





least the stringing of lines at one cross-ing point so that the damage that has already been done to the country side mum.

Connecticut Yankee finally bowed to public pressure in agreeing to guarantee that fish life destruction would not e allowed to occur if it turned out that damage would be created by discharg ing hot water into the river. The company also used good sense in planning the location of high tension wires leaving the atomic plant going north. Mini-mal despoliation of the scenery will be caused in this area, and Connecticut Yankee seems to have acceded to re

quests governing where to place the towers on Seymour Park — although turning down the request to put lines derground in the park where possi-The problem is that utilities in this state have tremendous powers. They can condemn nearly anything they wish. They can criss-cross the state without any regard for its beauties, and they justify extension of high tension lines justify extension of high tension lines on the grounds that more power is needed. More power will be needed every year. At the rate of expansion, it will be impossible to avoid looking at a high tension wire just about anywhere in the county. Con-necticut will eventually resemble a spi-der web. And what is more ugly than

the scars the utility companies leave against the hillsides and the moun-tains? tains?

Hartford Electric Light Company's decision to jump the river in two places (one existing) near its Maromas plant, combined with Connecticut's crossing a few miles below the Maromas plant just wreaks more destruction to the river and ridges.

Unless the utility companies care to use a little more sense in their despoilations, the day will come when an aroused public overdoes the restrictions placed on them. If the utilities companies continue to insist that they have to go overland everywhere, regardless of the circumstances, they are asking for trouble.


