





#### A Policy Of Lesser Risk?

Beneath the surface of the by-thistary of Defense McNamara that the war n Vietnam is to be "stepped up" yet once again, and apparently forever, there is beginning to be discerned another possibility which, if it could become policy, would make a somewhat as disastrous job of a disaster situa-

There is no good solution for our problems in Vietnam. There is no easy or guick way out. There are only choices between dangers and dissatisfactions.

But if, as now seems possible, the Johnson administration and all its soeager hawks of the policy adopted last February, have begun to realize that their policy has so far achieved nothing but the intensification of the chance of World War III, and if, therefore, they are now prepared to shift their emphasis from bombing North Vietnam back to the business of dealing directly with the guerrillas in South Vietnam-if this is so there are certain gains and

If we stay in South Vietnam, and, staying there, proclaim our intention of taking everything the guerrillas can our posture will be, in the eyes of the world, more moral and more legal than it has been since February.

If, in such a plan of operation, we lo increase American contribution to the war and American participation in it, we will also have decreased the risks of spreading the war because of our own ncreased role in it.

If we do adopt such a stance—that we are in South Vietnam and will stay there until we are satisfied as to the security of South Vietnam, no matter how many years it takes-we will be confining our action and our operation to what we claim it to be-a resistance to aggression. We will automatically be in a position which is ready for any reliable prospect of long term peace and stability. We will be in a position in which the other side can have a cease fire any time it wants it.

One of the chief liabilities of such a position and stance would develop in the domestic political arena, with the hawks decrying, once again, the idea of conducting a limited war, which does not openly aim at smashing and complete victory over the enemy. But the hawks have now had two and a half months of their own strategy, with, so far, no results which have not been opposite to those they claimed would re-

A second and more important liability would undoubtedly accumulate in South Vietnam itself, as both the weight and the length of our military stay there increased. The heavier and longer the role we play in South Vietnam, the more we are likely to be regarded, by the very people we say we are trying to protect, as the outside interloper, and the more we are likely to be suspected of coveting position and role in South Vietnam for our own national purposes rather than for any altruistic concern for the people of that

But there is no guarantee that going ahead to full, all-out war would heighten our popularity in South Vietnam or speed our eventual exit or lessen the amount of damage and disruption to Vietnamese life.

The time is inevitably going to come when the people of South Vietnam regard us as they have regarded every other occupying outside power in their history. Our humane objective and political policy, then, should be to accomplish our mission there—the protection of their sovereignty from military overthrow-with as little destruction as pos-

If we are now going to adjust our position and activity and policy in such direction, tacitly admitting the failure of our February policy, but fashioning ourselves a new strategy in which we have just as good a chance of attaining our own essential objective but much less chance of widening the war, that on at least be rated as a distinctly meer svil in a situation which offers no

These would-be party founders believe, to quote their own words, that "the most hated country in the world today is the government of our country." They profess to believe that "the initials U.S.A. which once stood for hope have replaced the crooked cross of Nazi Germany as the symbol of tyranny and death."

"The kings and queens and bishops of modern finance capital and their political pawns," the statement by the proposed new party went on as it warmed to its rhetoric, "have made it clear they will use every form of force and violence in their desperation to hold onto their stolen billions. We will be prepared to continue the struggle on whatever level and with whatever forms are

plete nonsense that used to come from the Russian Communists, when they were relatively young in their revolution. When they had not tried their own theories down to the hard, practical hilt, when they had not yet had some of their blinders removed from their appraisal of what really existed in the outside world, it was an easy matter for them to throw the whole wild book at us. They didn't know, then, that they themselves were never going to go quite as far down the revolutionary trail as they imagined, or that we, for our part, were always going to be softening and toning down some of the original in-

justices of capitalism. The Russian Communists have progressed through a certain amount of experience to a certain degree of sophistication. As a result, it isn't very much fun, being a Russian-style Communist in the United States any more. If you want to have fun, you shift to the Chinese Communist state of ignorance-ignorance about where Communism itself eventually stalls, and ignorance about the true evolving nature of American capitalism

#### Cows And St. George

Jousting with dragons, or providing the battle cry for Merrie England were not the only achievements for St. George. He also, by some process of affectionate evolution among the peasants of Europe, became the patron saint o cows going out to pasture. The practice of cows going out to pasture is almost as outmoded, these days, as the behavior of that sun which never used to be conceded a chance of ever setting on the British Empire. But it still provides, wherever cows are still depended upon to have that much energy, one of the great days of the year.

Where, in some of the countries of Europe, all cows still do go out to pasture, there still survives the tradition that they shall go out, with appropriate ceremony, on St. George's Day, which

This Friday, then, is the day to take your cows out to spring pasture for the first time. If you are to follow the custom in Europe's Alpine countries, you will have farm workers blowing trumpets as part of the procession. And, if it were in Europe, it might not be only the farmers who would serenade the cattle out into the warming airs, the prancing fields, of spring. People from the villages would come out too, and head up the country lanes, singing and praying with all that joy and plety the beginning of a new growing season inspires even in village folk.


There are not many lanes left hereabouts, and developments, apartment houses, supermarkets, multiple traffic lights and, golf courses stand athwart the ancient routes to pasture. The fine herds of yesteryear have long since been dispersed, and there's not very much chance, come Friday, of finding any true St. George's walk into the country to join. But here and there will still be a family cow or two, let loose from winter stanchions, high-tailing it across some miniature modern pasture, and if you see such a sight, you can at least remember that this was the way both farm boys and village folk used to feel in the spring, too.





Keeping tabs on the assistant superintendent of schools these spring days is no easy matter, for Ronald Scott is off on his annual search for teachers to fill vacancies that will exist in the schools next September.

ers to fill vacancies that will exist in the schools next September.

Being a talent scout occupies most of this semester and takes him along the length of the eastern seaboard. Yesterday, having just returned from Maine, Scott stopped by his office long enough to give a progress report.

"Things are slow this year," he said. "Normally, at this time about 55 teachers have told me they don't plan to return next year. But this year, I've heard from only 30."

Scott said that the law does not require a teacher to make a definite commitment until Aug. 1. But the slow rate or decision-making this year puts the school system in an embarrassing position, since the best teachers usually are hired early in the season, he said.

Perhaps fewer teachers plan to leave Mannchester. "I would be very surprised; in recent years from 60 to 65 teachers have left," he said.

Figures compiled by the State Department of Education on average teacher turnover in the state beak him up. In the past eight years the percentage of turnover has dropped less than two points. The 1964-66 state average is 125 per cent, about the same as Manchester's.
