



weekend, that the President and his chief advisors on Vietnam are now making some effort to find a way out of the dead-end, no-choice policy imprisonment in which they placed themselves and their country and the world when, in February, they decided to escalate the war in Vietnam.

The first sign of their developing uneasiness came when, after the Honohulu conference of military leaders, it began to be reported that we might be planning to shift our military attention and effort back toward South Vietnam, and an effort to withstand the guerrilla aggression there. This, as a policy, could mean that we could stop escalat ing the war in North Vietnam, where escalation, sooner or later, is so likely to bring both Communist China and Soviet Russia into action.

This first sign of possible adjustment in Washington policy was followed by another burst of oratorical toughness, in which the administration suddenly began denouncing all those on the lomestic scene who have, in various degree, and from varying motives, questioned the perfect wisdom of the Johnson strategy in Vietnam.

But even before this new round very far, Secretary of State Rusk himself suddenly shifted from criticism of Americans who criticized our policy in Vietnam to a special announcement Sunday night, that the United States "will gladly participate" in a conference to discuss guarantees for the neutrality and territorial integrity of the nation of Cambodia. This is the proposed conference both Britain and Russia have been pushing, and the proposed conferees would include representatives of the United States, North Vietnam, South Vietnam, Communist China, Laos, Britain, Russia and France. The formal announcement from Sec-

retary Rusk last night said: "It has been proposed that an international conference composed of the governments of the countries which took part in the Geneva Conference of 1954 be called to consider the question of the neutrality and territorial integrity of Cambodia.

"After reviewing this proposal with the President last week, and at his direction, we have informed a number of interested governments that if such a conference is called we will gladly par-

sutrality. Here, as elsewhere in Asia, the United States wholeheartedly supports the right of each nation to shape ts own course. To support this right for Cambodia is fully consistent with the purpose of the United States to support the right of every nation in Southeast Asia to lead a free and independent

Perhaps the most important and significant fact in this statement is its designation of Averell Harriman as the prospective American negotiator. He has the proper reputation as a sharp and shrewd evaluator of Communist words and deeds. The overall significance is, of course,

that the conference about Cambodia might find itself with little time for the special problem of Cambodia. For the conference would include all the parties nevitably involved in any making of truce or peace in Vietnam, and it would be for results in that direction that such a conference would be watched. It is late along the road to World War MI, and it would be delusion to place very much hope on the possibilities of this proposed conference. The easiest guess is that it will never be held. What can see and note, however, is that the Johnson administration has now grown apper enough about its February decision in Vietnam to begin to try to regain some freedom of policy, for

rationalization will ever change Prime Minister Shastri's feeling that his offense was one of joining the suggestion of Prime Minister Pearson of Canada and Senator Fulbright of Arkansas that the United States ought to consider halting its bombing in North Vietnam in order to give peace negotiations a better opening.

And as for President Ayub Khan of Pakistan, he knows well enough what he has done. In this very period when the United States was looking for allies against Communism in Southeast Asia, President Ayub, leader of one of our chief Asian allies, was making sweet talk and normalizing his country's relations with the leaders of Communist China in Peking.

These two Asian heads of state should not, by the record, feel that any special discrimination has been shown against them. As one Pakistan newspaper recognized; the behavior involved was "strange" and "unprecedented." to newspapermen, commentators, and legislators on the Washington scene, it has become routine, disturbingly routine.



These hits were recorded on a 2-4nch-diameter sensor. Scientists figure the whole 10x22-foot spacecraft has been scored by hundreds of times that many particles.
