Did All Read The Same Speech? The Hartford Courant, which last week was complaining that no kind of sanity seemed to get to the President, finds that "President Johnson's speech on Vietnam at John Hopkins the other night ended a nightmare. Gone is the trigger-happy, bombs-and-more-bombs, we-can't-talk-peace policy that seemed inexplicable. In its place is the familiar America once more."

Joseph Alsop, one of the great hawks on Vietnam, is also writing in the Courant this morning, and we find, to our surprise, that he labels the President's speech at John Hopkins "a great speech." But most of the reasons he at least pretends to think so are still hawk-"crafty" in his timing, and in the kind of "carrot" he offers, and Alsop agrees, in his own words, with some of the appraisal made of the speech in this space yesterday. Alsop describes the speech by aying that "all this was stirred into one mprobable mixture like a sort of oratorical marble cake." But the net meanng of it all Alsop interprets as this: that President Johnson has, by this speech, made the final "grim decision, this time, to go to the very end of the road if need be in order to avoid the terrible defeat that seemed to threaten in

Vietnam only a little while ago." Somehow, then, Hawk Alsop, unlike the Courant editorial this morning, thinks the President delivered the great There is a similar parting of minds,

it so happens, on the editorial page of the New York Times this morning. The Times editorial labels itself "New Policy, New Phase," and opens with the hopeful statement:

"The applause of the free world-and surely—of a great majority of Americans reflects the fact that in his John Hopkins speech on Vietnam, President Johnson has enunciated a new policy and therefore opened a new and hopeful phase of the conflict. "An offer to negotiate without prior

conditions, coupled with an offer of vast conomic aid, coupled further with a restatement of support for South Vietnam until it is safely independentthese are basic ingredients for an honorable peace. This does not mean that peace will automatically or quickly follow. Hanoi is silent and Peking has already summarily rejected the Johnson proposals. In Moscow the published account of the speech glaringly omitted the offer of unconditional negotiation. The United States has won a moral battle-mainly with itself-but the war

The New York Times has its hawk on Vietnam in the person of C. L. Sulzberger, and his reaction in his column this morning is upset and worried, as we expected the normal reaction of hawks to the speech to be. Sulzberger, who began advocating
