### South Windsor School Board Hears Middle School Plans

Educational specifications for a proposed middle school were presented to the board of education Tuesday night by the administration.

The proposed school was estimated at a "ballpark figure" of one and a half million dollars and requires some 20 to 25 acres of land.

The specifications call for 24 classrooms, 6 science classrooms, 2 music rooms, 2 art rooms, 2 home economic rooms, 2 industrial art rooms (1 wood and 1 metal), a remedial instruction room, a cafeteria with a stage at the end of the cafeteria, a gymnasium with equipment storage area, a preview area, a student viewing of 875 square feet and shelf area for curriculum material.

There would also be a teachers work room and curriculum office with equipment for typing, files and duplicating machines, and a teachers lounge.

The six science rooms would be located in a separate building, a laboratory building with a laboratory bench along with sink and utilities be provided for each two science classrooms.

The remedial instruction room would be the size of a regular classroom and be divided into two sections with a movable partition. The second would be designed for two remedial rooms of 600 square feet. One would be designed primarily as a food laboratory with spaces for four kitchen units.

The second would be designed as a clothing center with the provision for teaching and actual manipulation of tools.

The gymnasium would be divided into two instructional centers. Because of economy it was suggested that a central type of divider as opposed to a soundproof one would be acceptable. A drop ceiling with lights was mentioned.

The two music rooms would have a capacity of 80 pupils each. The rooms would be acoustically designed so that choral and instrumental instruction might be carried on.

The play area around the school would be divided into four rectangular areas for physical education activities. Superimposed on these areas would be softball diamonds and spaces for soccer, track, basketball, and volleyball activities.

It was also suggested that a considerable area adjacent to the school should be paved with court markings, thereby allowing it for spring and fall use when conditions are unseasonable.

Second School Board Supt. Charles Warner said he had visited two junior high schools in Springfield and New Haven and discussed with them the advantages and disadvantages of housing Grades 7 and 8 together.

Board members expressed surprise that the education specifications called for an extracurricular building.

The administration says the school enrollment will be such that the school will be open by 1967 to house 900 pupils and that it should be located on the Orchard Hill school property.

It also says that in 1969 a budget of \$750,000 would be needed in the western half of town. Supt. Warner said that the school would be built with a total of 1,200 pupils and that it would be built on a 20-acre site on the Orchard Hill school property.

### Andover Town Voters Faced With Big Decisions

Aside from the first item on the 20-item ballot, to choose a moderator, and the 20th item, to do any other business proposed to come before said meeting, the electors and citizens of Andover will act on 18 major items of business when the Annual Budget meeting convenes at 8 p.m. Saturday at the elementary school.

Officials to be elected include a building official, a job held by Percy B. Cook, for a one-year term; two members to the recreation commission for three-year terms; and a member of the capital improvement planning committee for a three-year term.

Of much interest will be the nomination and election of all three Andover members of the Board of Education. Usually only one member would be up for election, which would be that of the member whose term expires July 1. Currently this is the post now held by Mrs. Donald Richards. However, the recent resignation of Donald Clough, with two years to go, and James Foran, one year remaining, make all three open.

Mrs. Richards has indicated a desire to serve another term if the people of the town are agreeable to the idea. George Munson, Mrs. Francis Haines, and Larry T. Scanlon have all expressed a willingness to serve. All three have lived here for a number of years, all have been very active in community affairs, and all have children at Andover. Other people are reported to be interested, but have made no statement about it.

Salaries of town officials are the subject of several items. A salary for the first selectman of \$1,200, now paid \$600, will be voted on; a salary for the tax collector of \$1,900 will be voted on; the salary of the town clerk, now \$2,400, is up for readjustment to \$1,200, with a minimum of 25 hours a week in office hours, and all fees collected going to the town.

The question of salary adjustments is connected with item 11, "to see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to provide a full-time clerk to assist the various Town Officers, Boards, and Commissions with the return of their official duties." Some of the duties now performed by

### Events In Capital

WASHINGTON (AP) — A government investigating agency today reprimanded the Army for what it said was persistently poor maintenance of billions of dollars worth of equipment.

"Notwithstanding the vast sums of money appropriated annually by the Congress for maintenance purposes," the General Accounting Office said, "we continue to find widespread instances of inadequate maintenance of Army vehicles, aircraft, electronic equipment and missiles."

The GAO noted that this was the latest in a series of reports dealing with the problem, "and the underlying management deficiencies were often similar to those described in this report."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal banking regulatory agencies today issued a call for a statement of condition of banks at the close of business Monday, April 26.

The call was issued by Comptroller of the Currency James J. Saxon, the Federal Reserve Board's Arthur M. Burns, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

The call covers all national banks and all state banks which are members of the Federal Reserve, which carry federal deposit insurance.

### U.S. Plane Hit By Korean Jets

WASHINGTON (AP) — A U.S. Air Force reconnaissance plane was damaged when two North Korean jet fighters attacked it over international waters more than 80 miles off the coast of Communist North Korea, the Pentagon says.

Reporting the incident Wednesday, the Defense Dept. said the RB77 with six crewmen aboard was on a routine mission Tuesday when the attack occurred.

The plane returned to Yokota Air Force Base in Japan and no injuries were suffered by the crew, the Pentagon said. The RB77 had been on a mission to track the MiG17, but the return fire was not learned.

State Department officials reported unidentified whether or not the plane was damaged. There would be a problem of whom to protest to since the Communist North Korean regime, the U.N. Korean Liaison Commission still exists.

A spokesman said the RB77 was over the Sea of Japan, off the coast of North Korea, when the attack occurred. The brief formal announcement had said the plane was "flying more than 80 miles from the Korean coast, at the time of attack."

There have been 38 such incidents in the Far East and Europe, the latest having occurred March 10 last year over Germany.

### Pakistan Claims Victory In Rann of Kutch Battle

BEAR-BIT, Kutch (AP)—Pakistan forces claim they scored an easy victory over Indian troops in a four-day battle that ended with Pakistani occupation of this oasis in the baked, barren Rann of Kutch.

It is one of the most unlikely and desolate battlegrounds on earth. From the heat-scorched wastes will become miry islands covered by water from the Arabian Sea whipped up by monsoon rains.

The temperature reaches 120 degrees during the day. The densest showers in the blinding heat.

Pakistan field commanders said almost all fighting takes place at night, when the heat subsides. The darkness also allows more freedom of movement across the empty flats when during the day one can see for miles.

Troops are dug in several miles long. Some Pakistani tanks are parked nearby. No villages or civilians can be seen to the east.

The Pakistani officers talked light-heartedly about their combat experience.

"We would have pushed them clear to Bombay," a captain said with a laugh. He said his troops suffered no fatalities in taking Bear-Bit and that the first evacuee was a wounded Indian.

The Pakistanis said they captured the oasis Monday night, inflicting heavy Indian losses. They said in five miles south of what India claims to be its western border at the deserted Rann of Kutch area.

Maj. Gen. Tikka Khan said 100 Indian troops had been killed in heavy fighting since April 9. Khan, Pakistan commander in the Kutch, said only about 20 Pakistani soldiers had been killed. He said 45 Indians had been captured, including two officers.

India claimed 300 Pakistanis have been killed, wounded or captured and put its own losses at 60.

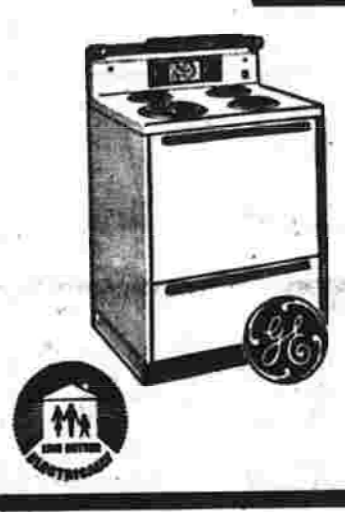

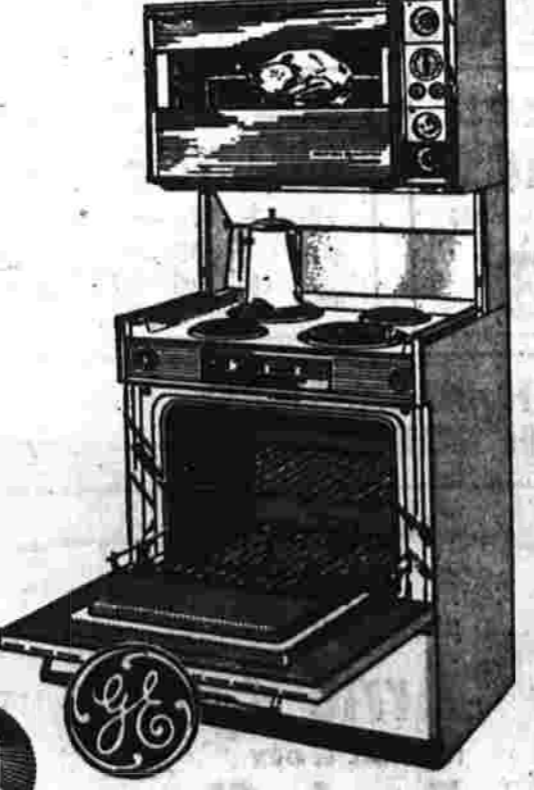

### Women Are Gaining Sit-Down Drinking Approved, But Standing Remains Taboo

The committee has given a favorable report on a bill that would allow women to sit and drink at a bar.  
Unescorted women and female stand-up drinkers would remain taboo under the bill, which was reported out by the General Assembly's Liquor Control Committee Wednesday.  
Under existing state law women are allowed in barrooms but must sit at a table away from the bar.  
The committee also gave a favorable report on a bill that would permit service bars in hotels, restaurants and clubs to remain open until 11 p.m. on Sunday instead of closing at 9 p.m.  
Favorable reports were also given on bills that would: Liberalize the existing restrictions on serving liquor at bowling alley restaurants; Permit the sale of beer in seven-ounce bottles for "take-out" consumption.  
Create a "club banquet permit" authorizing a private club to make its facilities available for weddings and other non-club functions without having to get a special permit on each such occasion.  
Create a "bar liquor permit" authorizing a place to sell liquor without the necessity of also serving food.  
Empower the community to decide by local option if there are certain days of the week in which liquor outlets closed.  
Pistol Sales  
HARTFORD (AP)—A bill that would restrict the sale of pistols in Connecticut was passed by the state Senate Wednesday and sent to the House.  
The measure would forbid the sale of pistols to anyone who has ever been convicted of a felony.  
It would also require a buyer to file an application with the state police commissioner and to the police chief of the town where the buyer lives.  
The buyer would have to wait seven days from the time the copies are sent out before he could purchase the gun.  
Sen. Charles T. Alfano said that the measure had been strongly opposed by gun club members and others. The opponents argued that their right to bear arms was guaranteed by the federal Constitution. Alfano said: "The Suffolk Democrat said he did not think any constitutional issue was involved."  
The measure passed on a voice vote.
