On this underneath level, the level of human want and need, ere are many varieties of grievance, renging from that of those who want to open their personal war against poverty by getting jobs helping to run the anti-poverty program itself up to the word of those who are idealistically erned with having such a noble to proceed as directly as possible to

While there is this kind of questioning of the efficiency and directness of gion of those who expect to be helped by e program, there is the beginning of eriticism from Republican spokesmen who combine their own philosophical pervations about such a program with their quick sense of an opportunity to charge a Democratic administration with playing a political shell game with human misery.

Hetween these two brands of critieism of the anti-poverty program, there is a third kind of appraisal, that being made by the middle-ground public. We believe there were, and are, mil-Hons of Americans, well enough off themselves, who welcome the idea of a full-fledged national crusade against poverty. It makes sense for us, the most powerful nation in the world, to be able to get around to trying to take care of that one-fifth of our own population which can be classified as underprivi-

And we believe millions of Americans are prepared to continue support of such a crusade even though they are completely aware that a proportion of the money and energy and benefit involved is going to be siphoned off into the waste and indirections of the political process.

But if this moderate section of the public is going to support the anti-poverty program against the disillusionment of the underprivileged and the critical analysis of the watchful potential Republican candidates, there will have to be imposed, from some level, some degree of restraint.

Across this wide land of ours there has, in the weeks since the anti-poverty erusade was launched, been one almos universal spectacle.

It has been the spectacle of all arms and levels of government, national, federal, and city and town, engaged in a feverish search for angles by which they can tie some of their existing functions into the anti-poverty angle so they can get their share of the forthcoming fedseral loot. Suddenly, there is no kind of govern-

mental activity, in state of community, which is not sprouting anti-poverty wings and labels.

Everybody wants to get a hand into the latest grab-bag.

As we said before, many of those who support the crusade most enthusiast sally are realistic enough to know that waste and politics are inevitably going to be involved and be part of the proc ess. But there ought to be some proportion and limit, and there ought to be some firm guidelines which reserve some of the money and energy to a aci-entific approach to the problem.

If the unti-poverty program is really going to mean anything great for this sountry or anything historic for the Johnson administration, it is going to be because it begins a scientific cure of the disease of poverty, and not merely pecuses it passes out a few more boxes of emekerjacies to its victims. It is this

chance and prospect of dealing with the causes rather than the symptoms which seems to be dwindling while the raids of the politicians and the siphoning of the state and community spending buresugracies grow more bold and univer-

Subway Without Violence

A new subway line over in Milan, Italy, eight miles long and with 23 stations, is equipped with a closed-circuit television system which enables its stationmaster to keep watch on all its platforms from his central office. It cost about \$185,000 to install this

system. It was designed to give the stationmaster a perpetual check on traffic conditions, and to enable him to watch the safety of operations. If he should see somebody jump or fall onto the tracks, for instance, he could shut off power from his own master switch. It is an incidental piece of intelligence that, in the five months the new subway line has been operating in Milan, there has not been a single act of criminal violence committed in any of its trains or stations. If there had been, the television could have been very helpful. But the television wasn't installed with the idea that it would be a weapon against crime, and no one seems to be giving the television credit for the fact that the new subway hasn't had a sin-

gle instance of crime to report. What is the explanation? It is not, we think, that the population of Milan happens to be more law-abiding than the population of any other of the world's large cities.

We think the explanation is that the subway is new and clean. And, if New York City should ever think that it could afford it, the first big campaign we would recommend against crime in its subway system would be to buy and apply about 50,000 gallons of paint. It is not strange, but natural, we think, that the dirtiest, darkest, ugliest subway system in the world should draw to itself the ugliest brand of human conduct.

A Question Of Mutation

A few days ago Dr. Benjamin Spock led a crowd of 3,000 parents and children to the United Nations building to demand an immediate cease-fire in Vietnam—even after President Johnson had made his offer of "unconditional" discussions with the Communist aggres-

The exercise engineered by the famed pediatrician is, of course, quite typical of a sizable and vocal minority of Americans, especially in the fields of science and the humanities, who appear to oppose almost any kind of war, chief-ly because of the danger of its devel-oping into nuclear conflict. These groups go by such names as the Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy, Women Strike for Peace and the Student Peace Union.

unimaginably horrible in itself but that it would be likely to bring unwelcome genetic mutations in the surviving gen-erations. That, in turn, is one reason do in fact go to considerable lengths to avoid atomic conflict, although not many of them subscribe to the proposition that world communism is an acceptable alternative.
In the U.S. Government the attitude

is that these are not necessarily alter-natives at all; by our maintaining a strong defense the Communists, it is hoped, can be deterred from launching a nuclear attack. But since that prospect is obviously not a certainty, we think it intellectually of some interest to look at the argument about mutation. What the argument apparently overlooks is that the human being has undergone drastic mutations from the time he first appeared on the scene. Anthropologists and other scientists are constantly pushing that time, on the basis of accumulating evidence, farther back into the reaches of prehistory; it is conceivable that ancestors of man were reasoned about as long as 30 million

roaming about as long as 30, million years ago. Even then, there are enormous stretches of man's development where knowledge is nonexistent.

A growing body of scientific belief is also coming to the view that man did not inherit his aggressive, or killer, instinct from the lower animals in the customary evolutionary sense. It's theorized, for example, that more than one kind or

man-like creature emerged; in this opinion one type was a fairly pacific vegetarian and the present homo sapiens lerived from a creature that mutations made aggressive, predatory and violent.

As one authority wryly puts it, "Man appears to be the missing link between anthropoid apes and human beings."

However much credence anyone gives to such as religious and human being a such as a link as a to such scientific speculation, if it has a germ of truth it suggests that the vision

germ of truth it suggests that the vision of a perfect and perpetual peace is not consonant with man's inherent nature, unless indeed that nature somehow experiences another profound mutation. The fact that is incontrovertible is that the mutations that have occurred—in brain size, skull shape and other ways—

brain size, skull shape and other ways—
are of staggering degree.

Moreover, some experts now think
that man is capable of arranging awesome further mutations for himself, entirely without reference to nuclear war.
In an article printed in the National
Observer, Dr. Arthur W. Galston, professor of plant physiology at Yale, suggests that current knowledge of cellular
processes makes it theoretically possible
to fashion people (or whatever they
should be called) by preconceived destern.

"See now." says Professor Galston,
"What a tool this puts into the hands
of man. If he is able to culture his own
self... he is really at the threshold of
Aldous Huxley's 'Brave New World'. Alpho phuses, the intellectuals, and epsilon
minuses, the hewers of wood and drawers of water, could be produced at will
by simple variation of the nutrient
medium in which tissue-cultured men
would be developed in sterilized glass
verseis."

What a tool, one might add as a chilling footnote, it would put in the hands of a totalifarian authority. And what all of this seems to us to indicate is that the matter of mutation, past and possible for the future, raises issues far too involved to be answered by a simple decrying of nuclear war, tinctively recoil from thinking about danger. - WALL STREET JOUR.
