In many ways these days, Manchester is changing.

From an administrator's point of view, this is a com-pletely fair method of cost distribution.
So long as the cost of the

projects undertaken did not go too high, and so long as the property owners who were as-sessed really wanted what they were getting, this was a good way to get things built. Things got out of hand, how-ever, when the project was large and the benefits unclear. thus, when the town proposerve the Keeney St. area, there was rebellion: The cost was relstively great and the need was n many cases lacking. People with septic tanks that perated the way septic tanks should, saw no reason their property should be burdened with the cost of a sewer they might never use, particularly when the cost appeared so high. They wanted, instead, to be assessed on the basis of benefit. If they could use the sewers, they would pay; if they did not want them, they did not want to

have to pay.

They wanted sewers on a "value" basis, not a "cost" basis.

The simplest way to handle the problem would be not to build the sewer, since the apparent concensus of Keeney St. area residents was against the


