

WASHINGTON (AP) -Anbassador Maxwell D. Taylor is going back to Saigon with plans to add several thousand Americans to the U.S. force in South Viet







For the past 20 years, the United States has also been living with the idea, promulgated, in fact, by such a great general as Dwight D. Eisenhower, that modern war has become an impossibility, with no winners possible, and of that peace has become the imperative necessity. That expectation was given a sharp blow by Communist aggression in ... Korea, but we then told ourselves, quite sincerely many of us, that we were enforcing a new world law against aggression, and the action was called a police action and was carrieden under the UN banner, and did end in a UN type of organizers, its publications, its head-

repeace, in which aggression was halted and that was made the end of it. Between our relatively clear conscience about the past wars we have fought, and our hope that no more wars will ever have to be fought, we are now engaged in war in Vietnam. And one of the unusual things about this war is the nervous, cringing, apologetic way many of us react to the way in which it is being operated.

Our great uncertainty over Vietnam, of course, rises from the fact that not all of us are sure we should be there, as we certainly should have been in Korea, or as we had to be in World War II. We are not certain it is our war; we are not certain we are not partially to blame for it; we are by no means certain about the civilian leadership in the White House which has let us get in so much deeper than it said it would; we are not certain of our moral or legal Perhaps it is the combination of that

large, basic uncertainty with one other factor and this other factor is the obvious rest with which Secretary McNamara and his generals are conducting all kinds of fascinating military experiments in Vietnam-which results in the curious civilian reaction we are trying to describe and analyze. Where, in some wars, we might react

enthusiastically to the quickness and wariety of the experiments our military are making in Vietnam, we are, this time, not quite sure we are proud of the napalm bombs, the phosphorous bombs, the new bombs that spray needie-like pieces of metal in a dense shower, the easy method we have found for blasting Chinese junks out of the water, the humane use we have found for gas. the fires we can set in the jungle, and all the other refinements and innovations in the art of war our military people are hurrying up to experiment with before some possible peace closes their little laboratory on them.

What, if all of us were to try to be honest about it, was our reaction the other day when we read that, after our magnificent effort to set many thousands of jungle acres afire, the heat of the fires we produced was such that it set off some special and unseasonal thundershowers which proceeded to put out the vast blaze we had so carefully set? What was our reaction? Did we regret our bad luck, in having the experiment go wrong? Or did we experience, instead a sly taste of somewhat grim and tragic amusement, if there can be such a thing, over the trick our own experiment played on itself? Were we all loyal to this forest fire project? Or were we hoping that, when it triggered off the thunderstorms which put it out, we would learn some kind of lesson from this, and stop acting as if we were playing war in a landscape that doesn't count with people that don't count?

Mail Snooping The snooping systems operated by the U.S. Post Office Department are not merely aimed at possible derelictions of employes. Brother may also be keeping tab on your mail.

cover" on any individual who has
aroused "suspicion.' The applicant may
be the Federal Bureau of Investigation,
the Veterans Administration, the Portland police, or whatever. The request is
usually granted.

The mail is not read, not even opened. A postmaster or supervisor orders the carrier on the route involved to note all nformation on the outside of any enve-

information on the outside of any envelope or package addressed to an individual under "suspicion," including return address and name, time and place
of postmark. This information—on government form 2009—then goes into the
suspect's file.

On its face, the practice is despicable.
One's mail should be inviolate, unless it
is a direct factor in a crime so judged by
due process of law—such as mail fraud,
pornography, etc. A postman should not
be required to demean himself by participating in such "fishing" expeditions
directed against the people he serves. He
is not a policeman. More important, the
testimony has frightening implications
of insidious operations of bureaucracy.

Town to Issue Tax Warrants


