






After Beven Weeks After seven weeks of showing nothing sit his poker face to his own nation or to the world on the issue of Vietnam, resident Johnson on Thursday presented to his Cabinet a new prepared statement of his position on Vietnam. This time, for the first time, the famed poleer face seemed to begin to show a trace of that tell-tale crinkle around the edges. And, when White House correspondents failed to get from the cold type that impression of potential geniality they were supposed to deduce, they were given the benefit of some further informal interpretation and emphasis by "White House sources." What was new in the Thursday tatement was, as all can realize after

enough educational prompting, contained in the following passage:

"The United States looks forward to the day when the people and governments of all Southeast Asia may be free from terror, subversion and assassinan-when they will need not military upport and assistance against aggression, but only economic and social operation for progress in peace. Even now, in Vietnam and elsewhere, there are major programs of development which have the cooperation and support of the United States. Wider and bolder programs can be expected in the future Asian leaders and Asian councilsand in such programs we would want to

This, said the subsequent White House interpreting, represents the introducdon, at last, of the carrot to go along with the stick of our bombing of North Vietnam. And what it offers, in the creat Southeast Asian society beyond he present trouble, is a massive new regional aid program—a Tennessee Valley Authority kind of exploit applied to the Mekong River-in which North Vietnam, if nice, would share.

What now becomes interesting is the guestion of what has finally brought the President, after seven weeks of hard-faced toughness, to the point where he even tried to contrive something in the nature of a carrot. Has the President made such a ges-

ture illusioning a carrot because his policy in Vietnam has been winning, so that he can now afford to begin to be

The situation seems to be that, although the President's toughness in Vietnam has been escalating and increasing steadily throughout these seven weeks, it has not yet been winning. And some of the accompanying elements in the President's statement Thursday indicate that what the Presi dent was doing was not celebrating a victory for his strategy in Vietnam, but

finding himself obligated to defend it more stremously than ever. Furthermore, a cynical judgment, which tried to play the game as the President himself has been trying to teach it to us, would judge that any carrot being offered is not being offered to North Vietnam at all, but only to sivilized public opinion here at home and abroad. The President, to put it bluntly, is disturbed and troubled that not everybody thinks well of where and with what weapons we are fighting in

One answer, then, is that we are fighting as we do, and experimenting with the weapons we are experimenting with, so that we may have the opportunity o finance a Mekong Valley Authority. Other touches in the Thursday statement also constitute somewhat laborious approaches to public opinion at home and

"This," said the President, "is no struggle of white men against Asians." Since we are the non-Asians on the scene, and in the fighting, and since our first extension of the war across the North Vietnam border was precisely labeled a punishment for an attack upon Americans in particular, and since there are some naive Asians who feel that we wouldn't be experimenting with any form of gas warfare against some Nordic foe, President cannot expect to get acseptance of his statement everywhere. The truth is that things are being mismanaged so badly, from the propaganda point of view, that the President is reof to pleading for the world to .

ignore an impression our own words and acts have created. The President, on Thursday, was feeling on the defensive so much he and his advisers felt required to make some new statement—again to public opinion here and abroad rather than to the Vietnamess-about his willingness to make peace. They found, this time, an ingenious way to make a longer statement

about negotiation with even shorter risk of any negotiation itself. "The United States," said the Presiient in a wonderful piece of phrasing, "will never be second in seeking a settlement in Vietnam that is based on an end of Communist aggression. As I have said in every part of the Union, I am ready to go anywhere at any time, and meet with anyone whenever there is promise of progress toward an honor-

If this statement affirms that "we will never be second" it is equally efficient in making it clear that we will never be first, either. And the portion about the President's willingness to travel toward peace makes it quite clear that he has no intention of traveling anywhere or meeting with anyone. It is, again, a statement directed to public opinion, seeking to defend a policy which seems to be failing in the field and in the minds of men, rather than a statement meaningfully directed to all those medding statesmen around the world who have been trying to set up some basis

for negotiation. By the way the President has been conducting himself on this Vietnam issue in the past, then, Thursday's statement represented no basic change, but merely a new and slightly more extended effort to keep everybody quiet while he pursues the deadly game of bet and call Vietnam. The only reason he has needed to make a somewhat longer and more ingenious statement is that the game has been going badly, with some regrettably poor play on our part, and a regrettable lack of compliance with our bombed wishes from the enemy. So far the enemy has refused to lose to us, who cannot afford to lose, being the great world power we are, and that is where the thing still stands, after seven weeks, except that perhaps the President is beginning to realize that nothing, no matter how quickly one escalation succeeds another, seems to be going according to schedule toward the

Richard Cardinal Cashing, one of the most highly regarded American clergy-men of these times, esteemed alike by Catholics and non-Catholics, sounded exactly the right note in a statement issued through a spokesman, at the re-cent State House hearing on the bill to liberalize the Massachusetts birth-con-The Cardinal said that he favors re

laxation of the law, but that the bill should be redrafted to place safeguards around the dissemination of medical information which might be entirely suitable for adults but not for young peo-ple. The Cardinal suggested that the measure be referred to a study commission, made up of citizens represent-ing a broad community consensus, "which can recommend to the Legisla-ture an amendment carefully drafted to satisfy the conscientious opinion of the

whole community."

In his statement, of historic significance in the old Bay State, the Cardinal said, "Catholics do not need the support of the civil law to be faithful to their own religious convictions, and they do not seek to impose by law their moral views on other members of our society."

Our state now forbids physicians to give birth-control information, in this respect lagging (with Connecticut) behind the rest of the United States. Unhind the rest of the United States. Until recently, when our antique Sunday "blue laws" were somewhat liberalized, we also lagged behind the rest of the nation on that issue, still clinging to legal remnants of the early colonial days when it was unlawful to do much of anything on the Sabbath except go to church—the Puritan church, of course, for none other was tolerated in Massachusetts at that time.

But times have changed much since then. Now, as Cardinal Cushing rightly points out, no single religious group has a right to impose its own moral precepts, through the civil law, on the whole population, which includes people of many different failus.—SPRINGFIELD



Business Can Close For Whatever Cause

WASHINGTON (AP) — These Explaining the court's posi-Supreme Court ruled today it is an unfair labor practice for an employer to close a part of his "to chill unionism" in any of the

Justice John M. Harlan deliv-

Justice John M. Harlan delivered the 7-0 decision.

Justices Potter Stewart and Arthur J. Goldberg took no part.

Harlan said that, even if liquidation of an entire business is motivated by vindictiveness toward a union, the closing is not an unfair labor practice.

As to Darlington, Harlan said the high tribunal disagreed with the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 4th Circuit that the right to close an entire business includes the right to close an entire business includes the right to shut down part of it, regardless of the reason.

Harlan said that, therefore, the case had to go back to the labor board for further proceedings on the point of closing part of a business.

The decision specifically applied to Darlington Manufacturing Co., which shut down its plant in Darlington, S.C., in 1956. The National Labor Relations Board said the plant was closed to avoid dealing with the Textile Workers Union, but Darlington said the closing was for economic reasons.

In this specific case, counsel for the Textile Workers Union argued before the Supreme Court that the Darlington plant was closed "to destroy the union in Darlington and to discourage unionization" in 26 other plants in the Deering-Milliken complex. WASHINGTON (AP) -Merger of the Pennsylvania and New York Central railroads was recommended today by examiners for the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Strict conditions were laid down, one of which would require the two railroads to provide freight service over the lines of the New Haven Railroad.

But the examiners contrary to expectations in the railroad industry-did not recommend that the merged Penn-Central system support the New Haven's bankrupt passenger operations "unless a plan is provided to offset the present operating deficits on a sound economic

In recommending against in-clusion of the New Haven Railroad's passenger service, the examiners concluded:

"Even if the most glowing estimates of the New Haven's savings and future freight increases are accepted as an ac-complished fact, its inclusion would still pose a substantial burden upon the merged company.'

In ordering the proposed Penn-Central system to assume New Haven's freight burden, they said some form of inclusion is necessary because its freight operations would be materially affected by the proposed merger,

"No type of traffic conditions appear to offer the degree of protection required." the examiners said. "It must be recognized, however, that without some radical change in existing conditions, even if this merger were denied, the New Haven yould face almost hopeless odds in extricating itself from bank-
