The Future Speaks

There is no real reason why American policy makers should continue living in the impossible, outmoded past. The present and the future are always talking out loud.

The other day, for instance, Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin accepted an honorary degree from New York City, and part of his speech on this occasion read this way:

"It is time for us to emerge from the protective wrappings of the past and to act like an adult state in our relationship with other states."
"No one has the right to insist that Germany must be the child of its fathers. The German people have the right to determine their own future."
"We do not reject this outmoded hand of our youth because suspicion about their fathers has not yet been put to rest."

"No people can live without pride. This is as true for Germans as it is for any other people."

Who can really mistake the role being played in such oratory, or ignore the proclamation being made? What it says is that Germany is going to be free again, in our time, free of both Russia and the United States, and that these two great victor powers don't have enough to get out themselves, some great rising up of German youth and freedom will throw them both out.

It is that voice of the new Germany is strangely unlike the image of a permanently subservient and divided Germany some of us and some of our policy makers may be carrying around with them, another voice of the future speaks the decision of France to deliver a deliberate snub to the approaching meeting of the Ministerial Council of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization in London next month. France will not, like the other members of SEATO, send its foreign minister to this meeting, but will be represented merely by observers.

France, of course, is the nation who liberated from Hitler. And SEATO, of course, is the alliance the late Secretary Dulles set up to complete our world encirclement of Communism. But France has come to the stage where it has developed a policy of its own, and SEATO has never done anything except illustrate the preordained rigidity of regional alliances in a modern world. The rescued nation stands on its own two feet, not always in agreement with the rescuer. And no regional alliance ever proved stronger than divergent policies and interests of its members.

The world moves on, and it tells us so. One presumes that, some day, Washington will seek out and adopt and begin implementing policies which are based on the realities of today and the likelihoods of tomorrow instead of on the dead fantasies of yesterday.

Ideals Becoming Necessities

Ambassador Adlai Stevenson, addressing newspaper executives in New York City last night, defended our present position and tactics in Vietnam.
At the same time, he employed some of the same arguments and tactics one would normally expect of Adlai Stevenson, the individual, to describe what he thought would be, once we ever could attain it, a better and surer kind of foreign policy for the United States.

He made hold, this man of words, to run up all previous American foreign policy in two parts, one of "long tradition" and the other one of "brief supremacy."

To succeed these two phases, we now need, Stevenson said, to enter a new kind of international partnership. Such a partnership, he said, should involve "more genuine consultation, a more concerted search for the common good" and a "genuine sharing in the formulation and execution of policies" and a "readiness to compromise" and to admit that the occasional mistakes have been ours.

And talking:
"It's something to see when they are seen, even the direct confrontation of American power by substituting an international policing apparatus, we should hasten to do so."
"The Greek story, the Congo, Cyprus, they all involved us in less expensive, more understanding and abuse than the direct confrontation of Southeast Asia."

"We must have an end to us to it. It is the underlying of worldwide freedom. But we should seek to maintain it."

There is no need to pretend to ourselves that there is, in this country, any automatic agreement with the arguments and ideals Mr. Stevenson tries to present. Many of Mr. Stevenson's own countrymen think we are behaving the way we should, going it alone, in Southeast Asia. Many Americans profess to believe that internationalism is a trap and a delusion and a betrayal of what we really should stand for and the way we should act in the world. And under Mr. Stevenson's statement of what would be ideal procedure for us we could no longer hold that role which is now favored with some of our policy makers—that of the big virtuous world policeman who has accepted the great and honorable duty of keeping order everywhere by his own wisdom and power.

But Mr. Stevenson's ideals are, to many others, no longer ideals at all, but the urgent necessities of our country. They are, rather than the wistful ideas of theorists, the hard, common sense realities we must seek to attain.

They are, actually, the only techniques and procedures that will work. And they must, eventually, come to be recognized, as well, as a high form of expression of our national leadership. Leadership toward such international civilization cannot fail to be part of the highest interpretation of this American dream of ours.

Education for Education?

Dr. Homer Babidge, president of the University of Connecticut, made one of the most interesting and thoughtful, and most provocative, speeches of his career yesterday. He made it down in New York, and he made it at the annual convention of the National Catholic Education Association, and what made the speech unusual was that it suddenly raised the question of whether the highest function of education should not be education.

Another way to ask that same question would be to ask whether other aims of political or utilitarian nature are not being given too much priority. Dr. Babidge asked the question both ways. "We have a responsibility," he said, "to consider whether, in our search for peace and understanding, education serves best as a conscious device for the achievement of immediate political goals or whether it has a higher function to perform."

He directed his speculation particularly to the field of international education. He felt that perhaps international education has become "too self-conscious on the one hand and too narrowly concerned with demonstrable results and hence with utilitarian programs."

"I think we have to come to grips," said Dr. Babidge, "with the issue of whether or not our goal is true international understanding—weakness and all—a kind of cultural one-upmanship."
He thought he detected, on the American educational scene, a growing emphasis on foreign languages not as liberal arts but as utilitarian tools; the structuring of area studies programs with a conscious pattern of occupational preparation; and the growing realization that it is necessary for a responsible educational institution, dedicated to the goals of world understanding and peace, to immerse itself in these exciting programs of direct international involvement; to offer instructions in Chinese; to have an AID contract; to send its faculty and students abroad; to have an AID contract; to send its faculty and students abroad; to have an AID contract; to send its faculty and students abroad.

Dr. Babidge, of course, runs some risk of being labeled an isolationist, and a 19th century mind and some will probably also think of him as being old-fashioned and narrow-minded. But his questions are, in an age when the federal government is officially proclaimed education an adjunct of defense, and when schools are being told they must satisfy a need for social integration before they can be allowed to dispense education, quite legitimate and pertinent. Koufax Stops Mets With but Four Hits

NEW YORK (AP)—Sandy Koufax is a bust as a Sunday pitcher. He took care of that Thursday night. Koufax, the arthritic-shoulder southpaw, pitched a four-hitter and gained his second complete game victory in as many starts in the Los Angeles Dodgers' 2-1 triumph over the New York Mets.

If the elbow responds well, Koufax will draw the Phillies at Los Angeles next Monday night. Against the Mets, Koufax was much sharper than in his first effort against Philadelphia. He gave up just six hits and walked five.
