## Mississippi's Last Act Slated in Hannibal

HANNIBAL, Mo. (AP)—The Mississippi River lapped at store fronts in Hannibal today as rivermen prepared for the last act in a flood tragedy which has run from Minnesota to Missouri.

Churning river water, which has claimed 12 lives in Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Illinois and caused almost \$180 million in damage, is expected to flatten out in the wide river banks of the lower Mississippi.

The U.S. Weather Bureau said the water would crest between 25 and 25.5 feet Sunday at Quincy, Ill., where the flood stage is 17 feet.

A crest between 24.5 and 25 feet will hit about midnight Sunday at Hannibal—a river town with no levees.

"About the only damage we expect at Hannibal—except for a little mud and silt—will be from tourists," a policeman said. The officer said the streets were jammed Friday by persons "who were just driving down to gawk at the river."

Almost a foot of water covers 16 square blocks of the downtown area—but no one is worried. Only about 25 families have been evacuated because of water surrounding their homes.

While businessmen in Hannibal sandbagged their doors and built wooden bridges four feet above the water, the grim fight against the backlash of the river continued upstream.

A critical spot is north of Quincy, Ill., where the water crest of a levee at the Rock Creek

drainage district is slowly being eaten away by the river. It is adjacent to a levee in the Indian Grove district which splintered earlier this week and sent the river rolling over about 10,000 acres of farmland.

The crest has subsided at Levee at Dubuque, Clinton and Davenport, Iowa and Moline, East Moline and Rock Island, Ill. But the water still pushes at the sodden dikes.

Workers battled the river at Niota, Ill., where soft spots kept appearing in the dikes. Workers reinforced soft spots or built at Port Madison, Iowa, just across the muddy river.

After the river water passes Hannibal, it will push to a crest at St. Louis of a predicted 25 feet on May 7, four feet below the 30-foot flood stage.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers estimated the record floods had caused about \$10 million in damage between Dubuque, Iowa and Hannibal.

The citizens of Hannibal weren't worried. One store owner has put out chairs before the sand bags around his business. Why? He wants to sit and watch the river rise.

A group of youths sailed down Main Street in a mailbox.

An unclimbed mannikin from a department store stands waist-deep in water on one street with a "help, help" sign around its neck. That's what you might expect from a town that spawned Samuel Clemens, who writing as Mark Twain made the Mississippi River and its legends live.

WEST HARTFORD (AP)—Joe Rockmore, 18, owns a baby cayman, which is like an alligator, because a photographer was bitten.

Malcolm Woronoff, who works for Underground Photographers Surveys of Boston, was taking pictures of sewer pipes on Griswold Avenue Friday to check for breaks when something fastened onto his thumb.

He yelled and a crowd which included Joe gathered.

"I've seen rats before in sewers, but they always ran away. Not this thing. He just hung on," Woronoff said.

Joe ran home, and got back with a note as Woronoff was nursing his bitten thumb and wondering what to do with the beast.

## Railroad Awaits New Federal Aid

NEW YORK (AP)—A \$3 million federal grant is "in the works" to aid the embattled New Haven Railroad, and hopes are bright for continuation of passenger service until a final solution is reached.

In Washington Friday, officials of the Housing and Home Finance Agency reported that a formal application for the grant would be filed by New York and Connecticut "by the end of next week."

Filing of applications in the past based on previous conferences, has been tantamount to approval.

Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., reported later in the capital that they had gotten the New Haven program back on the track.

In New York City a hearing on a petition by the New Haven to curtail commuter service ended last night after 12 days of testimony.

Interstate Commerce Commissioner William H. Tucker, who presided at the hearings, said oral arguments will begin next Thursday in Washington before all 10 ICC members.

A ruling in favor of the New Haven, or an ICC refusal to ban cuts for up to a year, would leave the railroad free to cut back commuter service into the city on July 28. A very 25,000 commuters from Westchester County and Connecticut use the line.

A parade of witnesses during the hearings argued pro and con about curtailing or discontinuing service. Anxiety marking the start of the hearings has diminished since announcement by New York and Connecticut of a \$4.5 million "demonstration project" which would keep the commuter service running for up to 18 months.

The \$3 million federal aid would wrap up the project, since each state is supplying \$1,500,000 to make the \$4.5 million total. Also, Connecticut and New York officials said they would continue work on a federal

state plan to aid New Haven commuter operations further in \$10 million more in federal funds being sought for the New Haven by New York and Connecticut. The two states would match the added federal grant with \$5 million apiece.

At the windup of the New York hearings, Leroy E. Peabody Jr., a transportation consultant retained by New York, testified that the road's net operating income on commuter runs into the city amounted to \$129,621 last year.

Robert G. Bleakney Jr., counsel for the New Haven, challenged Peabody's calculations. Bleakney also denied a Peabody assertion that the New Haven continued to lose money only on its long-haul passenger and freight services.

Tucker asked at one point whether it would be possible to determine the financial position of the New Haven's operations as of now.

Peabody said this would require more data from New Haven management and estimated a study of last month's operations would require until the end of August to complete.

State Sen. Max Berking, a Democrat representing eastern Westchester County, testified against the proposed cut in commuter service and elimination of station stops at Mount Vernon, Columbus Avenue, Felham and New Rochelle.

Berking cited figures to show the high cost of driving into the city by car. As for buses, he said, a \$30 million fleet of 800 vehicles would be needed.

### For View On Yale Scolded Viet Crisis

NEW HAVEN (AP)—House Minority Leader Gerald R. Ford has scolded university teachers and students who display what he called an "emotional disregard for the morality and facts of the case" in Viet Nam.

The Michigan Republican made the remarks in a speech Friday at a Yale Law School alumni dinner.

There has been considerable criticism of the administration's one of the few conservatives to Viet Nam policy at Yale.

Ford, introducing himself as come out of the Yale Law School, said he considered it incredible "that a source of such irresponsible modern-day 'know-nothing' dissent, based on emotional disregard for the morality and facts of the case, should spring from a few of our university campuses."

"And I consider it appalling," he continued, "that much of the leadership for picketing with anti-American slogans, in what at times amounts to irresponsible mob action, comes from a small minority of university professors purporting to carry forward the banner of free academic inquiry."

The congressman likened the student-led peace march in Washington recently to peace demonstrations during the 1890's when Europe was being threatened by the Nazis.

"Today," Ford said, "our so-called teach-ins and peace demonstrations cry for peace at any price while the seeds of Communist atrocity take root. And yet the appeasers speak of morality."

Ford's speech received polite but restrained applause, an observer said.

### Burglar Sentenced

BRIDGEPORT (AP)—A 28-year-old Bridgeport man who was tracked down by a trial of blood tests from a Fayetteville Avenue grill has been sentenced to serve from 18 months to three years in State's prison for breaking and entering.

The sentence was imposed Friday by Superior Court Judge Frank Covello upon Joseph Richardson, 600 Lafayette St.

Richardson had pleaded guilty to breaking and entering Rully's Campus Grille, 565 Fairfield Ave., last March 12.

Richardson suffered a severe laceration of his left hand in the burglary.

## Dominican Battle Goes On, Despite Cease-Fire Order

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—Heavy firing continued in this rebellion-torn capital today despite an agreed cease-fire in the Dominican Republic's week-old civil war.

Rebel leaders fighting for the return to power of exiled former President Juan D. Bosch admitted they did not have complete control of their men, who include armed civilians and disaffected young military officers.

Much of the firing was in the vicinity of the U.S. Embassy where one U.S. Marine was killed Friday.

U.S. Defense Department spokesmen in Washington said 14 Marines and 4 paratroopers have been wounded in clashes with the rebels. They were the first casualties among the U.S. forces landed to protect American civilians.

Fighting went on through the night in the eerie light of parachute flares.

U.S. Ambassador W. Tapley Bennett announced the cease-fire went into effect at 8:30 p.m. Friday but indicated to newsmen that foreign elements might have taken over the rebellious movement.

President Johnson said in a statement in Washington Friday night that he was responsible for restoring peace and re-establishing constitutional government in the Dominican Republic.

The cease-fire pact, Bennett said in his announcement, guarantees the personal safety of combatants on both sides, including prisoners and those in asylum in foreign embassies.

Bennett emphasized that only a cease-fire had been discussed with the rebels and not a final settlement. Signed for the rebels were Hugo Conde and Col. Fausto Caamano, whose brother, Francisco, is described as the rebels' top military leader.

It was not immediately disclosed who signed the cease-fire agreement for the junta forces, headed by Brig. Gen. Elias Wessiny Wessiny who rallied elements of the army and air force and the navy to oppose the pro-Bosch forces.

The papal nuncio in Santo Domingo, the Rt. Rev. Emmanuel Clarizio, played a key role in negotiating the cease-fire. He was in touch with the rebels and later met with the Wessiny Junta at its headquarters at Isidro air base, 20 miles outside of Santo Domingo.

Latest estimates of the toll of the fighting, which started when pro-Bosch military officers forced the resignation of a civilian junta government headed by Donald Reid Cabral, were put at more than 500 killed with another 500 possibly killed. The injured ran into the hundreds.

In a major battle Friday with some 1,800 police loyal to the junta, rebel forces won the massive Ozama fortress, which commands a strategic position on the west side of the river of the same name in the capital.

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## Request UN To Conduct Examination

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union accused the United States today of armed aggression in the Dominican Republic and demanded an emergency meeting of the United Nations Security Council.

"It is completely obvious that the landing of U.S. Marines in the Dominican Republic is nothing but an act of direct aggression against the people of this small country," said the Soviet news agency Tass.

Tass said the Marine landing is "yet another attempt to keep in power a reactionary, an anti-popular dictatorship regime, which suits the U.S.A., and to suppress the strivings of the people for freedom and independence."

"The U.S. intervention is being carried out," Tass added, "as the colonialists have always done in the past, under the hackneyed pretext of 'defending the safety of U.S. citizens.'"

The Tass dispatch said "the attempts of the government of the United States to assume the role of the ruler of the destinies of peoples, to dictate its will upon them, to crush national liberation movements evoke just worldwide indignation and protests."

Tass said the Soviet Union "has instructed its representa-

## Bomb Damages U.S. Consulate in Montreal

MONTREAL (AP)—A dynamite bomb exploded at the U.S. consulate early today, smashing 78 windows and six doors.

The floor through an elevated passageway between two parts of the consulate building was badly damaged by the blast. The bomb was placed under the passageway. No one was in the building.

"We have no clue as to all as to why the bomb was planted," said U.S. Consul-General Richard Hawkins. "This is very unusual for Canada."

There have been anti-American demonstrations protesting U.S. military action in Viet Nam and the treatment of Negroes in Selma, Ala. but these were conducted by advocates of nonviolence.

There was a series of bombings in Montreal in 1963, set off by French-speaking Canadians seeking independence of central government rule for Quebec Province.

Police estimated six sticks of dynamite were placed in a 30-foot corridor, which is about four feet above ground and connects the two U.S.-owned buildings.

The stone construction was credited with limiting damage. Glass from 16 windows littered the grounds.

The consulate is in a residential area of Montreal. It was the scene of demonstrations in March by pacifists who protested treatment of Negroes in Alabama and U.S. military action in Viet Nam.

## Captured Cong Arms Called Red Chinese

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—A big cache of captured Viet Cong arms included precision, lightweight flame throwers, presumably furnished by Communist China, the Vietnamese army announced today.

Also discovered were East German heavy machine guns described as especially suited for use as anti-aircraft weapons.

The announcement came as Saigon girded itself for possible trouble during the May 1 labor holiday.

The arms cache was found Friday during a three-day operation in coastal mangrove swamps about 60 miles south of the capital.

The government said 182 Viet Cong were killed during the action, including 82 at the site of the weapons cache. Another 35 Viet Cong were captured and 42 Communist suspects rounded up, the government said.

South Vietnamese casualties were given as three killed and eleven wounded.

Most of the Communist dead apparently resulted from air strikes by helicopters and fighter-bombers. About 80 guerrillas were machine gunned by U.S. helicopters as they tried to swim across a small river.

Civilians in the area were warned of the air strikes by leaflets and loudspeakers and some 4,000 were said to have poured into government-controlled areas.

Flying squads of combat police headed off trouble between two dissident labor unions in Saigon today. There were no injuries or arrests.

## Herald Correspondent, 95, Finds Youth in Growing Old

"I feel so young about getting old. It's a new experience." So said Miss Susan B. Pendleton, The Herald's Hebron news correspondent on the eve of her 95th birthday, which she is celebrating today.

Her thoughts on the event are typified by a verse she wrote some years ago, when, as the president complained about the fuss made over her birthdays:

When I get a birthday card  
I pitch it in the back yard,  
Head held high.  
Though I'm only an old woman,  
I'm something like Harry Truman,  
Who feels the same as I.

Miss Pendleton has been writing the Hebron news column in The Herald for 40 years. She prefers creative writing, but she says journalism pays more. Her creativity seeps through in her accounts of Hebron's history and her comments on the changes in seasons and society.

Her copy, which she mails to the paper five days each week, goes across the editor's desk largely unchanged, and she is read far beyond the limits of her town.

Miss Pendleton lives in a rambling colonial house where she was born back in 1870. The house is across Rt. 85 and up a way from St. Peter's Episcopal Church. It was built in 1812, according to numerals cut in the dining room fireplace.

The other day it was surrounded by lilac and other shrubs about to burst into leaf; daffodils and dandelions were blooming here and there in the new green grass.

In order to visit Miss Pendleton, you must go under the back shed and knock at the kitchen door. She may not hear you, her hearing is poor, but her great-nephew's dog will, and so you are welcomed into the kitchen, and into the dining room where she is finishing her lunch.

The wide board floors have the feel of many feet and the furnishings are antique, not the polished and preserved sort, but well-used chairs and tables and

well-remembered china and pewter.

Most of the old clocks are not running, but the one on the living room mantle ticks away with a muted tick. The living room contains the leisure time paraphernalia of Miss Pendleton's great-nephew, Horace Sellers, who teaches school in Glastonbury and lives with her.

On closer questioning, you learn that the cross-word puzzles and a stack of Saturday Review of Literature magazines belong to Miss Pendleton.

Her own bedroom, however, is across the front hall. Here she has gathered her most personal possessions: A rocking chair by a window looking out into the yard, an old typewriter, some pictures and a wall of books and manuscripts.

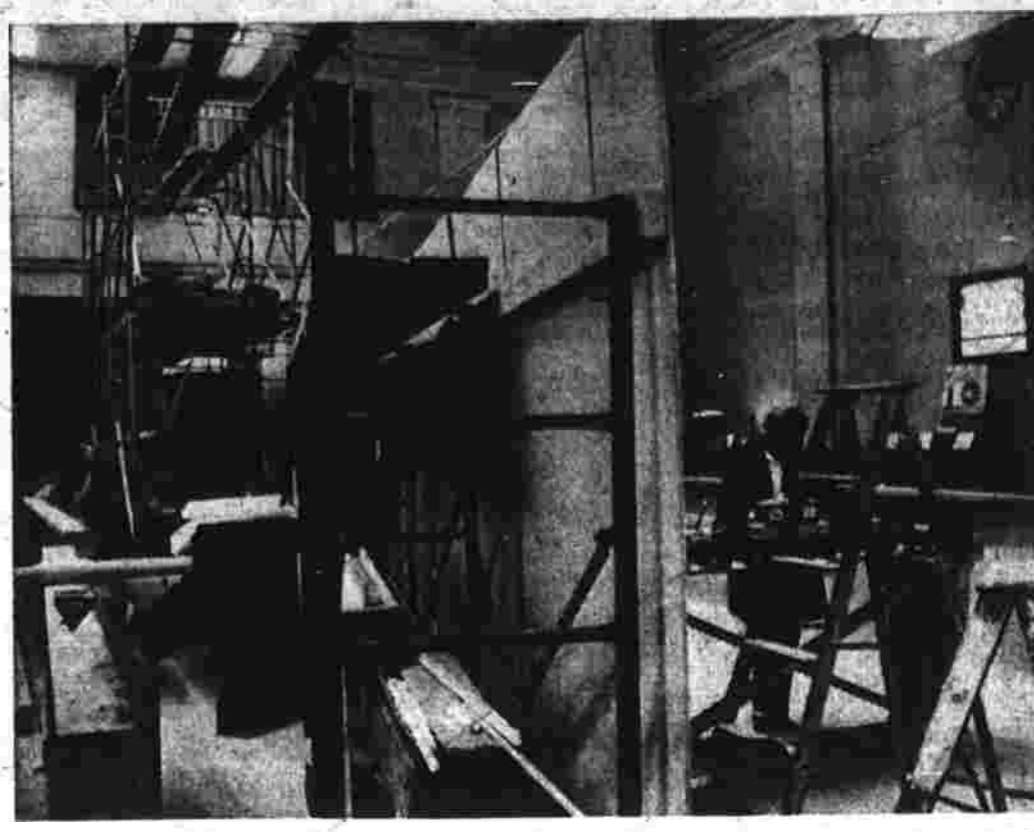

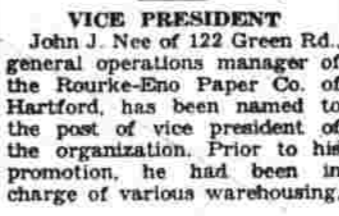

Retail Sales Up In Town by 13%

Retail Sales in Manchester during 1964 rose by 12.4 per cent over the year 1963 and showed the second highest increase in the state, being topped only by Norwalk, which showed a rise of 13.4 per cent.

The figures, released by Philip Dine, chairman of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce Retail Division showed that Manchester was far above the state average of 7.7 per cent increase. The total retail sales locally for 1964 hit \$95,687,000, compared to \$85,129,000 reported for 1963. The figures, compiled by the Connecticut Development Commission, showed that Manchester had a 6.9 per cent increase for the fourth quarter of 1964 over the corresponding period last year, with sales totaling \$25,481,000 in 1964 and \$23,836,000 in 1963. In reporting the figures, Dine said, "We are more than pleased with the year 1964 and, from all indications, it looks as though 1965 is going to be even a bigger year."

NEW YORK — (NEA) — While George C. Scott's blue Lincoln was parked outside Sardi's East, collecting overtime parking tickets, he was inside discussing his appearance on "Bob Hope Presents" and his forthcoming movie, "The Yellow Rolls-Royce."

The press agent for the Hope show turned three shades of green as other cars were mentioned, and Scott smiled. This car thing is getting out of hand.

"A Time for Killing," the Hope drama, is Scott's first dramatic appearance since his series East Side/West Side was canceled. (He did a Red Skelton guest appearance, but that hardly qualifies as drama.) He liked the script, written by Edward Anhalt, who won an Academy Award for his "Becket" screenplay.

**No More Series**  
"I was interested in working with Anhalt, who also directed the show. It was his first directorial assignment, and I thought he did quite well. I think he'll continue in directing."

Scott, known as an outspoken perfectionist, is fairly vehement as he says, "Nothing could get me back on series television as an actor. Perhaps as a producer. But if I were to produce a series, nobody would put it on the air. I would want the series to be—and I am going to use a dangerous word—distinctive."

In order to get back before a live audience, George has accepted a brief run in London in Chekhov's "Three Sisters."

"I had a magnificent play offered to me this fall, but I couldn't do it economically. I need to get back before a live audience. I begin to get nervous if I don't stay in there. It gives a charge to the batteries."

**A Few Good Nights**  
Scott says he has never been totally satisfied with any of his film performances. "Some times I'm appalled, sometimes I'm surprised, but I'm never happy. There's a lack of control in film, where you are at the mercy of mechanics. This, I realize, is the bargain you make when you do film."

"But on the stage, when you play a role six or eight months, you have a few good nights where there is an awareness and an edge. Things are tuned right and everyone is on the same wave length. These nights are very precious, like a magnificent love affair. But like all love affairs, the next night it all goes awry. Also, like a love affair, there is great hate involved. But not in film. You can't see film, and you can't hate what you can't see."

TV Rubbernecking

NEW YORK (AP) — It is very probable that a team of producers named Phil D'Antoni and Norman Baer have done more for arm-chair rubbernecking than anyone since the days of Burton Holmes of the lectures and Fitzpatrick of the movie travel talks. They invented, for all practical purposes, the television star-guided tour.

Perhaps Princess Grace's dignified "Tour of Monaco" a few seasons back was the seed, but the idea really blossomed with "Elizabeth Taylor in London" and "Sophia Loren in Rome," the first two D'Antoni-Baer super travelogues. Their success not only established the production firm but brought them a flood of offers by the great and near-great eager to guide future TV tours.

D'Antoni said, "The Taylor show grew out of the question — 'Who is the biggest star in the world?' — and courage enough to ask if she was interested. The Loren program involved another exciting personality. But, quite frankly, there are only five or six names in show business big enough to support such shows."

One of them is Rex Harrison, and the producers are now making arrangements for a "Week-end in Paris with Rex and Rachel." Rachel is actress Rachel Roberts, Harrison's wife.

Others they would be very happy to sign are Cary Grant, Doris Day — and, of course, Greta Garbo. And that's just about the whole list.

Coming up next Monday is their special "Melina Mercouri's Greece," on ABC.

"You don't want stars who are seen very much — and that immediately eliminates all the popular television names, except Bob Hope, who is in a special category. We did have some preliminary talks about a 'Lullie Ball in Ireland' — she's Irish of course — but it couldn't be worked out," Baer said.

One side-product is that all their friends amuse themselves thinking up gag travelogue ideas: "Buddy Hackett's Brooklyn," "Carl Reiner's Bronx," "Jack Benny's Waukegan," "Milton Berle's Lindy's," "Eddie Fisher's Philadelphia," and so forth.

Next season, in addition to turning out a couple of their specialties, Baer and D'Antoni will produce six ABC specials starring Robert Preston. Each will explore the geography and characteristics of a different region of the United States.

## 'Buzzard Roost' Sandwich— The Birthplaces of the Stars

NEW YORK—A fascinating cross-section of American folklore is represented by the birthplaces of some of the personalities who appear regularly on CBS.

The Alabama home town of Jim Nabors, tar of "Gomer Pyle—USMC," for instance, is Sylacauga, a musical-sounding Indian name meaning "buzzard roost." From the local quarries has come stone for the U.S. Supreme Court Building and the Presidential Palace in Havana.

Ted Mack, host of "The Original Amateur Hour," was born in Greeley, Colo. Settled in 1870, the town was an outgrowth of Union Colony, a cooperative enterprise conceived by Horace Greeley, New York Tribune editor who knew early that the West was worth going to.

Dr. George Crothers, host of "Lamp Unto My Feet," comes from Fort Morgan, Colo., which began as a station and military post on the Overland Trail during the California gold rush. It was named for its first commander, Col. C. A. Morgan. The high school has a large collection of Indian relics.

From Sandwich, Ill., comes Hugh (Lumpy) Brannum, the Mr. Green Jeans of "Captain Kangaroo." The town was so named by emigrants from Sandwich, Mass., which had been named after Sandwich, England.

Webster City, Iowa, home town of Don MacLaughlin of "As the World Turns," is a fit subject for historical speculation. Does it honor the memory of Noah or Daniel? Neither! Settled in 1850 by Wilson C. Brewer, it was named six years later for the operator of a regional stage line. There was a Noah Webster who built the first permanent residence at nearby Ames, Iowa, but he had nothing to do with dictionaries, either.

Cherryvale, Kansas, where Vivian Vance of "The Lucy Show" was born, was so named by a railroad which laid out the town site "in a broad valley of wonderful fertility." There wasn't a cherry tree in sight but the name was attractive to emigrants from the East.

Edgar Buchanan, who plays Uncle Joe in "Petticoat Junction" on the CBS Television Network, comes from Humansville, Mo., about which there is no historical mystery at all. It was started in 1830 by James G. Human, a wanderer from South Carolina.

Owatonna, Minn., where E. G. Marshall of "The Defenders" was born, takes its name from a very crooked little river, but the Indian word means "straight."
