But do we conclude, thereby, that our policy of preventing such things by bombing North Vietnam has proved a failure! Not in the least. We merely, by the code Washington is following, conclude that

we need to do more bombing. Lippmann may be a sick kind of dove, not the hawk every red-blooded Ameriean should be, these days. But hawks and doves alike might concede, today, that the progress toward the brink has been accelerated one more time, and that reaching it could now be a matter
