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Southeast Asia Plan's Chief Old Hand at Big Finances

WASHINGTON (AP)—Richard B. Black, who will head a Southeast Asian secretary's prime team of distinguished American leaders to formulate an expanded international development program for Southeast Asia, is an old hand at dealing with big figures.

For 13 years he headed the World Bank which has lent millions of dollars to underdeveloped nations. Before that he was a senior vice president of the Chase National (now Chase Manhattan) Bank of New York. President Johnson proposed Wednesday night that the United States contribute \$1 billion to aid development of Southeast Asia and said Black would head U.S. participation in the enterprise.

The U.N. Special Fund, of which Black is a director, is already at work on planning development of the Mekong River region of Southeast Asia, including Viet Nam, Laos, Cambodia and Thailand. Johnson said he hoped U.N. Secretary-General U Thant would initiate an increased development program.

And Johnson also said "I hope all other industrialized countries—including the Soviet Union—will join in this effort to replace despair with hope and terror with progress."

Black was named by President Johnson as U.S. ambassador to Germany in 1967. Two years later he became U.S. ambassador to West Germany. He has been in Germany since then.

Black lives at Princeton, N.J., with his wife of 22 years, the former Rosette Heath of Atlanta. They have three grown children, two sons and a daughter.

Opening lead—King of Hearts.

West leads his high hearts, and South ruffs the second round. Then South goes down in declarer's suit, and very considerable artistry, in the lowest register she fails noticeably, but above this she is in excellent control of her vocal apparatus, and in general she is a charming singer.

One must speak of the excellence of her diction, something with which too few singers concern themselves sufficiently. NEW YORK—Stroke constitutes the most devastating killer in the civilized world today. In the United States 200,000 people will die this year because of the cerebro-vascular disease. More are crippled than any other illness.

Farr was noticeably the best exponent of Mozart on the stage, even though Miss Miller has been hailed in New York for her success with the composer.

Mr. Farr showed great sensitivity throughout, accompanying Miss Miller in the Mendelssohn and American works as well. His support was sensitively lyrical and beautifully adapted to the voice of the soloist. Then he surpassed himself with the accompaniment to "Mendelssohn" by Richard Strauss, added in response to the applause of the audience.

The orchestra was also impressive in the Prelude to "Die Meistersinger" which was a bit stolidly done, but which was a very notable performance on the whole for any student orchestra. Wagner has been out of fashion for so long that Mr. Heller is not altogether conversant with the composer, but he was much more convincing when he had to lead previously been with Mozart.

Bernard A. Dion Submits Resignation of Town Posts

Bernard A. Dion has submitted his resignation effective as of May 1 as town assessor, building inspector, zoning agent, and deputy sanitary.

Dion, who started his work with the town in February of 1962, is seeking a position as assistant building inspector in Manchester.

The Republican Town Committee has endorsed Atty. Donald B. Caldwell of Ellington for an appointment to fill one of the three vacancies of judges in the Court of Common Pleas.

A letter is being sent to GOP State Central Committee Chairman A. George Finney to this effect.

Caldwell, who is affiliated with a law firm in Rockville, is also a taxpayer in Coventry.

The local GOP committee also endorsed a bill introduced in the present legislature by the Litchfield County Association of Selectmen and Mayors providing for increases to the town aid (roads) funds by \$5,100,000.

A letter is being sent to the Litchfield Association advising of this action and offering any support townpeople can give.

Passage of this bill would mean an additional \$70,000 minimum or a \$72,884 maximum, providing one of the alternatives provisions is approved to the town, according to Coventry Second Selectman Donald S. Davis, who is president of the Connecticut Selectmen's Association.

Davis told the GOP meeting Tuesday night the CSA is also advising the Litchfield Association of its support of the bill.

Madison Deb is a new member of the local town committee, replacing Robert C. MacChugge, who resigned because he was moving out of town.

MacChugge was also the Republican alternate on the local zoning board of appeals. The town committee voted that Albert W. Fryer be suggested his replacement on this board.

Bolton Lengthy Agenda Will Face School Board on Monday

The board of education here another long agenda drawn up for its regular monthly meeting Monday at 8 p.m. in the main office of the high school.

The board is expected to take action on the Tele-Lecture program, a telephone and loud-speaker system for bringing outside speakers into the classroom, demonstrated earlier this year and postponed for possible trial this spring, and creation of music and art positions on the basis of requests last month for an additional music teacher and a part-time art teacher for 1965-66, the board will also consider specifications and renovations of the elementary school, details of which were promised by the superintendent at this meeting; 1965-66 teacher salary schedule; Bolton public schools summer program; approval of the chemistry laboratory equipment list to be sent to the public building commission as an amendment to the movable equipment list, and a teacher candidate.

The superintendent's report will contain a science department report, an adult education report, a motor vehicle report with respect to school buses, a discussion of policies with respect to placing a teacher on the master's degree salary schedule, a request by the guidance director, the elementary school principal and the coaches to set up a salary negotiation meeting with the board.

This report will include a state of the budget report, approval of the home economics activities account, payment of electric light bill for street lights not on the school property, and a report of boiler inspection at the elementary school.

The board is expected to discuss the use of school equipment by outside agencies, consideration of industrial arts equipment for 1966-67, and a policy change on standing committees and elimination of policies with regard to audience participation at board meetings.

This last item is the result of two requests made at the last open meeting of the board. Mrs. Claire Warfel, board secretary, requested that a bills committee be set up. This would necessitate a policy change since there are no standing committees and since all executive matters had been delegated to the superintendent.

Because of complaints by townspeople attending the last meeting that they were never given a chance to ask questions or comment at board meetings, the board said it would consider a short question-and-answer period some time during each meeting. This would also necessitate a policy change, since no person not scheduled to appear can speak except by vote of the board.

Added to the agenda will probably be a discussion of the selection of members to increase the board of education from seven to nine members. According to statutes, this would dissolve the present board at the fall elections, when normally only three of its members would finish their terms. It would also lengthen the term of all board of education members, from the initial staggering of terms, from four to six years.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A motorist made a high-speed call from the Hollywood Freeway and ran through a red light. But the driver had a quick alibi for the California Highway Patrol officers who halted him: "If I make any sudden stops my wife will be breakfast. It makes her mad."

The officer looked into the car. There sat the driver's wife, a plate of bacon and eggs in her lap.

Patrol officers list this among the most surprising alibis yet for traffic offenses — although, as a compilation by administrative aides shows, Southern California's officers must by now have surely heard them all.

Like the time the gray-haired woman roared her powerful motor past a stop sign at a flashing red light, and explained when caught: "But officer, I went through between flashes."

Or the night Patrolman E. B. Foster stopped a motorist speeding 50 m.p.h. in a 25 m.p.h. zone during a heavy fog. The driver's excuse: "It was so foggy I couldn't read my speedometer."

It was Foster also who talked to a lady whose car had rolled into another when she left it at the curb to mail a letter: "Why didn't you set your emergency brake, ma'am?" asked Foster.

"Emergency?" she said. "I'm mailing a letter an emergency?"

Patrolman Henry Hopkins remembers a driver he stopped for doing 50 in 25-mile zone. Said Hopkins: "He said his fuel gauge read empty, and he was trying to get to a gas station before it ran out."

"Non-sensical excuses saved the motorists from traffic tickets. But Foster, whose best in South Los Angeles, remembers once he stopped a young woman for speeding and she told him she was hurrying because she had left her purse in a market and wanted to recover it before someone grabbed it.

"All right," said Foster, tired of alibis. "Let's go."

He escorted her back to the store and went in with her. There on the counter was the young woman's purse. She didn't get a ticket.

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Rockville Mayor Flaherty Takes Stand In Former Policeman's Suit

Mayor Leo B. Flaherty Jr. today took a stand in a case now in Tolland County Superior Court, was called to the witness stand yesterday by the plaintiff's attorney, Sgt. Bartlett.

Flaherty, in two separate actions, is suing the mayor, the city and police commissioner Thomas J. McCusker for damages totaling \$100,000. The suit stems from action taken in 1961 when Bartlett was suspended and later demoted.

Mayor Flaherty testified that he had received several complaints regarding Sgt. Bartlett prior to the scheduling of public hearings for disciplinary action.

In one complaint, the mayor said, Bartlett was accused of ordering a slowdown when police were called to aid a dying person. Police were bringing a funeral casket to the person's home.

Other complaints involved Bartlett's alleged ordering a slowdown when policemen were called to aid a fellow officer in trouble, and once when police were called to aid a woman who was being sexually abused.

Flaherty said he had run for mayor at the time on a platform of not interfering with the police department.

Flaherty added that it is his firm belief that committees composed of members of the city council to administer various city agencies should have no authority to interfere with the police department.

"I was informed of the complaints and invited to attend a meeting of the police commission," the mayor said. But he added that he did not use his suspension power against Bartlett.

"I was trying to protect him," Mayor Flaherty said.

He was informed of Bartlett's plan to sue the city and the police department.

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Massive Air Strike Staged, Navy Jets Battle Red MIGs

planes over North Viet Nam but did not engage them.

On Sunday, a massive air strike was staged against North Viet Nam. The Navy planes involved in the battle today were F4C Phantom II fighters and F4U Corsair fighters. The Phantom II fighters were equipped with "anti-MIG" missiles.

About 140 U.S. Navy planes were involved in the strike. The planes were based at the U.S. Naval Air Station in Da Nang.

Both the reinforcements and the original contingent of planes landed last month from the U.S. Navy's 7th Fleet.

The statement said a battalion of Marines and a squadron of Navy jet fighters will land shortly in Viet Nam.

To "improve security in this area," an additional battalion of Marines will be landed into the area.

Some 30 U.S. Air Force bombers and fighters struck two vital bridges in North Viet Nam today, U.S. officials said.

The officials said the raiders struck the bridges at Qui Nhon, 10 miles north of the border, and at the Han, 20 miles northeast of the border. One is a railroad bridge and the other a road bridge.

A South Vietnamese military court in Saigon today ordered the execution of two Viet Cong terrorists, one for taking part in the U.S. Embassy bombing and the other for trying to blow up an American officers' billet.

No date was set for either execution, but it was believed they would be carried out swiftly.

The court sentenced the driver of the getaway motorbike in the embassy bombing, Nguyen Van Hai, despite the Viet Cong's threat to execute an American official in reprisal.

In an afternoon session, the court gave a death sentence to Tran Van Dung, who was arrested March 20 near the Saigon airport with 20 pounds of high explosive on his motor scooter.

Dung said he and an accomplice who escaped were going to blow up an airplane at an air base in the area.

Last Saturday three MIA's were reported to have been rescued.

Small Shed Fire Erupts, Homes Are in Danger

Fire Chief Francis Lamerick of the 8th District was one of the first to arrive at a small shed fire on Woodland St. last night.

The fire, reportedly started by the owner of the shed in an effort apparently to finish in a hurry the project of demolishing the small structure, was initially observed by a passer-by. The latter then called Chief Lamerick.

When Chief Lamerick arrived at the scene, the fire was reaching uncontrollable proportions and threatened to engulf neighboring homes and garages in its wake if not immediately stopped. A call for help brought a fire crew to the blaze at about 8 p.m.

At least 1,000 gallons of water were required to smother the flames which were being engaged to consume the entire structure as the owner allegedly refused to leave the premises. Chief Lamerick stated today his judgment that this time of year was still a poor one for burning and requested that property owners in general refrain from setting fires in more favorable conditions arise.

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Woman Says City Owes Her \$385 for Faulty Water Bills

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Victoria Weichler says the city of Houston owes her \$385 because of overcharges on her water bill dating back to 1964.

The 78-year-old woman, who has a file in the City Water Department almost as big as the water line.

"I'm on your side," Mayor Louis Welch told her.

Mrs. Weichler, wearing a black cotton dress with lace at the wrists and a small straw hat, smiled and nodded.

Mrs. Ross said her aunt built a private water line from the city system to her home years ago. In 1944, 1947 and 1951, the city erroneously permitted three homes to hook onto the line.

All the water used in those homes ran through Mrs. Weichler's meter. She and the users both paid the city for it.

"The city agreed to pay my aunt an additional \$385 if it would let the city have the water line," Mrs. Ross said. "We lived up to our part of the bargain but my aunt can't collect from the city."

The city legal department said the statute of limitations had run out.

Mrs. Ross said her aunt had supported herself for 30 years with a small amount of property left by her parents.
