Aiming A Bill At The Klan Every attempt, by law, to set standards for or infringements upon the rights of citizens of this country to organize themselves into groups of their own fancy, carries a threat to the validity of American freedom as a whole, and this goes for any proposal to try to leg-

islate the Ku Klux Klan out of existence just as much as it goes for legislation cointed at any other specific movement. We began with a promise of freedom of assembly, speech, belief and organization to ourselves, and we still live in the assumption that the main part and spirit of that promise are still with us. But we allow ourselves to be tempted, by our emotional response to special deelopments in our national life, into the enactment, or the attempt to enact, specially aimed legislation which seeks cut out and eliminate one particular

dal majority disagrees with the way some particular group has abused its share of this freedom, it becomes a relatively easy thing to whoop through some law which denies the franchise to that

kind of practice of the traditional free-

Such legislation can never be sound, because it cannot really ever be based eause it is purely expedient. And it never really does even the job expected of it, for the simple reason that if there is any real danger to us all and to our way of life in the target such legislation is aiming at, the net effect of the egislation is merely to drive it underground and perhaps make it even more

All this statement of general principle we apply specifically to the Ku Klux Klan, and to President Johnson's request for the passage by Congress of legislation that will bring the activities of the Klan under effective control of the law." It is not that we wish to deny or disassociate ourselves from President Johnson's verdict that the Klan is a "hooded society of bigots." Nor is it because we think that the Klan should be free to commit murder and get away with it, as both organized and unorganized riff-raff in the South have been able to get away with murder in the past. The Klan is, by every verdict of a great American majority, an unspeakable thing, an ugly thing, an un-American thing. We would be delighted to see

But to try to legislate it out of existence, by writing some special law which would inevitably have to cast some shadow on other types and styles of secret organizations, would also be un-American, just as we have betrayed ourselves and our principles more conclusively than either ideology has ever been able to when we have persecuted the Nazis and outlawed the Communists as political parties. How could we ever outaw the Kian without putting words into law which would be applicable to the John Birch Society? And do we wish to confer upon the John Birch Society the honor and accolade of trying to forbid its members their traditional American freedom of communal insan-

We would hardly want to try to apply legislative sanctions to the John firchers because we wouldn't know how to do that without coming too close to other more genial and less harmful grackpots. And so it goes, once you start egislating about what kind of thoughts people can have and what kind of groups

The case was that of the Darlington Manufacturing Co., whose management in 1956, closed it down and liquidated its operations after its employes had voted in favor of having themselves rep-

Answering the question in this simplest form, the decision Monday, written by Justice Harian, made what seemed, for a moment ,to be a conclusive reaffirmation of all the rights of owner-"A proposition that a single business-

man cannot choose to go out of business if he wants to would represent such a startling innovation," Justice Harlan wrote, "that it should not be entertained without the clearest manifestation" that Congress itself was intending such a

So here we have it, in principle, that a man has the right to close down his own business, if he wants to, for any reason under the sun, including his dislike of a union.

Justice Harlan may think that to imagine anything else would constitute a "startling innovation," but the truth is that anybody who has been reading the signs of our times has been forced to wonder if ownership could long retain even such an elemental right.

What the high court thus establishes in principle, however, it does not yet apply to the historic Darlington case in particular. For the same decision goes on to qualify the statement of principle, by contending that if an owner owns more than one plant, he can close all of them down if he wants to, but must not close just one of them down "if motivated by a purpose to chill unionism in any of the remaining plants of the single employer and if the company may reasonably have foreseen that such closing will likely have that effect." So the Darlington case goes back to

the NLRB for that body to determine whether the closing of the particular mill was a policy designed to fight the possible unionization of other plants under the same ownership-management. When the case comes back, the Court may hold that the Darlington management didn't have the right to close the mill down after all. As if this were not confusing enough

-or perhaps as if the Supreme Court did realize that the decision which at first sounded like a victory for owneventual victory for unionism—the Supreme Court on the same day rendered two other decisions which were clearly and unequivocally on the side of ownership. One recognized the right of all the members of a bargaining group of employers to discharge their union employes and carry on with other help whenever the union might strike just one of the group. In the second decision the Court held that a single employer must be conceded the right to use the lockout, temporarily shutting down his plant and laying off employes, as one of his own weapons in a struggle with a

These are, one would guess, pendulum decisions, in which the 1965 Court is displaying its conviction that the historic rise of union power and privilege has, in the past three decades, been so successful that it does no harm to make sure that ownership retains a few rights,





By itself that sum exceeds the entire \$1.75 billion scheduled by Jresident Johnson i deed, as matters now stand, t Treasury opposes any reduction in the auto tax (though its position probably won't be made public until May). And Rep. Wilbur Mills, the immensely powerful chairs of the House Ways and Mossi Committee, is believed less than enthusiastic about auto tax 1 duction (while maintaining customary sphinx-like at

Nothing passes Congress if both Mills and the Treasury oppose it. So, like the American Medical Association (AMA) in in fighting medicare, the auto men are trying to change the minds of Administration and Congressional leaers. The AMA failed miserably

But the auto men are a different breed from the heavynded-doctor-lobbyists. If any or all of the auto excise tax is repealed this year, it will testito the effectiveness of Detroit's skilled lobbying appara-

This involves no advertising campaign. Fearful such a campaign might trigger mass postement of auto purchases until the tax actually is removed (a "buyer's strike"), the auto men are whispering to gov-ernment officials, not shouting to the public.

Both Henry Ford and Fred-eric Donner (General Motors chairman) have paid quiet visits to Wilbur Mills and other key lawmakers. Theodore Yntema, the brainy finance chief at Ford, has been prowling Wash-

Moreover, while the AMA was implicitly involved in the loldwater movement, the automobile industry is part of the Johnson establishment.
