Reds Shift Leaders in Crop Control

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union announced plans Friday to combat what it called "serious shortcomings and errors in agricultural management during the past few years."

It put new men in top government and Communist party posts to carry them out.

The Communist party's first secretary, Leonid I. Brezhnev, who presented the program to the Politburo last week, said it was necessary to carry out the program.

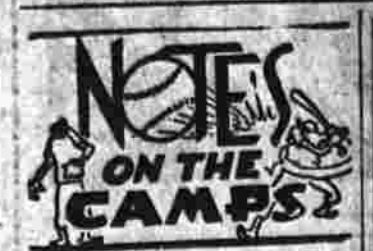

### CLASS GRADUATES

A chronic difficulty in obtaining experienced help led the Mal Tool and Engineering Co. and President George Longtin to the establishment in October 1964 of its now recognizedly successful training school. The training courses, twelve weeks in length and comprehensive in scope, are designed to develop, as fully as possible, the innate mechanical potentialities of a selected group of candidates, previously relatively unskilled in the mechanical arts.

All applicants for the courses undergo a series of tests to determine the nature and extent of their natural gifts. These tests probe an applicant's ability to visualize assembly of two-dimensional geometric shapes into a whole design, to understand mechanical relationship, to cope with the type of mathematical problems encountered in shop work and also explore his general mental capacities.

The successful candidates are then invited to a 12-week study of the practical and theoretical aspects of shop work. A total of 480 hours of instruction includes 72 hours of blueprint reading, 72 hours of shop theory, 762 hours of mathematics, 24 hours of instruction in safety and working according to specifications of various types.

Familiarization with operation of the fundamental machines in the shop occupies 192 hours of the students' time. These include a Reid surface grinder, a Bridgeport milling machine, a Bridgeport with Pratt and Whitney Velvetrace Kellering attachment and a Kearney and Trecker milling machine. Twenty-four hours are also spent in manipulation of various precision tools, such as micrometers, sine-bars and gauges.

The student-apprentices are paid at the rate of \$1.50 an hour and are treated as regular employees. The recently built training quarters are located in a separate structure and include a comfortable automated cafeteria. Gustave Ekstrom, the school's instructor, was brought in after 12 years of service with Pratt and Whitney Aircraft where he had held several posts.

Six members of the first class of 12 students graduated at the end of last year and have taken positions in Mal Tool shops in Manchester and Vernon. Eight candidates from among over 100 applicants have been accepted for the third course starting the first week of April.

Unlike the conventional switchboard, the console is immediately free to handle another call after a connection or transfer, no matter what the volume of telephone traffic happens to be at the time.

Engineering work on the system began in April 1963. The old 15-position switchboard and allied equipment consisting of more than ten tons of copper wire, cable and terminals will eventually be salvaged by the Western Electric Co.

UAC's telephone exchange is now the largest single installation in the SNETCO system and is larger than the exchanges of Coventry and Stafford Springs combined, for example.

By JOAN CROSBY NEW YORK — (NRA) — Robert Reed has discovered the difference between acting on Broadway and in television, both of which he is currently doing.

As costar in CBS-TV's The Defenders, Bob has been trained not to stare a door behind him as he speaks, not to make noise with props and not always to look directly at his fellow actors. (That's known as cheating for the camera.)

"But I find after the performance, I can't go to sleep until about 2 o'clock. So I nap through our lunch break and during the afternoon."

Reed, a tall, blue-eyed, sensitive young man, thinks maybe he will head for California, where he used to live, after his television series and play call it quits. "I prefer working here in New York, but I like living in California and I value my private life over my work."

An Old Juvenile In the four years The Defenders has been in production, Reed says he has changed from a juvenile to an old juvenile. The other day E. G. Marshall and I were figuring out the number of lines we have said over and over in the series. My least favorite is "What do I do now, Dad?"

Bob and Marshall are very good friends, but Reed had only an enigmatic comment to offer when asked about E.G.'s recent appearance on The Les Crane Show to accept an award. When Marshall was thanking the people responsible for the show, he said, "It would be gross culpable negligence on my part if I failed to mention the name of Herbert Brodtkin (the show's executive producer) without whose help it was all possible."

Was Marshall serious in his dig at Brodtkin, kidding or was it a fluff, people are wondering. "Your guess is as good as mine," Reed smiled.

The Coming Season Hollywood Is Happy

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — There is optimism in the Hollywood air and with good reason: The coming television season holds to be the healthiest in history for the major studios.

The film companies were late in entering television production, whether through lack of vision or fear of antagonizing theater owners. Almost too late, the studios discovered new economic facts of life. They could scarcely survive without the steady production for television to help support the risky business of making features.

Except for MCA, which entered television before it even owned a studio, the big companies went after the market in a sometimes sketchy manner. That's true no more. Nearly all the studios have launched major campaigns to sell series. The results can be seen in the 1965-66 season.

The big success story is 20th Century-Fox. A season ago, it had only a series on the network. This year it scored with "Peyton Place," "Daniel Boone," and "Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea" all slated for renewal, plus "Valentine's Day," which may make the grade.

Fox expects to have five more series on the networks in the coming season: "Lost in Space," (Guy Williams-June Lockhart); "Long, Hot Summer" (Edmond O'Brien); "Jesse James" (Chris Jones); "The Loner" (Lloyd Bridges); "Sally and Sam" (Gary Lockwood-Cynthia Pepper).

MGM lost "Mr. Novak" but renewed "Dr. Kildare" (in half-hours Monday and Tuesday), "Fwypper" and "The Man from

U.N.C.L.E." New series will be "Please Don't Eat the Daisies" with Mark Miller and Pat Crowley and a new Robert Horton western, "The Man from Shاندون."

Warner Bros. is scoring a major comeback, despite the apparent losses of "No Time for Sergeants" and "Wendy and Me." The Burbank lot is fielding "The F.B.I." with Estem Zimbalist Jr., while his onetime "T Sunset Strip" pal, Roger Smith, is making a "Mister Roberts." Warner also has landed a pair of comedies: "P Troop" with Forest Tucker and Larry Storch and "Hank" with Dick Kallman.

Universal City, formerly Revue, has its usual strong schedule: "The Virginian," Bob Hope, "McHale's Navy" and "The Munsters" returning. The new series: "Run for Your Life" (Ben Gazzara); "Laredo" (Neville Brand, Peter Brown); "Convoy" (John Gavin); "The Mr. and the Misses" (John Forsythe, Ann B. Davis); and "Tummy" (Brenda Scott).

Screen Gems, the television arm of Columbia, has its prize girls returning: "Hazel" (in a quick switch from NBC to CBS), Donna Reed, "The Farmer's Daughter" and "Bewitched." Four new comedies will be forthcoming: "Gidget," "Camp Runamuck," "Wackiest Ship in the Army" and "I Dream of Jeannie."

United Artists continues with three winners, "Gilligan's Island," "The Fugitive" and "Fatty Duke," while adding "Okay Crackerby" (Burt Ives); "My Mother, the Car" (Jerry Van Dyke, the voice of Ann Sothern in the title role); and "Meet Mona McClusky" (Juliet Prowse).

First Season Nobody Knows Your Name, Bill Bixby Finds

HOLLYWOOD (AP) The evolution of a television star, as analyzed by young Bill Bixby, earthing buddy of "My Favorite Martian":

"In the first six months of the first season, you are recognized, but nobody knows your name. They came up to me and said, 'Oh, you're Tim O'Hara on 'My Favorite Martian.' I never watch your show, but my kids do, and I see it when I walk by the set. Could I have your autograph for them?"

"They never said they watched it themselves, because they didn't want people to know that they watched a show that was supposed to be for kids. But inevitably the same persons would come back later and discuss two or three plots on the show. So how did they know about the plots if they didn't watch 'My Favorite Martian'?"

"Then in the second year they start to use your name. They don't always get mine right—it's Bill Bixby or something—but at least they're trying. Now they don't alibi that they happen to catch the show because of their children. They come right out and admit they watch it."

In the third year, he hopes to be firmly established as Bill Bixby, television star. There doubtless will be a third year of "My Favorite Martian," and possibly a fourth and fifth. The series, which costars Ray Wilson, has all the earmarks of longevity, and that's just fine with Bill.

Says he: "Hard work! Sure."

But that's what I became an actor for—to work. I am—to use what seems to be a dirty word nowadays—ambitious.

# Slattery's Pirates Are Given Reprieve

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)**—Richard Crenna had the air of a death-row inmate who had just been told the governor was on the phone.

The last-minute reprieve had saved Crenna's show, "Slattery's People," after it apparently had been slated for execution by the high powers of CBS. In Hollywood this week, programming chief Michael Dann admitted that a few weeks ago he didn't expect the state-legislature series to survive.

In the last major rating, "Slattery's People" placed third in its time slot, usually an invitation to death. But, said Dann, a great outpouring of critical and viewer protest convinced CBS otherwise. "It was our responsibility as broadcasters to give this show an opportunity to survive," said he.

To which Crenna might add, "Hallelujah."

The escapes from "Our Miss Brooks" and "The Real McCoys" had treasured "Slattery's" as his golden chance to grow up into a no-nonsense role. But even last week, the show seemed to have gone a-glimmering.

"I had been told by everyone, 'You're off,'" he recalled, "so

there really wasn't much grounds for hope. I had finished my work, but I returned on the last day's shooting and stayed until it was over at 11:30 p.m.

"You see, the crew had been named 'Slattery's pirates,' and every time I came on the set they would raise a black flag. Well, I had to be the last one to leave the ship."

Crenna credits Dann with making the pitch to the CBS board to give the series a go at a second season. He also commends the critics for stirring up letter-writers and the sponsors for not leaving what had all the aspects of a sinking ship.

"I said when we started the show that it would be the kind that would take a while to build its audience," the actor said. "We got clobbered on Monday night (opposite "Ben Casey" and Alfred Hitchcock), then things began to pick up a little when we moved to Friday. Still it didn't seem enough."

Far from being discouraged by the apparent failure of "Slattery's," he viewed the future with confidence. He had accomplished what he set out to do: To break out of his typing as an all-American mugger.

"And with the show close to folding, I received some marvelous offers," he added. Among them was a deal at MGM for various services, including costarring with Ann-Margret in "Made in Paris." He hopes to be able to make the film before resuming the series.
