SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. planes and helicopters and Vietnamese ground forces have killed an estimated 200 Viet Cong guerrillas in three operations ranging from the Mekong River delta in the south to the sandy coastal plains of central Viet Nam, spokesmen said today.

Two Americans were killed and five others wounded in the actions Wednesday and today. This brought the toll of U.S. combat fatalities in Viet Nam to 363 since December 1961.

U.S. aircraft made two raids and Vietnamese Skyraider fighter-bombers made a third in the continuing air campaign against North Viet Nam's highway system. Results reportedly varied from "highly successful" to moderate damage.







It so happens, however, that the confusion and armed disorder which might endanger the lives of Americans in the Dominican Republic is also a disorder which threatens to restore to office the last duly elected President of the country, one Juan Bosch, whose fulfillment of his elected term was interrupted two years ago by a coup executed by a military junta which accused him of being too much in association with and debt to possible Communist influences. So the debate will be posed, and the initial question will be this:

Have we landed Marines primarily to protect our own citizens, or have we used the protection of our own citimens as our pretext for getting into the country with the show of force which may defeat the revolution now If the revolution succeeds, President Bosch will undoubtedly resume his

office. He himself proclaims he is no Communist, and never has been, and never will be. Such disclaimers do not impress some observers who have been watching his career and his friends. The debate, one can predict safely enough, will never be settled conclusively, unless it is by the prompt withdrawal of our Marines as soon as the evacuation of American citizens has been completed, followed by our toler-

ance of success for the pro-Bosch revolution which was, at the moment of our intervention, apparently on the way to winning control of the country. Somehow, one doesn't expect thes two things to happen. Nor, whatever the outward face South

American diplomacy may put on the situation, need one expect our "good neighbors" in this hemisphere to recover easily from the inner shock all of them are going to feel at the news that United States Marines have landed, once again, thus ending the supposed end of "gunboat diplomacy" which was symbolized when our Marines were withdrawn from Nicaragua way back in 1933. We may be on our way to losing leadership and prestige in our own hemisphere, because of the way we use

Against such risks, one must calculate what reaction both at home and abroad might have been or might be even now if the United States should somehow fail to protect its citizens against possible tragedy in the midst of street anarchy. The future detailed pattern of Presi-







The selectmen responded by appointing a charter revision commission, which worked out a charter that Martin proposed. In June 1947 the voters approved the finished charter by a large majority.

In 1952, Martin was appointed as general manager for the town—the second man to fill the post that he had, himself, helped to create.

In this capacity, he organized the town's personnel program, instituted a detailed budget system, established a central purchasing system, organized program after program for the construction of water and sewer mains, storm sewers, highways and school buildings.
