Italy's Premier Moro Is Patient Pessimist

ROME (AP) — Italy's Premier Aldo Moro, visiting the United States this week, is a patient pessimist.

The premier, 46, is tall, handsome and slenderly elegant. He has a friendly smile that adds charm and a white mustache to his dark hair and adds distinction.

But he is no showman. He is a genuine expert of capital. He has a reputation as a man who prefers to work in the wings. He was the backstage craftsman who designed center-left government for Italy and who finally had to become premier when efforts failed to make the center-left government.

Even as head of government, he has clung to the privacy of his home in Rome, and has stayed as far back on the political stage as his office will allow.

He is not a popular political frontman. How he rocketed to success is one of the mysteries of Italian politics.

"This will be Moro's first visit to America. Twice before in 1961 and 1964, Moro was invited to talk with the president. Each time the visit had to be postponed while Moro fought out a government crisis.

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Marines Build, Pay for Chapel At Da Nang Base

DA NANG, South Viet Nam (AP) — Besides carrying out the most intensive air war since Korea, U.S. Marines here are building a chapel and paying for it themselves.

The United States has poured millions of dollars into Da Nang Air Base, which has a key role in bombing raids on North Viet Nam and Communist-held sections of Laos. The base is jointly occupied with the Vietnamese Air Force.

The largest chunk of construction money went into such items as runway and maintenance facilities and equipment. Many of the airman sleep in tents and the base commander lives in a trailer.

The Marines on Da Nang Air Base have their own chapel and the Army advisory team for 1st Army Corps plans to build one soon. The Air Force says it has no money available.

"So we decided to raise the money ourselves and build our own," says Capt. Wayne L. Stork, Protestant chaplain from Greenwald, Ind.

An airman filed through the line recently they donated \$120 toward the \$2,000 project. Stork says the rest of the money will be raised with further efforts for donations and possibly through a casino project.

Sheinwoold on Bridge

COUNT POINTS FOR PLAY AS WELL AS FOR BRIDGING BY ALFRED SHEINWOOLD

Most bridge players show 10 to 12 points with an opening bid of one no trump, using the familiar count of 4 points for each ace, 2 for each king, 3 for each queen, and 1 for each jack.

This is meant to be useful to the partner, but an opponent may profit from the information.

Opening lead — Queen of Hearts.

West opened the queen of hearts and continued the suit, forcing South to ruff. Declarer knocked the ace of trumps, and South then tried the club finesse, leading to the king as expected. Back came another heart, and South ruffed again. Now South could not afford to lose a diamond trick.

Declarer cashed the ace of diamonds and led a diamond to try a finesse with dummy's king. This led to the queen, and South was down one.

Should you?

When South tackled the diamonds he knew that East had started with the ace-king in hearts (7 points), the ace of spades (4 points) and the king of clubs (3 points). These cards gave East 14 points, and the only card that could give him 16 points showed by his ruffing the ace was the queen of diamonds.

In short, the diamond finesse was sure to lose. The only chance was a "backward" ruff.

Declarer should begin the diamonds by leading the jack from dummy. East must cover with the queen (since otherwise

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Clock Turning Begins Again Confusion Season Starts Sunday

NEW YORK (AP)—The nation's clock will be turned back one hour today to begin the daylight saving time (DST) season. The confusion will begin at midnight Sunday, when the clock will be set back one hour to 1:00 a.m. from 2:00 a.m. on Saturday.

Daylight saving time (DST) will soon be here for much of the country. This is what has created the confusion.

The DST clock turning will affect business, transportation and other activities.

Next Sunday 300 million Americans in 20 states will advance clocks one hour and then get out of step with the other 80 million Americans. These other 80 million will either shift DST on different dates or will remain on standard time.

Thus, the country will become a patchwork of time.

Benjamin Franklin is credited, or blamed for DST. It's said that, when ambassador to France, he awoke one morning and found himself yawning through his window while the city slept.

"I'm wretched" sunlight annoyed the frugal author of Poor Richard's Almanac. He decided to evolve a plan to conserve the daylight by advancing the clock one hour.

DST achieved its first widespread observation in 1883 when the country it was adopted throughout the country to give farmers some uniformity into the picture.

Next Monday Congress is due to begin action on legislation that would eliminate the DST law. The Senate Commerce Committee will hold a hearing on a bill proposed by the Committee on Time Uniformity, which was formed by the Transportation Association of America.

The bill would fix the last Sunday of April and the last Sunday of October as the DST starting and ending dates. The remaining states didn't observe DST at all.

Here are some of the things that happen:

—An airplane takes off in Washington, D.C., according to the clock, lands in Norfolk five minutes before it was airborne.

—Pennsylvania tries to run its state business on standard time while residents more than 600 communities try to remember that their towns are on DST.

—By law, trains run on standard time. The clock is turned back three days whenever they arrive in a DST community.

—West Coast businessmen are getting ready to go to work when the East Coast hasn't even a day in it.

Bogalusa's Racial Strife Differs from Other Cities

BOGALUSA, La. (AP)—The racial rights conflict which has kept this southern Louisiana town on the news is showing some marked differences from similar tests in the Deep South.

Observers here note a relatively minor role played by local Negro ministers and church leaders.

Many white citizens say Negroes face no barriers to voter registration in Bogalusa and that they don't remember any of the community has been chosen as a target for civil rights demonstrations.

Negro leaders contend that Bogalusa has a history of Klan Klan too much power, and that as a result the 20-year-old Civil and Voters League turned militant.

"This place is something else," said Wilfred T. Usery, vice chairman of the National Congress of Racial Equality. "I've never seen so many guns."

One group here is the Deacons of Defense and Justice, a Negro "defense team" group. It says, "I'm in 1953 days of straight combat in Europe in World War II when I was a platoon sergeant in a tank outfit. The war is over and things are about as bad as they were then."

"When you drive into that area at night, turn on the dome light of your car so they can see who you are," advised an FBI agent. "Make a lot of noise; don't seem to be making a sound."

The Deacons say they are not affiliated with any group.

"If it wasn't for the Deacons, I know the Klan would already have come into here and killed or whipped the leaders of this movement," said Young. "But the Deacons give them something to think about."

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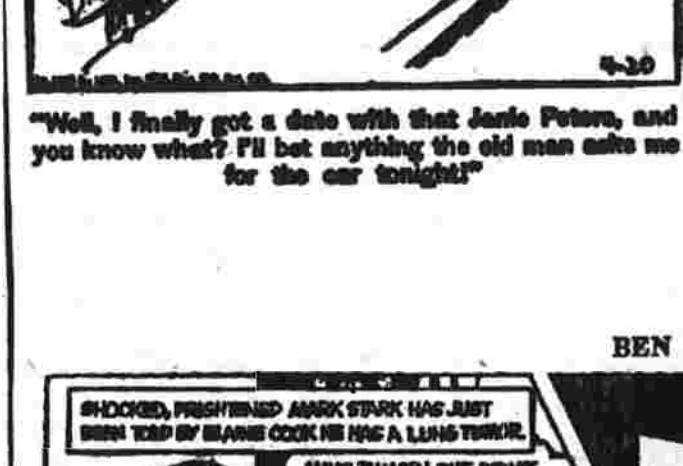
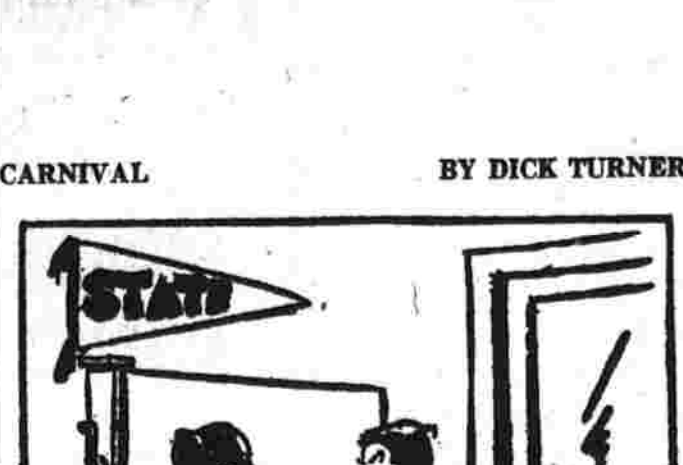
