Indeed it has. And, strangely enough, the precise places where we have the deepest and most faithful and most dangerous commitment of all is in that same Vietnam where we told France to give up and leave.

One admires the righteous indignation with which Under Secretary of State Ball, in the speech noted, reproached France for such underhanded attempts to ease us out of France's former colony.

The march down in Alabama has brought the problem and the obligation to every American everywhere. It will never go away again, not until it has been mastered. It is history—necessary history which Martin Luther King has contrived to make and lead for the country the Boston Patriots and George Washington contrived to create by presence, and all Americans, even those who do not yet begin to know it, are in his debt. For whatever degree of homage ever remains in this country is not for one alone, but for all, and if this country is to live and remain great it must be by the redemptive and reaffirmation of its fundamental articles of faith in the dignity and equality of man.

Imagine France Doing That! When Under Secretary of State George W. Ball makes a speech intimating that we suspect France of unwise and unbecomingly schemes to get us to draw out of certain parts of the world, so that perhaps France itself can have a bigger influence there, the first somewhat whimsical question which suggests itself is this: Are we getting ready to bomb some trifle of France because France may be encouraging North Vietnam against us in South Vietnam?

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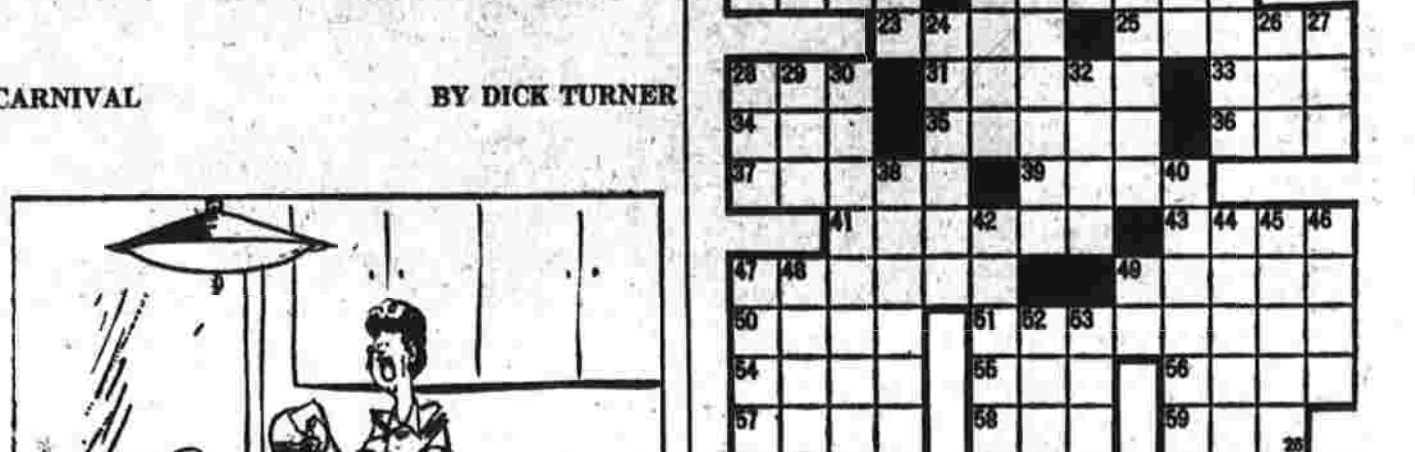
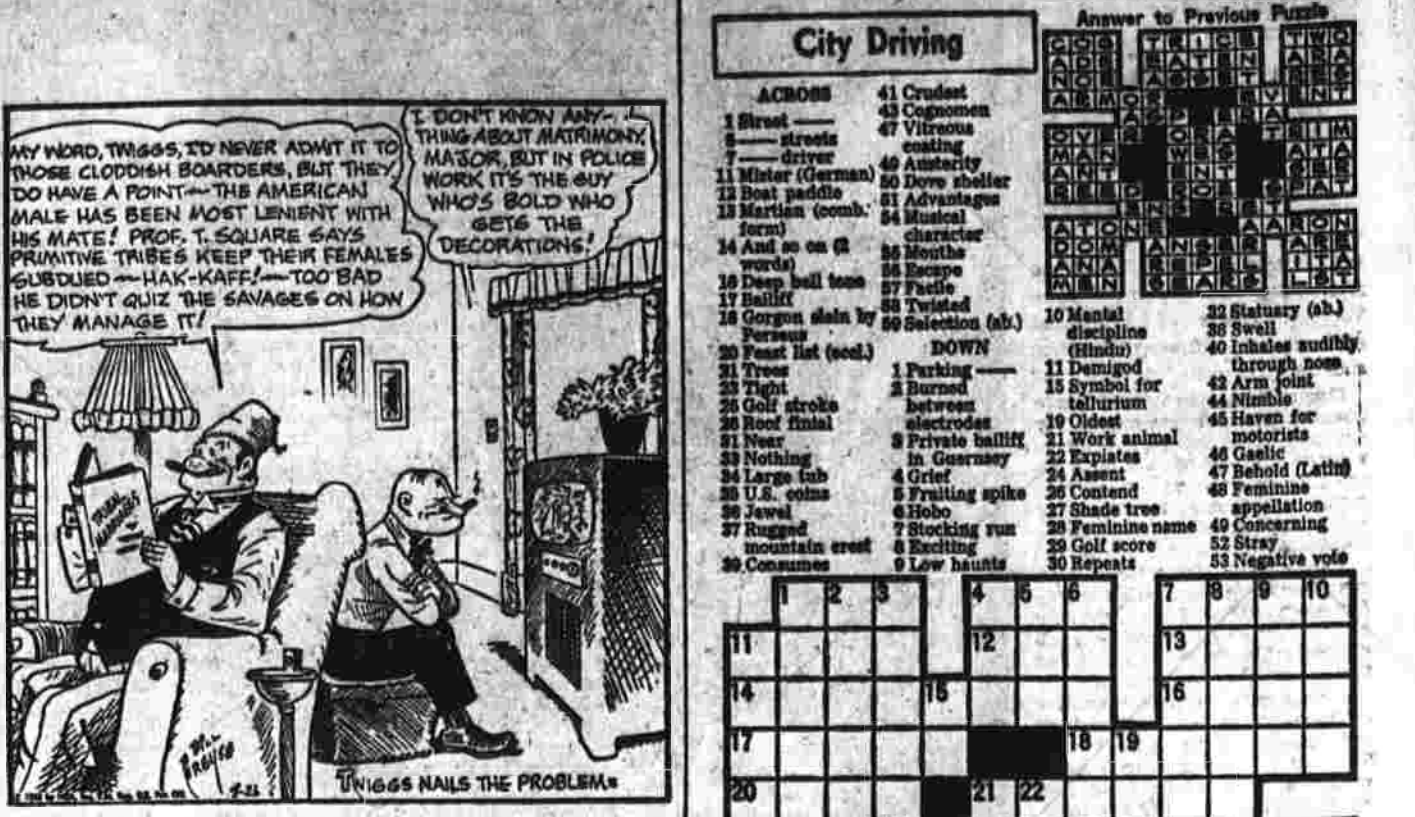

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Bolton Conservation Panel to Start Work on Open Space Plan

The conservation commission has sent home with Bolton students at its meeting last night to initiate work on an open space plan for the town using the commission's own resources, rather than seeking outside help.

Commission members made plans to begin by taking an inventory of publicly and institutionally owned land and by making a survey of lakes, ponds, streams and areas suitable for recreation and conservation purposes.

The purpose of the open space plan would be to provide areas for town recreational needs, as well as to insure a certain amount of aesthetic development of the town.

Members looked at examples of open space plans completed by other Connecticut towns. They felt it was feasible for high school students to undertake their own study because of previous studies made for the town planning commission and because of the availability of studies and data from state and federal sources.

A soil map of Bolton, being prepared by the United States Soil Conservation Service, will be completed and given to the commission free of charge some time this spring.

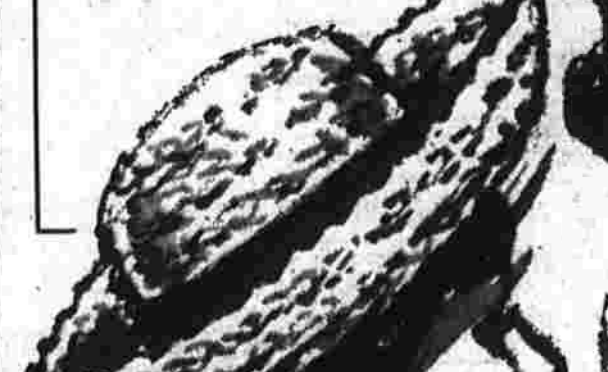

House Okays Aid to Schools

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House overcame bitter hickering last night to pass the controversial \$1.3 billion school aid bill.

The 263-153 vote gave President Johnson his biggest legislative victory of the session.

The party lineup: 228 Democrats and 35 Republicans for the measure; 57 Democrats and 96 Republicans against.

The bill, aimed primarily at helping school districts which serve children from impoverished families, now moves to the Senate where Democratic leaders predict quick action.

House opponents used legislative devices and time-consuming votes to delay final action.

At one point, Rep. Charles E. Goodell (R-N.Y.) charged: "This isn't going to be an education act; it's going to be a relief act."

Goodell also accused the administration of growing over the bill's impact on parental schools.

The New Yorker later declared that the measure was stifling opposition.

This brought Speaker John W. McCormack (D-Mass.), to the microphone.

Normally good-natured, the unassuming McCormack said: "I am aware there is some kind of implication of intimidation being made and I don't like it."

In the Senate, Mansfield said he hoped the bill would pass within two weeks.

Reds Shift Leaders in Crop Control

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union announced plans Friday to combat what it called "serious shortcomings and errors in agricultural management during the past few years."

He called for "wider use of economic and moral incentives" in collective and state farms which he said "should be allowed greater independence in economic decisions within the state budget."

NEW HAVEN AP—Two brothers were charged Tuesday with assault with intent to murder in the shooting and stabbing of an off duty policeman.

The policeman, Joseph McAlpine, was attacked while he was trying to break up a fight in a barroom, police said.

McAlpine was reported in fair condition and was being treated in the Grace-New Haven Hospital's intensive care unit.

Police said McAlpine's hand was bruised and swollen when he was a fight going on at the bar, but he was not injured.

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
