Symphony last evening, leading the orchestra and the Hartford Symphony Chorus through the measures of Mahler's Symphony No. 2. An enthusiastic audience applauded all the while, and especially Beverly Wolf and Barbara Pearson, lead and alto soloists respectively, and extended applause.

This is a very difficult work to conduct and there was never a moment when Mr. Winograd was not in complete command of the forces under his control. A situation which has not always been obtained in the past. An animal was most convincing in the intense musical portions, the work hand last evening. And as usual, it was not so impressed with his handling of slow and delicate passages. Still, the overall effect was excellent.

On the other hand, in hearing the brass down, he was forced at times to provide a sound that seemed diffident even though palpable.

The first movement was executed with good execution, and with the usual moderate tempo. The additional admission to the conductor in German, "Mit Beharrlichkeit," which translates as "Not hurried, very comfortable." Yet Mr. Winograd elected a tempo which was at least an Allegretto or perhaps an Allegro moderato.

This did the composer poor favor for the movement is the slowest of the entire composition and the faster speed resulted in a sort of mechanical effect. The third movement went very well, but there was insufficient contrast with the preceding section, since that had been too fast.

Finally we got to the "Urlicht," which Beverly Wolf, as soloist, I've heard this does considerably slower, too. But Miss Wolf displayed such gorgeous consistency (and I must add, a face and figure to match) that I shall not quarrel at all.

FTC Ponders Telling About Tire Hazards

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Trade Commission is considering ordering the major tire makers to tell the public of automobile tire hazards, a government source says.

The possibility of a "disclosure of hazards" order, described by a spokesman Wednesday, arose after the FTC listened to some highly explosive testimony during a two-day hearing in January.

Such an order could touch off a controversy similar to the furor over whether the tobacco industry should be required to display warnings that habitual smoking may injure health.

Sen. Gaylord D. Nelson, D-Wis., said in a speech prepared for the Senate today the 800-page transcript of the tire safety hearings documents a "national scandal in automobile tires," and should be made public.

Nelson said the transcript, which the FTC has not intended to print, includes expert testimony that:

Many new cars come equipped with tires inadequate even for normal use.

Six-passenger sedans with big trunks are tested for tire purposes with only three passengers and no luggage.

Rites stamped on tires do not tell the actual size and were never intended to do so.

Five-year-old tires have "no understandable meaning."

"There is no way a motorist can choose the right tire."

"If the transcript indicates that thousands of people are buying fine new cars, loading them up with children and baggage, and setting out across the country in the belief that they are perfectly safe."

"Actually, many of them are sitting on a time bomb."

The manufacturers and independent tire dealers testified at the hearing that the terms "first line," "second line" and "third line" mean something different to each manufacturer.
