Hospital's Psychiatric Plan Unique

GREENWICH (AP) — What has come to be known as "The Greenwich Plan" is today a topic of lively debate in Connecticut.

Under the plan, psychiatric patients are admitted to all floors and rooms of Greenwich Hospital without segregation. The extent to which the hospital has developed this non-segregated admission program makes it unique in the state.

"General hospital is despoiling of the name unless it does admit a wide spectrum of mental disorders," said Dr. Max Pappas, director of the Mental Health Planning project of the State Department of Mental Health.

"Half of all current hospital bed usage in the United States is for the mentally ill. Inclusion of such patients in general community hospitals helps to de-stigmatize and de-mythologize illness. It no longer can be regarded as awesome and fearful."

Although many Connecticut community hospitals have stated policies of excluding psychiatric patients, there is a growing tendency to attempt to treat these patients in their own community hospital.

Many general hospitals are creating a special psychiatric floor or wing, as opposed to the Greenwichean plan.

Dr. Pappas has outlined arguments both for and against the plan. The argument against it holds that some mental patients need special recreational and occupational therapy services which are hard to provide when patients are scattered through a large hospital.

The argument for it is that the patient is not excluded and harassed. Psychiatrists and other medical practitioners do not divide into two camps. Instead, there is a growing tendency to attempt to treat these patients in their own community hospital.

Midget Sub Starts Family of Vehicles

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 15-knot midget submarine now under development is the first of a new family of subs that eventually may probe the ocean floor as far down as 20,000 feet.

President Johnson announced Sunday that the Navy and the Atomic Energy Commission are jointly developing what was called a "deep submergence research and ocean engineering vehicle."

Few details were given, but it is understood the craft will be designed to operate down to about 1,000 feet — more than enough depth to explore the Continental Shelf.

It will be about 60 feet long — roughly one-fourth the length of a full-scale submarine. It will be manned by about six men, compared with crews of more than 100 men in regular size subs.

The single nuclear engine will give the midget submarine unlimited underwater endurance.

However, the human limitations of the crew will have to be taken into account in planning submergence missions.

The atomic power plant also will give the research sub untested maneuverability, unlike the bathyscaph Trieste which is capable of only very restricted operations.

The sub will be relatively slow — somewhere between 5

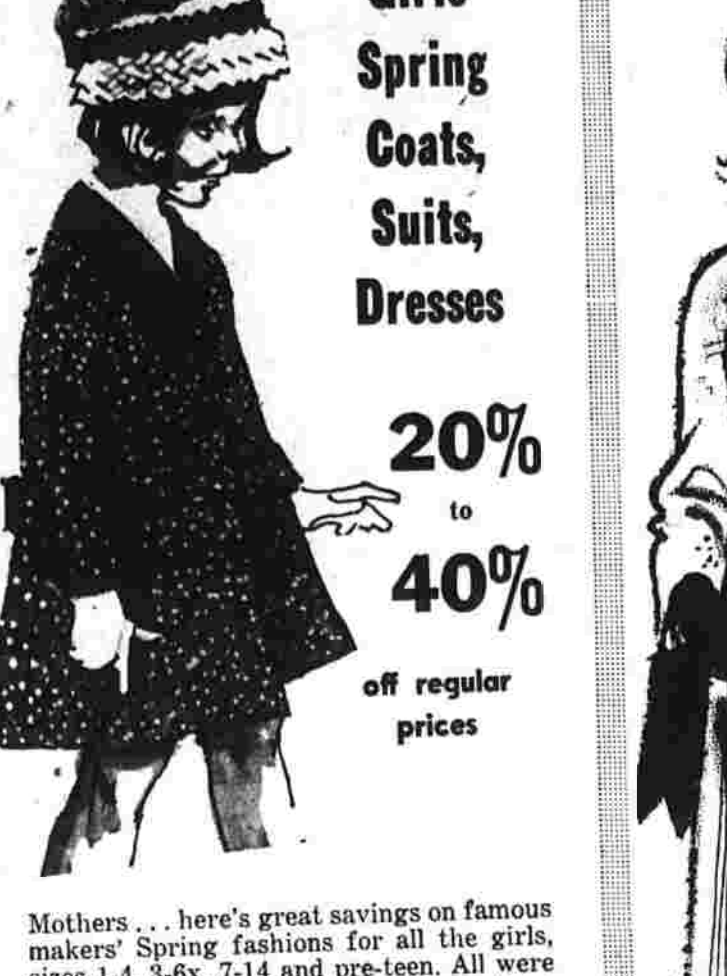

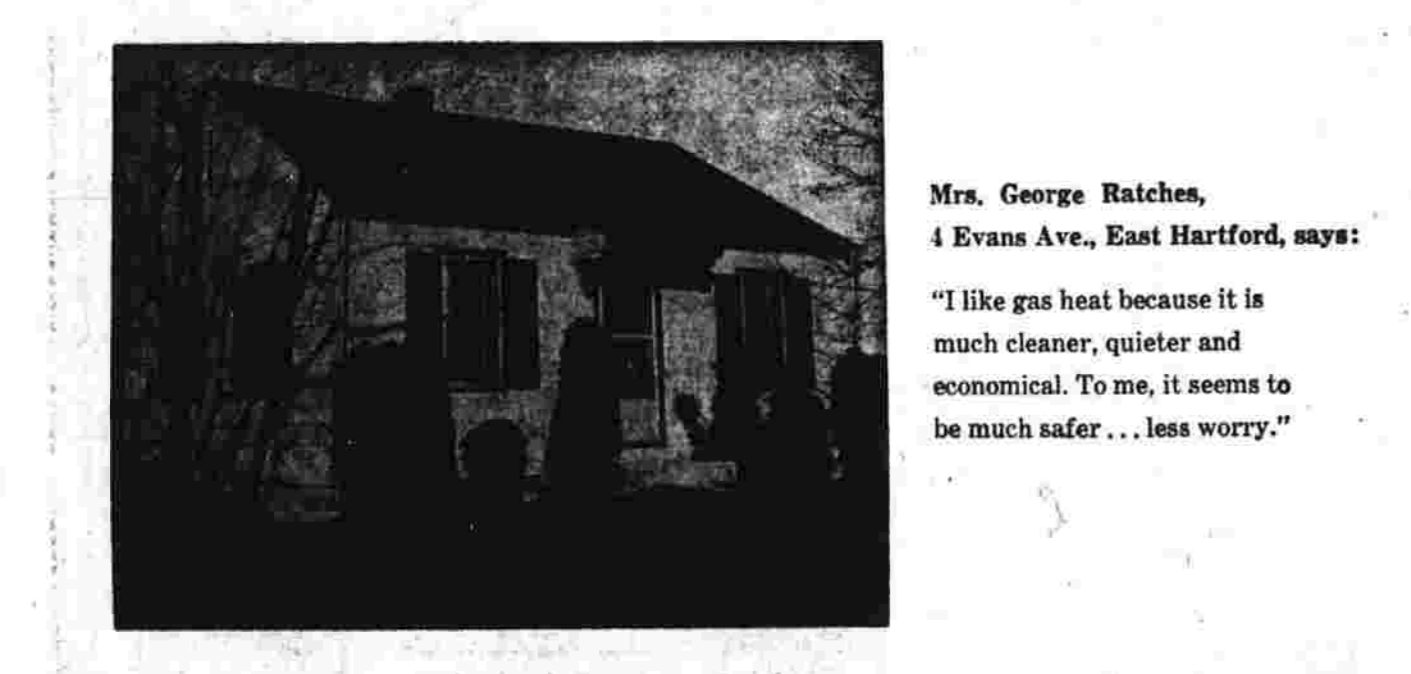

First Cheney Home Doomed

Unless somebody will remove it from its present location, the very first Cheney home to be built within the Town of Manchester will be demolished sometime early this summer.

The house was built, according to Cheney family records, sometime before 1707—the date noted on the chimney of the building. It was the home of Benjamin Cheney, who became the first Cheney in what was later to become Manchester when he moved here in 1724.

The house has been occupied most of the time by Cheney descendants, even after it was renovated and added to, however, somewhat changing its original appearance.

Edgar Clarke, a town insurance agent, bought the house in 1943. His family moved to a new home about two years ago, and the building has been the site of Clark's insurance business and other offices—including the American Cancer Society and the American Red Cross—since.

Clarke agreed last year to sell the house and land to Atty. Herman Yules, who proposed to develop the property with apartments. The transaction was finally completed and a building permit for four parallel apartment buildings—on four newly drawn lots—was issued this month.

The apartments, which will include 72 units in four buildings about 240 feet long, will require the removal or the demolition of the old Cheney House.

According to Atty. Yules, the house is available for the selling. But it must be removed in about three months—the period of time Clarke and his present tenants may stay in the building.

When Atty. Yules and Clarke first began negotiations last year, the town considered buying all or part of the property. Purchase of all or part of the property was rejected, however, as being too expensive.

Silly Putty Finder Now Millionaire

NEW YORK (AP) — Lost to be overlooked in the rush of world events, this Easter season is the 10th anniversary of the introduction of a chemical curiosity that has bounced its way around the globe.

It was discovered as a by-product of the government's effort to create synthetic rubber during World War II. And it was unknown — useless, that is, until a flat-broke advertising and marketing specialist came across it.

The special, Peter Hodgson, 46, named it silly putty. He is no longer flat broke.

Hodgson made the pink substance into a multimillion-dollar adult toy which, soon found its best market among children.

It also has broken up boring Wall Street meetings, and delighted Muscovites at a U.S. plastics exhibit behind the Iron Curtain.

Its public acceptance can be seen not only in the sales charts, but also in the way silly putty has worked itself into the language. In just the last month prominent writers have used the name to describe a prize-fighter's body, a comedian's face and an actor's performance.

Silly putty came into being in 1944. James Wright, an engineer working in General Electric's New Haven, Conn., laboratory, tossed a handful of boric acid into some silicone oil, a liquid refined from sand. The gooey result bounced when he tossed it on the floor, but failed as a substitute for rubber.

Nevertheless, it remained around for years, a conversation piece and plaything for Wright's friends and professional colleagues, mainly for its seemingly extraordinary qualities.

It can be stretched or molded; balled up, it will bounce; struck suddenly with a hammer, it will shatter; flattened out, it will pick up pictures from a comic book; left alone, it will flow slower than molasses into a steel puddle.

Hodgson, born in Montreal and raised in Norfolk, Va., had been a salesman, advertising copy writer, marketing consultant, wartime railroad troop traffic manager and magazine research director. But he was broke and jobless when he found his gold mine.

Working in a basement with a Yale student as a helper, Hodgson had to borrow \$167.50 to pay for the first shipment of the substance. He put small amounts of silly putty into toy plastic eggs retailing for 11¢ and got them onto the national market.

Within six months, 30 Yale students were helping Hodgson create the orders and he was receiving a clear profit of \$10,000.

Now 125 employees help him in a \$5-million annual business. In addition to the New Haven plant, there is a subsidiary operation in Canada. He is negotiating to open others this year in Japan and West Germany and just received an inquiry about a possible plant in Mexico.

And the once flat-broke advertising man relaxes on an 86-acre hilltop at Madras, Conn., with a swimming pool, tennis court and an old farm house 400 feet above the Long Island Sound looking a view stretching almost from Orient Point to Oyster Bay.

"I can trace most everything I have to silly putty," said Hodgson, pleased.

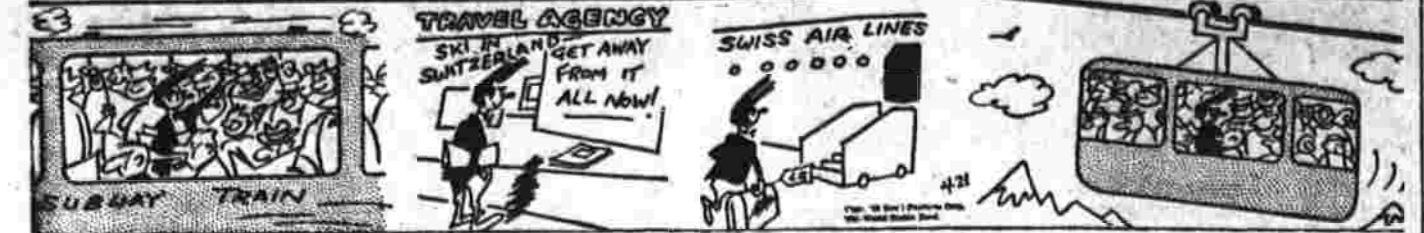

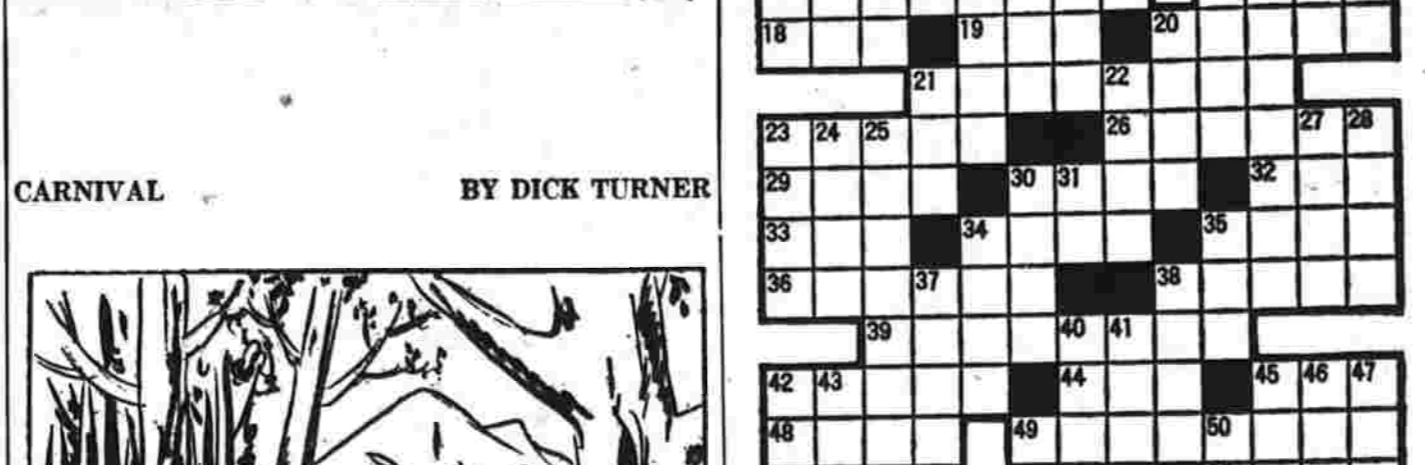
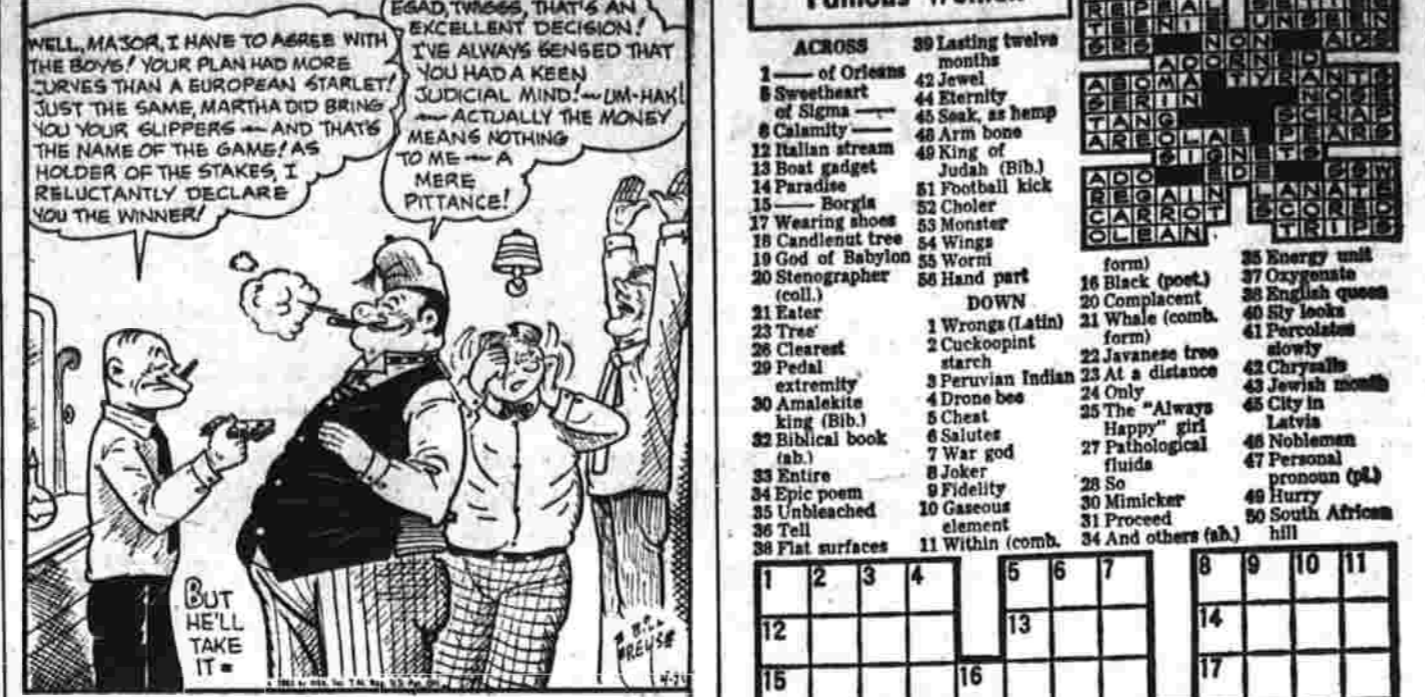
